

WCSJ 103.1 FM Quarterly Issues

April – June 2015

1. April 2nd to 7th WCSJ provided listeners with updates about the attempted murder of a Braidwood man. Walter Webster, 29, of Romeoville is accused of shooting his former boss.
2. April 9th WCSJ reported the final two suspects wanted for a string of residential burglaries in Morris from December of 2014 to January of 2015 were apprehended. The first two were arrested in the middle of March.
3. April 30th WCSJ interviewed a local business woman who was concerned about a medical marijuana dispensary business locating next to her business. The Greenhouse Group who applied for a license withdrew their application from the nearby business and looked at other facilities.
4. May 14th WCSJ reported that a Shorewood man was sentenced to nine years in prison for killing two people in Grundy County. Tristan Durov pled guilty to DUI after he was involved in a crash last year. The same day we informed the public that a Coal City man was arrested for allegedly sexually assaulting a family member in 2013.
5. May 16th WCSJ learned and updated the listeners about capture of a Coal City man who was arrested by the FBI with assistance from the Morris Police Department.
6. May 19th WCSJ reported the sad story of an 80-year-old Braceville man who died as a result of a house fire in Braceville. We interviewed Grundy County Sheriff Kevin Callahan about the incident.
7. May 26th WCSJ informed the public about a Morris High School student that was expelled after creating a hit list which had names of students and one administrator.
8. May 30th WCSJ reported a Morris man was arrested for possessing child pornography. We interviewed Morris Police Chief Brent Dite about the situation.
9. June 14th WCSJ heard that a Buffalo Wild Wings could be coming to the former Aldi's building near Big R in Morris.
10. June 22nd WCSJ gave live weather updates and reported from Coal City regarding the EF-3 tornado that injured five people. We also interviewed several people including: Coal City Mayor Terry Halladay, Village Administrator Matt Fritz, two homeowners and many more.
