**Water Breaks Force Neighbors to Find Other Ways to Get Water**

More people turned on their water once the temperatures hit 100 degrees. The increased pressure caused a 30-inch line to break. Neighbors were able to get some water to fill toilets and sinks from the city's 500 gallon water tanker, but they say that's not enough. Many believe it's time to start conserving water to get through the heat of the summer. One neighbor told us, "We all need to conserve and help everyone out so they don't have to be put in this situation."

**Homes Without Water Due to Break**

Thirty homes in one Tulsa neighborhood are without water due to a water line break. This break is connected to another break over the weekend only blocks away. The week before, people in the area were without water for two days while crews fixed a 30-inch line. Officials believe the heat is the blame for the water breaks as people used more water with the rising temperatures.

**Water Break Cuts Supply to Boynton**

A water line break cut the supply of water to Boynton, OK. The repair was hindered by rain, that kept the crews from getting to the line. Greg Lang lives nearby and told FOX23, "The rain slowed everything down and it's got some of the equipment stuck out there, so they weren't able to fix everything that day because of the rain." Meanwhile the town brought in water tanks to help people get some water if they don't have enough bottled water. The town buys their water from Boynton.

**Water Line Breaks Increase Across Tulsa**

Older water lines are breaking at an increasing rate as the heat reaches triple digits. The crumbling infrastructure cannot take the heat and city was working on 10 different breaks at 6p. The breaks are also causing problems for drivers. Driver Tyler Perez told us while he was annoyed with the water

breaks causing problems for drivers, he was also concerned for the workers who have to make the repairs in the high heat.

### **City Replacing Old Lines and Concerns for Houses**

Large 12-inch line breaks at a major intersection. People are concerned that the extreme heat means that the pipes within their own homes will break since the city lines are breaking so frequently. Some of the city pipes that are breaking are more than 50 years old, but houses built at the same time aren't facing the same problem. The reason is the make of the pipes going into the homes: iron pipes versus PVC. The city says they aren't having to replace the PVC pipes and that the smaller sized iron pipes running into homes aren't causing the same problems as the larger pipes.

### **Water Line Break in Dewar Forces Schools to Close**

The sewer line in Dewar collapsed, forcing the public school system to shut down for the day. Crews started working on the 60-year-old line early on Monday morning. By Wednesday, they were finally wrapping up and getting ready to let kids back into the school. Parents with younger children were concerned with child care. Meanwhile, the superintendent was concerned that if the kids were to drink from a water fountain or flush a toilet it would delay the work to get the pipe fixed.

### **Catastrophic Water Line Break in North Tulsa**

City crews are referring to this particular break as catastrophic. The 16-inch line ruptured and then damaged the arterial road it was under. The break was blamed, not on the heat, but on the water pressure moving through the pipes. Given the destruction of the main road, the cost of the break skyrocketed from a simple repair to a more complicated repair that included laying new asphalt. The complete repair was expected to take an entire week for the crews to not only replace the line, but repair the roadway.

### **Water Break Complicated By Storm Drain**

A water line break in west Tulsa is more complicated than expected. Crews had to remove a storm drain to get to the break before they could start working on it. Carlene Bird told us that her backyard looked like a river and by morning her fence was down. "My main concern is, are they going to repair the fence and the yard and they said they're going to, so that's great," she tells FOX23. Other neighbors say this is the third time the water has been out in a month. One neighbor told us they fill pitchers and other containers with water to make sure they didn't run out.

**City Parks for Sale**

As many as 17 Tulsa city parks could be sold. It's part of an effort to cut down on property the city owns. The parks vary in size and amenities. This is being done by the newly created Asset Management Department. At least one park is only accessible by trespassing through other property. Danny Finch's family sold that land to the city in the mid-1990's. He says, "They was gonna develop it into a park and schools were supposed to be built out here, but I don't know what ever happened to that." Over the coming months, the new department will evaluate possible uses for the land and decide if it's best to sell it off.

