Twenty years ago, Wendy Steele founded the nonprofit Impact100 in response to feeling as though women's roles in philanthropy needed a new way to be expanded and encouraged. Wendy launched the now global organization with the goal of empowering women to see themselves as activists through utilizing large grants to make an impact within their communities.

Just over 10 years ago, three local women founded the Impact100 Palm Beach County chapter, and it has grown to the second-largest chapter in the world. Last year the group awarded more than \$650,000 in impactful grants to initiatives in southern Palm Beach County.

The more members the organization has, the more it can donate to local causes. The group kicks off its next grantmaking year with a Fall Kick-Off event featuring Wendy Steele as keynote speaker on October 20th in Boca Raton. Prospective and current members are invited to attend to learn more.

By 2002, Impact 100 received nonprofit status and donated its first grant of \$123,000. In 2003, *People* magazine published a story about Impact 100, and Steele's idea quickly began to spread. Today, her model has been replicated in cities all over the world and only continues to grow.

"Through the joint efforts of philanthropic women, Impact 100 Palm Beach County gives so many smaller nonprofits a chance to launch new programming or initiatives that they may not have otherwise been able to develop without the grant," said Holly Schuttler, current president of Impact 100 PBC. "We hope women will come to our kickoff to learn more Impact 100 PBC and all of the great things we do to help other organizations in our community get a jump start to aid our neighbors in need. The more members we have, the greater impact we can make with our donations."

With 652 members in 2020-21, the Impact 100 PBC chapter is the second largest in the world and is entering its 11th year in Palm Beach County.

"Impact 100 Palm Beach County is completely volunteer-based," continued Schuttler. "Our members can invest as much time as they have into Impact 100 PBC, but no time commitment is required."

Impact 100 Palm Beach County is a women's 501c3 nonprofit organization funding local nonprofit initiatives in southern Palm Beach County – between Boca Raton and Lake Worth. It is comprised of a growing number of women who donate \$1,000 annually, pool all funds and vote to award multiple \$100,000 grants to nonprofits serving southern Palm Beach County in five focus areas: Arts, Culture and Historic Preservation; Education; Environment and Animal Welfare; Family; and Health and Wellness.

Brief History: Miami Rescue Mission (MRM) began in 1922 under the name "*City Mission*" serving meals to the needy. The hurricane of 1926, the stock market crash of 1929, and the following years of The Great Depression caused an increase need Of MRM services.

A headline in the Miami Daily News, June 14, 1930 read,

"1,226 at City Mission Cared for Each Day!"

In 1935, the name was changed to Miami Rescue Mission. MRM continued through the difficult years of WWII and in 1947 was formally incorporated with its quarters at 150 W Flagler Street, Miami. The Mission eventually moved from this location in order for the public library to be built. The next location, 716 N. Miami Avenue proved to be the exact spot the city wanted to build the Civic Center.

In 1969, MRM opened the building at 2250 NW 1 Ave. which would become the site of the Center for Women & Children, which opened in 1980. **Dr.**Frank and Maxine Jacobs became MRM's leaders in 1975. Their

dedication, vision, and hard work led to expanding services to the homeless and needy for the next 32 years. The present President/CEO, Rev. Ronald Brummitt, of the organization has 26 years of experience working with the homeless and needy of South Florida and has served in this role for 12 years.
