Topic: Maxwell Air Force base Centennial Celebration 2018

Guests: Col. Eric Shafa, Maxwell AFB Commander

Dr. Robert Kane, Air University Historian

Tim welcomed Colonel Shafa, Maxwell's Air Force Base Commander. Colonel Shafa told the viewers about the upcoming Centennial celebration, and gave a brief history of the special relationship that Maxwell has with the River Region communities. They talked about the support local communities have shown Maxwell and Gunter Airmen over the years, and highlighted the planned on and off base centennial celebration events, especially those open to the public (Biscuits' centennial-themed game on April 6, the city of Montgomery and Montgomery County sponsored Centennial Bash block party at Riverfront Park on April 7 and a 5K run/1-mile walk on Gunter Annex in June). They talked about the Air War College, and local families that welcome and support the Airmen and their families that come to the city to study and train at the college. The Base's economic impact on the community was also discussed. Tim asked about the upcoming Annual Gathering of the Eagles event that's coming up in late May.

Topic: Charter Schools, AEA Lawsuit

Guests: Theron Stokes, AEA Associate Executive Director

Mr. Stokes discussed the lawsuit that the Alabama Education Association and two of its members filed in Montgomery County Circuit Court that challenges the decision of the Alabama Public Charter School Commission to authorize LEAD Academy. He discussed reasons why this should not have been authorized, saying many things were done wrong – less than a majority of the Commission voted to authorize the school; The Commission did not include a member of the Montgomery Board of Education in the process; and LEAD Academy's application did not meet the criteria set out in the law that authorizes charter schools. He said LEAD's own expert said the application was deficient in several areas (education plan, facilities plan, and financing) and should have been rejected. Mr. Stokes also discussed the proposed closing and selling of Georgia Washington Junior High School.

Topic: “Colored Waiting Room – Empowering The Original and New Civil Rights Movements”

Guests: Kevin Shird, Author
Nelson Maulden, Martin Luther King, Jr.’s Barber

Tim and Mr. Shird talked about his book, how he came about writing it and the impact it has on young people growing up today. Mr. Shird met Mr. Maulden “by chance”, and they hit it off immediately. After a very long conversation, Mr. Shird decided to put Mr. Maulden’s experiences with Dr. King in print. Mr. Maulden, was a resident of Montgomery during the Civil Rights movement, and told Tim how he became Dr. Martin Luther King’s barber. He remembers the first day Dr. King entered Maulden’s Barbershop, and the impact he had on him. He shared some of the Civil Rights movements that were happening during that time, and compared them to modern day events. Mr. Shird’s conversations with Mr. Maulden are detailed in the book that is about a modern day activist, and a second-wave civil rights movement that is unfolding. Mr. Shird said we have to embrace the lessons of the past to effect change that is going to last. They discussed Black Lives Matter, police shootings of unarmed black men, and Tim even shared some of his experiences with young black men of today who told him that Jay-Z has made a bigger impact on the world than Dr. Martin Luther King. Both Mr. Shird and Mr. Maulden said their thinking shows a lack of education, especially about past events.

It's time once again for the Annual Joy To Life Walk, and Joy and Dickie came on today's show to talk about their foundation, and how they serve not only the county but the State of Alabama. The walk is their main fundraiser of the year, and they promise that the one held this year will be one of their best ever! They told Tim how the Foundation, and the walk has grown, and how far they have come from the first walk that they held. They provide mammograms, pap smears, screenings, and other tests for those in the area/state that cannot afford them. They refer to them as the underserved. For many, if the Foundation didn't pay for the services they wouldn't be able to afford them. Joy told Tim how the Foundation partners with the State Health Department, hospitals, and clinics in the area. She discussed how much was raised during the first walk, and the total from last year. She also discussed their magazine, and the Pink Garbage Can campaign, and how it got started. She also discussed how many mammograms were scheduled during the year, and how many came back positive for cancer. Their services benefit men as well as women. This year's walk will be held on April 21, 2018.

