Task Force Deploys to Louisiana

Oklahoma's Task Force One is in Louisiana today, getting ready to help in the aftermath of Hurricane Delta. Deputy Chief Chuck French is the Task Force leader and is heading up their latest deployment in what has been a record year for the Gulf. The first stop for the group of 37 is Monroe, Louisiana where they will build a shelter for evacuees. Then they will head to Baton Rouge and wait for the storm to pass. Their mission is two-fold: helping with collapsed structures and swift water rescues. One of their most important resources are four specially trained dogs, two for "live finds" and two for "recovery". Deputy Chief French says they appreciate being able to help families in their time of need, and Tulsa Fire Chief Michael Baker says it's all about being a community neighbor.

Tulsa Shelter Helps Rescue Hurricane Delta Animals

The Tulsa Humane Society was in Louisiana as Hurricane Delta moved through, volunteering to help with recovery efforts. Behavior Specialist Troy Ita says the local animal control offices were overwhelmed, so they stepped up to help with vaccines, spay and neuters, and with rescuing around 20 dogs. Ita says they say downed power lines and trees down everywhere, so many of the dogs rescued were no longer with their homes or families due to the storms. Since space is limited, the Humane Society of Tulsa says the dogs they rescued from Louisiana will likely be taken to other shelters across the country.

Historic Ice Storm Hits State

All morning long, most of the state has been dealing with sleet and freezing rain. Some areas are seeing ice start to accumulate and freeze on the roads, signs, and on tops of cars. Chautauqua County Sheriffs said people were calling about a few slick spots on Highway 99, so city crews took their trucks to salt parts of the road. Some of the ice is moving into parts of Green Country. The Oklahoma Department of Transportation this morning said they're monitoring the forecast closely but with all the rain they are unable to do any type of pre-treatment. ODOT says they do have crews on standby and have 25 trucks plus crews who are out checking road conditions.

Cleanup Underway After Eta

Massive cleanup is underway as people across southern Florida mop up after the deluge dropped by tropical storm Eta. The storm unleashed torrential rain, which soaked a region already saturated from more than 12 inches of rain last month. With nowhere for the water to go, entire neighborhoods are swamped. Parts of Broward county and Fort Lauderdale have already seen 10 – 18 inches of rain from

the storm. As the surge seeped into homes and businesses, officials in Miami dispatched tanker trucks equipped with giant vacuums to help soak up some of the water. Eta is slowly churning in the Gulf of Mexico, away from Florida, but the storm could still bring severe conditions to people in northern Florida and parts of the Gulf Coast by the weekend.

Fire Season in Full Swing

A red flag warning and wind advisory for parts of northern Oklahoma, coupled with no rain and low humidity kept firefighters on their toes today. They say they dead grass is the fuel, but strong wind gusts make it even harder to put out fires. A house fire today quickly spread to a grass fire when the flames jumped to the ground. Sapulpa Fire Chief David Taylor says things can change in a split second, which is why his crew is on standby and ready to go. They perform daily checks on their trucks and try to be ready all the time. In the meantime, Chief Taylor says the biggest takeaway when there's a high fire danger is to not do any type of burning, and to be careful when grilling.

Snow Blankets Tulsa Area

City of Tulsa street crews have been busy since snow started falling yesterday, and now they're gearing up for round two tomorrow. Tim McCorkell, the city's street maintenance manager says they were only expecting an inch or two of snow Sunday, but it quickly turned into a significant snow event. More than 45 city trucks hit all the routes clearing bridges, hills, and overpasses. Monday, they focused on clearing center lanes and turn lanes. If it doesn't rain, they'll be able to use brine to treat the road before another expected snowfall. City staff is working 12 hour shifts to ensure the 1700 lane miles they are responsible for are passable. With more snow Tuesday, McCorkell is asking everyone to be cautious and give the crews space to work. Crews are expected to work those 12 hour shifts through Wednesday, hoping freezing temps tonight doesn't cause too many icy roads.

EMSA Responds to Falls and Accidents

EMSA chief public affairs officer Adam Paluka says Sunday and Monday were very busy days in both the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metros. Due to snow and rain, road conditions quickly got bad and led to falls and accidents. On Sunday, EMSA responded to more than 50 accidents. On a typical Sunday in

December they'll respond to about 30, but Paluka says they had the staff to handle it. Medics are prepared to handle the sub-freezing temperatures. Each vehicle is equipped with things like hand warmers and rock salt, but Paluka says in the COVID area, it's a little more difficult to find people a place to get warm. EMSA medics say there is a bright side to wearing all of their PPE because on cold days like today, it keeps them a little warmer.

