The court gave the Trump administration 90 days to challenge the ruling before reinstating DACA in its entirety. Lawyer Ezequiel Hernandez who is with us on a weekly basis came along and we received approximately 18 calls from the audience.

We had lawyer Nestor Zarate speaking on behalf of thousands of immigrants who sometimes feel like they don't have the right to demand their rights. A show full of calls and questions. News (Top national stories)	Fernando & Carmen present: Migrant Caravan	05/07/18	10:20-11:00	About 345 people traveling with a migrant caravan sharply criticized by President Donald Trump arrived this week in Tijuana, the group's final destination in Mexico before coming to the U.S. border to ask for asylum. Caravan members interested in requesting asylum will spend Friday and Saturday at legal orientations to understand their rights and what to expect after they enter the U.S. port of entry. A group of supporters began marching on Sunday from Los Angeles to Friendship Park to welcome the caravan at the border. Fernando Sosa

Immigration	Fernando & Carmen present: Tolerance Zero	05/09/19	10:20- 11:00	Attorney General Jeff Sessions today notified all U.S. Attorney’s Offices along the Southwest Border of a new “zero-tolerance policy” for offenses under 8 U.S.C. § 1325(a), which prohibits both attempted illegal entry and illegal entry into the United States by an alien. The implementation of the Attorney General’s zero-tolerance policy comes as the Department of Homeland Security reported a 203 percent increase in illegal border crossings from March 2017 to March 2018, and a 37 percent increase from February 2018 to March 2018—the largest month-to-month increase since 2011.
Health	Fernando & Carmen present: Air quality	05/10/18	10:20- 10:42	The Clean Energy for a Healthy Arizona initiative will gradually increase the amount of our energy that comes from renewable. Not only does the State of Arizona run with the clean energy problem, but also Washington, California and Nevada. Two experts came to discuss: Nurse practitioner Damaris Hazell and Leonor Juarez, a mother of 3 kids with down syndrome affected by contaminated air. The topic lifted concern among the community and mothers called to ask about the correlation between asthma and air contamination.

6:12 June 20,21,22	<p><u>National:</u> *Live from McAllen, Texas*</p> <p>The storm created by the separation of families in the border produced national outrage. Radio Campesina was live from McAllen, Texas in a live coverage from the processing centers for minors and the shelters with the latest reports. From the executive order president Donald Trump signed to stop family separations, to the visit of Melania Trump on June 22nd to view with her own eyes the conditions of the minors. We covered with breaking news, interrupted programming and broadcasted live from our social media platforms.</p>
7:12 June 5-7	<p><u>National:</u> #BreakingNews on Suicide.</p> <p>A new government study released reveals that suicide has been on the rise nationwide since 1999. The figures were released in the week when the deaths of designer Kate Spade and celebrity chef Anthony Bourdain brought the issue to the fore. In the days following Spade's death, the US suicide prevention hotline - 1-800-273-8255 - saw a 25% spike in calls, the Wall Street Journal reported.</p>
8:12 May 2-4	<p><u>International:</u> *Immigrant caravan in Tijuana, Baja California*</p> <p>Attorney General Jeff Sessions announced that the Justice Department was sending dozens of additional prosecutors and immigration judges to the U.S.-Mexico border to pursue cases against illegal border crossers, while warning members of a controversial "caravan" that they "should wait their turn" to enter the U.S. According to Sessions, 35 assistant U.S. attorneys would go to the frontier to "prosecute illegal entries into our country," while 18 immigration judges would focus "full time" on clearing a backlog of asylum claims.</p>

June 28</p>	<p><u>National:</u></p> <p>#BreakingNews shooting number 195 in the USA.</p> <p>The gunman who opened fire at the Capital Gazette newspaper in Maryland, killing five, barricaded the door to stop people from getting out and was bent on killing "as many people as he could kill," police and prosecutors said. The mass shooting sent shockwaves through the journalism community and left investigators searching for answers.</p>
<p>3:12 PM June 29</p>	<p><u>International:</u></p> <p>*A decisive day for the future of Mexico*</p> <p>Mexican presidential front-runner Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador heads into Sunday's watershed election with a substantial lead in the polls and the hopes of a country disenchanted with rampant corruption and escalating violence on his shoulders.</p> <p>In addition to deciding on the third presidential bid of the former mayor of Mexico City, an electorate that has become increasingly angry with the political status quo will also select 500 members of Congress and 128 senators.</p>
