Staying at Ronald McDonald House Charities of Memphis improves adherence to complicated treatment plans and communication with the child's medical team. The Shelby County Sheriff's Office is currently divided into two primary divisions, Law Enforcement and Jail Divisions. The Shelby County Sheriff's Office Law Enforcement Division is commanded by the Chief Deputy, who is assisted by three Assistant Chief Deputies. Bureaus within the Law Enforcement Division include Courts, Uniform Patrol, Investigative Services, and SWAT. The Shelby County Sheriff's Office Jail Division is commanded by the Chief Jailer, who is assisted by two Assistant Chief Jailers. Bureaus within the Jail Division include Jail Security and Jail Programs. Barbara Farmer-Tolbert, a detective for the General Investigative Bureau Division of the Shelby County Sheriff's Office, discusses Human Trafficking with emphasis on Sex Trafficking in the Shelby County area.

Memphis Music Initiative

The Memphis Music Initiative was started in 2014 with funding from a private Memphis foundation. The initiative was inspired by earlier work from various youth and music organizations throughout the city to use community engagement to develop arts-focused activities that build on existing resources and assets to drive youth and community outcomes. The initiative's strategic priorities and approach were defined through a five-month strategic development process which engaged low-income and communities of color throughout Memphis and local and national youth development and arts leaders to identify the assets, process, and activities important to carrying out this work successfully. The five-year, \$20 million strategy is expected to run through 2020. The initiative was designed to focus on three critical areas of work: in-school (sustain existing in-school music education and expand instruction through partnerships with local musicians); extended learning (expand high-quality out-of-school time programs to reach more youth and remove barriers to youth engagement and participation); and innovation spaces (develop places to spur innovation where youth can hear, learn and play music). The introduction of the website and other digital properties represents the formal launch of Memphis Music Initiative, but hardly the beginning of its work and impact - teaching fellows were first placed in classrooms to pilot the program in January of 2015 and some initial grants were made to a shortlist of youth development and music engagement

focused Memphis organizations this summer and earlier this fall. Deron Hall, Director of Partnerships and Operations explained the Initiative.

Heal The Hood/Hoops for the Holiday

The Heal the Hood Foundation of Memphis' purpose is to implement and find creative methods to provide educational, cultural, and social economic and community change in the city of Memphis and surrounding areas that are heavily populated by youth crime, violence, and other social deviant patterns of behaviors through multi-media science. LaDell Beamon, founder and CEO, of Heal the Hood discussed the Hoops for the Holidays weekend, charity album, literacy campaign, mentoring program and legacy project in the school system.

The Foundation bridges the generational and social-economic gaps within the community giving the disenfranchised the opportunity to develop in all areas of life

Marsha D. Johnson discussed the personal motivation to launch Foundation for Youth Development, the year-round services and activities as well as the Foundation's premier weekend event featuring an award ceremony, a basketball camp hosted by a former NBA player, and the Sunday morning service featuring a national speaker.

Porter Leath

Before 1850, widows and orphans in Shelby County, Tenn., had nowhere to turn for food, shelter, clothing and care. That meant willing and compassionate citizens had to fill the gap. Sarah Leath was one of those citizens, and as a widow and mother herself, she took the lead to organize such a place—the home that would become Porter-Leath. Since its founding, Porter-Leath has remained passionately committed to serving at-risk children and families in Memphis. While both its name and mission have evolved with changing times and events, the focus has always been to serve Memphis' most vulnerable citizens. Today Porter-Leath helps more than 10,000 low-income children and families annually with programs designed to meet their developmental, health and social needs at the earliest opportunity. Mike Warr discussed the organization, its programs and the 14th Annual Toy Truck toy drive in which WXMX is directly involved.

Vollintine - Evergreen Community Association

The Vollintine – Evergreen Community Association (VECA) is a non-profit neighborhood association founded in the 1970s to address blockbusting. Over the decades the association has become one of the

leading community associations in the City of Memphis with prime education institutions and residential communities with a strong focus on community activism and youth programs.

VECA representatives and the owner of a Mustard Seed Studio, a sewing and crafts workroom, discussed the laudable youth initiatives and community programs which foster community residents' investment in their neighborhood. The Mustard Seed Studio promoted their annual Holiday Showcase featuring local residents crafting gifts for the holiday season. A weekend of special events also showcased crafts designed by community youth at Mustard Seed Studio free workshops.

