<b>Wildfire Prevention</b>	Interview	6/30	8:10am	10 minutes	Spoke with Dave Larson and Melissa Cano of the Oregon Department of Forestry about wildfire season, 4 <sup>th</sup> of July, and the coming eclipse drawing people to Oregon
<b>State Taxation, property ownership, economy</b>	Clear Connections	4/2	600	20	State Rep. Sal Esquivel proposes a state measure to eliminate property taxes on the first 500,000 dollars of assessed value, while imposing a small sales tax on retail sales. We discuss the reasoning for bringing this forward. Sal says it's needed to keep people from being taxed out of their homes, while the sales tax would bring much of the underground economy into the state tax system.
<b>Transportation security</b>	Clear Connections	4/2	620	10	Kim Stearns of the Medford Airport discusses a new plan bringing the TSA to the airport for a number of weeks. It will allow local residents to apply for TSA-PRE, a much easier way to travel. It allows relaxed security standards, but you have to register with the government to qualify as a "trusted traveler". Locating in Medford means residents won't have to drive to Roseburg to sign up, which is currently the case.
<b>Homeless Awareness</b>	Clear Connections	4/9	600	30	Representatives from the Gospel Rescue Mission in Grants Pass discuss the growing homeless problem in Southern Oregon. The Executive Director says they had to close the "open door" policy toward just letting any homeless into the mission, choosing instead to close the system, and only serve homeless individuals that they truly believe can be, or want to be helped.
<b>State Spending and Budgeting, taxation, public services.</b>	Clear Connections	4/16	600	30	Dr. Eric Fruits, an economist with Portland State University talks of his white paper, just released, which details many ways the State of Oregon can balance its budget (now indicated at 1.6 billion dollars deficit) without raising taxes, but it will take political courage. One of the biggest suggestions is to opt-out of the Medicaid expansion that Oregon signed on to after the passage of "Obamacare".
<b>Local Education</b>	Clear Connections	4/23	600	30	Brian Shumate, Superintendent of the Medford 549C school district talks of the various challenges facing the local school district. Graduation rates are up significantly, however the looming unfunded liability of the Public Employee Retirement system is a growing challenge. Education spending is

					rising, but a greater share of that funding is going to pay for past retired educators, rather than increased teaching staff.
<b>Health care policy</b>	Clear Connections	4/30	600	15	Dr. Merrill Matthews of Ipi.org, resident scholar there, breaks down the latest GOP plan to reform the Obamacare health plan. Says it's a mixed bag, but unfortunately still leaves too much of the problematic aspects of the ACA in place.
<b>Healthy eating, government overreach.</b>	Clear Connections	4/30	615	10	Julie Gunlock of the Independent Women's Forum pushes back against the conventional wisdom being reported an increased death rate from consuming diet sodas. Julie claims the science claims are from a very small sample study, and even if one were to believe the claims, the increase in death rate is negligible.
<b>Local government, timber policy, environmental policy.</b>	Clear Connections	5/7	600	10	Jackson County Board of Commissioners pulls out of the Association of Oregon Counties. Commissioner Roberts said the AOC has been ineffective, and that they didn't really fight for rural counties suffering under arduous environmental regulation.
<b>Education, tourism, local economy</b>	Clear Connections	5/7	610	10	Ann Dowe, the new executive director of Science Works in Ashland, talks of the new exhibits, the joy of bringing scientific knowledge to young children.
<b>Local history, the tourism economy</b>	Clear Connections	5/7	620	10	Randy McKay of Jefferson Live updates us on the progress of the restoration of the Holly Theater in Medford. Another million or so dollars is still needed raised, but the restoration is well on the way to a 2018 finish.
<b>Marijuana policy, law enforcement, property rights</b>	Clear Connections	5/14	600	30	Debbie Benedict, representing a consortium of home schoolers in Wimer, talks of the challenges their neighborhood is facing with the location of a huge recreational marijuana grow 100 feet from their school. Talk is of a local government overwhelmed and ineffectively responding to multiple marijuana violations and zoning problems.
<b>Public Health, water quality, government accountability.</b>	Clear Connections	5/21	600	10	State Senator Dennis Linthicum discusses a growing scandal in the Governor's office – When concerns about lead in public building water came to light, it was discovered that the state tested the governor's mansion for lead VERY quickly, but "slow-walked" demands to test the water of prisons in the Oregon Youth Authority.
<b>Public health and safety, outdoor safety</b>	Clear Connections	5/21	610	20	Capt. William E. Simpson of MyOutdoorBuddy.com talks about taking care in avoiding and treating the various venomous snakes in southern Oregon and northern California. Simpson says the great amounts of winter and spring rain has given us a bumper crop of grass, and a bumper crop of snakes hiding in those grasses.
<b>History, education</b>	Clear Connections	5/28	600	12	Historian Jennie L. Cotie discusses her upcoming book on the American Revolution, and the importance of making American

