04/01/09

8am

The FBI and Wichita Police have caught a woman they say robbed a bank on Monday. Authorities tell us a 27 year-old woman has been arrested in connection with a robbery at the Commerce Bank in the 23-hundred block of East 21st Street North. Police say she was taken into custody yesterday at a home in northeast Wichita.

04/01/08

10pm

He's a doctor and she's a pharmacist; together prosecutors say they teamed up to illegally distribute prescription pain killers. Tonight Dr. Lawrence Simons is in jail with no bond, considered to be a flight risk. He's accused of doling out drugs to people who were not his patients. Some of the 36 counts date back to when Simons worked at the Schneider clinic in Haysville, although prosecutors say the charges have nothing to do with the clinic. In one case, the indictment says Simons gave a man Oxycontin and Oxycodone prescriptions as payment for transporting a vehicle from Kansas City to Wichita. Prosecutors say Simons' accomplice in some cases is Constance King a former pharmacist at a Wichita K-Mart. She's charged with seven counts; King's ordered to appear in court when a hearing is set.

04/02/09

10pm

Claudia and Gisele Mijares' family wanted to make sure he'd never get behind the wheel again. This morning, a judge sentenced Gary Hammitt to nearly 40 years in prison. Claudia Mijares was dropping her 4-year-old daughter off for pre-school last October at Wichita's Gardiner Elementary when Hammitt flipped an SUV and hit them. Hammitt was driving 60 miles an hour with a blood alcohol level more than five times the legal limit. Claudia Mijares' husband and older daughter had a chance to speak. And Hammitt apologized saying he wishes the accident took his life instead of the Mijares'. The judge gave Hammitt more than 39 years in prison. Because of his age and health, prosecutors believe 55-year-old Hammitt will die in prison.

04/03/09

7am

A ConsumerWatch alert for you about a car warranty scam. The better business bureau says Kansans need to be on the lookout for the following. Scammers that have called hundreds of people warning them their warranty is about to expire. To prevent these calls join the DO NOT CALL registry. In some cases people received letters from service protection direct urging them to extend their warranty by buying fake contracts. You should ignore these notices and report any suspected fraud to the B.B.B. or the Attorney General's Office. The state of Missouri launched an investigation into the Saint Louis Company sending out the fake notices.

04/03/09

10pm

A day care provider will spend the next two years in prison; Jessica Cummings asked the judge to keep her out of prison for the sake of her two young children. Cummings left one year old Kailee Hundley strapped into a car seat that was too small. The child suffocated. Hundley's father asked for the maximum sentence 36 months in prison. The judge also ordered Cummings to pay more than 9 thousand dollars in restitution to the Hundley family.

10pm

A Newton man is in trouble for making threats against former President George W. Bush. Eric Bradley is accused of telling secret service agents he would "strangle the life out of the former president" and saying he would "do whatever he could to kill President Bush." If convicted, Bradley could face five years in Federal prison and a 250-thousand dollar fine.

04/05/09

10pm

A shooting outside a Wichita nightclub sends two people to the hospital; it happened just before closing time at the club in the 61-hundred block of East 21st. Police say two groups started arguing in the parking lot. During the fight someone started shooting. One person was shot four times, another person walked into Wesley Medical Center with one gunshot wound. Doctors performed surgery on both men and there's no update on their condition tonight. Police have not made any arrests; investigators are looking for an older-model maroon four-door Buick or Cadillac. If you have any information about this case, contact Wichita Police or Crimestoppers.

04/09/09

7am

He heard the car, saw the headlights then got out of the way; a car comes crashing into this apartment at Pelican Point in Wichita last night. Two people were inside the home at the time, they were not hurt. They said the after the crash the driver looked disoriented then got into another car and fled the scene. The guys inside the apartment say they feel extremely lucky they weren't hit. Structural engineers looked over the damage before crews could remove the car. They wanted to make sure the building wouldn't collapse if the vehicle was taken out. Police are still looking for the driver this morning.

04/10/09

10pm

We open the CrimeWatch in Salina where police arrest a woman for leaving her five-year-old daughter home alone. A driver found the child near the intersection of Cloud and Roberts early this morning. Police say when the girl woke up and didn't find her mom, she went looking for her. The child is now in the custody of relatives. The mother is out on bond.

