They identify themselves as police officers when they knock on doors in search of undocumented immigrants. The use of the label has long been criticized by immigration attorneys, who say the practice is unethical and sometimes illegal, particularly when it involves tricking people into revealing their relatives' whereabouts. But lawmakers have largely ignored the issue. Until now. A House bill introduced Thursday would bar ICE agents and officers from wearing clothing that bears the label "police." It also would affect agents and Officers with U.S. Customs and Border Protection.

Only the Panhandle and extreme South Florida were free from larger wildfires one day after Governor Rick Scott declared a state of emergency. Scott's Tuesday declaration was made as more than 100 fires sparked across the state on April 11, covering some 20,000 acres.

Judith Weissman, lead author of the study and a research manager at New York University's Langone Medical Center, found that 3.4% of adult Americans, or more than 8.3 million people, suffered serious psychological distress in 2014. Nearly a decade earlier, only 3% or less were reported to have suffered in the same way.

Working in fields such as science and technology. While the number of applicants has dropped the USCIS says the program's cap was met five days into the enrollment period for its fifth consecutive year.
TAX DAY FREEBIES	DESPIERTA AMERICA	04/18/2017	7:00am	0:30	Deadline is today for filing annual tax returns If you're one of the 40 million Americans who has still not filed your taxes this year, here's a reminder that provides little relief: You had an extra three days to submit your annual return, but that time runs out today. Although tax day in the United States - by law - falls on April 15, this year the deadline is today, April 18. That's because April 15 was a Saturday, and Monday a holiday in Washington D.C., the home of the Internal Revenue Service. The capital observes Emancipation Day, a holiday commemorating the day in 1862 when Abraham Lincoln signed legislation freeing slaves in the District of Columbia. IRS agents staffed telephone lines over the weekend to help taxpayers with any last-minute issues, and there are ways to obtain additional time. As of last week, the IRS had processed more than 100 million tax returns. The average refund was \$2,851 this year, up 1.9 percent from last year. About 92 percent of tax returns were submitted electronically.

Taking antidepressants during pregnancy doesn't appear to raise a child's risk of autism, once other factors that could influence the risk are taken into account, two new studies suggest. Depression during pregnancy can be dangerous for both mother and child. Pregnant women with untreated depression are more likely to have severe postpartum depression, and their children are more likely to be born prematurely or at a low birth weight. But

					earlier studies found a significant association between first-trimester exposure to antidepressants and autism spectrum disorder in children, sparking some concern about prescribing the drugs to pregnant women, researchers explained in background notes.

The Trump administration on Wednesday announced it would soon issue a new, redesigned green card for legal immigrants that will be more secure and more resistant to fraud. U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services said it would start issuing the new cards on May 1, and that the cards would use enhanced graphics and fraud-resistant security features. USCIS said the new green cards would display a person's picture on both sides of the card, and show an image of the Statue of Liberty. Employment Authorization Documents will also include photos of the authorized person, and show a picture of a bald eagle. Both sets of documents will also include holographic images, and will no longer display the person's signature, a move that could make it harder for people's signatures to be forged. USCIS said older green cards and EAD papers would remain valid until they expire, after which they will be replaced by the new, redesigned versions.

Democratic lawmakers in Sacramento want California to become the nation's first sanctuary state. Republicans tried to stop it Tuesday with legislation of their own. California's Democrat politicians have been promoting a policy of sheltering criminals in our state who are in here illegally, Allen's bill countered SB 54, which probits local law enforcement from communicating with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement officials in almost all cases. The only exception involved is convicted violent felons. Allen believes that's troublesome because that means everyone else including those deported in the past, those convicted of prior or multiple misdemeanors, and those who plead guilty to lesser offenses would be

Their visual judgement and motor skills have not fully developed before then - putting them at risk each time they negotiate a busy street, according to new research. A study using a simulated virtual traffic environment showed accident rates can reach as high as eight percent among six year-olds. Crossing the street by foot seems easy for adults who take stock of the traffic and calculate the time needed to get to the other side without being hit. Crossing the street by foot seems easy for adults who take stock of the traffic and calculate the time needed to get to the other side without being hit Even those aged 12 were struck by vehicles two percent of the time - and had to compensate for their lack of judgement by choosing bigger gaps in traffic.
ARKANSAS EXECUTIONS	DESPIERTA AMERICA	04/21/2017	7:00am	0:30	Arkansas carried out its first execution in nearly a dozen years despite a flurry of legal challenges that had spared three convicted killers, but courts still could scuttle the remainder of the nation's most ambitious death penalty schedule since capital punishment was restored in 1976. Ledell Lee was pronounced dead at 11:56 p.m. Thursday, four minutes before his death warrant was due to expire at midnight, capping a chaotic week of legal wrangling. Arkansas originally wanted to put eight inmates to death before the state's supply of midazolam, one of three drugs used in its lethal injection process, expires at the end of April. Three of those executions were canceled this week because of court decisions. Another inmate scheduled for execution next week has received a stay. But Arkansas wants to put two other inmates to death Monday, and one next Thursday.