Memphis Botanic Garden serves over 40,000 school-aged children annually through <u>organized education programs</u>, offering them the opportunity to get outdoors and learn through hands-on activities and nature play. Students come from 192 area schools, including 102 Memphis public schools where 83% of the children qualify for lunch assistance programs, reaching an under-served population through our educational programs.

My Big Backyard family garden offers a place for jumping, splashing, digging, creating, and discovering the joys of time spent outdoors.

Mary Helen Butler discussed the annual Snowy Nights in My Big Backyard, Winter Break Camp and the annual Incognito Art Auction all of which benefit the Garden.

Memphis Black Arts Alliance has been celebrating & nurturing the Arts & Black Heritage since 1982. The programs are designed to offer easy and affordable access to high quality cultural instruction and arts programming which: instills pride, discipline, reflection, positive action on social issues; improves cognitive and social skills; develops talent and offers arts-related job training; encourages and promotes entrepreneurship in the arts; and, promotes harmony and appreciation of diversity within and outside the black community. The first professionally staffed, year-round, non-profit cultural center in Tennessee. LarJuanette Williams, the newly elected Executive of the Memphis Black Arts Alliance her film and theater career, her personal connection to the MBAA and her path to becoming the new Executive, its continued mission, various programs and upcoming annual holiday soiree.

Pink Palace Museum

The Pink Palace Family of Museums, a wide-ranging collection of historic, educational and technological attractions maintained by the City of Memphis, and Memphis Museums, Inc. includes the Pink Palace Museum, the CTI 3D Giant Theater, the Sharpe Planetarium, The Lichterman Nature Center and the historic Mallory-Neely and Magevney Houses and operates some of the finest attractions and exhibits in the country. The Pink Palace Museum, the Sharpe Planetarium and the CTI 3D Giant Theater are accredited members of the American Association of Museums. The Lichterman Nature Center was the first accredited nature center in the United States.

The Pink Palace Museum is one of the largest facilities of its kind in the Southeast. You can walk through a replica of the first self-service grocery store in the country, Clarence Saunders' Piggly Wiggly. Explore the cultural and natural history of the Mid-South through exciting exhibits, dioramas, and audio-visuals. Trace Memphis' development from the time of Spanish explorers through the Civil War and the yellow fever epidemics. Learn from the award-winning medical exhibit how health care grew to be Memphis' largest industry. The Museum also hosts a number of touring exhibits for you to see and experience throughout the year. Rhonda Cloud with the Pink Palace talked about the 43rd annual Enchanted Forest as well as the newly renovated Sharpe Planetarium unveiling January 30, 2016. She also discussed the upcoming event The Science of Beer in which one can learn about the science behind favorite brews through activities, mini-lectures, and talking with expert brewers.

American Red Cross Blood Drive

American Red Cross Biomedical Services plays a critical role in our nation's health care system. It is the largest single supplier of blood and blood products in the United States, collecting and processing approximately 40 percent of the blood supply and distributing it to about 2,600 hospitals and transfusion centers nationwide. The Red Cross also plays a leading role in protecting the safety of donors and patients and increasing the availability of blood. It has been among the first to help develop and implement testing for infectious diseases and is frequently the single major contributor to clinical trials to improve blood safety. Providing life-saving blood and blood products to patients is a key component of the Red Cross mission to help people in times of emergency and disasters. American Red Cross of Mid-South provides

services to Dyer, Fayette, Lake, Lauderdale, Obion, Shelby and Tipton Counties in Tennessee; De Soto and Tunica Counties in Mississippi; and Crittenden County in Arkansas.

Michelle Rupp, Regional representative for the Red Cross Blood division, talked about extreme importance of supporting blood banks in the region and pushing year-round blood drives.

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Mid-South Kwanzaa Inc.

Mid-South Kwanzaa Inc. is a non-partisan cultural organization. Mid-South Kwanzaa provides throughout the year, opportunities for involvement and cultural enlightenment are scheduled to reflect on our African past and American present. All activities are geared toward the promotion of African and African-American heritage through Kwanzaa celebrations, education, festivals, scholarships, and the arts. Osupa Moon and Frances Barnes discuss the 2016-2017 Kwanzaa cultural celebrations scheduled throughout Memphis focusing on family, community and culture.