04/11/09

10pm

New at ten...an investigator say yesterday's fire at Joyland appears to be intentional. Arson investigators were back at the former amusement park this morning. Friday's fire destroyed the old opera house. Joyland's owner suspected arson when we talked to him yesterday. Police have not made any arrests. Joyland closed in 2-thousand-4 after 55 years in business. Various attempts to reopen the park have been unsuccessful.

04/12/09

10pm

One person is shot & several others are hurt at a party in northwest Wichita. This was the scene in the 23-hundred block of north burns late last night. Police say a fight started when a group of men showed up with knives, bats and chains. Someone shot a 16-year-old boy in the foot. Police say he'll recover. Officers have not made any arrests but are looking for 15 Hispanic men between 18 and 25-years old.

04/13/09

10pm

Opening statements are expected tomorrow in the trial of this Wichita woman. Katie Cornejo is charged with first degree murder of 2-year-old Daytona Robertson. Jury selection in Cornejo's case began this morning. Police and prosecutors say she was the only person with Daytona when she was hurt last year. The girl suffered severe head trauma and shaking before dying at a Wichita hospital. Daytona's father says he'll be in court every day. Katie Cornejo's family says she's innocent; her mother told us today, "It's been a long hard wait, but the more we wait, the more we find out. We're confident Katie will get her justice. Defense attorneys say several people besides Cornejo could be responsible for hurting her stepdaughter. Cornejo is charged with first degree murder. Prosecutors say she was the only person with the girl when she was hurt and her injuries were from a severe blow to the head. Tomorrow, prosecutors expect to put Daytona Robertson's family members including her father on the stand.

04/15/09

10pm

Two-year-old Daytona Robertson's father takes the stand to talk about the day his girl suffered a severe blow to the head. We open the CrimeWatch in Sedgwick County court where prosecutors argue Daytona's stepmother Katie Cornejo was the only person with her when she was hurt. She's charged with first degree murder. Tommy Robertson told jurors he and Cornejo were fighting and talking about divorce when Daytona suffered her injuries. He said he still remembered driving to the hospital hoping his daughter would be okay. Cornejo's defense attorney says there are several people could be responsible for hurting the girl. For now, she says Cornejo does eventually plan to take the stand in her own defense.

A defense expert says two-year-old Daytona Robertson may have been hurt for hours before she had a seizure. Prosecutors say Katie Cornejo killed her stepdaughter in February of last year. A prosecution child abuse expert told jurors Robertson would have shown symptoms almost immediately. But a doctor testifying for the defense says Robertson was anemic when she arrived at the hospital because of bleeding on the brain. He said it takes much longer than minutes for tests to show you're anemic. Dr. Richard Gilmartin Jr., defense medical expert answers the defense question, "How long that would take to become anemic?" Gilmartin says, "That's really kind of difficult to say, but it would take at least hours or longer." Cornejo's defense expects to wrap up its case Monday. It's possible Cornejo will take the stand in her own defense.

A Wichita Abortion provider is gunned down this morning inside his church. Doctor George Tiller was known as one of the few physicians in the United States performing late-term abortions. He was 67-years-old. Tiller was serving as an usher this morning here at the Reformation Lutheran church on 13th and Rock Road. Police say he was in the foyer area when a man shot and killed him. They say Tiller died of a single gunshot wound, but didn't specify how many shots were fired. Tiller's attorney, Dan Monnat says Tiller's wife Jeanne was also in the church--she was with the choir at the time of the shooting.

Several hundred people come together in Wichita tonight at a vigil for Wichita abortion provider Doctor George Tiller. Tiller was gunned down in his church this morning and as this vigil wraps up in old town his suspected shooter is in custody being brought back to Wichita tonight.

7am

This is not the first time Tiller or his clinic has been attacked. Back in June of 1986, someone detonated a homemade bomb on the roof of his clinic on East Kellogg, no one was hurt. Five years later the clinic was targeted again. An anti-abortion group called Operation Rescue targeted the clinic in what they called "The Summer of Mercy". More than 27-hundred protestors blocked entrances to the facility until a federal judge ordered their arrest. In August of 1993, Doctor Tiller was shot outside the building; Tiller was wounded in both arms and returned to work the next day. A woman named Shelly Shannon was convicted of the crime and spent 10 years in prison for attempted murder. Shannon is now serving a 20 year prison term for arson; she set fire to several abortion clinics around the country.