Topic: 50th Anniversary of the Integration of the Montgomery City-County Library
Guest: Juanita Owes, Library Director; and Dr. Howard Robinson, ASU Center For Civil Rights and African-American Culture

Mrs. Owes and Dr. Robinson came on today to talk about the early years at the libraries. Mrs. Owes remember going to the library when she was a child and how different the experience for children is now than it was years ago. The Montgomery City-County Public Library is honoring Alabama's Bicentennial and the 50th anniversary of the integration of its downtown branch. They will host a panel discussion on the desegregation of public libraries in the south on May 3, from 6-8 P.M., at the Juliette Hampton Morgan Memorial Library on High Street. Dr. Robinson said the panel will explore the non-violent protest demonstrations and legal efforts to desegregate public libraries in Alabama and across the Southeast. The focus will be on the case of Cobb v. Montgomery Library Board which ended "separate but equal" libraries in Montgomery in 1962. Mr. Robert L. Cobb, the lead plaintiff in the case was one of the first African-Americans to be issued a library card to be used at the downtown branch. The library is asking community members who participated or had family members that participated in sit-in or other demonstrations to desegregate public libraries in Alabama to share their stories at the event.

Ann told the viewers that the Alabama Organ Center is the federally designated organ procurement organization for the state of Alabama. They serve as the link between the donor (and their families) and the recipients of the gifts. She also told the viewers how to register to be an organ, eye and tissue donor. Most register at the DMV, but people can also register online through their website or by completing a form and submitting it to the Alabama Organ Center. She said that they encourage people to have conversations with their families about their donation wishes, which can be very impactful and give the family confidence in the donation decision. She explained how donations work. Everything is done to save the life of the individual, but when those efforts are not successful the Alabama Organ Center is called. They screen every hospital death for donation opportunities and approach families about donation and discuss their options. They then coordinate the donation process and after the donation is complete they follow up with the family so they know the outcome of their generosity and how the recipients are doing. The Gift of Life's 2nd Annual Conference will be held on April 27 from 7:30 A.M. – Noon at the AUM School of Nursing. The mini conference is designed to provide education to area health professionals on important issues health professionals are grappling with like the state and nation's current opioid crisis. Topics will include important trends on sexually transmitted infections in Alabama, prenatal stress and its impact on the mother and a child's development and neonatal abstinence syndrome and what happens when a baby is exposed to drugs in the womb before birth. Alabama has the second highest rate for new gonorrhea infections in the United States trailing only Louisiana. The state has the 3rd highest rate for new chlamydia infections in the United States trailing Alaska and Louisiana. There are persons living with HIV in every county in Alabama. In 2016 there were 343 opioid-related overdose deaths in Alabama, and cases of infants born addicted to drugs increased from 170 in 2010 to 345 in 2013. CEUs (educational credits) will be available for nurses and social work professionals who attend the mini conference.

Ms. Whatley said the new Medicare cards are now being issued all over the country. She told Tim why the cards are being changed, and what recipients need to do when their new cards are received. She also discussed should old cards be kept or can both be used, and will Medicare or Social Security call the beneficiaries. The new cards have your name, the new Medicare number, and the dates that Medicare Part A and Medicare Part B coverage started. It doesn't have your signature, social security number, or gender. Only the Medicare Card and Number are changing. She said to start using your new cards as soon as they are received, and beginning January 1, 2020 only the new card and number can be used. Medicare started mailing new cards in April, 2018, and everyone who had Medicare before this date will get a new card with instructions in the mail. She said that mailing the cards will take several months, and your card might arrive at a different time than your friend's or neighbor's. If you retired from a railroad, the Railroad Retirement Board will mail your new card. Ms. Whatley also discussed how to protect yourself and Medicare from fraud.

Topic: HBCs/The Alabama Historical Commission

The Alabama Historical Commission is focusing on Historical Black College Universities during "Presentation Month. Alabama saw the development of nine historically Black Colleges and Universities between 1867 and 1922. The oldest HBCC in Alabama is Talladega College that was founded in 1867. The oldest publicly funded HBCU in the state is Alabama State University which was founded in Marion by 9 former slaves, and the campus moved to Montgomery in 1887. ASU and Alabama A&M Universities were the subjects of a court case filed by alumni regarding the systematic practice of discrimination in funding the HBCUs by the State of Alabama. The case Knight v. Alabama was recently settled after 20 years and provided funding for significant upgrades to the campuses including new fields of study, classroom buildings, dormitories and a new stadium at ASU. All of the state's 9 HBCUs have interesting facts or buildings on the campus which makes them unique within the history of the state. Dr. Robinson and Mrs. Walker discussed the facts and buildings on these 9 campuses. Ms. Walker also discussed the Freedom Rides Museum that used to be the old Greyhound Bus Station. It's where In 1961 groups of volunteers made history by challenging the practice of segregated travel through the South. They called themselves Freedom Riders as they crossed racial barriers in depots and onboard buses. The

