2022 year-end news summary for Hatteras Island. January 1, 2023.

Some of the events that happened on the island last year start with the Rodanthe Bridge completion.

The Rodanthe Bridge opens

Providing mostly assured vehicle access, the new Rodanthe Bridge opened for traffic July 28, 2022. The Rodanthe Bridge is a 2.4-mile bridge over Pamlico Sound that bypasses Hatteras Island's famed Scurves, one of the most vulnerable sections of NC 12.

A Community Day was held April 9. A Run the Rodanthe Bridge 5-mile and 5K events started at 8 in the morning. NCDOT opened a Community Day at 1 o'clock for people to walk or bike the bridge until 5 o'clock.

The anticipated mid-April opening did not occur. The last delay involved painting white and yellow lines on the bridge.

Construction started September 6, 2018. Bridge construction cost was \$145 million.

Historic day for Electric Cooperative

Tuesday, December 6, 2022, was a historic day for the Cape Hatteras Electric Cooperative. The island's electric provider finished the final cutover to the new transmission lines on the Rodanthe Bridge! The reliability of electric service to Hatteras and Ocracoke islands is greatly improved as the bridge bypasses the vulnerable section of transmission infrastructure that was just north of Rodanthe.

Erosion takes three houses in Rodanthe; more are threatened

During the night of February 8, 2022, a two-story house collapsed into the Atlantic Ocean, south of the Rodanthe Pier.

It was the first of three that would fall this year, all from Ocean Drive, south of the Rodanthe Pier.

The structure had not been connected to water or power for a year or more

Cape Hatteras National Seashore alerted visitors to the presence of debris from Rodanthe through Salvo to Ramp 23, seven miles south of the site.

A few days later, debris had spread 15 miles south of the site along the Cape Hatteras National Seashore beaches.

The call went out for volunteers. And, volunteers showed up!

As a result of the collapses, the National Seashore purchased a mechanical rake to pick up smaller debris pieces just under the beach sand.

Property owners along the Rodanthe beach front are lobbying for beach nourishment. The Dare County Board of Commissioners will host a Town Hall meeting on erosion and nourishment Jan. 18, at 6 o'clock at the Rodanthe-Waves-Salvo Community Building, across from the Chicamacomico Life-Saving Station.

Hatteras Island was visited by storms

The year opened with back to back winter storms in January. First, came a low pressure system; then three winter storms. One was icy. Another promised snow, but only delivered a trace of the white stuff. Coastal flooding came in February with 6 to 9 food waves and one house collapsing. In March, it was a cold front and a freeze warning.

In April, a low pressure system caused NCDOT crews to be called out twice to scrape sand off NC 12 in Pea Island National Wildlife Refuge.

A warning of coastal flooding in May was correct. A storm that visited May 10 brought two houses down along Ocean Drive in Rodanthe.

The summer was relative quiet.

Named storms started in September with Earl, Fiona and Ian, which returned in early October after hooking up with a low pressure system. Ian sent moderate to major coastal flooding.

The Christmas storm hit all of Hatteras Island with soundside overwash and bitterly cold temperatures, which gradually abated. A warm but foggy day greeted New Year's Eve.

Real Estate Market on Hatteras Island is trending downward

The significant decline in the number of homes and lots under contract to be sold suggests that the weak real estate market will be with us for some time to come, says Business Correspondent Tom Hranicka.

The number of houses available for purchase is less than 100 for the entire island.

The sales of houses are down. The median sale price is still rising.

The number of properties under contract to be sold has declined.

In October, only 23 homes were sold on Hatteras Island.

The cumulative results for undeveloped lots through October reflected continued weakening. The number of undeveloped lots for sale, properties sold and those under contract to be sold are all trending downward.

The median sale price for undeveloped lots has increased to \$125,000.

Two other gages for Hatteras Island's economy are meal tax and occupancy tax receipts.

Meal tax receipts through October were down 1.75 percent compared to the first 10 months of 2021. Occupancy tax receipts, on the other hand, were up almost 7 percent through October when compared to the same period in 2021.

Major project addresses inlets

Miss Katie arrived in Dare County Friday afternoon, August 19. The shallow draft hopper dredge is already at work clearing shoaling in Oregon and Hatteras inlets.

The dredge is a collaboration between Dare County officials and EJE Dredging Service, who owns the dredge. It was built in Conrad Shipyard in Louisiana. She docks in Wanchese harbor. The Oregon Inlet Task Force is tasked with scheduling the Miss Katie and addressing the shoaling in all channels in Dare County.

The dredge was funded with a \$15 Million Forgivable Loan from the State of North Carolina. The Miss Katie was selected by Workboat Magazine as one of the 10 Significant Boats of 2022.

Waterways Commission has good news

After two years of work by the county's Waterways Commission, the realignment of Hatteras Inlet was accomplished Dec. 1.

It means that the horseshoe route is now entirely open to federal maintenance dredging. On December 1, Barton Grover, staffer for the Waterways Commission, received notification that a Finding of No Significant Impact was posted for the Hatteras to Hatteras Inlet Channel Realignment. And, the environmental document says that in dredging, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers can follow best water.

New campus for College of The Albemarle

College of The Albemarle moved into a brand new campus this year. Various dignitaries snipped a ribbon April 8.

The \$17. 7 million building consolidated offices and classrooms in one location.

The college now offers face-to-face instruction in classes needed for a diploma or certificate.

Do you think this doesn't affect Hatteras Island? The year one Cape Hatteras Secondary senior, perhaps more, has already earned a diploma along with the technical program in Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning. He's still taking courses at the island school. Last year, four Cape Hatteras Secondary students received Associate in Arts degrees along with High School diplomas.

Two beach nourishment projects were completed on Hatteras Island in 2022.

In Avon, about 2.5 miles of shoreline was nourished at a cost of \$11,030,962. The project started 3,000 feet north of Avon Pier at Due East Road and ran to the Avon/National Park Service line. Start date was June 19 with finish July 27, 2022, just 39 days.

In Buxton, about 3 miles of shoreline from the Haulover Day Use Area to the oceanfront groin at the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse was nourished at a construction cost of \$18,106,674.

