DISASTER ASSISTANCE

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) is offering low-interest disaster loans to non-farm businesses of all sizes, private nonprofits, homeowners and renters who suffered losses caused by the severe storms and flooding that began on May 21, 2019. Types of loans available are:

Individuals and Families:

Homeowners: up to \$200,000 to repair or replace real estate damage and up to \$40,000 to replace personal property.

Renters: up to \$40,000 to repair or replace personal property.

Businesses:

Property Damage: up to \$2,000,000 to repair or replace real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other assets that were damaged or destroyed (available to businesses of **any size** and private, non-profit organizations).

Economic Injury: only for **small** businesses and most private non-profit organizations suffering adverse financial impacts of the disaster (**with or without** property loss), up to \$2,000,000 for working capital to help pay obligations until normal operations resume.

SBA customer service representatives will be at the following location to meet with each disaster survivor. SBA will answer specific questions about how a disaster loan may help each survivor recover from the disaster damage, and will provide one-on-one assistance in completing applications for these loans.

Four More Arkansas Counties Added to Disaster Declaration

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. – Continuing preliminary damage assessments have resulted in four more Arkansas counties being designated for disaster assistance as part of the federal disaster declaration for areas affected by severe storms and flooding beginning on May 21.

The addition of Arkansas, Desha, Logan and Pope counties brings the total number of Arkansas counties designated for Individual Assistance to 12.

Conway, Crawford, Faulkner, Jefferson, Perry, Pulaski, Sebastian and Yell counties were previously designated for Individual Assistance.

Affected residents and business owners in the newly-designated counties can check to see if they are eligible for disaster assistance from state, federal and voluntary organizations by visiting <https://www.disasterassistance.gov/get-assistance/find-assistance>. This tool can help you identify available resources in your community.

Visit www.disasterassistance.gov or call 1-800-621-3362 to assess your needs and to find out what federal assistance may be available to you. If you use TTY, call 800-462-7585. If you use 711 or Video Relay Service (VRS), call 800-621-3362.

1. **Martin Gibala, PhD**, Professor and Chair of the Department of Kinesiology, McMaster University in Ontario

Dr. Gibala led a study that found that a single minute of very intense exercise produces health benefits similar to longer, traditional endurance training. He recommends the plan for occasionally busy days, not as a permanent substitute for longer and more moderate workouts. He said the findings put to rest the common excuse for not getting in shape: there is not enough time.

Mitigation advisers will be on hand at Lowe’s in Jefferson County and Home Depot in Sebastian County to answer questions about rebuilding and protecting homes from future disaster-related damage. Topics will include flood insurance and elevating utilities. Most of the information is geared toward do-it-yourself work and general contractors.

Summer is the time for fun in the sun, pool parties, gardening and “honey-do” lists. If your list of summer tasks include building things like decks, sheds, home additions, or anything that includes digging in the dirt, be sure to do it safely by getting natural gas lines marked before you start. Arkansas Oklahoma Gas Corporation provides a free service to mark lines by dialing 8-1-1. Getting your lines marked before starting to dig can help prevent pipeline damage and costly repairs.

Natural gas is colorless and odorless until gas companies add an odorant. If you see unexplained areas of dead vegetation, a meter dial that continues to move after all natural gas appliances are shut off, blowing dirt or bubbling water, smell the odor of rotten eggs or hear a hissing noise near your meter, leave the area immediately and call AOG at eight hundred, eight four two, five six nine zero. This is a free, twenty-four hour a day service for emergencies.

1. **Tyler J. VanderWeele, PhD**, Professor of Epidemiology, T.H. Chan School of Public Health, Harvard University

Those who attend church services on a regular basis may receive more than just spiritual benefits—they may live longer. Dr. VanderWeele led a study that found that women who went to church more than once a week had a 33% lower risk of dying, compared to those who never went. He talked about the potential reasons behind the finding. He said it is conceivable in the future that doctors routinely ask about church attendance during medical checkups.

1. Alisa Divine, domestic abuse survivor, author of "*#She Wins: Harrowing Stories from Women Who Survived Domestic Abuse*"

2. Matt Fellowes, founder and CEO of United Income, a retirement-focused online investment management and financial planning company based in Washington, D.C.