**Community Meeting to Discuss Closing BC Franklin Park**

City leaders hold a community meeting to find out what people want from a new park after they already demolished the park recreational building. City leaders were quick to dismiss items such as tennis courts and a rock climbing wall. The city is spending \$800,000 on the project. People at the meeting are concerned that their voices aren't being heard, since the city is planning to use half of the park for a splash pad. They are arguing for a citizens advisory council to help create the new park.

**Citizens Concerned for the Future of BC Franklin Park**

Citizens are concerned they are getting the raw end of the deal with regards to plans for the park. There is a community effort to decide what to replace the demolished building with. The city wants a large splash pad. Residents in the area are arguing that they need a playground and an outdoor fitness area, but the cost of those items would be \$1.3 million dollars, \$500,000 more than what is budgeted. They are now seeking donations to make up for the differential.

**State Park Will Stay Open After Last Minute Agreement**

Walnut Creek State Park will stay open. It was slated to close at the end of August, but that closing was pushed back. The Army Corps of Engineers owns the land and they worked out a deal with the state to keep the park open until October 1<sup>st</sup>. The Oklahoma Department of Tourism and Recreation said they spent more money maintaining the park than the park made. The Army Corps of Engineers is still working to determine if they can afford to operate the parks on their own. Campers tell us, "We just want someone to come in and take care of the park, maybe do some updating."

**City Councilors Tour City Parks**

The city has \$752,000 budgeted for the renovation. One tour participant told us, "It matters a lot because this is our tax dollars at play. We love our parks, but north Tulsa is really about our money too."

### **Chamberlain Recreation Center Saved**

Another recreation center on the block could stay open thanks to a community compromise. Eight-year-old Loretta uses the community center's reading programs. Her mother thinks it's a valuable asset to the community for helping to keep kids out of trouble. She says, "They need more for kids because they are going to participate in drugs or violence, so it's a good thing that this place stays open." The city has allocated \$34,000 to get two more employees in order to keep it open during the day. The previous proposal meant the center would only be open starting at 3p.

### **Committee Formed to Shape Plans for Franklin Park**

The new committee is closer to deciding what will replace Franklin Park. They've created a list of items that they want or need for the park. Hundreds of people came to the meeting and pointed out the lack of walking trails, pavilions and basketball courts in the area. They also want a park with a cultural theme, such as the Black Wall Street. People are passionate about the project because they are concerned the revitalization is being overlooked or simply unwanted by city leaders.

### **New Plans Unveiled for BC Franklin Park**

### **Neighbors Petition Plans for Building at New Park**

The Gathering Place, a \$350,000,000 new park, has some neighbors concerned. The project managers are planning a temporary building to serve as construction headquarters. Neighbors are concerned the commercial building in a residential neighborhood will become permanent. Millie York has talked to the construction company and says they "told me that the building will be the first building up and the last building down when stage two was completed." The problem is that it's predicted to be in 2023. The plans call for an 8-foot fence and extensive landscaping around the building, but York has started a

petition to stop construction and keep 31<sup>st</sup> Street open to traffic. Project managers say they are working on a compromise with neighbors.

**Tulsa Police Get Crime Fighting Grant**

The Tulsa Police Department received a grant of \$200,000 to combat violence on Tulsa streets. The money comes from the Attorney General's "Safe Oklahoma" grant program. The money is slated to be used for overtime "for existing personnel to target violent crimes with evidence-driven approaches." Not everyone was happy with the grant stipulations. One speaker says, "So I think that the sum amount of effort; some thought should be used to fund preventative policing." The money will be distributed to the gang unit, along with sex crimes, warrants and vice.

**Assault Rifles Recovered by Gang Unit**

Nine stolen guns and a bullet-proof vest were among the items recovered by the Tulsa Police Department's Gang Unit. Sharon McDonald tells FOX23 that teenagers have terrorized the neighborhood for years, but she didn't expect they were hiding guns. Tulsa Police say the teenagers broke into several cars in an apartment complex and found one car full of custom guns and accessories owned by a shooting instructor. McDonald says, it's clear that crime and the influence of gangs has spread all over town, "It makes me more aware. I think we'll be more alert."