Roeder's family members say they are shocked and horrified by Sunday's events. His brother David released a statement yesterday. It said: "We know Scott as a kind and loving son, brother, and father who has suffered from mental illness at various times in his life. However, none of us ever saw Scott as a person capable of or willing to take another person's life." However Roeder's ex-wife has very different views. Lindsay Roeder said she's not surprised that her ex-husband could be involved in death of Doctor Tiller. She calls Roeder self-righteous and says he had no tolerance for abortion. She said back in 1996, when police arrested her ex-husband for having explosives in his car, Roeder told family members he planned blow up an abortion clinic.

It's called, Zynga." "When I heard I was going to interview a CEO I never expected this." "Yeah, it's like a beanbag sleep-over party." 44 year old Harvard Business School grad Mark Pincus is turning conventional wisdom on its head. He is a yoga enthusiast. "How many jobs have you created in the last year? 330." Many of them with six figure incomes and shares in the company and at the moment there are 90 additional openings for flash developers, artists, engineers, to work on Zynga's stable of games for social media. It had 100 million dollars in sales and is making a profit. It's not based solely on advertising but having people buy things in the virtual world. "We started playing with ideas to let you buy virtual items in our games, and let you buy currencies and power ups and things that let you move along faster because you have no time." People are spending money on few things these days but apparently they'll drop a couple of bucks to move up in games they play on line. A lot of people are spending a little bit of money and making a lot of money. Zynga wants employees to work hard, so it makes life easy for them. Chris Makarsky creates Texas HoldEm Poker, "So you come to work with ski-goggles and a bathrobe?" "Yeah, I mean you've got to be comfortable at work as long as at the end of the day we get the job done." But don't way this sounds a lot like web 1.0. They might not know what you mean. Experts say they are particularly concerned with how the flu is developing in Australia and South America. Here in Kansas there have been 113 confirmed cases of swine flu. But the teens nearly lost that opportunity. And here's why. For *these* high school seniors, in Douglass, the days leading up to July fourth mean hard work. "We had to get tables, and we had to inventory all the fireworks and price all of them." "It is a big project." Fireworks went on sale Saturday morning-by 10 Douglass' class of 2010 is busy pushing sparklers and smoke bombs. "Most of us, we have summer jobs to. So, we're going straight from here and going back to work and then we come back after words to go back to work here." But *this* job is a fundraiser-students work for free. The stand is set up next to the high school. Wholesale Fireworks provides the tent and inventory and high school seniors do the rest, they share the profit. "This is the sole money maker that has been used for years to give these kids an after graduation party, a safe place to go. Parents, like Helen Shawver, supervise. Students volunteer in shifts. The city of Douglass charges a three-thousand dollar fireworks tent fee. Last month they raised it to five thousand dollars. When the seniors heard about that they knew they would never sell that many fireworks to pay the fee and make a profit. "We were going to be working for nothing." If they could work at all. "We were concerned because wholesale was probably at the point to where if they would have kept it at five thousand, they would have looked for another place to put it." Until the same parents volunteering under the tent, went to council members to try and reverse the decision. They did. "I was glad they decided to lower it instead of raise it." Every fireworks stand, in Douglass got the same privilege. Students say they now appreciate every dollar. In past years, parents say seniors have raised between five and seven thousand dollars. That's enough to cover their post graduation party and part of the senior trip.

