#### Ice Causes Headaches in Checotah

I-40 in Checotah saw at least three cars run off the road today because of ice. Officials warn that because of some below freezing temps in the area, as well as some parts of Muskogee County that there could be some icing. Checotah Police Chief Darren Glover says they have had some ice on this bridge over business route 69 along with some other icy spots on I-40. ODOT officials say they have had crews out all afternoon monitoring conditions, and they are putting salt and sand on the roads as needed. They plan to have crews out as long as the weather continues to cause slick conditions.

#### **Doctors Warn Against Frostbite As Temps Drop**

Doctors say your skin can only take so much cold before it succumbs to frostbite. Dr Jacob Greuel at St. John's Clinic says frostbite thankfully is not a problem we encounter in Oklahoma often, as our temperatures don't typically get cold enough to make it a concern. Frostbite is something Greuel himself has had a close call with after getting lost while snowboarding near Lake Tahoe a few years ago. With some of our coldest weather of the season on the way this weekend, Dr Greuel says you should cover exposed skin as much as possible if you plan to be outside for long periods of time.

#### **Strong Winds Spark Fire Concerns**

The Washington County Fire Department are geared up and ready to go in case today's high winds cause a grass fire. The National Weather Service has issued a wind advisory for the northwestern counties of Green Country, expecting winds from 35 to 40mph. Washington County is in the advisory, so Fire Captain Danny Wadsworth is asking people to wait to start their controlled burns. Washington County firefighters can monitor fire conditions using a hot spot detector. While the department has this high tech available, they are still asking the public to remove dead leaves around houses. The NWS says the winds will start to die down by tomorrow.

#### **Tornado Alley Shifts Eastward**

Oklahoma is dead center of Tornado Alley, but we haven't seen quite as many tornadoes as we used to. Recent research from Dr Harold Brooks at the National Severe Storms Laboratory in Norman shows that there has been a slight drop in the number of tornadoes in our region, while Dixie Alley has seen a small uptick. Brooks says it's a change he and his team have noticed in data going back to when US tornado reporting began in 1950. He says the change is due to a combination of moisture in the atmosphere and wind shear ingredients lining up on storm days more to our east compared to the southern plains. Brooks cautions not to get too relaxed this Spring, and we can still count on having plenty of storms in Oklahoma.

#### **Morning Freeze Causes Road Problems**

Car accidents all over the Tulsa area kept first responders busy this morning as the roads iced overnight. Freezing drizzle caused dangerous road conditions and several accidents including an overturned semi truck on I-44. Andy Little with the Tulsa Fire Department says thirty six wrecks all happened within just nine hours. Little says repairs will have to be made to three fire trucks that were hit by sliding cars while responding to separate accidents. With temps staying below freezing, drivers may see slick spots on the roads this evening. Little warns drivers to slow down and be prepared to not be able to stop.

#### **EMSA Kept Busy in Cold Weather**

In Moore, they will complete the final shelters this spring. Edmond says it will have storm shelters in all schools by 2020. The superintendent in Edmond says they can't get them finished fast enough with storm season fast approaching. Oklahoma City Public Schools is also making progress. The district has increased the amount of schools with shelters from 5 to 31.

## **Green Country Turns Green Again After Winter**

#### **US Marshal Involved in Deadly Shooting**

Tulsa Police are out tonight gathering evidence after a shooting involving a US Marshal left a wanted suspect dead. The Marshals say they were working a task force operation, serving a felony warrant for domestic assault and battery by strangulation. The suspect had reportedly barricaded himself inside the home so Marshals and TPD were called to surround the house and force their way inside. Inside the home, they found the suspect armed as well as multiple guns but have not yet released what happened when two deputy US Marshals fired several shots. Tulsa Police had officers stationed outside the home at the time but none of them were involved

#### **Bust Leads to Stolen Property Collected over a Decade**

Rogers County Sheriff Scott Walton said Danny Slinger is behind bars tonight after deputies linked the man after a burglary suspect left behind piece of mail leading them to Slinger and a gold mine of stolen goods. After a search warrant, deputies discovered a multitude of stolen items dating back over a decade, including six trailers, dump trucks, tools, guns, and drugs. Deputies say Slinger admitted to trading the stolen items for things like cash and illegal narcotics. The officers needed the help of several agencies to remove all the items with tractors, as well as 20 head of cattle and several malnourished dogs from the residence.