The nourishment project began on June 30 and was completed on August 16, some 47 days.

A water infrastructure project completed

A Dare County Water Department contractor replaced one and half miles of existing water line between Buxton and Avon.

The project started November 1 and the new line was placed in service December 12.

Between November 2018 and September 2022, the existing line experienced 10 ruptures due to pressure spikes. The new 12-inch PVC line is able to withstand pressure at 200 pounds per square inch.

Two groups are raising money for two more infrastructure projects

The Frisco-Buxton Pathway Committee has raised \$77,550 in donations for matching funds in case a federal grant is awarded. The first Pathway phase will run from Cape Hatteras Secondary School in Buxton to Little Grove United Methodist Church in Frisco. The Tourism Board has pledged \$400,000 for matching funding.

Outer Banks Forever is official non-profit partner with the Cape Hatteras National Seashore, Wright Brothers National Memorial and Fort Raleigh National Historic Site.

Outer Banks Forever is raising funds to build a pathway from NC 12 to the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse. The organization is working to close a \$625,000 funding gap. The Dare Tourism Board provided a \$132,000 Tourism Impact Grant for the pathway. The organization held a 2022 Giving Day event and raised \$24,500.

Another completed project finished just before the New Year.

The Dare County Geographical Information Systems Department has spun off a Recreation Map from its updated Community map.

The community map is found on the Dare County website, DareNC dot gov.

The recreation map can be accessed on Play dot DareCountyNC dot gov.

The brand-new Recreation Map allows Dare County residents, visitors and property owners to enter a location and discover an assortment of nearby attractions and amenities, including area beach accesses, lifeguard stations, public boat launches, ORV ramps, fishing piers, playgrounds, dog parks, picnic areas and sports facilities, as well as local historical sites, museums and other attractions.

Rodanthe feasibility study to be updated

Dare County received a grant regarding beach nourishment in Rodanthe from the state's Division of Coastal Management.

The Division of Coastal Management provided a \$25,000 grant for a beach, shoreline, and water management project which consists of "re-establishing control and stations for a systematic survey along the Rodanthe beach to update the 2013 Feasibility Report. Topographic and bathymetric data will be used to determine minimum beach volume necessary for 5 years of storm protection and expected costs."

For the grant, the state provides a 75% match. Dare County provides \$8,335 from fund balance for the update work, making the update cost around \$34,000.

The County Manager Robert L. Outten was authorized to sign a contract for the grant.

To answer questions about beach nourishment in Rodanthe, a Town Hall meeting will be held by Dare County's Board of Commissioners January 18 at 6 o'clock at the Rodanthe-Waves-Salvo Community Building in Rodanthe.

The meeting will be live streamed.

Island Free Press has a report with links to online options.

Dare School board receives more local money

The school board will receive almost \$200,000 more in funding from Dare's commissioners.

Under the funding formula followed by Dare County and the school board, the local current expense calculation includes increases in the state's Coast of Living Adjustment and in the state's retirement system rate.

Dare County is required to have its annual budget in place by July 1 of each year. If the state's budget is not in place the percentage of increases is estimated. In both categories, the state's increase was higher than the estimate. The formula was recalculated resulting in the additional funding.

The 2022 Fiscal Year Annual Comprehensive Financial Report and Audit reports that Dare County delivers the highest amount of local current expense school funding in the state, a position it has held in 19 of the last 20 years. Orange County edged out Dare in a recent year.

Dare County Board of Education meets Monday, January 9, 2023, in the Commissioners Meeting Room at the Dare County Administration Building, 954 Marshall C. Collins Dr., Manteo.

Speaking about the audit

Dare County commissioners received an unmodified audit opinion for the county's June 30, 2022, audit. Bob Taylor, partner with the county's audit firm, Potter & Company, told the commissioners that the required opinion letters were clean with no exceptions.

The auditor is required to provide an opinion on the county's financial statements and single audit opinions on internal control and compliance with federal and state programs.

Potter & Company looked at statements of governmental activity, the business-type activities like the Dare County water system, component units, each major fund and related notes.

Based on the audit, Potter & Company opined that the financial statements "present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position" of the various funds examined.

The entire 2022 Fiscal Year Annual Comprehensive Financial Report and Audit is posted on the Dare County website, dare n c dot gov under the Finance Department.

Dare has a new planner

Savannah Newbern is Dare County's new Planner. She joins the county's planning staff after two years with Currituck County. She previously worked for the Town of Duck. On January 3, Newbern made her first presentation to the county's Planning Board.

Planning Director Noah Gillam introduced Newbern to the Planning Board, January 3.

At that Planning Board meeting, board members agreed that conditions on a Buxton special use permit were reasonable and appropriate.

The permit goes next to the Dare Board of Commissioners March 6.

John Canning with High and Dry LLC requests the permit for a group development for storage warehouses on property across NC 12 from Sandbar and Grille in Buxton. The property has one 1,500 square foot metal building with vacant land used for storing boats, trailers and recreational vehicles. Canning proposes to add 4,263 square feet to this existing structure and build another smaller, 939-square foot structure. Total units will be about 20.

Conditions cover lighting, access hours, building separation, keeping an access easement at a full 20 feet and making the surface dirt free and capable of supporting emergency vehicles.

Occupancy and meal tax collection is slowing

In December, Lee Nettles, Executive Director of the Outer Banks Visitors Bureau, reported that the January to October lodging and meal tax collection data suggested a slowing in the major tourism boom of the last few years, reports Tom Hranicka, Business Correspondent for Radio Hatteras.

Nettles stated that the collection statistics are looking more like the 2019 pre-COVID period.

In Nettles opinion, the level of visitation during the last year and a half is not necessarily sustainable, reports Hranicka.

Dare County Employee for January is Hatteras Islander

Captain Jack Scarborough is the communications director for the Dare County Sheriff's Office 911 Communications Center in Manteo. On January 3, Dare County Sheriff Doug Doughtie tapped Scarborough as Dare County Employee of the Month for January 2023.

Scarborough is from Avon. He attended Cape Hatteras High School.

