A Cuba, Missouri man was sentenced on October 13, 2023 to ten years in federal prison consisting of 5 years imprisonment for conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine and five years imprisonment for possessing a firearm during and in furtherance of a drug crime. 65 year old Raymond Toth was sentneced by United States District Judge Colleen R. Lawless, who ordered that Toth also serve four years of supervised release after completing his prison sentence. This case was investigated by the Drug Enforcement Administration, Springfield Resident Office; the Illinois State Police; the Christian County, Illinois, Sheriff's Office; the Taylorville, Illinois, Police Department; and the Pana, Illinois, Police Department. Assistant U.S. Attorney Matthew Z. Weir represented the government in the prosecution.

State Representative Brad Halbrook is encouraging local families to join him for an upcoming Veto Session Update/Town Hall event in Taylorville. Rep. Halbrook (R-Shelbyville) will provide an update on the Democrats' gun ban, the sanctuary state crisis, nuclear energy, the Co2 pipeline, and more. The event will also be an opportunity for Christian County residents to discuss their concerns and suggestions with Representative Halbrook. The event will take place November 13th from 7-8:30 PM at the Taylorville City Hall located at 115 North Main Street.

The current Farm bill is expired but negotiations are expected soon to pass new legislation into this bill. State Representative Wayne Rosenthal (R-Morrisonville) knows the importance of this bill and the impact it has across Illinois and the country. The Farm bill is put together by titles and these titles create a package that keeps agriculture strong. It is the foundation of food and farm systems. Representative Rosenthal spoke on Thursday during the Veto Session.

Christian County Board set to meet for the last time in 2023. The board will hear from Mr. Matt Hart, with the CCEDC, go over ZBA amendments, and hear from the public. Under highway, building, and grounds, the board will discuss some updates to the courthouse and an EPA Grant Program, along with a Nuisance Ordinance. Under executive/personnel, the board will get an EMA update, a resolution for the Appellate Prosecutor for the States Attorney, discuss paid leave for all workers, review board office staff, and discuss text amendment proposalsStay tuned to Regional Radio News for a complete update following the meeting.

The minimum wage is increasing in Illinois on January 1st in 2024. Workers will see an increase of \$1/hr from \$13 to \$14. The minimum wage for tipped workers will jump to \$8.40/hr and youth workers working fewer than 650 hours per calendar year will see their hourly wage increase to \$12/hr.Lieutenant Governor Juliana Stratton echoed Governor Pritzker's statement saying that Illinois is continuing to strenghten its workforce and sustain it by increasing minimum wage. This is the sixth increase in the state's minimum wage since 2019 when Governor JB Pritzker signed legislation establishing a schedule of increases culminating in \$15/hr by 2025.

The Taylorville City Council met on Monday evening to discuss business, review ordinance, and hear from the public at their bimonthly board meeting. The Taylorville Junior High Baseball was honored for being Regional Champions. The team went 13-3. The meeting itself was very cut and dry with a minimal discussion on a motion to recommend to the City Attorney to prepare an ordinance to limit the number of video gaming liquor licenses to the current number of 40, with additional video gaming liquor licenses to be added only upon council approval. The next city council meeting is set for October 16th.

RUN AS OF 10/17/23 TZ

After discussion and stoppage of the Ameren Remediation Project taking place at Manners Park in Taylorville, the area will undergo third-party testing to understand if there are any reasons to believe there are unsafe conditions. Behind the stoppage of work was the Mayor of Taylorville, Bruce Barry. Since the work has ceased a special park board meeting took place where a unanimous vote approved the hiring of an individual to test the site's air. Mayor Barry says he is taking the issue seriously as he and the town understand how important being thorough in this investigation will be. Mayor Bruce Barry appeared as a guest on the WTIM Morning Show.

Taylorville City Council set to meet this evening at 7 PM for what looks to be a fairly busy meeting at the Municipal Building in Taylorville. A motion to raise the cost for a cigarette and tobacco dealer's license from \$100 per year, to \$3,000 per year is also on the table. Along with the discussion for tobacco, the council will discuss amending the city code to add penalties for first time offense of sale to minors for \$750, second offense to be 90 day suspension of license, and third penalty to lose license for remainder of license year. There is also a motion to change signage for cigarette, tobacco, and vape shops to have similar signage to video gaming parlors.