Crews Prep for More Snow

Roads aren't bad right now in Broken Arrow, but crews warn that they are expecting a re-freeze overnight and that they will be out on the roads by midnight. In Glenpool, the roads are sanded, and residents are enjoying a winter wonderland with snow staying on the grass where it's safe. The city of Broken Arrow says they had twelve trucks out treating their roads with salt and they'll be back out first thing in the morning. The Oklahoma Department of Transportation vehicles will join the BA crews. ODOT asks the public to remember when the trucks are out to maintain at least 200 feet from them so they have enough room to work.

Tulsa Public Discusses Next Steps

Tulsa Public School board members will spend the next week hearing from families about how they should move forward with digital and in-person learning for the rest of the semester. TPS Superintendent Dr. Deborah Gist says if Tulsa county's COVID-19 numbers remain stable, there are three options moving forward with how to get all students back in the classroom before the end of the calendar year. One option is a piece-meal approach with Pre-K and Kindergarten going back first and then adding more grades as time goes on. Also under consideration is 4 days in person and a digital day on Wednesday. There are also considerations about mixing those two proposals to where some students would come to school on certain days while others stay at home and switch off. Gist says the options she presented were developed with health professionals.

TPS Votes to Return to Classroom

It's back to school for all TPS students after being all virtual for the first few months of school. A lot of things came in to play when deciding when older students should be back in class. Elementary students start phasing back into classrooms in November, but research on who is more likely to spread the virus kept the board from letting older students go back to school. There are sure to be bumps in the road, and Superintendent Dr. Gist says one concern is getting used to wearing a mask all day. The TPS district has 20,000 tests available which it will use to try to find spot problems before they become bigger problems. Those tests will be given on a volunteer basis.

Union Officials Speak with Health Department

Dr. Bruce Dart of the Tulsa Health Department spoke with the Union School Board tonight about some of the biggest issues they're seeing in regard to COVID-19 around Tulsa county. Union school officials invited Dr. Dart to a special board meeting Monday night. The superintendent says they not only wanted to learn about COVID-19 in our area, but also how to get students and staff to stop withholding information after testing positive. One Union board member said he's had people who tested positive say they're not telling who they were around. Out of the 12-24 hundred cases we're seeing a week, Dr. Dart says they're lucky if 15% give them information on where they've been. Dr Dart says he doesn't have a solution to people not being honest with the health department right now, but they will address it in a press conference tomorrow.

Bixby Back in Session After Closing

Classes were back in session this morning in Bixby, thanks to some serious creativity and problem solving by the district's transportation department. Classes were cancelled Tuesday when a bus driver

tested positive for COVID-19, prompting 6 more drivers to quarantine. The seven bus routes affected will follow a new bus schedule. Parents need to make arrangements to get their kids to school one or two days a week, and the students ride buses on the other days. Meanwhile, students at Muskogee's Ben Franklin Academy will remain virtual for the rest of the week. At least 97 students and two teachers are self-isolating after having close contact with a COVID-positive student. Students in all other Muskogee schools returned to class this morning.

Union Votes to End Mascot

The Union School board voted without objection to end its use of the "Redskins" mascot and logo. The committee was made up of students, alumni, and even some teachers who mostly believe the name is derogatory and hurtful. The school board said it's time to move on, without hesitation. About ten speakers attended the meeting tonight as part of the committee formed by the superintendent to look into this issue. The school board responded tonight saying the committee was right and that they needed a mascot that further defines who they are. The school board said now their next goal is to remove all items and display related to the former mascot and logo. They're hopeful by August it will be all cleared out.

Owasso Pivots to Distance Learning

Because of the increasing number of COVID cases, Owasso Public Schools has joined the many districts now deciding some students need to return to distance learning. Sunday night, Owasso Public Schools announced high school students will return home this week after only two months of in classroom learning. The district says 9th through 12th graders have experienced the greatest level of absenteeism related to COVID. For now, pre-k through 8th grade will continue in-person at their schools for the rest of the semester. The district says the virus has affected staff members as well. There's an increased need for substitutes that just aren't available. Moving the older students to distance learning will free up subs and resources so the district can provide a traditional learning environment for pre-k through 8th.