"Cheap, car cheap, what does that mean? It means I'm not going pay more for a house that I would for a car right now." By that, she's talking \$25-thousand dollars or less. It might be difficult. Next stop a home that was once listed for 255-thousand dollars. House hunter Ciara Byrne is impressed by today's price. "This place here is 109 thousand and it's about 1400 square feet. There is no way you can get that anywhere in America. Certainly not in a big city, there are a lot of reports that Vegas is the best market, the cheapest market to buy a home, is that a reality? It is, yes because we're number one in the nation for foreclosures. The banks are in competition with themselves so they've got to keep on reducing and reducing until someone buys it." That's made some places dirt cheap - even car cheap. Remember Jessica? Well, this is what she can get for 25-thousand dollars. "I wasn't sure what we were going to find but this is a pretty big place." "Yeah, this place is huge. Yeah, I think it's huge." "Is it better than what you imagined it would look like?" "Yeah, especially as far as size goes and this is like double what I thought it would be." "Do you think you could see yourself in a place like this?" "Oh for sure, yeah it needs work but martin says with a 7-thousand square foot lot - you could even tear down the house and eventually make money on just the land." Tight savings and a short period of unemployment have forced them to stick to a \$5,000 budget, honeymoon included. No band and fewer guests, "We wanted between 100 and 150, but we've cut back to 75." And plenty of bargain hunting, it retailed for a thousand dollars and I got it online for \$299 if you can believe that. Keeva and Jeff are not alone. They're definitely cutting back. They're cutting back in so many different ways on so many different services. Wedding planner Sharon Lewis says attendance at her shows has shrunk. Research shows a quarter of brides-to-be plan to slash their budgets in half. And from a peak of just under 29,000 dollars in 2007, the average wedding tab is just 19,000 this year -- a more than 30 percent drop. "We've cut our price points from the year prior by about 30 percent," says Vera Wang. Even high-end designers, like Vera Wang, are feeling the pinch. She says her brides usually come to her right after getting a ring, but not anymore. They're shopping around instead, and many are spending less, "One would think that maybe bridal would be the last to suffer but it really has suffered I think for the whole industry." Still, Keeva move is looking past the wedding planning woes and finding blessings in a smaller bash. What's more important is saving that money to make sure our marriage lasts. The state's budget deficit keeps growing; Kansas now faces a deficit of 328 million dollars for the next fiscal year. That comes after new numbers show an expected 744 million dollar drop in tax revenues through June of 20-10. That will force legislators to revise the 13-billion dollar budget approved for the next fiscal year. That budget included across the board cuts, but used federal stimulus money to keep schools largely untouched. Since schools eat up half the entire state-budget, many say they will likely face bigger cuts. The two sides compromised; the company wanted to build two plants but will now only put up one. The agreement also means Sunflower Electric will build a wind farm. The deal will only go through if state lawmakers pass a new energy plan that gives incentives for renewable energy sources.

05/05/09

10pm

Imagine poison coming out of your faucets. It's been happening for more than a decade in one Kansas town. But nobody's gotten sick so far. Eyewitness News Reporter Jim Grawe traveled to Great Bend to talk to those who wonder if their drinking water will ever be drinkable again. Staying hydrated is a must for the hard working employees at Hugo Repair Services. But the water has to come out of a bottle because drinking from a faucet here is an H2 no no. "The water was good and now it's not so what are we going to do about it?" Hugo Younker has been asking that question for years. Ever since the Kansas Department of Health discovered this former metal plating factory in the Great Bend's industrial park was poisoning the ground water. State Health officials first ground water contamination here back in 1991 and took steps to deal with the situation. Then when this plant closed in 2005 they found more problems. Officials discovered several tanks of a plating solution, called chromium, were left abandoned and leaking. "I was disgusted for somebody to that." Fortunately the number of people impacted is small-just a few businesses and one home. "The majority of the public are drinking water the city provides and they have eight water supply wells they draw from only one of them has a small amount of chromium in it. The risk to the public drinking municipal water is minimal." but for there's no telling when danger will disappear. Officials say it's too expensive for the state to do on its own. They want the federal government to dig up contaminated soil from the site and pump out polluted groundwater. "I think that needs to be done." The project is high in cost but not high on the EPA's priority list it could take more than a decade; meanwhile those affected must steer clear of the tap.

05/13/09

10pm

Our crew was caught in the middle of this hail storm in northeast Cowley County. Hail larger than quarter-sized and brief torrential rain southeast of Cambridge. A tornado also touched down in this area but after we called around, there were no reports of damage.

05/14/09

7am

Crews from the Kansas City stations caught this tornado while flying in their chopper yesterday. This tornado touched down near Burlington in northeast Kansas. This is the second touch-down they saw out of this storm which broke out over Emporia earlier last night and moved northeast. The twister is at times hard to see because of all the rain around it. So far we haven't heard of any reports of damage or injuries.

The town also plans a celebration with food and music for this weekend.

06/12/09

6am

"It just made you sick, it was very devastating, just sickening, how it could just wipe you out in seconds, kind of like you were in a movie when you got evacuated because like you just couldn't really believe it." A lot has changed in Chapman in the past year. After last June's tornado, Ashlynn and Nick Bledsoe's home needed a lot of work. They tried to keep things in perspective, "It's not like I wanted the tornado to happen but like we kind of did need new windows and new siding, now I look at it and it looks so much better than it used to." Diana Irvine agrees. She's thankful she was able to repair her home. Funnel clouds send people running for cover in downtown Denver. Thousands of people attending a Colorado Rockies game had to be moved inside. No tornadoes actually touched down. Although parts of city got hit with hail, the Rockies game eventually resumed. The home team winning 7-to-1.