**Gang and Drug Connected Band Visits Tulsa**

Tulsa Police beef up their presence when El Komander comes to town. Police are concerned that the band itself has ties to drug lords and gangs. The owner of the club where the concert is being held promises that there will be no gang violence at the event that's expected to draw up to 2,000 people. The singer's manager says he's just playing the role of gangster, much like the people who sing gangster rap and says it's nonsense to believe that he is here to spread messages from the drug cartels.

**Federal Drug Indictment for Area Gang**

Federal agents announced a huge drug indictment involving 51 people. They describe the group as a cancer on the Tulsa area. The indictment covers Donald Walters and the people he uses to move drugs throughout the area. It describes how Walters would use the other players to move drugs around to various crack houses, while also monitoring court cases. The indictment also alleges that they used force and intimidation to stop people from cooperating with law enforcement.

**Juvenile and Young Adult Gang Violence**

An attempted car theft turned into a homicide involving a 22-year-old and a 16-year-old. Homicide detectives are seeing a trend in the crime progression from small petty crimes to gang violence and homicide. We talked to two women in the neighborhood where a man was shot and killed following an attempted car break-in. They tell us, "They're not doing anything but running to the street, getting off into trouble. That's their hustle. That's their only means of money." The Tulsa Police Gang Unit tells FOX23 that they are catching almost as many juveniles with guns as adults.

### **Anti-Gang Violence Rally in Oklahoma City**

The rally was called "Silence the Violence," sponsored by an Oklahoma City pastor who focuses on outreach to former gang members. A former gang member spoke about his path from gangs to a family man. Francisco Garcia says, "I just want to give back you know, because I influenced a lot of people in the negative way and now I'm trying to reverse that and influence kids to do the positive things."

### **Tulsa's Most Wanted Connected to Area Gangs**

Local officials are looking for two men in connection with Operation Battlefield. Jamar Stewart and Rodney Parker are named in an investigation involving gangs and accusations of distributing some \$10,000,000 worth of cocaine from cartels. Operation Battlefield is the name of the federal investigation that led to the indictment of more than 50 known gang members.

### **Guns Confiscated From Gangs**

The Tulsa Police Department Gang Unit says they are on track to get more guns off the streets than ever before. They even arrested three people across the street from a school. They recovered two semi-automatic pistols and two shotguns. They say that as a result of these confiscations, in 2013 aggravated assaults were down 28% over the previous year. However, neighbors are asking if that decrease means an increase in safety. Beverley Dobey says, "I don't know if that would really make it safer because as long as you have gang bangers, you'll still have problems. They may have gotten some of the guns, but they are going to get access to more."

### **Man Beaten in Roadside Robbery Helping Stranded Driver**

Police say a man trying to help a stranded driver became the victim of a robbery. The man was driving down the street when he noticed a car with its hood up and a man trying to wave him down. The victim told police he pulled up and opened his door because his windows don't roll down. That's when two men took the victim's wallet and tossed his keys and left the scene. Officers tell FOX23 they've dealt with the three suspects before involving gang related activities.

**Lottery Funds Used for Education**

The state lottery has given more than \$600,000,000 to education in the 10 years since it went into effect. In 2004, voters agreed to the lottery and a second question stating that the money “may not be used to replace other state funds used to support education.” FOX23 has learned that the money goes into a general fund and the state legislature gets to decide how much districts get. The Tulsa Public Schools superintendent and the director of the Oklahoma Lottery both agree the money should go into a separate fund. However the state Board of Equalization says that it has been considered extra funding for education and thus there is no need for a change. FOX23 also spoke to a Midwest City lawmaker who says he’s written bills to create the separate fund for lottery money, but it has failed both times he proposed it.