#### Man in Critical Condition After Chase

The Tulsa County Sheriff's Office says a man is in critical condition tonight after leading deputies on a chase, then flipping his truck into a creek in East Tulsa. Deputies say the driver, Devin Hausum, nearly hit a deputy in a patrol car at 15<sup>th</sup> and Sheridan. Then they say he lead deputies on a chase to 15<sup>th</sup> and Memorial where he crashed. Deputies say Hausum was going over 75 miles per hour when he hit the curb, went airborne over the fence, and rolled the truck multiple times into the creek. Homeowner James Junk said he saw first responders pulling Hausum out of the pickup. Deputies say they think Hausum was driving drink after finding open beer and alcohol containers in the truck. Paramedics took him to the hospital in critical condition with multiple severe injuries.

#### String of Robberies May Be Connected

Tulsa Police think three armed robberies overnight may be connected. Police say the victims include two businesses and a man at a car wash. Surveillance tape shows two suspects holding a Walgreens clerk at gunpoint while she works to open the register. Robbery detective Chad Moyer says these crimes are

something his unit will start to see more of in the coming months. The Walgreens robbery was the third robbery in a row that night. An hour and a half before, there was an armed robbery at the A-Mart Convenience store with just one suspect demanding money. Police say evidence is hinting that these robberies may have been done by the same suspects, but they will have to investigate more before they can be sure.

#### **Shots Fired into Home**

Tulsa Police have arrested a man accused of firing shots in his neighborhood, hitting a car and a home, when people were there. Officers say the man also assaulted a family member who ended up in the hospital. Police say Laron Henry got into a fight with two family members outside a home near Sheridan and Pine. As the family members were leaving, Henry pulled a gun and started shooting. Officer Danny Bean says two shots ended up hitting the victim's car as they drove off. The bullets traveled into a house across the street, where multiple people were inside. Thankfully, those people were not hit. Police say Henry went back inside and then got into a fight with another family member and assaulted her. Officers had to get on the megaphone to get Henry out of the house. Henry was arrested for shooting with intent to kill, shooting into an occupied home, and assault and battery.

#### **Store Employees Help Apprehend Shoplifters**

Employees at a consignment shop in Broken Arrow helped police arrest a couple of accused shoplifters today. Officers say the suspects also had weapons and meth. The manager at Plato's Closet on 71<sup>st</sup> and Garnett said shoplifting is such a problem at their store that the employees have learned to spot it quickly. Employees say Magdalena Siegfried stole a pair of jeans, ran out of the store and into a getaway car in the parking lot. They called police who spotted the vehicle and performed a traffic stop. Officers found a knife in the console, a gun in the glove box, and two clubs by the driver's side door. Several grams of meth and about 3,000 dollars in cash were also found. Police say this is a good example of how proactive employees can help lead to a bigger bust.

#### Woman Shoots and Kills Boyfriend

Tulsa Police say a woman is in jail today, accused of shooting and killing her boyfriend in east Tulsa after an argument. Officers arrested 64-year-old Mary Carroll after she called 911 admitting she shot her boyfriend at their home near 16<sup>th</sup> and Garnett. When police arrived, they found the man had already died. Police say they think this started inside the house with some sort of domestic fight. After searching the house and interviewing Carroll, they arrested her for manslaughter.

#### **Traffic Stop Turns into Major Drug Bust**

Broken Arrow Police say a routine traffic stop turned into a major drug arrest this weekend after they found heroin, meth, pills, and marijuana on Ashley Cox on St Patrick's Day. Police said Cox even had syringes. Officer James Kock said Cox was pulled over on south Elm Place when an officer noticed her sitting at the light for an unusual period of time. Koch said Cox admitted to having a suspended driver's license. When the officer put Cox in handcuffs, he found heroin in her pocket. After searching the car, he found meth and pills and marijuana in her wallet. The syringes were on the floorboard. Reports say Cox identified each drug in her car and admitted to selling marijuana after questioned by an officer. Cox faces 4 counts of possession of a controlled substance as well as possession of marijuana.

