The easy straight forward app walks moms through not only symptoms of post partum depression but other life threatening conditions like infections and high blood pressure.

Several studies predict more expecting moms to be diagnosed with breast cancer as more women delay pregnancy later in life.

Numbers have changed a lot since the pandemic and they desperately need volunteers in their warehouse where it all starts. The warehouse is the heart and soul of the volunteer program and depends on volunteers and donations to help the growing number of people depending on them.</p>

Leander City Council voted to launch a study to evaluate Cap Metro's services, which runs not just the red line but a pick up service in town. The study will analyze Ridership, cost of withdrawing, and alternative options. Leander pays for CapMetro services through a one percent sales tax that came out to around 9 million dollars last year. Leadner voters could see the question come up on the May ballot allowing them to decide if they want to cut ties with the transit agency.