More Schools Shift to Distance Learning

Oologah-Talala is the latest school district to switch to distance learning for the rest of 2020. Staff notified parents yesterday that today students would be getting the materials they need to learn from home for the next few weeks before Winter break. At the start of the week, Bixby also switched to distance learning, and the next day Tulsa Public announced their students would do distance learning for the rest of 2020 as well. Oologah-Talala quoted a rapid increase in both positive cases and quarantines that led to unimaginable issues on their campus and in their classrooms as the reason for their decision. They shared a graphic with families, showing they've had a total of 364 students who completed quarantine because of testing positive or exposure to COVID. The district also said they are seriously lacking in cafeteria workers, bus drivers, and substitute teachers, and they are currently in what's called the Red Level.

TPS Approves Tiered Return to School

The Tulsa Public School board approved a recommendation tonight for a tiered shift back to in-person learning following winter break. The plan is contingent on what the COVID-19 health data and community spread looks like in Tulsa county. The three dates put forth are January 15th, when students in all grades come back from the break and continue in virtual learning. Then come January 25th, pre-k through third grade students will return to in person learning, along with special needs students getting tier three or four services. Lastly, February 1st is when 4th through 12th grades will go back in person. In-person learning will be Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday with Wednesday being the online learning day.

New Turnpike Opens Next Week

A brand-new turnpike is opening next week, and it could save drivers a lot of time getting to places like Norman, Lawton, and even Dallas. Oklahoma Transportation Secretary Tim Gatz says the new Kickapoo Turnpike is designed to keep drivers who have to go through central Oklahoma but have no direct business in downtown Oklahoma City away from a growing city seeing more and more traffic jams and gridlock. Gatz says the turnpike may seem like it was placed in the middle of nowhere, but by placing a toll road east of Oklahoma City, they can begin directing Tulsa traffic away. The Kickapoo Turnpike will benefit Tulsa traffic by connecting I-44 with I-40, so someone coming from Tulsa to Norman, Lawton, or even Dallas can get off the Turner Turnpike on the Kickapoo and take the Kickapoo around OKC and save twenty minutes. The current toll is two dollars and twenty-five cents.

TSO Will Have Independent 911 Center

After 6 years, the Tulsa County Sheriff's office is moving forward with its own 911 dispatch center. Today construction crews picked up where they left off in 2014, getting to work on phase one of the Tulsa County Training Center. The project was started by a previous administration, but the funds weren't available to finish it. The concrete is already in place for the dispatch center. It will also serve as a tornado shelter with bulletproof brass and a steel reinforced door, giving county dispatchers their own space. They currently share a center with TPD, TFD, and EMSA, and sharing a space during a pandemic has presented its own challenges. Tulsa county has 19 dispatchers, with 5 or 6 on each shift. Construction started Monday to get the dispatch center up and running before 2020 ends. Because they are using CARES Act money, this project must be finished by the end of the year.

Owasso Park Gets Improvements

Improvements are on the way to a popular park in Owasso. Elm Creek Park is very popular since it is inside a neighborhood near 76th street north and 129th east avenue. The city has the park closed as renovations take place. The pond at the park that has been falling apart over the last 5 years is the biggest part of the project. The city of Owasso has set aside 750-800 thousand dollars for the park renovations. The pond is exposing roots and limiting the amount of storm water it can hold. Once that's finished, crews will plant more trees and get rid of the outdated playground equipment. The city will put in a modern playground and build another pavilion for families to use. There is also plans to increase the size of the parking lot. The city would like to see the park completed by February, just in time for spring.

AHHA Tulsa says they realize the area where their building is was affected by the massacre in 1921 and there is still work to be done in terms of healing and reconciliation. Broken Arrow Takes Part in Project

Broken Arrow is the first city in the state to take part in a new groundwater monitoring project. A new well will be drilled at the city's Verdigris water treatment plant where an algae bloom in the past led to water that smelled and tasted terrible. The well will be added to the state of Oklahoma's groundwater monitoring and assessment program. The map has 750 wells that help monitor the water quantity and quality of the state's 21 major aquifers. The city of Broken Arrow donated the land where the well is being built. Groundwater is the primary water supply for about 300 Oklahoma communities. The data collected will help the state make quality decisions when it comes to water.

Groups Gather to Mark 100 Years Since Massacre

American Airlines Hits Milestone

Today one of Tulsa's largest employers hit a major milestone by flying its first paying customers on the newly re-certified Boeing 737 Max. American Airlines has had the multi-million-dollar machine parked in Tulsa for nearly 2 years, and it's finally back in business. The first American Airlines revenue flight using a Boeing 737 Max left Miami for New York's LaGuardia Airport Tuesday morning. The flight comes after multiple flights where the airline flew their employees and certain dignitaries around for free to boost public confidence in the plane after it had been re-certified for flight in November. There are still many maxes in Tulsa being worked on, and at the American Airlines maintenance base in Tulsa they are installing software that fixes a problem linked to two high-profile crashes. While working on planes that have been parked in Tulsa since 2019, American is also taking in new maxes that have been sitting at Boeing headquarters in Seattle ever since the FAA grounded the plane to figure out what was causing them to pitch itself nose down against pilot commands.