He started his career with the Dare County Sheriff December 14, 1998, shortly after turning age 21. "I like to hire homegrown," said Doughtie during his award presentation at the meeting. "He was a perfect fit for the community," said the Sheriff.

As a sworn law enforcement officer in his native Dare County, Scarborough embarked on what would become an incredibly successful career with the Sheriff's Office, earning a series of promotions over the course of the next 25 years that reflected his passion, hard work, dedication and service to the residents and visitors of the Outer Banks, stated the Sheriff.

Big events in February

The North Carolina Coastal Federation's Oyster Roast is set for Saturday, February 4. Tickets are already sold out for 1 o'clock entry time.

Proceeds from this event benefit the Federation's oyster education and restoration programs.

Tickets are \$40 in advance and \$50 at the door, although in the past, the oyster roast has sold out well before the February event date.

To enhance the safety and enjoyment of the event, ticket sales are separated into different event entry times. The second entry time is 2:30. The ticket price includes all-you-can-eat steamed oysters, one serving of chowder, cornbread, and a nonalcoholic beverage.

Hatteras Island weather turns really cold and brings minor flooding

Starting Saturday afternoon, Pamlico Sound water started creeping into sound front properties and in Hatteras village.

By Sunday morning, flood waters from the sound had receded.

Overnight temperatures dropped to 35 degrees with a wind chill around 25 or 26 in Rodanthe and Frisco.

On Sunday, both a coastal flooding and a high surf advisories were in place from Cape Hatteras north to Duck. Minor coastal flooding may happen tonight into Monday morning. Wave height of 6 to 9 feet in the surf zone is predicted.

Given the weather, a Meeting in Rodanthe about erosion, beach nourishment is timely

A special meeting of the Dare County Board of Commissioners is scheduled for Jan. 18, 2023, at the Rodanthe-Waves-Salvo Community Building, 23646 NC 12, Rodanthe, across from Chicamacomico Life-Saving Station.

The purpose of the meeting, which starts at 6 o'clock, is to discuss Rodanthe erosion and beach nourishment.

Now to other news.

Dare's school board has been grappling with a request by home school families to allow home schooled students to participate in high school athletics and extracurricular activities.

At January 9 Dare Board of Education meeting, a new Policy was introduced along with changes to another policy to permit home school students to participate in high school sports and/or activities. The proposed Policy Code 3105 addition is titled Part-Time Admission of Home School Students. The North Carolina High School Athletic Association requires many of the 11 conditions about home school student's participation in high school sports.

Some of the conditions are:

- —Students must enroll for at least one-half of the school day and take at least one course on campus each semester.
- —Classes will be assigned on space-available basis.
- —Student must present academic records from the student's current home school.
- —Home schooled students dually enrolled must participate in all required district, state and federal testing.
- —Student must adhere to Dare Schools "Student Code of Conduct" and other rules applicable to full-time students and subject to consequences for violation.
- —Student sports eligibility is determined by the principal and applicable rules of the North Carolina High School Athletic Association, the state's Department of Public Instruction and State Board of Education.
- —While enrolled in a part-time basis in Dare Schools, the student must maintain attendance at an active home school registered with the North Carolina Division of Non-Public Education.

Changes are also recommended to Policy Code 3620, titled Extracurricular Activities and Student Organizations.

This policy echoes existing board policy, which requires students participating interscholastic athletics or extracurricular activities to participate in the district's random drug testing program.

A section is added to the policy titled "Athletic Participation by Dually Enrolled Home School Students." The new section states that dually enrolled home school students can participate in interscholastic athletic if they comply six conditions.

The full list of requirements was published in The Coastland Times on January 15, 2023.

In the future, the board's agenda as published on the system's website will contain proposed policies and other agenda items so that the public can consider whether to make comment before a meeting. Former school board member Susie Walters suggested the change during public comment.

The two policies mentioned were part of a package containing eight policy manual updates or new policies, two regulations changes and four form changes, proposed by the North Carolina School Boards Association and/or Poyner Spruill, LLC, the school board's law firm.

The policies were presented for first reading, allowing the school board and the public time for consideration of the proposals. The proposed policies are usually presented at the next board meeting.

North Atlantic right whale with serious injury sighted

On January 8, 2023, an aerial survey team from the Clearwater Marine Aquarium sighted a heavily entangled North Atlantic right whale about 20 miles east of Rodanthe, according to an update from NOAA and reported on Island Free Press.

After reviewing documentation of this new entanglement case, NOAA Fisheries biologists have made a preliminary determination that it meets the criteria of a "serious injury." This means the whale is likely to die from this injury, states the article.

Scientists with the New England Aquarium identified the whale as right whale #4904, a 4-year-old juvenile female.

The last known sighting of right whale #4904 was in May 2022 in Massachusetts Bay, and she was not entangled at that point. NOAA Fisheries and its partners reviewed initial images from January 8, which showed her to have numerous wounds across her body and whale lice on her head.

NOAA Fisheries will work with authorized responders and trained experts to resight her. They will further document the entanglement, and determine if an entanglement response will be possible, reports the article.

Some reminders from the National Park Service

In the coming weeks, Cape Hatteras National Seashore will announce its preliminary plans for celebrating the 200th anniversary of the Ocracoke Light Station..

In 1822, for a charge of \$50, the federal government bought two acres at the south end of Ocracoke Island as the site for a new lighthouse. Constructed by Massachusetts builder Noah Porter and finished in 1823, the tower still stands today.

The lighthouse is about 75 feet tall. Its diameter narrows from 25 feet at the base to 12 feet at its peak. The walls are solid brick, 5 feet thick at the bottom tapering to 2 feet at the top. An octagonal lantern crowns the tower and houses the light beacon.

Cape Hatteras National Seashore's Cape Point and Frisco campgrounds open Friday, April 7. Campgrounds at Oregon Inlet and Ocracoke are open year-round. Reservations and payments for camp sites are made online at recreation dot gov.

The National Park Service has three government contracts for businesses to bid on at Cape Hatteras National Seashore.

The projects are:

- —Construct 10 RV sites and install utilities in an administrative area on Ocracoke Island. Bids due noon, February 9
- —Stripe Oregon Inlet boat ramp parking lot on Bodie Island. Bids due 5 o'clock February 6
- —Conduct market research for a multipurpose paved trail between NC 12 and the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse. Responses due January 25.

