Sunday, January 7, 2018 – Repeat of Show That aired 12/17/2017 9:00 – 9:30 A.M. and 4-4:30 P.M. Tim Lennox, Host

Topic: Habitat for Humanity

Guest: Nick Mielke, Executive Director, Habitat for Humanity

Mr. Mielke talked about the Habitat For Humanity's ReStore, and told the viewers what it is, and what it does. They accept donations from individuals as well as from corporate and local businesses. He talked about their housing program - what it is, the misconception about the program, who can apply, and what the requirements are, etc. Contrary to what most people believe the houses are not given away for free. Those getting the houses must put is 400 hours of sweat equity and well as obtain a mortgage for the home. Habitat provides financial education classes (they do not want to get stuck with the mortgage), homeowners classes, and teach them how to manage and maintain their homes. They establish a relationship with the people getting the homes, and stays in touch with them to make sure things are going well for them. they don't give them money for any upkeep or repairs on the houses, but often recommend plumbers, roofers, and others who they have used, and know that they are seasonable. They are currently remodeling 2 donor houses that have been donated to Habitat, will have applications opening up during the first of the year for future homes. Mr. Mielke said Children of parents who have gotten homes usually apply for Habitat homes as well.

Topic: Family Sunshine Center, Sexual Harassment Program Guest: Robert Pasley, Sexual Assault Program Coordinator, FSC

Mr. Pasley talked about the Sunshine Center's newest client service, Sexual Assault Counseling and Emotional Support. This is a very hot topic in the National news, and Mr. Pasley said he didn't want to focus on any specific case, but came on to highlight their sexual assault services and address the importance of getting help. He discussed the importance of sexual assault counseling and talked about sexual assault services offered at the Sunshine Center. He also talked about other services that the center offers. He told Tim that they choose to believe a person who tells them that they have been sexually harassed because they need to be helped. It doesn't matter if it was 20 minutes ago, or 20 years ago, they need help. He said you can't question why people don't come forward when it happens because there are so many reasons why. People can receive individual

counseling from The Center for up to 26 sessions, or longer. They also offer counseling to relatives of those who have been abused. Their "Cares" program provides counseling for children, and he told Tim about their Shelter and education programs. He gave their website address and emergency phone number for those needing help.

Reverend Handy and Ms. Gilmer came on today to talk about the Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Birthday Celebration on tomorrow, Monday, January 15th at Dexter Avenue King Memorial Baptist Church. There will be a worship celebration, guest speakers, and the Annual Parade will follow. Ms. Gilmer talked about the parade, and the party that will be held to celebrate Dr. King's Birthday. Cake and ice cream will be served, and Blue Bell will provide the ice cream for those attending. Tim and Dr. Handy discussed the statue of Dr. King that the church has been trying to get for some time. For the past few years they have been in the process of raising money for the statue. Dr. Handy shared some good news on the progress of the stature. Guest: Nancy Fitzpatrick, Executive Director, Mid Alabama Coalition for the

Homeless

Ms. Fitzpatrick came on today to inform the viewers about the homeless in Montgomery and to tell them how they can help. The Mid Alabama Coalition for the Homeless is continuing to ask the public for blankets beyond the recent blanket drive. Because of the severe cold weather that we have had recently, they need more blankets. She also told the viewers about the annual count of the homeless that is coming up, and how it is conducted. The Mid Alabama Coalition for the Homeless had a few points to offer the public on a great way to help the homeless they encounter, etc. s. Fitzpatrick stressed the importance of being kind to the homeless that someone may encounter. Because the homeless usually doesn't have transportation, she also suggested calling them or some other agency that will go out and talk to and help those in need, instead of telling the person to go to this place or that place. Besides blankets they would be grateful for toiletries, socks, gloves, caps, etc.

Topic: Staying Healthy in 2018

Guest: Lita Chatham, Nutritionist and Physical Activity Division, ADPH

Ms. Chatham shared a wealth of knowledge with the viewers about staying active and healthy during the New Year. The first thing she discussed was don't drink your calories. There are a lot of empty calories in soda and other sweetened drinks, and she advised against drinking them. Water is much better, and does not have any calories. She told the viewers to make small changes that will add up to big improvements in their health. She said to always get your nutrition information from a credentialed expert such as a Registered Dietitian. She also discussed obesity/diabetes rates and the impact they have on our health. She told the viewers about the statewide health efforts and campaigns — Scaleback Alabama, Vending, OFT, Get Moving Alabama, etc. Each year, participants win money in the Scale Back Alabama challenge by losing the most weight of those in the competition, so this is a win/win competition. An Intern that came along with Ms. Chatham gave some healthful, nutritional tips for those watching.