06/15/09

10pm

Storms rolled through Kansas overnight damaging this home in Cowley County. A text message at three in the morning from a family member alerted Tony Williamson to the severe weather. The nine people inside went to the basement. When they came out, they found their garage in pieces, a three ton trailer rolled more than 100 yards, and the roof ripped from their home. They say it could have been worse, but the damage is pretty bad. Kelly Williamson says, "I look at this and this is my house, but I feel so helpless right now. I don't know where to start or what to do." The Williamson's home is the only report of damage in Cowley County. The family is convinced it was a tornado that hit their home.

06/16/09

5pm

A home near Leon takes a direct hit by storms, ripping off the roof and soaking everything inside. Lori Koehn says she was sitting on the couch when she heard the wind and something fell on her head. It was a piece of the roof. The rest blew away. There was nothing covering the entire back half of the house. Everything inside is rain-soaked and covered in debris. The Koehn's are now trying to salvage what they can. Insurance adjusters will determine how much damage there is tomorrow. Coming up at six tonight, hear from Koehn and what she plans to do next.

06/17/09

8am

Hail the size of a baseball smashes a small Kansas town. Alta Vista is about 30 miles south of Manhattan. The 500 people who live here spent the day raking up the leaves the hail ripped off trees. The hail broke windows in homes and cars. Many people now have holes in their siding. Dustin Liddick wanted to get to his storm shelter when it hit, but he has to go outside to get to it, "I was kind of scared. I wanted to get him in the hole so nothing happened to him. I don't know. Him being 1 and me being a new father, I was just going crazy." There's no damage estimate yet from Wabaunsee County.

Two people are injured, one of them critically, from an explosion in Pratt. Investigators believe something sparked fumes from a semi truck. The blast knocked out one wall of Central Kansas Crude, and caused another one to bulge out.

People in hutch have probably have had enough. Severe weather hit the town again Wednesday night. This time it was strong winds. A big shed was blown apart overnight and a tree fell on a house. June has been pretty rough for Hutch. Merrill Teller says it was a dry microburst. Monday night, severe thunderstorms hit the town and then back on the 8th a microburst hit. That storm did a lot of damage to Collins Bus Company.

06/20/09

8am

If your lawn or garden is looking a little sad the problem might be in your soil. The only way to know if your soil needs compost or fertilizer is to test it. The folks from Kansas State Research and Extension show us how. Take a shovel, it can be four inches, six inches, or eight inches, and get what we call a shovel slice. For an accurate sample, start by digging a hole, very carefully. It should have a flat side on the hole, so that you can get a nice flat sample. And then, sample about an inch depth, meaning an inch thick. Once the sample is on your shovel, break away the soil until you have a rectangle. What this does is give you the same amount of soil from the bottom of the hole, and the top of the hole, so you get a more accurate reading. Sometimes there's a gradation, and there are more nutrients at the top or at the bottom. Then find a container or a bucket, and put it in the container. In a plot this size, I would do that about ten times. When I have my 10 subsamples, I would take that same shovel, break up any clumps, and stir the soil. Let's pretend I have my 10 subsamples. Then you'll need just one shovelful as your final sample to send in to the lab. You can send in a fresh sample, but it's better to let it air dry before you send it. To do that, take your subsample (the one cup of soil you've taken from your subsamples), and put it out on a newspaper for about two days. Then take that to your county office, and have them send it to K-State. You can put the sample in a plastic bag, or a paper sack. Your county office may also have containers, and you can ask K-State to run tests on pH, phosphorus, potassium, nitrogen, and organic matter. Each of those will tell you a different, but very important thing about your soil. You can get your soil sample tested by taking it to any local extension office. "We were actually standing on the front porch so we were able to hear the booms and the bangs. We heard the transformers go out and the wind was nuts. That tree has a massive root system on it and I swear that tree is leaning this way today but it just be my imagination or maybe the house is leaning the other way." Farms outside of Conway were also badly damaged. The national weather service will try to determine if the damage is from just high winds or if a tornado touched down.

Richard Webb says, "Okay, well, it's just things that happen in daily life. And it appears they're on top of the problem. By in the morning, we'll probably be going again." City workers say extreme temperatures may have caused the ground to shift and that may have caused the water main to break.

10pm

No air-conditioning and all the windows shut. Police say it was probably 115 degrees inside this Kansas City house and heat may be what killed an elderly brother and sister. Authorities say it was so hot inside the house a pet bird was also found dead inside its cage. Police want to remind everyone to check on elderly family members and neighbors. We checked around with Wichita hospitals to find out if they've seen people with heat problems. Via Christi St. Francis says it's seen 7 patients since yesterday.