Pavement gone in Pea Island refuge

The North Carolina Department of Transportation recently completed the pavement removal of a former section of N.C. 12 north of Rodanthe, reports Island Free Press.

The two miles of former roadway are bypassed by the new Rodanthe Bridge.

The road route reverts to Pea Island National Wildlife Refuge.

The refuge beach remains open, but no parking is available at the southern end. A parking lot is available at the northern end of the Rodanthe Bridge.

Five years ago, Radio Hatteras reported that on Thursday, January 12, 2017, NCDOT awarded a design build contract to Flatiron Constructors of Broomfield, Colorado for the Rodanthe Bridge.

The Bonner Bridge replacement bridge was still under construction but expected to open in late 2018.

The new Captain Richard Etheridge Pea Island bridge was due to be completed in May 2017.

Beach nourishment meeting brings large crowd

Beach nourishment is a hot topic in Rodanthe.

A Town Hall meeting in Rodanthe last Wednesday night was sponsored by the Dare County Board of Commissioners. Over 100 people with standing room only crammed the Rodanthe-Waves-Salvo Community Building. Another 160 people turned in virtually to hear a county presentation about erosion and beach nourishment.

Dare County Manager Robert. L. Outten made the presentation and answered questions. He reviewed the county's history with beach nourishment and how it is financed.

His final presentation slide flatly states: "The county currently does not have sufficient funds to pay for any new beach nourishment projects. Without an influx of state or federal funding, no new beach nourishment projects are possible in Dare County."

Questions were answered. Suggestions made.

One attendee said "we just can't give up."

The major market indicators paint a picture of a lethargic market with a downward trend, writes Hranicka.

Homes for sale were about the same. Only 70 residential properties were available for purchase on the entire island at the end of the year.

2022 registered a 34 percent decline in the number of residential sales for the year. A drop of nearly 60 percent of the properties under contract to be sold, a leading indicator of future sales.

Hranicka points out an interesting aspect of the market. Despite the noted declines, the median residential sale price increased 15 percent to \$599,000 from \$523,000 at the end of 2021.

Similar patterns during 2022 in the undeveloped lot market emerged in a real estate sector that was fairly strong.

The market decline becomes much more apparent on an annual versus monthly basis.

In 2022, properties for sale declined from a high of 113 in July.

Residential sales are holding in the 20 to 30 per month range, down from a high of 51 in March.

Properties under contract to be sold are about one-half of what they were in December 2021.

In contrast to the increase in the year-over-year median residential sale price, the monthly median sale price also started a decline from its high point of \$737,500 last July to \$515,000 in December.

It is worth mentioning that during 2022, mortgage interest rates increased from around 3.5 percent at beginning of current year to 6 to 7 percent now.

Considering the market picture as a whole, it is hard to see a significant level of improvement during 2023, writes Hranicka.

Sea Turtles rescued

This winter season has been a busy one for the volunteers with the Network for Endangered Sea Turtles and the staff at the North Carolina Aquarium on Roanoke Island.

In the Christmas holidays, over 200 cold-stunned sea turtles were rescued.

A recent update from the Sea Turtle Assistance and Rehab Center said another 37 sea turtles have been rescued. The number includes 37 green, five kemp's ridley and one loggerhead.

Get reentry permits

Dare County Emergency Management is encouraging all Dare County residents, non-resident property owners and business owners to obtain reentry permits well ahead of hurricane season, which officially begins June 1, 2023.

To enter Dare County following a mandatory evacuation, individuals must present a current reentry permit along with a valid corresponding ID. Last year's reentry permit expired December 31.

Reentry permits are issued as a PDF file that is sent via email to applicants with the required credentials. Permits can be obtained online at any time.

To obtain a 2023 reentry permit from Dare County Emergency Management, go to dare n c dot gov, click on emergency management under departments and punch reentry in the list on the left side.

The Dredge Miss Katie arrives to work in Hatteras Inlet

On Thursday, January 26, the dredge Miss Katie arrived in Hatteras village and docked at the U.S. Coast Guard station.

The dredge will perform maintenance dredging in Hatteras Inlet's Connector Channel.

The dredge was built as a public private partnership by Dare County and EJE Dredging.

For the first time, this dredge is working on maintenance not crisis dredging.

The inlet has been navigable since the last dredging by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

The goal is to widen and deepen the channel in preparation for the spring tournaments and summer traffic.

Already, Hatteras Village Offshore Open organizers have announced that boats participating in the tournament must sail out of Hatteras village docks. Last year, because of inlet conditions, the tournament permitted boats to sail out of Morehead City. Hatteras village missed out on a late spring economic boost.

Dare County Waterways Commission asked that the Miss Katie be sent to Hatteras Inlet. The county's Oregon Inlet Task Force controls where and when the Miss Katie will work.

Dare County State of the County event was a sellout

In 36 hours, tickets for this year's State of the County event were sold out.

Some 210 people gathered for breakfast at Captain George's Seafood Restaurant in Kill Devil Hills and to hear Dare County Board of Commissioners Chairman Bob Woodard deliver information.

Woodard talked about five issues: essential and workforce housing; beach nourishment, waterway accessibility, commitment to education and combating the opioid crisis.

The presentation included five individuals, each one talking about one of the five issues.

A teacher talked about trying to find housing. She's been living in teacher housing. Her three years are up in August. If she can't find housing, she'll need to leave.

The Captain of Hatteras Island Rescue Squad told how difficult it is to deliver emergency medical services to narrow beaches on Hatteras Island.

A waterman's wife praised the new dredge for keeping Oregon Inlet open. Her husband no longer has to leave only on high tide.

Dare County has a long standing commitment to the county's public schools, providing 38% of the school system's budget. But supporting education doesn't stop at the twelfth grade. Dare County built a new \$18 million academic building for College of The Albemarle. Dare's commissioners created the Dare Guarantee Scholarship that essentially guarantees two years of community college for free.

To deal with the opioid crisis in this county, a Recovery Court was created. The 18-month program helps people get and stay sober and wipes out court problems.