#### **Police Investigate Third Consecutive Homicide**

Tulsa Police have confirmed another homicide investigation is underway, the third since last night. Homicide Detective Brandon Watkins said this homicide is fairly cut and dry. Two men were arguing and one shot the other. There were 4 shots, three of them hit the victim and killed him. It's not clear yet what they were arguing about. The suspect did have a concealed carry permit, but Watkins says it's not a get out of jail free card. Police say they have two witnesses and are waiting for the medical examiner to arrive. This homicide happened near Hudson and Archer. Police previously responded to two earlier homicides near 48<sup>th</sup> Street North and Johnstown, and Woodrow and Hartford.

#### Arena District Planned for Downtown Tulsa

The public got it's first look tonight at the proposed Arena District plan for the area around the BOK Center, the Cox Business Center, and the Central Library. The City of Tulsa hopes the district will revamp and dramatically change this part of downtown. The city said nine months of planning went in to the Arena District master plan, and showed models of what the area could look like once it is finished. MSKS, a planning and urban design group, said downtowns across the country are being revitalized, with more people wanting to walk to work, meet in coffee shops, and take advantage of downtown Tulsa no longer closing at 5pm. The Arena District master plan is a long term plan, so the improvements would come over the course of many years.

#### **Tulsa Launches New Bus System**

The City of Tulsa officially launched its new bus rapid transit system today. The bus route will connect north and south Tulsa with buses running along Peoria every 15 minutes during the week and every 20 to 30 minutes on the weekend. Tulsa Mayor GT Bynum says this will be a huge step for the city. The BRT system is paid for by Tulsa's Vision Fund. It's expected to be operational by the end of the summer.

#### **Hard Rock Casino Finishes Expansion**

Senior Director of Marketing Martin Madewell says they are excited to give guests something they have been asking for. The signature piece is a 1200 square foot dance floor. With dozens of beer taps and a large video wall, Madewell says he's certain Track Five will be something unlike Tulsa has ever seen. The venue is named after Don Williams' 5<sup>th</sup> track on his 1978 album, "Tulsa Time".

# **Nowata County Hopes for new Jail**

Over the last 100 years, Nowata County has seen a lot of change everywhere except the county jail. Former Tulsa County Undersheriff Tim Albin acted as a volunteer inspector today and told Nowata County commissioners that their jail was a lawsuit waiting to happen. Sheriff Terry Barnett asked Albin to look at the facility to see how it needed to be brought up to federal justice department standards. It was determined by both of them that it needed to close. Albin told commissioners that they could either

raise taxes now to build a new federally compliant facility or they could raise taxes later to pay for a lawsuit from the health hazards in the current jail. It is now proposed with the sheriff's support that until a new facility can be built or found, the Nowata County jail move its inmates to neighboring county jails. No decision has been made as of Monday.

#### **Google Announces Pryor Facility Expansion**

## Muskogee Hope Taxes Continue to Help Roads

The city of Muskogee knows their roads are in desperate need of repair, and hopes voters choose to renew a sales tax increase approved in 2014. In May, voters will be asked to keep a .5 cent sales tax in place. City Manager Mike Miller says 2/3 of the money is for street maintenance. The Muskogee Foundation is prepared to match the money, and it would add up to an estimated 24 million dollars. Miller says the plan is to focus on residential street repairs. Most residents say if the money does go to fix the roads, they will be glad to pay it. The other 1/3 of the money will go to capital improvements like more parking for the Martin Luther king Center and equipment for the fire and police departments. The vote is scheduled for May 4<sup>th</sup>.

#### **NCAA Tournament Brings Revenue to Tulsa**

Hoys adds that none of the teams in the tournament have ever played in Tulsa before, which means a win for future visitors and future businesses. Hoyt says he expects all downtown hotels to fill up by tomorrow and if you hope to eat somewhere downtown, your best bet is to make a reservation ahead of time.