06/24/09

8am

New this morning, we're learning more about a fire that destroys the laundry building at Larned State Hospital. This was the scene after the fire at the laundry building the Hutchinson News sent us this picture. SRS is in charge of the psychiatric hospital. Authorities are still investigating how the fire started.

06/25/09

10pm

Saline County got hit with a hail storm earlier this evening. Jill Wright sent us this picture showing golf ball size hail. And Yvonne Davis sent us this from the south part of Salina. You can see lots of marble size hail. And this is what parts of Salina look like tonight leaving people with some clean-up. We found lots of tree limbs down and saw cars driving through high water. We have no reports of injuries.

06/26/09

7am

It's been hot all week so here are some pictures to cool you down. Remember back in march when this powerful blizzard swept across the state? Now, the president has issued a major disaster declaration to help cover costs associated with the storm. The declaration makes federal funding available for emergency work and facilities repair.

06/27/09

10pm

Storm Team 12 Storm Chaser Brandon Ivey sent us this video of storm damage in Cowley County. The storm caused some streets to flood, and knocked down some tree limbs. He also says there was some small hail in the area. Westar Energy reports on their website about 360 customers are currently without power in Cowley County.

8am

If you head to the playground during these hot summer days, remind your children the swings and slides can get very hot. Paramedics used a heat gun on this rubber swing to show how hot it was after sitting in the sun all day. It was 136 degrees and children's skin is more sensitive to heat than adults. Hutchinson will be getting a long-awaited water treatment plant this week. The reverse-osmosis plant comes after nearly three decades of searching for a way to treat contaminated groundwater in the city. Purified water from the plant will be mixed with 40-percent of the city's current water supply to avoid corroding the water pipeline. Construction on the plant began in 2005. City officials learned in the 1980s that volatile organic compounds contaminated a public water supply well.

04/10/09

7am

We wanted to know why farmers and ranchers burn fields; we talked with agriculture experts at Kansas State for FactFinder 12. They tell us it helps prepare the land by burning away crop residue and weeds, seeds and trees. Experts also say the range burning improves the quality of grass that grows making it healthier for livestock.

04/10/09

10pm

Sedgwick County Emergency Management says human error set off tornado sirens in Wichita yesterday afternoon. Director Randy Duncan says a supervisor at the 911 call center pressed the activation button by mistake. Duncan said the supervisor confused a thunderstorm warning for a tornado warning. Another supervisor realized what happened and turned the sirens off. Still Duncan says people shouldn't rely on the sirens as their only warning.

Wichita's allowed four days of ozone levels above Federal standards, if it goes over the state could mandate gas stations sell a cleaner and more expensive blend of gas. Now the city is trying to keep the ozone levels under control by no longer issuing burn permits and revoking outstanding permits.

7am

Cars continue to become smaller, cheaper, and more fuel efficient; could all this come at the cost of safety? Tests by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety show today's mini-cars have some serious safety flaws. The group found the Honda Fit, Toyota Yaris and the Smart Fortwo were no match for larger cars in head-on collisions. Researchers found the passenger compartment crumpled when hit by a larger car. The institute crashed mini and midsize cars from the same automaker at 40 miles per hour.

Medical advancements allow more premature babies to survive. That's making a Wichita charity even more valuable. Premature babies may need to stay in the hospital for months. This isn't the first time the company has been in trouble with the EPA. Compliance records show Treat-Co violated the Clean Air Act and mismanaged hazardous waste in 2-thousand-6 and 2-thousand-8. The EPA won't say what it's investigating this time. But, we do know the unit looking into treat-co specializes in hazardous illegal dumping. The plant has not been shut down by the EPA.

