Weather

Plants Face First Freeze of the Season

Green Country had its second warmest September on record, but this weekend will likely be the first freeze of the season and the plants in your garden will definitely feel the effects. Todd Lasseigne, president and CEO of the Tulsa Botanic Garden, says not all plants are created equally when it comes to cold hardiness, but those still growing are in for a shock. Lasseigne says many plants can survive a couple of hours of freezing temps, if it stays above killing freeze territory, which is around 24 degrees. On average, Tulsa's first freeze isn't until November 2nd, so we are ahead of schedule for the cold.

Possible Tornado in Wagoner County

Widespread powerful storms raked the area last night causing extensive damage. The McKinney Auction building off Highway 51 had their roof caved in, trees uprooted, and branches crushed ceilings in other places. John Robertson of Porter said he saw a funnel cloud around 11:30 Sunday night from his porch, which caused a tree to fall on the roof of his rental property. The tenant luckily made it out without a scratch but said the storm came out of nowhere. The Red Cross was there today providing assistance. In Wagoner, tree debris covered lawns and power lines were down. The National Weather Service said that same storm system was responsible for an EF-3 tornado in Dallas that night.

Muskogee Businesses Still Feeling Flooding Effects

Chad Wheeler, customer service manager at Wheeler Metals, says he's trying to forget when his family shop took on 4 feet of water, destroying machines and costing them business. Wheeler credits his 100 loyal employees with getting the shop back to business. Chad said it was a three-month process to get machines up and running again, and getting the shop cleaned up and freshly painted. Wheeler said while the loss was devastating, they all came out of it closer and stronger, with a better idea on what to watch for if the river ever floods again.

Pecan Growers Call Record Rainfall A Blessing

All the rain Green Country has received this year was disastrous for some folks, but local pecan growers are finding it to be a blessing in disguise. Lotsee Spradling, owner of Flying G Ranch, has been picking pecans up since she was a little girl. She says that the weather can make or break your crop, and that all the rain this spring came at just the right time for growing season for the pecan trees. While not all pecan growers are as lucky as Spradling this year, she says her crop this year is booming. The rain

combined with the short crop last year has increased production. Even through the spring rain has helped out the pecans, if we get too much rain this fall during the harvest, it's going to be difficult to get into the orchards and collect the pecans with machines if it's too muddy.

Winter Weather Won't Actually Kill Pests

Many people are hoping the winter weather this year will help cull the number of pests brought on by this year's record rainfall in the area. Brian Jervis, a horticulturist at the OSU Extension Office in Tulsa, says despite the wild temp swings and the big temperature drop we had Monday, insects are pretty resilient. Jervis explained that like a car, bugs have a sort of antifreeze they can release in their bodies to help them weather even the coldest, harshest conditions winter can throw at them. If there is a big enough cold snap and it catches bugs unaware, they won't be able to push the antifreeze out in time to stay alive, but overall most end up being just fine. And Jervis warns once the weather thaws back out, you can count on the pests to be back.

Counseling Available for Flooding Victims

Thanks to a grant from FEMA, residents in Tulsa county can get free help after a record spring season. Counseling and Recovery Services of Oklahoma was awarded an exclusive contract from FEMA to provide crisis counseling to those impacted by the June flooding. By December, crisis counselors will hit the streets, knocking on doors in affected neighborhoods, including some that have experienced major flooding twice, letting residents know that help is available. According to the American Psychological Society, 4 out of 10 survivors can experience emotional trauma after a disaster. Although months have passed since the historic flooding, counselors say it's never too late to teach people to cope with that loss.

Snow Falls in Bartlesville

Some Broken Arrow families will spend their Sunday cleaning up damage after a confirmed EF-0 tornado touched down Saturday afternoon. Our team found damage near 101st and County Line Road Sunday. The homeowners say they were just settling in to watch the Sooners play in the Peach Bowl when the storm rolled in and ripped their roof off. The National Weather Service says the tornado had maximum wind speeds of 80 to 85 miles per hour. In October, Oklahoma broke the record for the number of tornadoes in a single year, and after Saturday we are now at 147 tornadoes in the state in 2019.

Tulsa Police Search for Shooting Suspect

Tulsa Police believe the city's latest shooting started in a residential driveway where a man was speaking to someone and when he turned to walk away, he was shot in the back. Sergeant Dedlorn Sanders said no one saw the shooting but multiple neighbors reported hearing shots. The people in the house that the driveway leads to said they heard the shots and then a knock on their back door, where they found a man who was shot and asking for help while the shooter ran from the scene. Police used dogs to search the area, but they were unable to find the suspect. They also have not found the gun that was used.