Topic: Black History Month Guest: Richard Bailey, Historian

Naturally Dr. Richard Bailey was booked as our first guest for the first show during Black History month. Dr. Bailey is very knowledgeable about Black History, and history in general. He is an Alabama historian, and a frequent lecturer and consultant on black history. He is also the author of two books on Black History, "They Too Call Alabama Home, African American Profiles 1800-1999', and Neither Carpetbagger Nor Scalawags: Black officeholders during the Reconstruction of Alabama 1867-1878. He talked about the Civil Rights Movement, as well as the Civil War, the protests during the 1960, the fight for the right to vote, and some events and ways of life buried in history that caused these movements. Dr. Bailey said that he cannot just discuss one side of a movement, period, or time . . . both or all sides have to be addressed to come to the right conclusion. We are where we are today because of past events, good and bad, and all of them combined make us who we are, what we are, and where we are today. He said that it is important for everyone, every race, to know their history, not just African Americans. Everyone needs to know where they came from and what part their ancestors played in our history. He said that we should study the history of others as well.

Topic: NAACP

Guest: Benard Simelton, President, State NAACP

Mr. Simelton talked about the NAACP in general and its work in Alabama and around the country. He discussed the very successful role the NAACP played in the Get Out the Vote effort during the special Senate election in 2017 that Roy Moore eventually lost to a Democrat. He told about the relevance of the NAACP in 2018, and getting millennials involved in the NAACP and other civil rights groups. He and Tim talked about our flawed criminal Justice system, and how it remains the same year after year. He said President Trump's racist "S...hole Nations" and other racist remarks goes to show what kind of person he is. They discussed why people support this and it really shows the hearts of those that go along with this. Mr. Simelton and Tim touched on the Dreamers/DACA issue and what it will do to those who were brought here as children and their families, and the University of Alabama students using the "N" word that went viral. He said that it's sad to see that as much as things have changed, some things remain the same. There should never be a place for hate.

Topic: Mt. Zion A.M.E. Zion Church Annex Guests: Charles P. Everett, IV, Church Historian

Georgette Norman, Consultant and Project Historian

Mr. Everette and Ms. Norman discussed Mt. Zion A.M.E. Zion Church, and the historical events that took place there during the Montgomery Bus Boycott, the Civil rights Movement, The Montgomery - Selma, March, etc. The Montgomery Improvement Association elected Martin Luther King, Jr. to lead the movement at Mt. Zion A.M.E. Zion Church. Mr. Everett and Ms. Norman came on today's show to tell the viewers all about the church's place in history, and how they have been trying to restore the old Mt. Zion Church which is now called the Mount Zion A.M.E. Zion Church Memorial Annex. They discussed why it was selected to be a member of the Alabama African American Civil Rights Heritage Sites Consortium . . . explained the benefits of being a member of the Consortium, and how the Annex will benefit from being on the World Monuments Watch Fund List. Ms. Normal went on to explain what the World Monuments Watch is and why it is significant for these Alabama Civil Rights sites. She discussed the goal of the Consortium, and told the viewers why these particular sited were selected.

Topic: American Heart Month/Red Dress Dash/Go Red

Because it is Heart Month, Ms. Williams visited us again to talk about the annual fund raising events that help support the American Heart Association. The Red Dress Dash is a 5K run/walk to "dash" the myths about the No 1 killer of women which is heart disease. Heart disease is the No. 1 killer of all Americans, and is particularly devastating for women – causing 1 in 3 deaths each year. That is more than all cancers combined, yet 55% of women don't know that heart disease is their No. 1 killer. All proceeds from the "dash" go to the American Heart Association's Go Red For Women Campaign, a National movement to end heart disease and stroke in women. Everyone is asked to wear their best red outfit during the dash. The event is free to attend, and everyone is welcome and can bring their pets. Pets dressed in red will be entered in a raffle to win a prize. The American Heart Association funds millions of dollars in cutting-edge research in Alabama. Heart disease and stroke are the No, 1 and No, 5 killers of Alabamians and Alabama has the 4th highest rate of cardiovascular deaths in the nation. Through the Heart Association's education programs, 2,920 lives are saved in Alabama each year. The Dash will be held on February 24 at the Baptist Health East Campus. Festivities begin at 7:30 A.M. with the race starting at 8:30.

History

Mr. Murry and Tim discussed the museum and all that it has to offer and inform the public. The state's history is in this museum, and answers to any questions that you might have about events in the state can be found here. They talked about Alabama's Bicentennial Celebration and events and exhibits (old and new) at the museum. Mr. Murray also told Tim about the ongoing "Food For "Thought lunch time Lecture series, Friends of The Archives Student Fellowships, Alabama History Education Materials, and internships at the Museum. There are special exhibits during Black History month each year, and Mr. Murray said that they are happy to have Dr. Richard Bailey, Historian, to make a presentation there this month to discuss Alabama's first Congressional Reconstruction Legislature which represented the new Republican Party and included the state's first African American office holders. Mr. Murray told the viewers about the Museum's EBSCO Research Room that is open Tuesday through Friday and the 2nd Saturday in the month from 8:30 A.M.-4:30 P.M. The Museum is open Monday – Saturday from 8:30 A.M. – 4:30 P.M.