Mr. Fellowes co-authored a report that found that only 4% of retirees sign up for Social Security at the most profitable time. He said this single mistake costs the typical American household an average of \$111,000 in lost retirement income. He said that most people should claim Social Security later than they typically do, but he recommends seeking professional advice.

3. Jason Forman, PhD, Principal Scientist at the Center for Applied Biomechanics at the University of Virginia

Dr. Forman led a study that concluded that women are 73 percent more likely to be injured in a car accident than men. Older people were also at greater risk of injury. He talked about the likely reasons behind this trend. LITTLE ROCK – Many young adults entering college or the workforce feel the pressure of looming bills and turn to credit cards to cover the initial costs but end up paying exorbitant rates long-term. Accumulating credit card debt is avoidable; unfortunately, new users often fall victim to debt that hurts their ability to invest in personal pursuits like obtaining home loans and other financing in later years.

Arkansas Attorney General Rutledge offers this advice when using a card:

- Submit payments on time.
- Pay the whole balance owed if possible.
- Do not “max out” a credit card. Do not respond to every tempting credit card offer. Using too much credit could lead to having uncontrollable debt.
- Read the fine print as some credit cards include expensive annual fees and higher interest rates in exchange for incentives like airline miles and bonus points.

College students are further protected by the Credit Card Accountability Responsibility and Disclosure Act, which restricts the marketing of credit cards on campuses nationwide. Credit card companies are also forbidden from using gifts as a form of persuasion to bribe younger consumers into applying for a card.

Arkansas Attorney General Leslie Rutledge is issuing a warning to consumers about mail-out automobile dealership promotions containing lottery-style game pieces that trick Arkansans into thinking they've won a high value prize. The mail-out promotions contain what appear to be lottery scratch-off tickets that indicate that the recipient is a winner of a prize, such as a television, a trip, a boat, cash, and other big prizes. These promotions entice recipients into a false belief that they have won the prize, as if the Arkansas Scholarship Lottery sold the actual scratch-off ticket. Upon arrival at the dealership to collect the prize, the consumer learns there is no prize and that it is just a ploy to try to sell a car.

The Attorney General's Office has conducted an investigative review of these mail-outs and could find no evidence that anyone had ever actually received any of the high value prizes promised. Rather, consumers report that their names were placed in a drawing for another prize or that they received an item of nominal value, but all were subjected to a high-pressure sales pitch to buy a car. The Arkansas Prize Promotion Act prohibits sending a prize notice representing that a person is a winner when in fact it is only a promotional scheme designed to make contact with prospective customers.

Consumers should be on the alert for door-to-door sales people using scare tactics to sell home alarm systems. The Attorney General's Office receives complaints against home alarm systems and monitoring services for violations of the Home Solicitations Sales Act, including high pressure sales, misrepresentations of products, failure to provide a copy of the contract and others.

Things to lookout for include:

Consumers have a right to review the contract outside the presence of the sales agent, and cancel the contract without obligation within three days of the home solicitation sale.

- High-pressure tactics are rarely employed by companies whose business depends on providing quality customer service. A legitimate company will allow consumers to weigh options and will review the system details and notification procedures.
- The solicitor may suggest the existing security system needs an "upgrade," when the salesperson actually represents a different company. This may lead a homeowner to believe the system must be "upgraded" just to remain reliable.
- The salesperson offers "free installation." The homeowner may think it is a bargain, but many "free installation" offers are coupled with long-term, high-cost monitoring contracts. In the long run, the "free" offer may be the most expensive of all.

Identity thieves continue to adapt their scam techniques to fill their pockets with the money of hardworking Arkansans. These criminals know that any personal information they are able to gather, the better, and they will resort to any means necessary to steal your information. They often do this by calling consumers while pretending to be a legitimate business.

Attorney General Rutledge has compiled a list of precautionary tips to protect yourself:

- NEVER give away your personal information over the phone. Legitimate companies will have processes in place to protect personal information and will not request it by telephone.
- DO NOT trust the source even if it has some of your personal information. Scammers often use partial pieces of personal information in order to verify current personal information or gain personal information.
- NEVER verify your personal or banking If you verify your personal information to a scam artist, it can lead to identity theft.
- BE MINDFUL of scammers who spoof the caller I.D. The caller may appear to be from a trusted source and in reality, is a scam artist.

If you have been a victim of identity theft, close accounts that have been tampered with or fraudulently opened, and file a complaint with the FTC.