Two Dare building projects advance

Dare County's Capital Improvements Planning Committee sent to the Board of Commissioners for the Feb. 6, 2023, agenda two projects: the new Southern Shores Emergency Medical Services building and the new Dare Medflight Hangar and living quarters.

The two projects are in Phase I of the county's capital improvement plan.

The Kill Devil Hills partnership project is also in Phase I. However, the lease between Dare County and the Town is not in place and bids are not due until Jan. 31.

Barnhill Contracting Company, the county's construction manager, reported that bid overages were about 9% or \$1,305,404 over the company's September 2022, estimate. The total cost for the two projects is now \$15,177,017.

The Financial Model for the Capital Investment Fund does not work going forward into Phase II. For Hatteras Island, the five-year capital improvement plan would upgrade the Emergency Medical Services Station in Buxton, provide improvements for the Fessenden Center and work with Chicamacomico Banks Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department for a new Rodanthe Emergency Medical Services station.

Options exist for the projects to eventually be built, but no decisions have been made about schedule or project priority.

Propane tanker overturned on NC 12 in Hatteras village

Around 5:30 in the morning on Tuesday, Jan. 31, 2023, a propane tanker was reported turned over on the side of NC 12 around a half mile south of the Hatteras Village Civic Center.

Richard Harris, 55, Kill Devil Hills, was travelling south heading to the NCDOT ferry to Ocracoke to make deliveries.

Even though he followed his normal routine of going to bed early and getting up at 3 a.m., he fell asleep at the wheel, reported State Highway Trooper Karl Libby. Fog in the area was dense.

Harris was not trapped in the truck but was held in place by a seat belt. The driver of the car in front of the propane truck saw the incident, turned around, and was able to cut Harris out of the seat belt. Harris was charged with failure to maintain lane control.

Seto's Towing Service arrived on the scene with a massive wrecker around 8:15.

The Hatteras Village Volunteer Fire Department was called out. The scene was cleared at 10:05 a.m. About an hour after the incident occurred, one lane of NC 12 was open.

Cape Hatteras Elementary and Cape Hatteras Secondary had announced that the Hatteras Island schools would open two hours late. To be safe, the buses filled with students did not roll past the ditched propane tanker.

Possible Primary Health Care Alternative developing

While Manteo is not Hatteras Island, what the town's Healthcare task force does may offer an alternative primary health care service,

Early last week, the Town of Manteo Special Planning and Zoning Board approved a Zoning Permit for changing the use of the property at 402 Budleigh Street in Manteo from a telecommunications office to a medical office.

This action allows for the establishment of the Manteo Medical Center facility at that location.

The Manteo facility will be associated with the Ocracoke and Engelhard medical centers, which are federally qualified health centers.

Such centers deliver physical, dental and behavioral health care and also have a transportation component.

Behavioral health care is a key need in Dare County.

On January 31, Port Health Services announced it "will not be able to accept any new Medicare or private/commercial insurance patients until its staffing pattern is enhanced.

Jennifer Hardee, Clinical Services Manager for Port Health wrote in a media release: "We simply do not have the capacity to assess and provide timely treatment with our current staffing."

She called the move a "temporary strategy." A list of local providers will be handed out for patients and stakeholders.

Port Health has an office in Hatteras village. The level of service offered is unknown. It is not readily apparent on Port Health's website or with telephone calls.

On July 20, 2022, the Town of Manteo Board of Commissioners appointed members to a Healthcare Task Force and directed the task force to address the growing healthcare concerns in Dare County. The primary care medical practice in Manteo had shut down due to lack of medical personnel.

At the onset, the Task Force identified priorities and created sub-committees addressing facility needs, patient care, project funding, and recruitment and retention of medical professionals.

In connection with medical care, the Outer Banks Hospital and Medical Group recently announced that it will operate under a new brand name, Outer Banks Health.

The logo is changed as well.

Dare school board agrees to let home-schooled students play high school sports

Dare County Board of Education unanimously approved a new policy allowing homeschooled students in the county to enroll and tryout for high school athletics.

The new Policy 3105 was adopted in a special board meeting Jan. 30, 2023, so those students who want to participate in spring sports can meet the deadline for declaring intent to tryout.

Another policy, Policy 3620 titled Extracurricular Activities and Student Organizations, was revised to be compatible with new policy.

The meeting was held at the administrative offices of Dare County Schools. It was broadcast online. The actions taken apply to all Dare County student-athletes. The information required of home-school students is already on file for current in-school athletes. No additional information is required for current student-athletes.

Dwelling insurance settlement reached

Radio Hatteras Business Correspondent Tom Hranicka writes the North Carolina State Insurance Commissioner Mike Causey has announced that a settlement has been reached with insurance companies regarding dwelling insurance.

Dwelling insurance policies are offered for non-owner-occupied residences of no more than four units, including rental properties, investment properties and other properties that are not occupied full time by the property owner. The policies are not the same as homeowners insurance.

Under the settlement, insurance companies writing dwelling insurance east of the sounds and Roanoke Island for fire remain unchanged. Extended coverage increases over 12 percent for buildings and over 11 percent for contents.

Three types of dwelling insurance are available in North Carolina. The basis and two extended policies which increase the number of perils covered.

The average increase statewide is one-tenth of a percentage point less than 10 percent.

The increase affects new or renewed policies after June 1, 2023.

Beach nourishment in Rodanthe

A well-attended in person and virtual audience attended a Dare County Board of Commissioners presentation about beach nourishment for Rodanthe was held January 18.

Radio Hatteras Business Correspondent Tom Hranicka forwarded follow-up information.

At the meeting, County Manager Bobby Outten estimated the cost at \$20 million. Outten discussed the county's beach nourishment fund, stating that that the fund fueled by occupancy tax is not growing fast enough to add this expense.

One solution pointed out by Outten is being pursued by the state's coastal counties. The counties are asking the General Assembly for a recurring fund to help pay for nourishment.

The county has also engaged a consulting firm to update a previous report about erosion rates and how many cubic yards of sand would be needed for a project. The information will answer the question about how much a beach nourishment project in Rodanthe would cost. The update would likely take 90 to 120 days to complete.

