AMAZING WOMEN

This 20 minute program runs Sunday morning, 7:30am on HOT 106 FM. It features an interview with a prominent woman, highlighting issues important to women.

- Jan 1st:** How do Rhode Island companies find well-trained employees? URI's Business Engagement Center (BEC) is the front door for connecting business with students for internships, careers, or research. **KATHARINE HAZARD FLYNN** is the executive director and discusses the growing opportunities and jobs in manufacturing, engineering, computer science, digital media and design.
- Jan 8th** 1 in 5 women will be assaulted on college campus. **TOBY SIMON,** the former director of Women's Center at Bryant University has taught human sexuality and authored numerous books on the connection between alcohol and sexual behavior. She discusses what colleges need to do about sexual assaults on campus and the changing attitudes towards violence and sexual assault.
- Jan 15th** Rhode Island's history and heritage are economic assets to the state's economy. **MORGAN GREFE,** executive director of ***Rhode Island Historical Society*** discusses Rhode Island's rich history that reminds us how the past frames the future.
- Jan 22nd** Rhode Island Superior Court **JUDGE NETTIE VOGEL** has presided over some of the state's high profile cases over the past 20 years on the bench. She is a colorful justice with a daredevil spirit. She bikes cross country and zip lines, but don't cross her in the courtroom.
- Jan 29th** There's politics in the workplace and in our families. How does power and compassion relate to the political arena? **SYLVIA WEBER,** a clinical nurse specialist at Miriam Hospital Dept. of Psychiatry discusses how we can bring compassion into our work and family.

Mar 5th COLONEL ANN ASSUMPICO is the 13th Superintendent and the first woman to lead Rhode Island State Police in 92 years. She is a native Rhode Islander who talks about her 40 year career in law enforcement. This includes twenty-four years with the State Police, seven years with Coventry police as a SWAT Team member, and as the Director of Training for the State Police Academy. She discusses what she hopes to accomplish.

Mar 12th Newport is home to impressive mansions on Bellevue Avenue. TRUDY COXE is executive director of the Preservation Society of Newport County and explains that the preservation of these historic homes is a boon for the local and

state economy. The Newport mansions eclipsed one million tours—the most of any museum in all of New England.

Mar 19th In 1638, Roger Williams was the first minister at the First Baptist Church in Providence. Today, it's REVEREND JAMIE WASHAM. She discusses Roger Williams' ideas of soul liberty and freedom of conscience and the historic and religious significance of America's oldest church.

Mar 26th Rhode Island has a rich maritime history. Dr. KATHY ABBASS is an archeologist and marine historian who founded the Rhode Island Marine Archeology Project. She has located and identified 13 British ships that were sunk in Newport Harbor in 1778.