The Department of Homeland Security's inspector general, in an April 13 report released publicly Thursday found that ICE deportation officers in charge of "non-detained" immigrants facing deportation at four ICE field offices were responsible, on average, for supervising between 1,700 and roughly 10,000 immigrants. Caseloads for deportation officers overseeing detained immigrants were far less burdensome, averaging between 65 and 104 immigrants per person.

Scam artists claiming to work for "U.S. Immigration" are calling victims across the country seeking to steal their personal information and commit identity theft, the Department of Homeland Security's inspector general warned. The thieves are using a technique called spoofing, where they alter the caller ID so it looks like the call is coming from the Department of Homeland's hotline number (1-800-323-8603). "The scammers demand to obtain or verify personally identifiable information from their victims through various tactics, including by telling individuals that they are the victims of identity theft," the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Office of Inspector General said in its fraud alert Wednesday. It also noted that many of the scammers "reportedly have pronounced accents."
STUDY DIET SODAS DEMENTIA	DESPIERTA AMERICA	04/21/2017	9:00am	0:24	Artificially sweetened drinks, such as diet sodas, were tied to a higher risk of stroke and dementia in the study, which published in the American Heart Association's journal Stroke on Thursday. The study sheds light only on an association, as the researchers were unable to determine an actual causeand-effect relationship between sipping artificially sweetened drinks and an increased risk for stroke and dementia. Therefore, some experts caution that the findings should be interpreted carefully. No connection was found between those health risks and other sugary beverages, such as sugar-sweetened sodas, fruit juice and fruit drinks.

Days after US Attorney Jeff Sessions sent letters to eight 'sanctuary cities' including New York, giving an ultimatum that if they do not cooperate with 'La Migra' they will lose federal funds, the Brooklyn Attorney's Office announced on Monday new measures to Protect immigrants from being deported for minor crimes. The initiative would educate the staff of the Office of the Attorney General about the legal consequences that immigration would have for people who are not US citizens, to be accused of certain crimes. In turn, Prosecutors should instruct defense lawyers in criminal court.

Washington DC, self-classified as a "sanctuary city" challenged President Donald Trump's dawning of restricting federal funds to jurisdictions that continue to protect immigrants.

One of the nation's largest school districts has launched a campaign against Islamophobia, drawing praise and criticism. It's expected to be drafted and sent before Ramadan begins in late May. The district is also reviewing internal staff calendars to make sure Muslim holidays are recognized. Next school year, it will review materials on Muslim culture for libraries, provide resources to teachers and engage in partnerships with the Council on American Islamic Relations. Over several years, it plans to consider high school clubs that promote American Muslim culture, create "safe spaces" for students and train staff about Muslim culture.

US Department of Homeland Security Secretary John Kelly confirmed that people in the United States with expired visas will be the new priority of immigration officers across the country. 45% of the undocumented population in the country entered the United States using some type of visa, according to a study by the Pew Hispanic Center. Known as "illegal residents", these immigrants became undocumented the moment they stayed in the country once their respective visas expired.

Trump is scheduled to unveil the broad outlines of a tax overhaul Wednesday. As part of the plan, he would propose a massive cut in the corporate income tax, reducing the top rate of 35 percent to 15 percent. The official budget scorekeeper for Congress said Tuesday that even a more modest rate cut, to 20 percent, would add to long-term budget deficits even if the tax cut is temporary. That's a

					problem for Republicans because the Senate cannot pass legislation that would add to long-term budget deficits without a 60-vote majority. That means Democrats would have to support it, and Republicans and Democrats have major differences when it comes to tax reform.
IMMIGRANT CRIME OFFICE	DESPIERTA AMERICA	04/26/2017	7:00am	0:26	The Homeland Security Department is set to launch an office for American victims of immigrant crime. The Victims of Immigrant Crime Engagement, or a href(equals)' office opening Wednesday is intended to keep victims informed of the immigration proceedings of suspects. Critics have argued that such an office is misguided in part because multiple studies show that immigrants are less likely to commit crime than native-born U.S. citizens. President Donald Trump announced the office in his speech to Congress in February. The office's creation was also part of an executive order aimed at combating illegal immigration. Trump's tough approach to illegal immigration was the core issue of his campaign. The office's opening comes as his administration is highlighting his accomplishments as he approaches the 100-day marker of his presidency.
FDA CRACKS ILLEGAL CANCER	DESPIERTA AMERICA	04/26/2017	8:30am	0:20	The US Food and Drug Administration calls it "cruel deception": companies promising desperate consumers that their products can cure cancer. On Tuesday, the agency responsible for policing the American food and drug market issued warning letters to 14 companies that it says are "illegally selling more than 65 products that fraudulently claim to prevent, diagnose, treat or cure cancer." The companies that received the warning letters are required by law to respond in a timely fashion, indicating whether they intend to pull the products under scrutiny from the market or alter the advertising and packaging to comply with the agency's rules and regulations.
TEXAS SANCTUARY	DESPIERTA AMERICA	04/27/2017	7:00am	2:00	The Texas House has approved a strict ban on "sanctuary cities" in the country's second-largest state, seeking to empower police to enforce federal immigration law against anyone they detain and threatening to jail police chiefs and sheriffs who refuse to do so. Thursday's 93-54 vote followed 15-plus hours of emotional debate, much of it from outnumbered Democrats powerless to stop the bill. Under it, the state could withhold funding from local governments for acting as sanctuary cities, even as the Trump administration's efforts to do so nationally have hit roadblocks. Other Republican-controlled states have pushed for similar policies in recent