A faulty headlight prompted a traffic stop Tuesday night where police say they caught some known gang members. Officer Danny Bean says police stopped two men near Queen and MLK Jr Blvd, then ran a routine check of their names. Police say the driver, Deaundre King had a suspended license, and passenger Marquann Cobb had some city warrants. Officers asked them to step out of the car for questioning, and that's when they noticed ammo falling from the car to the ground. Officers reportedly found a handgun on the floorboard and a backpack full of marijuana in the back seat. Both men are now facing charges for the gun and the drugs.

Tulsa Police have released the name of the suspect they were forced to shoot yesterday near Pine street in north tulsa. They say 50-year-old Luis Arregiun-Lara was the suspect, and it started when the car Lara and his girlfriend were in broke down. When officers went to help, they found only the girlfriend as Luis went to get some spare parts. Officers noticed drug paraphernalia inside the car, so they ran a check on Luis and his girlfriend and noticed they had warrants. When Luis returned with parts, they started questioning him and that when Luis pulled out a gun, leaving officers no choice but to fire upon him. The three officers are now on paid leave pending investigation.

Murder Suspects Finally Charged

Delaware county sheriffs say a couple charged in the 2017 murder of a woman have finally been charged with their crime. Sheriff Harlan Moore says the murder was originally reported as a suspicious death, but a video camera set up at the scene by the suspects tells a different story. Investigators believe the suspects killed 41-year-old Melissa Vermillion by injecting her with a lethal dose of meth in order to prevent her from testifying in a drug trafficking case against them. Moore says the video shows Vermillion after she was injected, begging for the suspects to call her mom and to get her help. Deputies

say the suspects didn't call 911 until an hour after she died. The couple was already in jail and both were just charged with first degree murder last week.

Broken Arrow police are searching tonight for three suspects in a robbery and chase that took place earlier this evening. Police say this all started with a reported home invasion robbery in Bixby. When officers arrived, they saw three suspects leaving in a car and a chase began. Officers say the suspect vehicle hit speeds of up to 100MPH. The suspects then ran into a home in Broken Arrow belonging to a family member of one of the suspects. Officers found the vehicle with drugs inside, but the three suspects were no longer in the car. Police obtained a search warrant but did not find the suspects in the home either. Officers do know who the suspects are but aren't releasing names, and plan to file warrants for their arrests.

There was a shots fired call at the same home a few weeks before, but at that time no one was injured. Police say the bullet went through the home and hit an 18-year-old man in the head while he slept. He is expected to be okay, but neighbors in the area say something needs to change.

Tulsa police are investigating a "gun battle" between several teens in an east Tulsa neighborhood tonight. Officer Jeanne Pierce says it happened near 5th and Sheridan Sunday night, all of it starting with a girl fight a couple of hours before. The females started fighting and left and came back with guns. They hit a stalled-out truck multiple times, terrifying the man inside. Pierce says the teens probably don't even realize the severity of what they've done, and just how dangerous it was. In fact, Pierce is surprised no one was shot and hurt or killed in the incident. So far, no arrests have been made. The suspects who started the shootout were gone by the time officers arrived at the neighborhood.

Bartlesville Police Arrest Murder-For-Hire Suspect

Bartlesville police have made an arrest in a case involving alleged murder-for-hire and audio evidence. Investigators say 34-year-old Clinton Kohout offered friends thousands of dollars to kill his ex-wife. Kohout was arrested Thursday night accused of solicitation for murder. Police say Kohout's ex-wife called in because of a voicemail left on her phone, claiming it was her child's father speaking. According to court documents in that recording you can hear Kohout saying he's pay \$10,000 to have his ex-wife and her boyfriend killed. According to police, Kohout was speaking to a group of buddies saying he was

ready to kill something and asking if they were ready to kill something too. His bond is set at \$150,000. Police urge anyone in a domestic situation to seek help.

The project is some 58 years in the making, and Governor Stitt was on hand along with Mayor GT Bynum and other state officials to break ground on the five mile, 330 million dollar project that will expand the existing expressway to four lanes. The partnership includes INCOG, the city of Tulsa, Tulsa County, ODOT, and the OTA. The Governor hopes to relieve congestion and boost the economy with this expansion and said it will bring about 400 construction jobs along the way.

