Ascertainment Issues 4th Quarter 2012

The following is a description of what KSTW Television has determined to be the most significant issues facing our local communities. This list reflects ongoing topics, as well as a brief list of other issues presented by citizens and community leaders:

Violence and Crime

Teen violence, gun violence, juvenile crime and domestic violence are areas of increasing concern. There is a need to establish safer communities through education, advocacy and youth leadership programs. Policy makers need to identify a long-term, dedicated funding source for human services programs. Communities need to improve access to information and services for teens and provide safe places for children and youth during out-of-school hours. Media needs to promote programs designed to train children how to handle violence.

Child Abuse and Neglect

Child abuse and child neglect are areas of increasing concern. Social isolation is the number one factor of child abuse. Parental support and group parent interaction are key issues. Communities need to provide programs that enable parents of infants and young children to meet the challenges of parenting through mutual support and shared information. New moms need access to parenting resources and tools. Teen pregnancy is a growing concern. 66% of teen parents in Washington have been sexually abused and 60% of homeless youth have experienced physical or sexual abuse. Programs that help abused, neglected or poverty-stricken children attain self-esteem and confidence (i.e. Treehouse) need media attention and awareness.

Homelessness and Housing

There is a critical need for emergency, transitional and low-income housing in our community. Every family needs a safe, stable home base to achieve success; it is especially important for children. Homeless and runaway youth need tools for self-sufficiency, access to basic survival skills, HIV education, referrals to shelters and access to public transportation and health clinics. Programs helping families move from temporary housing to permanent housing need media attention. Due to illness, aging, inflation, or any number of uncontrollable causes, many older homeowners are not able to provide repair work, resulting in unsafe living conditions. Volunteers and media sponsors are needed to staff housing project campaigns such as Habitat for Humanity.

Education

Quality education, early education and after-school tutoring programs are areas of growing concerns. There is a need for parent involvement in schools. Media needs to promote the academic success of children and youth through mentoring and tutoring programs. Media needs to promote the academic success of at-risk and low-achieving students, particularly in the area of literacy. After-school community programs that help

kids succeed in school and prepare for life need community awareness. There is a critical need for one-to-one mentors for students in elementary and middle schools. Schools need to develop new resources and community leadership programs to help children achieve at a higher level and assure the achievement of every child.

Health Care

Issues surrounding quality and affordable health care are an increasing concern. Seniors (over 65 years of age) need reasonable, reliable and affordable health care services. Persons with disabilities need assistance with medical limitations, restrictions and boundaries. Funding long-term health care problems need media attention. Non-profit agencies providing basic health care need fundraising and community support. Long-term care resources need to be made accessible to persons with limitations and disabilities.

Traffic

There is a need for better traffic flow, timed lights in the city and improved general efficiency on highways. Ongoing construction projects need media support. Traffic is the number one delay factor in emergency response times. Media need to educate drivers to move to the right for emergency vehicles, sirens and lights.

Hosted by Sandusky Radio in Bellevue, the following speakers addressed the Media regarding the topics noted:

Alan Stein, Senior Historian for History Link Discussed how the online encyclopedia of Washington State history chronicles photos, maps, and articles. The encyclopedia is searchable and offers a timeline which makes this a valuable resource for school children or people interested in learning more about Washington's history.

Nicole Taylor, Affiliate Manager for Young Survival Coalition Seattle Explained how the organization offers support to the small percentage of breast cancer patients who are younger than 50. The organization provides support groups as well as a resource binder for each member with medical terms and tips for getting through treatment.

Ken Weinberg, CEO and Executive Director for Jewish Family Services Topics included the food bank operated by the organization, the in home assistance program they run, and the housing assistance given to families in need. This organization serves Jewish and non-Jewish families and individuals.

Robin J. Lester, CEO of Washington Women's Employment and Education (WWEE) Explained how the organization provides education and employment assistance to women moving from welfare to the workplace or are changing careers. They teach interview skills, provide

interview outfits, offer transportation for interviews, and teach seminars on writing resumes and cover letters.

Hyeok Kim, Executive Director for InterIM CDA, and Jonathan Chen, Garden Manager for InterIM CDA Discussed how the Danny Woo community garden in Seattle offers elderly Asian immigrants the opportunity to continue their farming techniques practiced in their home country. Children's gardens are offered as well.

12/5/2012 Hosted by KCIS Radio and Spirit 105.3 Radio in Shoreline, the following speakers addressed the Media regarding the topics noted:

Jerry Senner, Executive Director of Western Heritage Center Explained that the Western Heritage Center shares the living history of the Snohomish River Valleys by collecting, preserving, and restoring historical documents and artifacts through interpretive displays and through creative public and educational programming. They are expanding their grounds.

Sharon Okamoto, Executive Director & Principal of the Seattle Urban Academy led discussion regarding the school's goal to serve youth who've dropped out of school or lost all hope in their academic and personal future. The school develops a system of academic intensive care, personal reflection, and college prep.

<u>Sylvia Anderson, CEO of Everett Gospel Mission</u> Topics included homelessness, children in trauma, service for the working poor, encampments, the need to break generational poverty by providing transitional homes in churches. The center offers housing/shelter for men and women, standing as the only emergency shelter in the Puget Sound area.

Jennifer Osborn, Marketing Director of Northwest Railway Museum and Richard Anderson, Executive Director of Northwest Railway Museum Explained the museum's purpose of providing the public a place to experience the excitement of a working railroad and to see and understand the significance of railroads in the development of Washington and adjacent areas. The museum offers seasonal events to engage the community like Santa Train and A Visit from Thomas.