Seashore visitors in record numbers

Cape Hatteras National Seashore, Fort Raleigh National Historic Site and Wright Brothers National Memorial combined to host nearly 3.6 million visits in 2022.

Last year was the third busiest year on record at Cape Hatteras National, behind only 2021 and 2002. America's first national seashore hosted 2,862,844 visits and booked 60,973 campsites in 2022.

Balloons are year-round threat in seashore

Cape Hatteras National Seashore personnel who patrol the Bodie Island, Hatteras Island, and Ocracoke Island beaches collected a total of 733 balloons along the shoreline in 2022, which included 300 balloons that were picked up in the months of May and June alone.

CHNS biological technicians and other staff regularly pick up trash while working on the beaches, but collecting and tallying balloons specifically is a somewhat new endeavor, reports Island Free Press. Balloons are singled out for an annual tally because they are potentially harmful to wildlife. Floating balloons often resemble food, and animals may die of starvation if ingested balloons block digestive tracts. Entanglements can occur with birds that encounter the strings which are attached to discarded balloons.

Despite these declines, the median residential sale price increased 14 percent to \$570,000.

The undeveloped lot market was also sluggish. Median sales price for building sites is \$222,000.

Accommodations and restaurants reported for all of 2022.

Meal tax receipts for the year were flat with just a one percent increase over 2021.

Occupancy tax receipts for 2022 rose a little over six percent when compared to last year.

Writes Hranicka, "one thing is for certain – what the future holds for the Hatteras Island economy is always a lively topic for speculation."

Attendees expressed a wide range of concerns.

Bob Woodard, chairman of the county's board of commissioners, started the conversation about local needs. He mentioned the just-released report by the NC 12 Task Force. He asked Murphy for some help with state leaders. "The state never put money into a nourishment fund," said Woodard.

In addition to this new office in Manteo, Congressman Murphy has district offices in Greenville, Jacksonville, and New Bern.

Murphy represents the Third Congressional District which includes the following counties: Beaufort, Camden, Carteret, Craven, Currituck, Dare, Duplin, Hyde, Jones, Lenoir, Onslow, Pamlico, Pitt (part), Sampson, Wayne (part).

New flood information may be required from property sellers

The North Carolina Real Estate Commission at its February 15 meeting voted unanimously to move forward with a potential new rule that would add flood-related questions to the disclosure form that sellers must provide to potential buyers, reports Business Correspondent Tom Hranicka.

At some point a public hearing on the rule will be held, and if adopted, the new disclosure guideline could go into effect July 1.

Some of the questions that might be added are:

Whether a house has had flood damage

Whether the property has a flood elevation certificate

The cost of any flood insurance policies

Whether a damage claim has been filed through the national flood insurance program

Whether the property owner has received federal funds in the past due to flooding.

In other news, Hranicka reports that according to a report in HometoGo, the marketplace with the world's largest selection of vacation rentals, Avon was fourth in the 2022 ranking with an increase of 274 percent.

And finally, the Target store in Kill Devil Hills is scheduled to open April 2.

Dare school board hears presentations

In the 2023-24 school year, the first Dare County students to enroll in Dual Language Immersion will transition to middle school.

At the start of the Feb. 13, 2022, regular board meeting for the Dare County Board of Education, Jake Henry with Participate Learning presented information about the language program and a possible elective course rather than a core course taught only in Spanish.

Proficiency levels are established by the state. Assessments come at the end of the eighth grade. Dare Schools Superintendent Steve Basnight read from a letter he sent to parents of students in the Dual Language Immersion program.

In that letter, he said the system had no plans to do away with the Dual Language program. Middle grade students who opt to remain in the program will meet every day, year long. The system's three middle schools will have an elective period to accommodate the class.

The classes will use curriculum from Participate Learning, which will be taught by native Spanish-speaking teachers in the classroom.

Several presentations marked this board meeting.

From College of The Albemarle came college President Jack Bagwell and Dare County campus Dean, Tim Sweeney.

Sweeney said the Dare Campus is growing with new programs. The Dare Campus now has Career and Technical Education courses including electric, plumbing, HVAC at the Dare campus. Marine Diesel engine repair is offered in Manns Harbor.

Sweeney also reminded the Dare County Board of Education about the Dare Guarantee Scholarship, created and funded by the county's Board of Commissioners.

The community college duo is promoting proposed changes to add a Diploma Track with a vocational focus for high school students. Such a track would allow students to choose a Career and Technical Education pathway to a diploma and employment.

The Dare County school board continues to investigate Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps or JROTC. The program requires the local school board to pay half the salaries of one officer and one enlisted person and provide a classroom and 400 square feet of storage space. The program would be offered at First Flight High School. The estimated cost is \$60,000 to \$65,000.

The new Secondary Schools' Program of Studies lists JROTC as available.

Oregon Inlet bridge inspection starts Monday. Traffic delays expected

Starting Monday, March 6, the Oregon Inlet Bridge and the Bonner Bridge Pier will undergo federally mandated inspections.

North Carolina Department of Transportation officials said weekday daytime lane closures between a half-mile to a mile in length will be in place on the Oregon Inlet Bridge while the inspections take place. The lane closures will be marked by flaggers.

Motorists can expect delays of up to 10 minutes.

Bonner Bridge Pier inspections will also begin March 6, but the pier itself will remain open to the public. Sections of the pier will be cordoned off by traffic cones to keep pedestrians from accessing areas where inspections are taking place. The pier may be closed for brief periods while platform trucks are moved on and off the structure, officials said.

All work is expected to be complete within three weeks.

The inspections are a part of the Federal Highway Administration's National Bridge Inspection Standards, under which thorough inspections of bridge decks and support systems are required every two years.

Meeting held about threatened oceanfront structures

On Monday, February 27, the first of four meetings of the threatened Oceanfront Structures Interagency Work Group took place virtually.

Radio Hatteras Business Correspondent Tom Hranicka filed the report about the meeting.

The work group was formed last August to address issues facing coastal communities where structures are threatened by storms, water and beach erosion.

Complex issues were discussed including funding, potential buyouts of endangered structures, and relocation or removal of these properties.

