Immigration	Fernando & Carmen present: latest news Monday: Authorities Can Now Deny Visa and Green Card Applications Without Giving Applicants a Chance to Fix Errors	09/10/18	10:20-11:00	<p>As President Donald Trump wages a vocal battle against illegal immigration, his administration has been working more quietly to cut down on legal pathways to immigrate to the U.S.</p> <p>On Tuesday, a new policy kicks in, allowing officers with the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services to outright deny any visa or green card application that is missing evidence or contains an error. Previously, officers were required by an Obama-era policy to send notices, giving applicants a chance to correct such problems instead of closing the process. Our immigration lawyer Ezequiel Hernandez explained the topic and answered immigration questions.</p>

If USCIS fails to make a decision by that time, an action may be brought in the federal district court pursuant to 8 U.S.C. § 1447(b). Doctor de la Rosa, an immigration expert spoke about what to do in case it's taking "too" long. We also answered 17 immigration related calls from the audience.</p>

8:12	<p><u>International:</u></p> <p>Indonesia tsunami: Death toll rises sharply as desperation grows</p> <p>Desperation is growing in the stricken Indonesian city of Palu as residents faced a fifth day with little food or clean drinking water and the official death toll mounted in the wake of Friday's devastating earthquake and tsunami.</p> <p>The number of people killed rose to 1,234 on Tuesday, Indonesia's national disaster agency said, including Monday's grim discovery of 34 bodies, mostly children, in a church recreation hall in Sigi Biromaru south of Palu.</p>
12:12AM.	<p><u>National:</u></p> <p>Police say 2 men broke into a UPS facility and stole 400 guns</p> <p>When 400 guns go missing, there's cause for concern -- understandably.</p> <p>For two days, agents with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) and local law enforcement searched for two men who stole that many weapons from a UPS facility in Memphis.</p> <p>The burglary occurred Sunday. Officials say two men drove up in a U-Haul truck and made off with about 400 guns.</p>
3:12 PM	<p>Once-mighty Hurricane Rosa is now just a low-end tropical storm. Nevertheless, it is still poised to pack a punch — in the form of heavy, flooding rains that are targeting the Desert Southwest.</p> <p>Rosa is set to make landfall along Mexico's Baja Peninsula Monday evening, likely as a weak tropical storm or depression. But the reduction in winds doesn't mean the threat is waning — in fact, concern is growing about potentially dangerous flooding</p>