Broken Arrow Police Investigate Stand Your Ground Case

It was peaceful tonight on south Ash place off west Winston, in contrast to Tuesday night when police were called to the otherwise quiet neighborhood. At about 8:45pm, BAPD say they responded to a reported burglary and break-in. Police say they suspect broke into a home, but before he could get away with anything he was shot by the homeowner. Officer Chris Walker says when BA Police, Fire, and EMS arrived that the man was shot and down on the ground. He was taken to the hospital in critical condition after being shot in the upper torso. Investigators say the victim and suspect knew each other by name. At this time, the homeowner will not be charged but detectives are still collecting evidence.

Arrests Made in Shooting

Tulsa Police identified the victim in the city's 67th homicide of the year as 52-year-old Lionell Rivers. Police say they got the call just after midnight Thursday when someone discovered Rivers shot inside his home near 52nd Place North and MLK. They confirmed he was killed during a robbery. In the last day, as detectives investigated his murder, friends say people have broken into Rivers' home, stealing his stuff, knowing he was dead. Police have arrested Clearance Holmes and Stephon Thompson in connection with the murder. Officers say Holmes robbed and shot Rivers and Thompson was the getaway driver.

Man Killed in Dog Attack

Police have identified the victim in a mauling by three dogs in west Tulsa as Curtis Wickham, who was killed by the dogs after a fight with the owner of the dogs outside a home. Police said they initially were called to the home for shots fired, but instead found a man mauled to death. It happened outside a home near Admiral and north 49th West Avenue just after 6 this morning. Tulsa Police say when they arrived one man had been attacked by at least one dog. The homeowner says the dogs were protecting her home, but neighbors say they have called police about the dogs before. Police say the homeowner was taken into custody but later released as they continue to investigate.

Police Investigate Deadly Shooting

Police are investigating a deadly shooting tonight in east Tulsa outside Meadowbrook apartments near Admiral and Mingo. Right now, police say they are still searching for the suspect and believe he may be armed. Witnesses say they saw a car go into the building and heard gun shots. After talking to those witnesses, police believe both the victim and the suspect were in the car. They say there was evidence that the victim left the car and traveled to the second story where he tried to get help. After viewing video from the apartments, cops believe the suspect took off and headed eastbound. They had a large search out earlier, and police are still investigating.

Investigators Catch Serial Arsonist

Tulsa investigators say they put together a task force concept using intelligence, surveillance, and gathered map data to catch a suspected serial arsonist. Fire Marshal Andy Teeter said they have investigated 16 suspicious fires since October 2nd, most of them in a 2 square mile area centered around Pine and Lewis. Investigators say Allen Wessell was being investigated as the man who set them all. On Wednesday night, two fire investigators set up near north Atlanta place and Queen street and just after midnight the suspect walked up to a house and set a plastic bag on fire and threw it on the roof. Investigators jumped out and arrested Wessell after a short chase, which comes as a relief for neighbors who live in the area.

OBI's Urgent Need for Plasma

Statewide hospitalizations are higher than ever with 240 COVID-positive patients in intensive care units, bringing available ICU beds to less than 13%. Having a shortage of convalescent plasma is an actual life or death situation and hospitals are using it faster than they can get it. One of the things that makes it difficult to stock is that not everyone can donate, only those who have had COVID and been symptom free for 14 days. William Grayson was at the clinic donating his plasma as a way to give back, since someone weeks ago did the same the same thing and their plasma saved lives. Grayson says he will return with his father and encourages all who are able to go donate.

City Dealing with No Surge Staff

While Oklahoma City may be dangerously low on hospital beds, Tulsa Mayor GT Bynum says so far Tulsa area hospitals are reporting they for now are OK on bed capacity. But the surge we've been waiting for could very well happen in the coming winter months when flu cases peak while we are still in the middle of the pandemic. Last spring, the state built a COVID surge facility at OSU Medical Center in downtown Tulsa and staffed it with extra doctors and nurses. Instead of paying people to babysit empty beds, the state allowed the contract to expire and there is no longer surge staff available. Last week the state department of health said if the city of Tulsa and THD felt things were getting bad enough, they could enter into their own contract with a medical provider to bring back the doctors and nurses. Bynum says the city is strapped for cash and has never received federal COVID funding to help cover such a cost. He hopes to sort out who is paying for what before a surge happens and the extra beds are needed again.