					years. But Texas would be the first where police chiefs and sheriffs could be jailed for not helping enforce immigration law.
TRUMP TAXES	DESPIERTA AMERICA	04/27/2017	7:00am	0:30	President Donald Trump's team boasted Wednesday that its tax-cut plan would lighten Americans' financial burdens, ignite economic growth and vastly simplify tax filing. Yet the proposal so far remains short of vital details, including how it would be paid for. And based on the few specifics spelled out so far, most experts suggest that it would add little to growth while swelling the budget deficit and potentially handing large windfalls to wealthier taxpayers. Trump's plan would replace the current seven income tax brackets with three, and the top bracket would drop from 39.6 percent to 35 percent. It would also slash the corporate rate from 35 percent all the way to 15 percent, a boon to most companies even though many don't pay the full tax now. With tax credits and other loopholes, most corporations pay closer to 20 percent.
ICE CHILDREN CRIMINALS LIST	DESPIERTA AMERICA	04/27/2017	8:00am	0:26	Babies and children are listed in Homeland Security's immigrant database of alleged criminals. A database the Trump administration said would help victims of crimes track the custody of suspected criminal immigrants mistakenly listed babies and other children. The public database included the names of children, from infants to underage teenagers, in immigration custody. When alerted Wednesday evening, Department of Homeland Security officials said the release of children's names was a lapse in policy. The agency is not supposed to release information on children in immigration custody, said Gillian M. Christensen, acting Homeland Security press secretary.
SUPER BACTERIA THREAT	DESPIERTA AMERICA	04/27/2017	9:00am	0:27	Health authorities are concerned about the spread of the Candida Auris infection. A super drug resistant fungus is emerging as a new threat in US hospitals, mainly in New York and New Jersey, according to information released at a CDC conference. The fungus, called Candida auris, is a harmful form of yeast. Scientists say it can be difficult to identify it with standard laboratory tests. Federal health officials sounded the alarms in 2016 because two of three types of drugs commonly used against fungi had little effect.
TOYOTA RECALLS	DESPIERTA AMERICA	04/28/2017	10:00am	0:26	Toyota is recalling 228,000 Tacoma vehicles over an issue that could cause drivers to lose control of their cars. The company says the recall applies to

	certain 2016 and 2017 Tacoma trucks. The issue is that the vehicle's' rear differential the piece that connects the truck's back two wheels could lead to a crash if a vehicle is operated for a long time and damages the rear differential. Customers can look up whether their car is included in the recall on Toyota's website. The company says it's already sending notices via mail to affected customers. Toyota is encouraging drivers with affected trucks to bring them into a dealer to get checked out. If there's an issue, the company says necessary parts will be replaced free of charge. Otherwise, minor services may be performed to ensure there isn't an issue going forward. The company declined to comment when asked whether there have been any injuries or crashes linked to this recall.

It does give Trump a \$12.5 billion down payment on his request to strengthen the military, a figure which could rise to \$15 billion should Trump present Congress with a plan for fighting the Islamic State terror group. The proposed \$15 billion amounts to half of Trump's original \$30 billion request.
TEMPORARY VISA SHORTAGE	DESPIERTA AMERICA	05/02/2017	8:00am	0:20	Innkeepers, restaurateurs and landscapers around the U.S. say they are struggling to find seasonal help and turning down business in some cases because the government tightened up on visas for temporary foreign workers. At issue are H-2B temporary visas, which are issued for workers holding down seasonal, nonagricultural jobs. The U.S. caps the number at 66,000 per fiscal year. Some workers return year after year, and Congress has let them do so in the past without being counted toward the limit. No such exception was passed for 2017 at the end of last year, after the presidential election. Lawmakers on Monday unveiled a government spending bill that would
