As budget season approaches for the Christian County Sheriff's Office one item looks to be approved to bring more officers onto the roster. As of now, 17 sworn officers, including Sheriff Kettelkamp, Chief Deputy Baker, a courthouse officer, and two investigators handle the needs of the office for the county. That leaves 12 patrolling officers to ensure the safety of cities and villages like Mt. Auburn, Kincaid, and Tovey, whose towns are without local law enforcement.Baker notes that the Sheriff's Office has been able to manage the larger workload but with 14 cities in Christian County another hand on deck could make patrolling these cities easier.

The Christian County Coroner has announced she will not be running for reelection. Amy Calvert Winans announced she will not seek reelection in the 2024 election. Winans was first elected in 2004 and will complete her term as the longest serving Christian County Coroner with over 20 years of service and the first woman ever elected to the position. Winans says she is very appreciative of the people of Christian County for entrusting the work of the coroner's office to her leadership. Winans' last day will be November 30<sup>th</sup> 2024. The 2024 election is set for November 5<sup>th</sup>, 2024. We here at Regional Radio News salute you Amy Calvert Winans for all your years of dedication towards the people of Christian County.

The race for the Coroner's office position got opened immediately following the announcement that Coroner Amy Calvert Winans would not seek reelection. Michael A. Assalley announced his candidacy for Christian County Coroner. Assalley is seeking the Republican nomination for this office in the Primary Election which will be held on Tuesday, March 19<sup>th</sup>, 2024.