Dare County Manager Bobby Outten pointed out that in addition to structures, several hotspots on Hatteras Island are uninhabited like the canal area south of the Oregon Inlet Bridge and the Cape Hatteras National Seashore area between Salvo and Avon.

Perhaps the best summary of the current status of the issues discussed by the work group was Outten's comment that at the present time any of the potential options lacked funding, but that the county in conjunction with other stakeholders would work hard to identify and develop programs and alternatives for solutions to the funding challenge.

The next meeting of the work group is planned for May.

Dare County felony blotter for February 2023

The Dare County Sheriff's felony blotter for February 2023 was released March 1. Eight incidents were listed with Roanoke Island leading with four incidents.

Buxton had two incidents reported.

"Scammers calling themselves the Sheriff's Office & Sheriff's Office Civil Division are at it again and telling the person called that they have missed court, owe money, have a warrant or some other reason. At some point they will ask you to pay money. If they give you a number to call back, you will get an answering machine which answers as the Sheriff's Office and it gives you options which sounds to be an official call, but it is not!

"Please tell your friends or family members to let them know this is occurring and hopefully people will not be drawn into this ploy and lose their money. The Sheriff's Office will not ask for money over the phone."

North Carolina will expand Medicaid

North Carolina legislative leaders Phil Berger for the Senate and House Speaker Tim Moore announced Thursday, March 2, 2023 that an agreement was reached to expand Medicaid.

The legislation will likely be voted on later in March at the earliest and go into effect January 2024. North Carolina has been one of 11 states that has not adopted Medicaid expansion.

Associated Press reports, the federal government covers 90% of the cost of Medicaid recipients under expansion. Potentially 600,000 people in North Carolina could receive the benefit — those who make

too much to qualify for conventional Medicaid but not enough to receive subsidized health insurance under the Affordable Care Act passed in 2010.

Under the agreement, the state's 10% share would be paid through assessments paid by hospitals, which in turn benefit from getting reimbursed as they cover patients with Medicaid.

Officials say the state also would get an extra \$1.8 billion over two years through a COVID-19 federal relief package from Congress for states that hadn't accepted expansion.

North Carolina currently has 2.9 million Medicaid recipients.

Additionally, the board is asked to approve a budget amendment to fund a new air handler at Cape Hatteras Secondary School.

Dare County Board of Commissioners is asked to support the naming of two new ferry vessels as MV Avon and MV Salvo.

In the resolution, Dare County Board of Commissioners strongly urges the Albemarle RPO and the North Carolina Ferry Division to consider naming future vessels using the Algonquian named areas of the region.

On Tuesday, March 7, the daily schedule increases from 28 to 26 departures.

The schedule, effective Tuesday, for the Hatteras to Ocracoke departures is top of the hour starting at 5 o'clock in the morning to 6 in the evening followed by departures at 7:30, 9, 10 and midnight. From Ocracoke to Hatteras, ferries leave at the bottom of the hour with the earliest at 4:30 in the morning then every hour starting at 6:30 through 5:30, then 6:15, 7:30, 8:45, 10:30 and midnight. The Hatteras-Ocracoke vehicle ferry route will again increase its departure schedule on April 4 before running its full summer schedule beginning May 16.

The Hatteras-Ocracoke ferry rides are free.

Large breaking waves of 8 to 12 feet are expected in the surf zone on beaches north of Cape Hatteras. Dangerous swimming and surfing conditions are occurring. The weather service expects localized beach erosion.

Large item pickup in unincorporated Dare County starts March 27

Large item pickup for unincorporated Dare County starts Monday, March 27, 2023, and runs continuously for about 12 to 15 days.

Already items are appearing on the NC 12 right-of-way.

Due to budget and time constraints, a strict one pass only will be enforced.

While items are already appearing on NC 12 about two weeks early, items must be on the roadside in front of homes by Monday, March 27.

If the private contractor does not take an item placed on the roadside by the end of the 12 to 15 day collection period, the item has been rejected and therefore must be disposed of at the owner's expense. Accepted items include scrape metals, appliances (take off refrigerator doors) and furniture, mattresses and box springs.

Sort these items into separate piles.

Do not add tree limbs, stumps or other vegetation, or old clothing, construction/demolition materials, boats, trailers, jet skis, propane tanks or fire extinguishers.

Hazardous materials will be picked up Friday, May 12, from 2 to 4 o'clock at the transfer station in Buxton.

Remember March 27 starts the only large item pick up or 2023 on Hatteras Island.

Congratulations to Fessenden Center's April Bodiford

During the stop the vehicle was searched and an amount of Marijuana, MDMA which is known as ecstasy in tablets and molly in crystal form, and Drug Paraphernalia were located and seized. Kimberly A Kronsberg, 28, Richmond, Virginia, was arrested and charged with felony Possession of a Schedule I Controlled Substance and misdemeanor Possession of Marijuana. Kronsberg was given a \$2,000 secured bond.

The information was announced March 10 by the Dare County Sheriff's office.

Dramatic rescue off Avon

Early Tuesday morning, March 7, the U.S. Coast Guard Station Hatteras Inlet was notified of a 25-foot disabled sailboat about three nautical miles offshore Avon. Three people were aboard.

The station's 47-foot Motor Lifeboat was launched and started toward the sailboat.

Due to weather conditions clearly seen in a dramatic video, a Jayhawk helicopter was dispatched from U.S. Coast Guard Air Station Elizabeth City to assist in the rescue.

Once on the scene, the surfmen on board decided that towing the vessel south towards Hatteras village or to Oregon Inlet would prove difficult.

As a result, the Hatteras Station Officer in Charge with Sector North Carolina and U.S. Coast Guard District 5 thought the safest course of action would be a helicopter evacuation.

The Jayhawk helicopter maintained its position as a rescue swimmer retrieved each person from the water one at a time. The mariners were hoisted onto the helicopter. Once the three mariners were safe, the helicopter left the scene and the motor lifeboat headed back to the Hatteras station.

New bridge coming for those travelling west from Hatteras Island

On Thursday, March 9, Governor Roy Cooper, Federal Highway Administrator Shailen Bhatt, and N.C. Department of Transportation Secretary Eric Boyette visited the Alligator River Marina to talk about a \$110 million federal grant to help replace the Alligator River 2.8 mile swing bridge.

