1 MINUTE NEWSCAST: Retail theft is becoming a huge issue in Illinois and State Senator Doris Turner is joining other officials from the Illinois Retail Merchants Association and Attorney General's office to discuss a legislative proposal that would curb organized retail crime in Illinois. Work is also being done to prevent stolen goods from being sold online, including requiring third party sellers to verify users' identity with bank account numbers and other information. Sellers who don't comply may be suspended. The House bill is 1091 and awaits consideration by the Senate.

The case went to trial and a jury returned a guilty verdict for White. The charge carries a sentencing range of 3 to 7 years. Judge Stan Brandmeyer delivered the maximum sentence after a contested sentencing hearing.

For many years, the belief was that a daily regimen of low-dose, or baby aspirin was recommended for adults as a way to keep heart attacks and strokes at bay. Aspirin also contains anti-inflammatory properties and acts as a blood thinner to prevent clots. This may be changing however. The US Preventive Services Task Force says that for a certain group, this is no longer the case. Data gathered from recent studies indicate that the risk of internal bleeding from taking an OTC drug daily outweighs the benefits for adults over 60.