04/18/09

8am

Marcus Gibson says he got tired of backing over things in his big Dodge pickup, so he bought this little wireless back up camera system. The camera attaches near the license plate and has a two-point-four gigahertz wireless transmitter that attaches to the backup light and sends video to the monitor on the dashboard, which plugs into the cigarette lighter. But, as he began driving around town, he noticed he was picking up other people's wireless cameras on his monitor. Marcus Gibson: "Very weird, lots of things I can see, I don't want to see." We could see ourselves pull up to this business. He's seen inside banks, convenience stores, cash registers and even where valuables are hidden. Marcus: "The weirdest thing I saw was a video store near Arkansas. When the image came up, there was a wall full of guns." But, that's not the scariest... he can also see right inside people's homes. Lori, reporter: "You can see people things in their houses?" Marcus: "Yes, and I'm sure they don't know I can see them." We drove past this man's house and we could see him sitting on his couch, smoking a cigarette, even moving around the room and the man had no idea. But, what really unnerved Marcus and made him decide to call me was when he saw a baby sleeping in a crib. We warned the woman about this story who didn't want her baby on t-v, but, agreed to put a doll in her child's crib and we could see it as clear as day. Marcus: "When I drove by Saturday night and saw the image of the baby and you think about that mother who thinks she's protecting her child, but, it's no different than having a video screen outside, showing everybody driving by, what's going on inside the baby bed." Marcus says it's ironic the people who think they have cameras for security, actually end up being the least secure of all.

Wichita police also checked nearly 100 liquor stores looking for underage drinking violations. Thirteen establishments were found violating liquor laws, 103 containers of alcohol were seized during the checks, and one minor was cited for possession of alcohol.

A car shifts out of gear then rolls over a 2 year old Wichita boy. Police say another child knocked the car out of gear and it rolled backward near 11th and Estelle Wednesday afternoon. The child was rushed to the emergency room and he's in fair condition and is expected to be okay.

The Border Patrol said it's taking a closer look at the thousands who make this trip every day. The U.S. recommends travelers avoid Mexico trips if the trip is not essential and it's starting distributing anti-viral medications. The confirmed cases in the U.S. including two in Kansas are said to be mild.

Two cases of swine flu showed up in Kansas in Dickinson County; county health officials say the couple quarantined themselves to keep the disease from spreading, but people are taking precautions. Swine flu concerns are changing the way the large Mexican community in Dodge City travels. Hispanics make up more than half of the town's population. Most work in the meat packing plants and often make trips to Mexico. Since news of Swine flu hit, many canceled travel plans and instead focused on protecting themselves against the virus. Local health clinics are having conference calls with the CDC to make sure they're up on the latest information.

A K-State professor plans to get a sample of the Swine flu virus and inject it into pigs for research. In the meantime Kansas officials want to clear-up some rumors about the virus. They say, swine operations in Kansas are not quarantined and that the virus has not been found in any pigs in Kansas or the U.S. and K-State said pork is still safe to eat.

Not everyone is happy with the change; they say the smoking ban should have been put to a citywide vote.

Health officials say a student at a Wichita Catholic school appears to have swine flu. On Friday, Saint Thomas Aquinas warned parents and staff about the possibility. Today the K.D.H.E. confirmed it. The case is being called a presumptive positive. The diagnosis still needs to be confirmed by the Centers for Disease Control. The student started experiencing flu like symptoms last week while visiting family out of state. But because the student was out of town when he got sick Saint Thomas said on Friday it has no plans to close. The student and his or her family are cooperating with health officials and being quarantined for the duration of the illness. The state says there's a second presumptive case in Johnson County; a couple from Dickinson County is the only confirmed cases in the state.

One case, two schools; tonight we learn more about the Wichita family dealing with the Swine flu. As we first told you last week an eighth grader at Saint Thomas Aquinas was exposed to the virus on an out of state trip. Ramsey's friends went in and pulled him from the water but it was too late, he died at the scene.

An unfortunate set of circumstances; Reno County Sheriffs say that's what led to the death of a 20-year-old man. Investigators say Chance Ramsey was rounding up cattle when he and his horse rode into a pond to get a stray cow. Ramsey and his horse drowned. Recent rains flooded the pond, making it ten feet deep. A muddy bottom and the fact that Ramsey couldn't swim all played a role in his death. Ramsey was an avid rider and was a member of the U.S. Team Ropers Association.

An emergency system that would alert people on the Wichita State campus to potential dangers is almost completely running according to plan. Right now the university can send out the messages, but it's up to the people at the physical plant to do it. Training should be complete next month so that campus police can send out messages campus wide about possible threats. The school decided to hang electronic message boards and institute a text messaging system after the shooting on the Virginia Tech campus in 2007. University officials say this system will also be used for natural disasters like tornadoes.

Would you trust your life to a wire? K-DOT said you can. The Kansas Department of Transportation will install cable wires to divide two highways in Kansas. Look at this; such a cable median kept this semi from crossing into oncoming traffic in Colorado. K-DOT said the cables will prevent that from happening in Kansas too. The cables will cost about 125 thousand dollars which is cheaper than concrete dividers. KDOT will install the cables north of Topeka, and on a four mile stretch of K-96 between Rock Road and I-135. Look for construction on K-96 in the fall of 2010.