GUESTS ON DRAKE IN THE MORNING 4TH QUARTER 2015

The top 4 Memphis mayoral candidates were each on air for 20 minutes ahead of the October 8 elections.

October 2, mayoral candidate and Army veteran Mike Williams discussed his plans and goals if elected. He noted he'll be able to return to the Police Association if not elected. "I'm running a people's campaign so it's all about the people." It's his intention to run on people's behalf especially regarding those involved in the pension issues. "We have individuals championing saving the Coliseum, helping the MAS, etc and nobody in politics is helping on those issues." On fixing crime, "We have to put Memphis first, have citizen buy-in, restore city employee benefits and health care, and invest in our youth." He wants 24-hour safety community centers for kids so "we can put kids on a ladder to success." He believes if we lower crime, educate our young people that companies will want to come here. On PILOTS, "Let's push the pause button on them; we have 400 of them. Our problem is we give them for 15 years to 30 years while most cities do it for 3-5 years. THEY have low crime rates, good transportation systems so companies want to invest and stay. WE have quality things to offer here, but our transportation, etc is horrible." He notes that when we create PILOTS the money goes back to citizens and it's not true. On the money he has raised, "My volunteers have been worth as much as what the other candidates have raised. The status quo may not like what I have to say, but they can't say it's not the truth." The fire Association has endorsed Collins, but they're "standing on corners with me too. All the candidates have alternatives." He urged listeners to at least go vote.

October 5, mayoral candidate Harold Collins discussed the race. "It's about bringing quality jobs to our city so people can have careers. I'm the only candidate that supports never cutting benefits to police and fire." On day 1 he would assemble a good team, meet with the Chamber, meet with the police director, have a discussion with the Superintendent of schools and college presidents and speak directly to the people about issues. The key to that list is to prioritize. On crime and truancy, "Our kids don't skip school because they don't want to go, rather, because they're being bullied or ignored by classmates. It's for that reason that the DA's office has provided mentors for them... to give them encouragement. Some of these kids are bullied, etc and some don't even get out of their neighborhoods." He noted what he'll be doing between now and election day Thursday. His final comment would be, "You can choose an incumbent who has made broken promises or you can choose me. I have helped balance the budget, fight for good-paying jobs, fight for good public services, and advocated for the budget."

October 6, Mayor AC Wharton discussed his campaign including his "positive mindset and wanting to do it due to unfinished business. We've brought in so much business such as Bass Pro and so much development in many areas like Foote Homes and the Convention Center, to name a few. It's a bitter pill to swallow." On the pension issues, "I would much prefer to be where we are with the pension issues than in Jackson MS where officers are being furloughed. We're going to look back in history and see somebody stand up and avoid the burdens that could have been. You learn from the past and keep moving on." Regarding the polls, "My polls say to keep working to the last minute, talk to voters, and stay confident." He noted that the mayor called in

to Ben Ferguson's show because he was shocked. He doesn't have anything to do with the schools so he shouldn't be blamed when things don't go right as Ben so questioned. On the Malone deal with TASER, the only contract he reviewed was 1 between the city and TASER noting that there are many subcontracts that he doesn't see. The only obligation they had was to use a minority business, and the timing was awful. I've expressed my displeasure with both sides. On truancy and crime, etc, "we have to work with youth on the front end, more technology, getting neighborhoods involved, etc. We don't need gun control, we need criminal control. In closing, when asked what he'll do if he wins, he said he'll "implement staff changes, find the big forward-looking issues, rally a team of getting the city energized, and make it everybody's business. Our city can't thrive until we all are going the same direction; let's keep pushing the 'manufacturing button'."

October 7, mayoral candidate Jim Strickland discussed his campaign including his feelings of doing everything he can possibly do to win. He confirms that his polls show him in a good position. "We all want the same thing: less crime, better education and clean neighborhoods. I'm the only one who is 100% behind bringing back Blue Crush. I'm the only one who talks about holding city officials accountable; his (Wharton's) CAO wasn't doing a good job but he didn't replace him for 2 years. The Animal Shelter director isn't held accountable either. Don't confuse activity with achievement", he says of the current administration. He quoted stats on poverty, crime, etc. He claims that he doesn't know who has sent the anti-Strickland mailers. "The charges (on the mailers) are so over the top that it's ridiculous and I'm not worried about it because I never said any of those things." He noted he sadly only expects about 55k people to vote tomorrow. On moving the polling places, "They decreased the number to save money at a time when we're encouraging people to go vote." His plan is to go work a poll and greet people. "You *can* track how many are voting not *how* they're voting. Today, I'm out in the community." He estimates that we'll know a close estimate of the outcome by 8pm tomorrow and a total by 10.