Ms. Zaid wanted to give the audience the best experience and the best information that she could, so she kept things simple when telling them about Islam and her life in Montgomery. She explained what Islam means, and told Tim about their tenants of faith. People are curious about women's role in Islam, and the Hijab (headscarf) so she explained their beliefs on this as well. They talked about culture vs religion, and she spoke of misconceptions that Islam = terrorism or anti-American sentiments. Tim asked her about the EMIS Mosque project – when will it be completed, the obstacles they faced when they first decided to build it; and how they overcame those obstacles by getting with community leaders and deciding what would work best for the Mosque and the Community. In most cases, communication is all that is needed to come to an agreement. Ms. Zaid loves Montgomery, and she was invited to come back at any time to share any information that she would like to with the River Region.

Dr. Feltmate is Co-Editor, Journal of Religion and Popular Culture. He came on today to discuss religion. He and Tim talked about Alabama being a state with virtually one religion . . . and almost one denomination (Baptist). They also discussed other religions in the State and what their beliefs are. They talked about the largest religions in the world (Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, etc.). He and Dr. Feltmate also talked about whether there has been a shift in membership in recent years. Tim asked Dr. Feltmate why he thought most churches not only in Alabama, but Nationwide are still segregated. He thinks more than color, it's just different styles of worship that are preferred. Dr. Feltmate also told Tim about his classes at AUM and what some of the young people think.

On a brighter side, Tim also had her give him her picks for winners at tonight's Oscars telecast.

Guest: MSgt. Mia Davis, 187th Fighter Wing

MSgt. Davis visited the station to advertise their recruiting initiative, promote the passing of Gov. Ivey's new ill to allow Alabama residents go to school up to a Doctorates Degree for free and of course to tell us about the experience of serving. The 187th Fighter Wing was one of 5 Air National Guard Unites to be selected for the F-35 Jet Program to replace the aging F-16. This ensures a future for the unit and around 1,000 jobs in the Montgomery area. All of their training translates into civilian college credit hours. When they return from training, they will have almost half of an Associate's Degree complete before even sitting in a college classroom. MSgt talked about the opportunities to travel and see the world as they continuously support the mission outside the Continental U.S.

This is Mr. Forrister's 27th year as Executive Director of Alabama Arise. He and Tim discussed a piece of legislation requiring Medicaid recipients to work. He is opposed to this as most of those on Medicaid are children, the elderly, pregnant moms, and the disabled. The only able bodied left are those that stay (around 70,000) home to take care of children. If they work and make more than \$75 a week, they won't be eligible for Medicaid; a 10 hour work week will make you ineligible. He has discussed this with legislators but they have the mentality that all people should work, regardless. His biggest concern right now is Pay Day lending, and how difficult it is for borrowers to pay back loans in 10 days. Companies make huge profits on these loans. 5 out of 6 borrowers are able to pay the loan back in 90 days. They are not allowed to make partial payments - it has to be paid in full. Several Federal credit unions across the State are offering competing products with reasonable interest rates with none of the traps. Alabama's Senate passed Senate Bill 138, the Pay Day Loan bill that is now being considered in the House. Alabama Arise is working on poverty issues at the Legislature. They have 150 member congregations and groups and approximately 1,300 individuals who are paid members. Are we a poorer state than we have been? Mr. Forrister said the poverty rate has been higher at times when the economy wasn't so good. But the rich get richer, and the poor get poorer. Half of the people below half of the poverty line, the people living below the poverty line, those living on less than minimum wage, who only have a half-time minimum wage job are becoming more of a phenomenon. Poverty can be generational, but if your parents went to college, you are not as likely to wind up in poverty.

North Korean Leader, Kim Jong-Un 9:00-10:00 P.M.

As North Korea and the United States escalate dangerous rhetoric and nuclear threats, experts and citizens are on edge trying to anticipate what may happen next. At the center of it all is supreme leader Kim Jong-un and his fractured family. Now, nearly one year after his half-brother, Kim Jong-nam, was assassinated in a Malaysian airport, "20/20" documents the 70-year rule of North Korea's first family and the cracks within the dynasty. Correspondent Bob Woodruff reports.

Friday, January 19, 2018 California Child Abuse 9:00-10:00 P.M.

This week a story made national headlines when, according to authorities, 13 siblings were found captive inside a California home. "20/20" has the latest reporting on what life was like inside what authorities are characterizing as a house of horrors and on parents, David and Louise Turpin, who were arrested on charges of torture and child endangerment. The hour details the severe child abuse the children were allegedly subjected to including beatings and strangulation, and features information from those who knew the family. It also explores the question of whether warning signs were missed that could have alerted authorities far earlier to the alleged abuse.

Friday, January 26, 2018 Survivors 9:00-10:00 P.M.

The gymnastics sexual abuse scandal that rocked the world, and included accusations by Olympic gymnasts Aly Raisman, McKayla Maroney and Gabby Douglas, continues to dominate national headlines as an astounding 156 women have testified against ex-USA Gymnastics doctor Larry Nassar since last week. On the heels of these emotional impact statements detailing over two decades of abuse they say was inflicted by him, Anchor Elizabeth Vargas interviews survivors who open up about their dreams of gymnastic glory, their harrowing stories of abuse by Nassar, why they decided to come forward, what the future holds for them and questions who failed to protect them from the abuse.