State Hospitals Overwhelmed

Less than two days after the state put in place its new surge plan, Oklahoma City becomes the first region of the state to be elevated to Tier Two, meaning 15 – 19% of all hospital patients in that area have COVID-19. OU Health's chief COVID officer Dr. Dale Bratzler says cases in rural parts of the state have spiked, and hospitals in OKC became overwhelmed when those patients were sent to them. This week one patient ended up in Fort Worth because there was no room for them. Now in order to open up more beds, hospitals will begin to move patients with lower immediate medical needs into long term care facilities, more staff will be shifted to handle COVID patients, and some elective surgeries may be postponed until fewer beds are needed. Right now, the state reports 300 people are in ICUs statewide for COVID and another 13 in LOCUs are suspected of having COVID but awaiting test results. Dr. Bratzler said while things like masks are now a political issue, public health policy measures need to be increased to slow down the inflow of patients and avoid a statewide surge.

Jenks Votes to Mandate Masks

The city of Jenks votes tonight to make masks mandatory. The vote comes as Oklahoma sees another day with more than 1500 new COVID-19 cases. The meeting started at 6pm tonight and is still ongoing. Three doctors and Dr. Dart of the health department attended and spoke on how effective masks are. Councilors seem to be split on the issue, but doctors say even if the flu was as serious as COVID, a mask would help combat the flu as well. If Jenks passes this mandate, it will require all people aged ten and older to wear a mask in public places. There are some exceptions such as eating and drinking, exercising, and if you have a medical condition. People without a mask could be fined up to \$200, but Jenks Police say they are more focused on educating people instead of fining them, especially at first.

OBI Hits Milestone for Plasma

The Oklahoma Blood Institute has hit a milestone, providing hospitals the 10,000th unit of convalescent plasma. OBI has collected convalescent plasma from 1,530 people so far, but there's a need for so many more people to donate. Part of the reason for the increased demand is due to the surge in COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations. The problem is demand is high and supply is low. Donors must be people who've recovered from coronavirus and symptom free for two weeks. Most donors are repeat donors. One donor's convalescent plasma helps up to four COVID-19 patients. OBI and the Red Cross also say there's a huge need for blood donations.

Tulsa Hospitals Maxed Out

Tulsa Mayor GT Bynum told our partner KRMG today that all three Tulsa hospital systems report they are all almost tapped out on intensive care unit beds. While ICU beds are in high demand outside of a pandemic during the flu season, the likelihood of finding an available bed is now even more difficult. Over Thanksgiving, Tulsa county as a region was elevated to tier three in the state's hospital surge plan, one step below the most critical stage four. Bynum says if you need an ICU bed for any reason in the Tulsa metro, you should not be surprised if you are moved to another part of the state that can care for you because their capacity level is better. According to the state's recent report on hospital capacity, the only other areas that are batter off right now is the Muskogee area and the southeastern part of the state that includes McAlester and Ardmore.

First Vaccine Doses to Arrive in Oklahoma

Oklahoma is ready to roll out the COVID-19 vaccine, with Commissioner Dr. Lance Fry saying they could start distributing the vaccine December 13th or 14th. The health department has predetermined sites around the state where the vaccine will be stored. Dr. Frye says first they are focused on getting the vaccine to healthcare workers who are treating COVID-19 patients. Also in the first group are people working in long term care facilities and their patients. Dr. Frye says most of us in the general public can expect to get the vaccine hopefully in the spring. Oklahoma is expected to get 33,000 doses of the Pfizer vaccine and the Tulsa Health Department will get around 5-7000. The Pfizer vaccine requires two shots,

and the state says the second round should arrive within 21 days of the first. The Moderna vaccine could get to Oklahoma around the end of December, and we are expected to get at least 10,000 doses.

ER Nurse Hannah White has been on the front lines of the fight against COVID-19 and today she was the first in line for what is considered a great moment in Oklahoma medical history. White was the first person in the state to get the vaccine for COVID-19. The first doses of the Pfizer vaccine arrived Monday morning and by afternoon the first 10 people, all frontline medical professionals, were vaccinated. None displayed symptoms from complications. But there is still a very long road and more illness is possible through the winter. Monday's first shipment was only a little more than 33,000 for a state with a population of around 4 million. The public was warned that this does not mean COVID-19 is over, and to keep wearing masks while more doses arrive.
