On June 19th, 1972, the first hurricane of the season, Agnes, crossed over the Florida Panhandle and quickly headed back out to sea. With sustained winds of just over 75 miles per hour, Agnes was considered a low level threat by most weather experts. They were wrong.

By June 22nd, the remnants of Agnes stalled over the northeastern United States, dumping up to 22 inches of rain in some areas, including the Elmira/Corning region of New York. The devastating flooding that followed would result in one of the worst natural disasters in the region's history and change the landscape of the region forever.

Agnes is a one-hour documentary from award-winning filmmaker Brian Frey. Frey also produced Johnson, Watson, The Flood of '35, Link: The Quiet Genius, The Dusts and The Twilight Zone LIVE.

Utilizing archival photos and film footage, Agnes tells the incredible history of the region and the story of a natural disaster that forever altered the area's destiny.

But they share something else, too: Both had ancestors who were early opponents of slavery. Bacon's Quaker ancestors repudiated slavery long before the rest of the country, in 1780. And Sedgwick's ancestor Theodore Sedgwick argued the freedom case of Elizabeth Freeman, also known as "Mumbet," in 1781 - which helped bring an end to slavery in Massachusetts. These facts - and many others - are revealed to Sedgwick and Bacon in this episode, revealing quite a bit about slavery in the North in the process.

Since the death of Osama bin Laden, Yemen has become the hottest front in the war against Al Qaeda. Now, with headlines about a terrorist plot to bomb a U.S.-bound airliner, award-winning reporter and FRONTLINE correspondent Ghaith Abdul-Ahad travels into the heart of Yemen's radical heartland. His first hand report shows how members of Al Qaeda in the Arabian Peninsula (AQAP) have taken advantage of turmoil in the country to impose their rule on areas of south Yemen. Explore woven textiles and story quilts by artists Faith Ringgold of Harlem, Randall Darwall of Cape Cod, Consuelo Jimenez Underwood in California and Terese Agnew in Wisconsin.

Faith Ringgold is an internationally celebrated artist, teacher, author and founding member of the National Black Feminist Organization. She creates painted "story quilts," many which highlight the master artists of Harlem, where she grew up and taught for many years.

Weaver Randall Darwall says, "Why use five colors when fifty will do nicely?" He created a cottage industry on Cape Cod where he and his partner, Brian Murphy, collaborate and employ a community of artisans to craft textiles that explore color, landscape and the beauty of hand-dyed weaving.

San Jose State University professor emeritus Consuelo Jimenez Underwood's story began in the fields of California, where as a child, she was a migrant farm worker. Her artwork is now in the Smithsonian. "Indigenous women throughout the world know this medium - the thread. And the best thing about this art form is that you don't need industry. You can do it with four sticks tied to your back. When I weave, I keep the ancient traditions alive."

Terese Agnew caused a national stir with her quilt, Portrait of a Textile Worker, depicting a young sweatshop employee, which she created by stitching together more than 30,000 designer clothing labels. She quotes Leon Golub who said, "As artists, we're in the consciousness raising industry." Portrait of a Textile Worker is the story of inspiration, community, social action and the dedication of a singular artist.