Voters Decide on Improve Our Tulsa Package

Tulsa voters approved the renewal of the "Improve Our Tulsa" package today. The trio of propositions passed with overwhelming support to the plan to raise 639 million dollars to improve Tulsa streets, parks, and many other things. 70% of that money will go towards improving Tulsa streets and maintaining streets that were repaired or replaced through the first Improve Our Tulsa package, passed in 2013. 30 million dollars of the new package will go to improving city parks, including Swan Lake in midtown Tulsa. Tulsa Fire will also receive 26 million and Tulsa Police will get 5.6 million which will cover the cost of replacing a police helicopter. Supporters say the approval of this package will no doubt benefit Tulsans.

Sapulpa Hopes to Lure Trout Fishers

Sapulpa Parks and Recreation have stocked the local, 25-acre lake Pretty Water with 600 pounds of trout last week, hoping to attract fishers to the area. Jodi Baker, director of the Parks department, says they are working to get Pretty Water lake on the Oklahoma Fishing Trail, which Lt Governor Pinnell said has generated 12 million dollars in revenue since its launch this summer. The lake will be stocked five more times before the spring. Sapulpa city leaders say fishing is an easy way to reel in tourists. They come for the fish and hopefully stay a while, boosting the local economy.

The Philbrook Museum of Art is moving out of its downtown Tulsa location to make room for the Bob Dylan Center. Philbrook will close its doors on their downtown location December 29th so work can begin on the building to house the Bob Dylan archive. It was purchased by the Kaiser Family Foundation and the University of Tulsa in 2016. The archive includes more than 6000 items, spanning nearly 60 years of Dylan's career. The Philbrook's president and director Scott Stulen says this change will allow them to focus their energy on their main campus in midtown. After the museum officially closes to the public, the Philbrook staff will relocate the art and other items to the main campus.

Jenks Moves Forward with Outlet Mall

American Airlines Expands Tulsa Facility

One of Tulsa's largest employers, and the world's largest airline, is about to get even larger when it comes to its presence in Tulsa. American Airlines Tulsa Maintenance Director Erik Olund said the airline is adding 30 more jobs on top of those that opened up earlier this fall, totaling nearly 600 total for 2019. The new jobs will focus on wheels and braking. Olund says American had been splitting wheel and brake work for the last 6 years between its own mechanics and a contractor that had been doing the same work that was hired before US Airways and American merged in 2013. Olund says the airline will continue to push for more maintenance work at its Tulsa base and less work with outside contractors because they believe the airline has found a way to do quality work at a low rate with Americans. All 500+ positions hope to be filled by the end of January.

Tulsa Launches Rapid Bus Transit System

Earlier, Tulsa Mayor GT Bynum was joined by city leaders, Tulsa Transit officials, and students for the ribbon cutting outside of McLain High School on 56th Street North and Peoria. Students who got a preview of the bus route during the initial test phase say they are big fans of the system. The city announced rapid bus transit will continue to be a free service through January 2nd.

Tulsa Schools Redesigns Budget

Tulsa Public Schools is facing 20 million dollars in budget cuts, and said they now have a better idea of what parents and others in the community want to cut and want to protect. Superintendent Dr Deborah Gist told us that feedback from the community is shaping how the district moves forward with well over 5,000 people responding to a survey online and more than 800 attending community meetings. Overall, the feedback shows people value behavioral and emotional support for students, quality classroom materials, smaller class sizes, upping teacher pay, and not laying off staff the most. The superintendent says Oklahoma still has a long way to go when it comes to making public education a priority. The process of budget cutting continues with more community meetings and workshops planned through mid-December.

Broken Arrow School Holds Virtual Day

Several Schools Vote on Bond Issues

Several counties voted today on bond issues for their school systems. In Creek county, two propositions for Allen Bowden Public Schools were voted on, totaling 650 thousand dollars for several needs including roofing and improvements to the cafeteria and gym. In Rogers county, voters considered the first phase of a three-phase plan of improvements for Catoosa public schools. Phase one is a more than 2-million-dollar bond issue to buy land for future school sites. And finally, in Latimer county, a 315-

thousand-dollar vote for Buffalo Valley Public Schools up upgrade plumbing and drainage along with a number of other improvements.

TPS Continues Budget Redesigns

The Tulsa Public School district is continuing to discuss the possible closure of four elementary schools, along with other cuts, to make up for a 20-million-dollar budget shortfall before the next school year. Superintendent Dr Deborah Gist says that having to cut that kind of money has been a significant challenge. Last week, Dr Gist announced the possible closure of four elementary schools: Mark Twain, Jones, Wright, and Grimes schools, all to help cover the shortfall. Officials say enrollment is down at all four of those schools and there's several other elementary schools only currently using about 50% of their building, so there will be more than enough space for all students at the closing schools to be able to transfer. Dr Gist plans to announce other recommended cuts at a meeting this evening at McLain High School.

Lawmakers Push for Teacher Retention