#### **Owasso Gets New Elementary**

The project is estimated to cast more than 23 million dollars. Morrow Elementary is scheduled to open in time for the new school year in August.

#### **Bixby Schools Propose Time Change**

Bixby Public Schools are looking at moving forward with a proposed bell time change for students. If the plan were to be adopted, grades 7-12 would move to a start time of 8:40 am and the elementary school students would have an earlier start time of around 7:40 am. Superintendent Rob Miller says this is something they have considered for awhile now. Miller says countless research has shown that teenagers really do better with more sleep. Right now, parents are divided on the issue with some expressing concern about after and before school childcare and elementary school students would be waiting on the bus in the dark during the winter months. Other districts like Tulsa Public, Jenks, Union, Sand Springs, and Glenpool have already adopted this practice.

#### **Broken Arrow Explores Virtual Classrooms**

Broken Arrow school officials are exploring a new idea of the district, and it calls for students using the internet. On Tuesday, the 19,000 students that go to school at Broken Arrow Public Schools won't actually go to school. Instead they will step into a virtual classroom from home. 8<sup>th</sup> grade students and up will do assignments from home from their Chromebooks. For students who don't have Chromebooks, the district's pre-school through 7<sup>th</sup> graders will do work the old fashioned way, just from their homes. District officials say they're not sure yet if Virtual Day is something they will do every year, and Tuesday was just a test to see how it would work. Virtual Day could be the alternative for havint to make up missed school days, such as snow days or in the event there is an emergency on one of the district's 27 campuses.

#### **Change Coming to Vacant Elementary School Building**

Change is finally coming to an old school building that has been empty for more than five years. It involves the former site of Indian Springs Elementary in Broken Arrow near the sports complex. The school district hopes to sell the vacant property and has marked it as surplus property and the city has changed the zoning to make it more marketable. BAPS says the property is for sale and they hope to turn it into some type of light office space. Indian Springs neighbors say not only is the building an

eyesore, it's a safety hazard. Homeowners hope the property can be used to complement the surrounding athletic fields. The school district says it's still too early to say what's in store for the lot.

#### **Broken Arrow Plans to Reconfigure High School**

The Broken Arrow Public School district laid out a plan tonight for their growing district. It all started when the district wanted to get rid of some of the crowding issues at the high school. Students can choose their path that will intend to get them closer to their goals post-high school. Students can choose between a career path, early college, or innovation. The district will partner with businesses and industry leaders to give students the hands-on experience they need to be competitive in different fields. There are no plans to build a second high school, but there are plans for a new STEM Center, funded through the 2015 bond. The STEM classes and off-campus learning will help alleviate some of the crowding concerns at the high school.

#### McLain High School to Change

Tulsa Public Schools announced some changes to McLain High School. Right now, McLain High School is 8<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade, but will change to 9<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup>. McLain Junior High and McLain 7<sup>th</sup> Grade Academy will be closed, and students will go to the new Monroe Middle School next year. That school is becoming the only one to feed into the high school. Penn Elementary School will also close and those students will now attend Anderson or Hawthorne Elementary Schools next year. School officials hope the teachers at Penn Elementary will choose to also transfer with their students to Anderson or Hawthorne or to the new Monroe Middle School.

#### **Oral Roberts University Receives Donation**

#### **Union Votes on Redistricting Plan**

Crowded elementary schools have forced the Union Public School district to vote on a redistricting plan. Ellen Ochoa Elementary was built to reduce overcrowding. With phase 3 of construction finished, the district plans to redistrict. If the school board approves that proposal, nearly 300 kids will start attendance at Ochoa in the fall. 59 students will come from Boevers, 104 from Rosa Parks, and 108 from Roy Clark. Union has 13 elementary schools with nearly 8000 students. With this proposal, 4 schools lose students and 2 will gain students. Associate Superintendent Charlie Bushyhead says he hopes parents will see how less students in schools means better learning overall.

#### Flu Shot Study Released

A newly published study sheds some light on flu vaccinations.