**Why Public Schools aren’t Affected by Common Core**

While the drama surrounding Common Core continues to pick up, Oklahoma’s private schools aren’t having to deal with the problems. Private schools are allowed to choose their own curriculum, so teachers haven’t had to change the way they teach. Kirk Post, headmaster at Augustine Christian Academy, says “We do respect the state’s interests in seeing that its citizens are educated, but in Oklahoma we have the freedom to make choices about how we’re going to do that.” Over 35,000 Oklahoma students are enrolled in private schools.

**School District Fights Writing Test Scores**

When Jenks Public Schools got their 5<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade state writing tests back they knew something was wrong. Jenks Superintendent Dr. Lisa Mueller says, “It’s very very unusual for us to see even two of the categories come up with the same score for a student, because students tend to be strong in some areas than others.” The state Department of Education shows that the tests are scored using a rubric, but Dr. Mueller believes the test vendor didn’t follow the rubric. When the district took it to the state, they were told they could challenge it, but if the test vendor, CTB/McGraw Hill, didn’t find a reason to change the score then they would be charged \$125 per test. The school has requested the tests be rescored at no charge, but so far they have not received a response.

**Smaller Districts Cope With Changes in Education Standards**

Not every district is dumping the Common Core standards that were repealed over the summer. Muskogee Public Schools decided to stick with what they had in place before the repeal. Clevetta Gray cites the rigor and relevance of the Common Core standards as a reason to continue using it. She tells us, “Rigor means they need to use higher order thinking skills. The relevance means every day problem

solving. They want them to teach a higher depth of knowledge or a higher level of thinking.” Instead of simply going back to the old standards, the school district is blending the two standards. One parent says that while he doesn’t agree with many aspects of Common Core, he does agree with the schools on one thing. “We don’t want kids who are less than smart from going to school. We want kids to teach them something so they can be productive citizens.”

### **Language Immersion School Not Known to Parents**

Tulsa Public Schools has a unique program that most parents don’t know about. It’s a full language immersion. Monroe Demonstration Academy started their dual language immersion school four years ago. In the school half of the students speak Spanish and half speak English. Science and social studies are taught in Spanish, while math classes are in English. Unlike similar programs at other schools, there is not a waiting list for the school, which is adding a 4<sup>th</sup> grade program next year.

### **Oklahoma Faces a Teacher Shortage as New Year Starts**

Hundreds of students went back to school to substitute teachers. Tulsa Public Schools started the year with 76 open positions. The TPS Director of Human Capital says, “The biggest challenge is just having enough teachers interested in teaching.” The problem isn’t unique to Tulsa Public Schools. The State School Board says there are more than 800 vacancies across the state. The main concern is that the state doesn’t have funding to entice teachers to stay in the state.

### **Oklahoma Loses Their No Child Left Behind Waiver**

Another aspect of the fallout from the repeal of Common Core, Oklahoma’s waiver of the No Child Left Behind Act was rescinded by the US Department of Education. This means that nine out of ten schools in Oklahoma could suddenly be considered in need of improvement. School districts, such as Union Public Schools, are saying that there’s a real struggle to meet the No Child Left Behind standards. Dr. Kirt Hartzler says, “I think it was a challenge to begin with when NCLB was passed back in 2001 to say that all students in Oklahoma grades 3 through 8 will be reading at proficiency level in reading and math.” Additionally, the fiscal impact of losing the NCLB waiver is \$20- to \$30 million.

### **Oklahoma State Department of Education Releases School Grades**

The districts are still going through the grades to determine what they are going to mean for students and the future of the district.

The owner of Gateway Market says that they lost more than half a million dollars in business since they opened the doors in 2009. The Community United North group is in the planning stages and will meet the following week.

The owner claims he didn't get the support he needed from the community in order to stay open.

The café includes a teaching component to help diners learn to cook healthy, inexpensive meals at home.

### **Food on the Move Uses Food Trucks to Combat Food Desert**