					history “fun” in order to spark interest in otherwise disinterested students.
<b>Medical Care</b>	Clear Connections	5/28	612	18	Dr. Joel Salinas was trained at Harvard Medical school, is the author of “Mirror Touch, Notes From a Doctor Who Can Feel Your Pain”. The doctor has a syndrome, “Mirror Touch Synesthesia”. It’s a glitch in his brain leading to a blend of senses and sensation. Vision and touch are more closely wired together, and often he’s able to, in a sense, “feel another’s pain through sight”. He says it has been a challenge, but is also helpful in making him a better, more-sensitive physician.
<b>Transportation, local economy and tourism</b>	Clear Connections	6/4	600	10	Airport Manager Bern Case announces the good news that southern Oregon will now receive daily flights from American Airlines, which will eventually bring more competition and lower fares in the valley.
<b>Homeless problem, law enforcement</b>	Clear Connections	6/4	610	10	Medford Police Lt. Justin Ivens discusses the challenges of the homeless problem in Medford’s Alba Park. Waiting for direction from the Medford City Council. City is also facing a lawsuit over its exclusion zone policy.
<b>Law enforcement, taxation</b>	Clear Connections	6/4	620	10	Dave Daniels, Josephine County Sheriff brings forth more information on how the recently passed Jo Co safety levy money will be spent.
<b>Law Enforcement, state, taxation</b>	Clear Connections	6/11	600	15	Rep. Duane Stark of Grants Pass reports on legislative action. Efforts are being made to add OSP troopers to southern Oregon, an additional judge, and more help regarding marijuana regulation problems.
<b>Government accountability</b>	Clear Connections	6/11	615	15	Attorney Matt Whittaker from FactDC.org discusses the testimony of former FBI director James Comey. Matt worked with James, and believes that Comey was in a no-win situation between those who believed he gave enough evidence to justify charging President Trump with obstruction, to the other extreme of completely exonerating the President. Said that the leaking of investigation memos was highly troubling.
<b>Economy, state taxation, business growth</b>	Clear Connections	6/18	600	15	Professor Fruits, economist from Portland State University, breaks down an extensive critique of the state’s plan to impose a gross receipts tax on Oregon’s businesses. Fruits adds it would be devastating in the long run, leading to fewer business startups in the state.
<b>Healthy diet and living, public health</b>	Clear Connections	6/18	615	15	Dr. Robin Miller is here promoting an upcoming wellness and healthy living seminar being conducted at the Smullin Center in Medford. Topics covered include diet, healthy exercise, Yoga’s role in well-being, many other subjects.
<b>Healthcare reform, Federal Government action</b>	Clear Connections	6/25	600	12	Resident scholar at IPI.org, Dr. Merrill Matthews updates us on the healthcare reform bill, THIS time from the GOP Senate. Matthews says the Senate plan is a stronger

					bill, looking at it from a healthcare freedom point of view, but still faces stiff political opposition.
<b>Mental Health and Law Enforcement</b>	Clear Connections	6/25	612	8	Lt. Kerry Curtis of Medford Police discusses the challenges of working with mentally ill suspects. Says around 75% of the homeless problems MPD has experienced is due to untreated drug and/or untreated mental health conditions.
<b>Emergency preparedness, emergency communications</b>	Clear Connections	6/25	620	10	Curt Hadley, local ham radio operator is here promoting a Field Day event. Both Amateur radio clubs in the Rogue Valley are teaming up for this at Science Works in Ashland. Field Day is a yearly event designed to hone the skills of local radio operators in order to better provide emergency communications for the area. We also discuss what amateur radio is, why the hobby is more relevant than ever (especially with severe earthquake conditions here) and that attendees can observe and get information on how they can become an amateur radio operator.
