**Topic 1:** National political news had a number of headlines this week after Joe Biden announced that he will not run for president which boosted Hilary Clinton's campaign prospects amid testimony in front of congress for the Benghazi hearing. Meanwhile republican representative Paul Ryan agreed to run for house speaker with specific conditions.

**Topic 2:** A number of citizens could lose their health coverage after Colorado Heathop was shut down by the state due to financial issues. According to the Denver Post the decision could impact nearly 83 thousand members. The non-profit is now suing to regain the right to sell policies in 2016.

**Topic 3:** Grocery stores are attempting to have full strength beer and wine sold in their stores by bringing the issue directly to the voters. The ballot is being backed by "your choice Colorado" with supermarkets like King Soopers, Safeway and Walmart behind them. Back to Studio - Opinion Polls show, the American people still oppose getting involved in another European war but here in Colorado, preparation for war is taking place. The new Munitions plant being built west of town is almost finished, as is the Lowry airfield. The Army is still looking for funds to complete the new Fitzsimmons Hospital east of town and a number of Colorado companies are also receiving contracts for military goods like packs and harnesses. This sounds like we are preparing for war. What do you think?

**Topic 1:** The Aurora Theater trial dominated the summer of 2015 and re-hashed both the local and national discussion of the death penalty and mental health issues. Both the perpetrator in this case and the defendant in the Fero's bar trial were found guilty of several counts of first degree murder and both were sentenced to life in prison after being eligible for the death penalty.