Smoke and flames from an afternoon fire leave crews helpless to fight it. The people living at this mobile home in southeast Wichita say a friend put a chicken on the propane grill and left it. The fire spread to the wooden deck and to then to the home. One man went to Saint Francis hospital for smoke inhalation and some burns. He's expected to be okay; the fire destroyed most of the home.

Sunday was a beautiful day to get outside and grill; but firefighters say be careful, every year their crews work an average of 65-hundred grill fires. School's already out for the summer in Maize but the health department wants anyone with flu-like symptoms to see a doctor. Kansas now has 75 cases of Swine flu.

They spent Monday night stranded on riverbank now three teenagers are ok. The girls wanted to go swimming a few miles north of this bridge in Arkansas City. They say they drifted downstream, and once it got dark, they decided to stay on the riverbank until someone found them. One of their mothers called 911 and rescuers found them around 5 yesterday morning. This isn't the first rescue on this stretch of river. Fire fighters say people often try to float it and don't take into consideration how long it's going to take them to get only a few miles.

Now, the city is being criticized once again for allegedly violating the Americans with disabilities act. Eyewitness news reporter Denise Hnytka has more on the lawsuit. Whatever was on the agenda at the Lyons city council meeting didn't matter. People wanted to talk about the city's decision to cancel non-emergency 9-11 dispatch, "It seems like we're spending an awful lot of time fixing a system that wasn't broke." Non-emergency calls are now sent to a voicemail. That's what happened to Beverly Brothers after someone shot at her home, "They said leave your name, phone number, and address and I will get with you within one hour. I felt so alone." She wasn't tonight, "I am one very disappointed Lyons resident." Deannette Dixon is deaf. She says the 911 system violates the Americans with disabilities act because there is no T.D.D., a system of typing and reading messages. As far as that happening in Lyons, there has never been one. I moved here in the year of 1998 to 2001. There wasn't one then, and there's not one now. Dixon and the Kansas Disability coalition filed a lawsuit against the city of Lyons and county commissioners. At the meeting, the city admitted there was some trouble-shooting to be done on the new policy. But said there wasn't time for it at this meeting. So if you have a bit of patience we can get this done. In the meantime, at what cost? "Ma'am, that's it. This is it. We're done. We're not taking any more. We have things to do. You're all going to have to leave." They left, but say they're not satisfied. They want their voices to put their concerns on a future agenda. Denise Hnytka, KWCH 12 Eyewitness news. One solution being discussed is putting an officer's cell phone number on the non-emergency voicemail, so people will still have the option to be in direct communication with police.

Congress passed and President Clinton signed the law in 19-94. We wanted to know how many people have been prosecuted for violating the face act. Between 19-94 and 2-thousand-5, 71 people were convicted of violating the law. The Clinton administration prosecuted an average of 10 people per year. In 19-97 alone, 17 people were charged. New at 10 Sedgwick county will receive four a half million dollars in stimulus money to help fix up and sell homes in struggling neighborhoods. Eyewitness news reporter Michael Schwanke explains how the money will work. This house on South Estelle may be one of the first in the county to see stimulus money. The garage is tilted, replace it, or make it better and these steps. Tim Hagan with community housing shows us why the home is vacant, a foreclosure that is now an eyesore for this south Wichita neighborhood, "You actually couldn't see the house with the trees and overgrowth." Neighbor Val Smith helped clean up the yard but there's only so much he can do. The house needs thousands of dollars of work, "This house isn't absolutely blighted but it's not livable." And that's the goal use the 4.6 million dollars in stimulus money to fix up homes like this one. Get them ready to sell, "We would replace those windows with energy efficient windows and in turn provide housing for a qualified family." The money isn't here yet but it's close and work should begin soon on this home and many more like it and that has neighbors like Val Smith excited, "This is a good use of stimulus money and all my neighbors think so also." Of course in this area we don't have the tracks of foreclosed homes like a phoenix or Las Vegas. The money here will focus on homes in revitalization areas--that will help low or middle income families, first time home buyers get into a home. Some of the homes will likely have to be demolished and rebuilt.

Also new this morning the first test of new u-n sanctions on North Korea continue to play out on the high seas. An American destroyer is still shadowing a North Korean ship along China's coast, but the destroyer has no orders to intercept.
