The Christian County Board met at 6:30 Tuesday evening and what started off as a normal board meeting quickly got interesting, as the discussion over a part time maintenance project coordinator came to the forefront. Chairwoman Becky Edwards says that while this position would probably not include any laborer work it was still important and a necessity for the county.

EDWARDS1 KEY: Q LENGT: 22

After much debate and discussion, an amendment was pushed through to make the position a 20 hour a week position, with up to a \$22 salary. This position would be a 6 month position when after that time it would be reevaluated. This temporary position would not offer pension or other benefits. This all comes from an overworked staff who is busy trying to make repairs for the courthouse. Board member Dale Livingston spoke about some of the issues effecting the courthouse.

Becky Edwards also gave her thoughts on the courthouse repairs.

Bruce Engeling and Mike Crews were recognized for their hard work dedicated to the county. Engeling did not make the meeting, but Chief Crews was there and thanked the members of the board. Both men received a standing ovation.

Another Christian County Board meeting, and another night filled with comments for and against wind turbines. Turbines wasn't even on the agenda tonight, but the meeting was moved to Taylorville High School regardless in order to accommodate the huge crowds that have been gathering at these meetings. Tuesday's County Board meeting had over 150 people in attendance.

In committee reports, Committee head Phil Schneider called for a vote on having an inspector come out and look at the Courthouse elevator. The elevator which is operated by OTIS is already slated to be fixed in February. Schneider announced that OTIS has already ordered the parts, and if the County Board pulls out of the deal, they could face serious litigation.

SCHNEIDER1 KEY: Q LENGT: 42

The motion passed and the county will bring someone in to do another inspection to see if the 57 year elevator truly needs to be replaced. Repairs will also be looked at for the sagging floor at the south entrance of the courthouse.

An approval went through for hiring an assistant public defender position. Judge Brad Paisley had requested that the County hire one as the work load has gone up tremendously. State's Attorney Mike Havera said that the need is strong.

HAVERA1 KEY: W LENGT: 54

Christian County Board members also voted to push back the "safety tax" vote till April of 2021 so the County would have time to explain to the public why this was so important. The county abolished the office of Jury Commissioner and revised the County Cannabis Retailers' Occupation Tax Ordinance to add a %3.75 sales tax to unincorporated areas of Christian County and a 3% sales tax made in municipalities located in Christian County.

As far as the wind turbines go, Havera also announced that they would be seeking to hire an attorney to represent the county not pro or against wind energy. Havera stressed that whoever the County hires should be involved with the process immediately.

A group of concerned citizens that call themselves Protect Christian County or PCC, crowded into the board room, forcing Chairwoman Becky Edwards to move the meeting upstairs. Multiple people spoke at the meeting talking about health issues, concerns about the land value and concerns about transparency. Adrian Adcock, who is with PCC stated that the group wants to work with the board.

Adcock continued by saying that the group feels there is too much closeness between the board and the wind companies.

Chairwoman Becky Edwards said she did not have her mind made up on which way she wanted to vote. She also felt that people didn't understand the process and just what went into the process of county government—especially when lawyers get involved.

The arguments got quite heated and nothing was decided as far wind farms are concerned. The next time wind farms will be discussed will be in the December committee meeting.

The Taylorville Park Board met on Monday, November 25<sup>th</sup>. All were present except Trustee Kay Champley, who was absent. Tim Mathis from Ameren was at the meeting. With him, were Don Richardson, and Bret Carney. Richardson, an environmental Specialist with Ameren, assured the board that Ameren is checking the area for contamination and that wells that were on the ground did not have any contamination, so they would be removed and a new well would be put in. Testing on the old wells and new wells will continue. The board announced that they would draw up a proposed access agreement for the new well.

The Board of Trustees announced Christmas information including the date for their employee party and approval of the 2020 meeting dates. A final decision was made on the North Pond Excavation Bids. After President Miller announced that Aldrich had pulled his bid, the board awarded the bid to Michael Mizeur in the amount of \$135,125. All voted yes with Robert Steiner voting no.

Superintendent Gary Brown announced that brush and trees were being removed from the pond area, but due to weather had to stop their efforts. Recreational Director Bailey Hancock, reported that Kids-R-Kids held their dance on November 8<sup>th</sup> and it was a success and that she will be on Newstalk WTIM's morning show on December 2<sup>nd</sup> to share Christmas in the Park events.

The Taylorville City Council met Monday evening, and a big topic of discussion that came up from earlier discussions involved fixing a tanker for the Taylorville Fire Department along with some much needed building repairs. The tanker has an issue with the siren and has metal shavings under the pump. Taylorville Fire Chief Matt Adermann says these repairs have been needed for quite a while.

While Chief Adermann was concerned about getting the tanker fixed, he also expressed need for the Taylorville Fire House as a whole getting the repairs it needed done as well.

The tanker needs repairs not in excess of \$5,035. The Fire Station building repairs will cost a little over \$16,300 for the roof, and nearly \$3,000 for the bricks. Both measures passed unanimously.

The Taylorville Community Pleasure Driveway & Park District will meet on Monday at the Manners Park Office Board Room at a new time. The Board will meet at 3 PM at the Park Office in Manners Park. After approval of minutes and a treasurer's report, the board will discuss new business.

On the agenda are two ordinances 2019-3 and 2019-4. Ordinance 2019-3 is an Ordinance adopting smoke-free regulations on the grounds of the Taylorville Community Pleasure Driveway and Park District. Ordinance 2019-4 is an ordinance prohibiting cannabis consumption on the grounds of the Taylorville Community Pleasure Driveway and Park District.

The Ameren agreement that has been worked on will be discussed. There will be reports from Maintenance Superintendant Gary Brown along with a report from the Recreation Director Bailey Hancock.