November 17, Southaven **Mayor Darren Musselwhite** discussed his first 2+ years in office and all of its changes and growth including Tanger Mall, etc. Traffic will be a big issue with major MDOT improvements in the Church Rd / I-55 area, and his office has a short-term plan which he shared. Two North / South corridors will help and Swinnea and Elmore will be improved to alleviate future congestion. Long term plans are under design now with MDOT as well. The estimate is 12,000 cars per day for opening weekend at Tanger Mall. There is currently a \$9.5 million program in place regarding synchronizing the traffic lights on Goodman Rd. "In MDOT's defense, you just don't know how fast the area is going to grow."

December 15, exiting Mayor AC Wharton stopped by for a wrap-up and a look at his future. He told a story about his time in law school at Ole Miss and finding a framed picture behind a couch that hadn't been moved in 20 years in his basement apartment. The picture noted not to take one's self too seriously. He DOES take this city's issues seriously and notes he's most proud of the way people now feel about the city having gone from being the butt of every negative joke to the up-and-coming city it is today. He alluded to all the new development along the river, the addition of the Greenline, etc. The one plan that hadn't gotten under control under his administration is the issue of reducing poverty, but he did note that under his administration he has "brought some into prosperity." In looking ahead, "If you don't get the finances right, all the green spaces and

improvements to the city won't prosper. Our only hope in improving the economy is to increase property taxes and enhance property values." He noted that of many big city mayors, his is 1 of the phone numbers that's actually listed. "You can't have impact without contact." His future plans are to be determined, but he would like to do something to impact public parks and similar spaces. "If we don't get it right in our cities, we ain't going to get it right in our nation."

December 16, mayor-elect Jim Strickland talked about his future and plans, etc. On changes under his administration he said that in the past, the CAO was just under the mayor and all the administration under the CAO. His structure will have the heads of the "Big 6" departments reporting directly to him. The COO, former military man, Doug McGowan will have the largest number of departments reporting to him. He described his attributes and noted that he's already delving into 911 problems, aspects of the "gun down" program, etc. The MPD and MFD aren't unequal but police will report directly to him. On finding a new Police Director after Armstrong, an outside agency will do the search and Toney will stay on in the process. He nominated a new fire chief and is hopeful the council will vote her in. Regarding the new council members' relationships with the former, "It's like a honeymoon but hopefully after all the grading on each other, we'll work together easily. People just don't need to take things personally." He went to yesterday's council meeting and noted that local government is the most accessible. Some of the new council members were there and are very willing to be accessible. On duplication, "If we want good people in office, we're going to have to pay them more. To recruit police and fire, we have to pay them more." He explained the 2 kinds of positions there are: civil service and appointed positions. "Every attorney and library person is appointed; they ought to be civil service." He has a 100-day plan, and plans on meeting the Big 6 in the coming days. He discussed hiring Ursula Madden and Kyle Veazey as Director of the communications office and Deputy Director, respectively. Their duties are to communicate not only with the people but the media and everybody internally who works for the city. Starting Jan 1, a raise will be put into effect. "I don't want to raise taxes, but we have to grow the number of tax payers, therefore fixing infrastructure." He'll have access to a study that was done by Wharton comparing the pay packages of sister cities like Nashville, Birmingham and Louisville.

Wednesdays except November 25 and December 23 and 30, Shea Flinn, SVP of the Chairman's Circle of the Memphis Chamber, talked about topical issues and local issues pertinent to Memphis including the mayor's race, the Chamber's Moon Missions, fighting blight, the current MPD Chief, Toney Armstrong stepping down, the Grand Jury's decision not to indict the police officer in the Darrius Stewart case, MLGW water tax hike, and Wanda Halbert's lawsuit challenging the results of the court clerk in her defeat by Kay Robilio, the water water tax hikes proposed by Memphis Light Gas and Water, the Paris attacks, the Tennessee legislature and Presidential debates.