The grant is one of only nine projects nationwide to receive a Mega Grant from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.

The grant will help pay for a new two-lane, high rise span to carry US 64 from Dare County to Tyrrell County and beyond.

The new bridge is expected to cost \$294 million. The funding estimate also includes the cost to install broadband between I-95 in Rocky Mount and NC 12 in Nags Head, an underserved area.

The current bridge is a two-lane swing-span bridge named the Lindsay B. Warren Bridge. It was built in 1962.

More than 4,000 boats pass through the bridge every year while travelling the Intracoastal Waterway, forcing vehicle traffic to stop while the swing-span opens and closes or doesn't open or close.

Pathway planned for Cape Hatteras lighthouse district

Cape Hatteras National Seashore has issued and environmental assessment for the construction of a new multi-use pathway from NC 12 to the Cape Hatteras lighthouse.

Public comment is open until March 28.Lighthouse Road, in the Seashore's Hatteras Island Two alternatives and analysis of potential impacts are presented for public review The first is a No Action Alternative - Current Management

The Preferred Alternative is a 1.6-mile-long paved multi-use pathway to be constructed on one side of the road in two segments.

The proposal is to build a 10-foot wide pathway for two-way travel for bikes, electric bicycles and motorized wheelchairs, but not equestrian use. The Lighthouse entrance would be reconfigured and connection made to the existing sidewalk along NC 12 and Buxton Back Road.

An education plaza with comfort station, picnic tables, benches, and bike racks constructed. Comments may be submitted electronically or mailed to: Superintendent, 1401 National Park Dr., Manteo, N.C. 27954. Another house collapses into the ocean

This past week started with a small oceanfront house in Rodanthe falling into the Atlantic Ocean. Residents and volunteers earned well-deserved praise for immediately going to the Rodanthe beach to begin cleanup.

This time around, the National Park Service was proactive. On Wednesday, 60 park service employees and a fleet of vehicles kept up the arduous task of picking up debris.

By the end of Thursday after a community volunteer effort, 67 pick-up truck loads of debris were taken off the beach and loaded into a big dumpster and dump trucks which made five runs to the county's landfill on the mainland.

The house at 23228 East Point Drive was small, only 1,116 square feet. It was built in 1976 and purchased by the current owner in 2007.

The National Park Service has been in touch with a representation of the owner. The park service anticipates a cleanup plan from the owner.

For second time this year, communication was sliced off

Around 9:30, Tuesday morning, March 14, 2023, the island's fiber optic cable was damaged close to the Pea Island Visitor Center.

According to Dare County Emergency Manager, Drew Pearson, the cable was in the dune not underground when it was damaged.

On Hatteras and Ocracoke, cell phones, land lines, internet service was disrupted.

The damage was fixed by 2 o'clock.

911 service was crippled. Dare County issued instructions to go to the nearest fire or EMS station for emergency help.

The first outage occurred February 14.

Dare school board adopts calendar for next academic year

Meeting in a short session, Dare County Board of Education adopted a school calendar for next year and a budget amendment for Cape Hatteras Secondary's soccer facilities.

First day of school next fall is Monday, August 28. School staff return August 21 for five days of required work days, one day more than last fall. Starting August 16, school staff have three days of optional workdays.

Scattered throughout the 2023-2024 calendar are nine optional workdays and seven required workdays. Three days of early dismissal are set for September 1 and Halloween, October 31 which is followed by a required workday for parent conferences. Another early dismissal comes on the last day of the school year, June 7.

Traditional holiday periods are in place with no school from November 22 through 24 for Thanksgiving; December 18 through January 2 for Christmas; and April 1 through April 5 for Easter.

In the consent agenda, the board adopted a budget amendment appropriating \$50,000 for upgrading facilities at the Cape Hatteras Secondary soccer field on Buxton Back Road. The funds were forwarded from Dare County.

Economic measures of Hatteras Island

February report on real estate markets remain lethargic, however the number of homes for sale are slowing creeping upward, writes Radio Hatteras Business Correspondent Tom Hranicka. It will be interesting to see if this pattern continues into the summer as it did last year.

The number of houses sold last month also inched upward but remained in the 20 to 25 sales per month range, where the residential market has been stuck since June 2022.

The median sales price cooled to \$435,500.

Properties under contract to be sold, which are considered to be an indicator of future sales, continued the downward trend present for over a year.

Performance indicators for undeveloped lots all posted negative results for February. The exception is the median sale price which increased to \$225,000.

On parallel track, the moratorium on new connections to the waste water treatment plant on the Soundside in Kinnakeet Shores community has still not been lifted.

In an additional measure of the island's economy, the reported January meal tax receipt was an eyepopping increase of 44.7 percent. Occupancy tax receipts were flat with an increase of 2.81 percent

Prescribed burn in Pea Island

On Monday, March 20, smoke was visible north of Rodanthe

A prescribed burn was underway in the Pea Island National Wildlife Refuge.

The burn area was 1,600 acres to set back woody vegetation, improve wildlife habitat and reduce fuel loads.

Wild turkey hunting season opens in North Carolina April 1.

The youth season is April 1-7, and the statewide season is April 8 through May 6. Hunters are limited to two turkeys for the season, only one of which may be taken during the youth season.

Last year, 2,022 wild turkey season hunters statewide recorded 20,576 birds harvested, including 1,777 birds that were taken during youth season.

Hunters must comply with a two-bird limit and may only take male or bearded birds."

The youth season is open to anyone under the age of 18, and hunters aged 16 and 17 must have hunting licenses. Youth under 16 are exempt from license requirements provided they are accompanied by a licensed adult who is at least 18 years old. Youth who have licenses or a hunter education card may hunt without adult supervision. All hunters must report their turkey harvest on a Big Game Harvest Report Card.

Hunting licenses can be purchased online. Close-by hunter education classes are scheduled for April 2 at Roanoke Island Volunteer Fire Department in Manteo and Tyrrell County Agriculture Extension, 4-H building, Columbia. Both in person classes run from 1 to 7.
