Environmentalists are concerned that grocery store shoppers will just switch their disposable bag habits. His"bag ban plan" would replace 5-cent fees in Suffolk County, Long Beach and other areas where local governments have passed fees in recent years to reduce bag waste.
	January 31, 2019	7:49-7:51am	Learn what you can do locally to help deal with the plastic pollution problem by attending the first meeting of the Plastic Reduction and Elimination Project of the North Fork today at 6:30pm at the Jamesport Meeting House. This is a new joint project of two North Fork groups.
	Feb.13, 2019	7:42-7:45am	The Southampton Town board has voted to ban plastic straws and other polystyrene products. The law will permit providing a plastic straw to a person who has a disability and requires one. The law goes into effect. On May 8 <sup>th</sup> .

	March 21, 2019	8:43-8:45am	Eastern Long Island businesses that rely on foreign workers through a federal guest worker program are facing a labor crisis this summer unless the Trump administration takes some immediate action to allow more workers to enter the country, according to Rep. Lee Zeldin and business owners. Zeldin has called for a raise on the cap of the H-2B visa program as a temporary fix for this problem.
