# **WDWS PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS**

Champaign Multimedia, LLC acquired WDWS, WHMS, WKIO from News-Gazette, Inc. in November 2019

Since 1990 WDWS has been a News-Talk-Sports programmed station. Locally produced talk programing 5A-11A, 4P-6PM, Monday thru Friday. Live local programs Saturday 8A-11A, Sunday 6A-10AM. The station has the market advantage of being a 24 News Operation which enables WDWS to respond instantly to situations and emergencies that affect our local communities.

Below are the programs from which we generate our response and/or coverage regarding local issues as identified on the following pages. The topics addressed are just a small sample of how WDWS serves our communities all day, all night, all weekend.

<u>PNY:</u> "A Penny For Your Thoughts" A daily (M-F) live local two hour talk show airing from 9a til 11a. This program allows for listener participation via the phone, email and text. Content ranges from newsmaker interviews, local civic leader interviews, celebrity interviews to open line segments. During open line listeners drive the topics. Everyone is welcome to participate. (Public Affairs)

MS: "Morning Show" Interview segments during the Morning Show between 5-9am (M-F). Newsmakers and local leaders are interviewed by the morning show crew. (Public Affairs)

<u>NWS:</u> "News Segment" Specific extended stories or special series packages prepared and delivered by our joint broadcast and print news department.

<u>CI:</u> "Citizen Involvement" A series of pre-recorded programs. (Public Affairs)

<u>SA</u>: "Station Announcement" A series of short messages in support and or in conjunction with WDWS community engagement projects.