Topic: Old St. Margaret's Hospital

Guests: Margaret Gunter, Former Director of Communications, St. Margaret's Hospital

William Abernathy, MD, Physician, St. Margaret's Hospital

Mrs. Gunter and Dr. Abernathy, both former employees of St. Margaret's Hospital when it existed, visited with us on today to talk about a reunion for the Hospital. The hospital was built in 1902, and for many years served Montgomery and many citizens across Central Alabama. For a period of time, it was known as Montgomery's Heart Hospital, and many people, including Mrs. Gunter were born there. In 1989, the hospital was sold by the Catholic order to Humana, Inc., then to Baptist healthcare, and a little over a decade later permanently closed the doors, selling the facility to the state. Mrs. Horton and Dr. Abernathy talked about the hospital during its "glory" days, as well as when the tide started to turn against the grand old institution. Because it was located in a residential area, the hospital itself, and the employees were a normal part of the neighborhood. People didn't have to travel far to see doctors, have babies, or check into the hospital. For 75 years St. Margaret's was the premier hospital of Montgomery. It was expertly run by the Daughters of Charity of Indianapolis. In 1980 the Sisters expended \$25 million to save their hospital, but location and charity overload doom their effort. A St. Margaret Reunion will be held in Montgomery on October 26 and 27. Topic: Tourism

Guest: Rick Harmon, Publications Director, Alabama Tourism Department

Tim and Mr. Harmon discussed tourism and its economic impact on the state last year. The Alabama travel industry grew by \$1 billion in economic impact, increasing from about 13.3 billion to \$14.3 billion in economic impact on the state last year. The state had an additional 810,000 visitors to top 26 million guests for the first time. Alabama is seeing new, major attractions everywhere from North Alabama to the Gulf Coast. Last year, OWA the biggest amusement park on the Gulf, opened. This year renovations to Gulf State Park, which will be completed near the end of the year, will include a new lodge, expanded walking and biking trails, restored sand dunes and an interpretive center and learning campus that will help visitors study and understand Gulf ecosystems. In Huntsville the newly renovated Constitution Village has opened in time for our upcoming bicentennial, and Alabama's top paid tourist attraction, the U.S. Space and Rocket Center, plans to open a state-of-the-art planetarium in 2019 and have a huge 50th anniversary celebration of Huntsville's role of putting the first man on the moon. The Cook Museum of Natural Science is scheduled to open in Decatur next year. Montgomery didn't do as well as some of the other major cities in Alabama last year, but has turned that around this year and is poised to have an incredible 2018. Montgomery already received a \$20-25 million economic impact from the opening of the Equal Justice Initiative's National Memorial for Peace and Justice and its Legacy Museum, and the city is projecting an increase of more than 300,000 tourists this year.

Topic: Alabama State Parks

Guest: Greg Lein, Director, Alabama State Parks

Like tourism, Alabama's State Parks make a huge economic impact on the state's economy. Mr. Lein discussed the state's 22 parks and gave viewers plenty of "get-away" and vacation ideas. He discussed the three major resort park facilities and what they are capable of. He said similar (but smaller) opportunities are offered at two other state parks. He said 20 of the 22 parks offer more than 2,500 modern campsites, cabins, and related amenities. 16 of the 22 parks offer public access to waterways that host boating, fishing, water skiing, wildlife viewing, and other opportunities. There are trails that accommodate biking, horseback riding, hiking and backpacking, running, and walking. Caves are at two parks; golf courses are offered at six. The State Park system has a consistent visitation rate of 4 to 5 million customers each year, and has been recognized as being one of the most efficient in the nation. 80-90% of annual funding comes from customer fees, not taxes.

Topic: Family Promise

Guest: Jayme Teague, Director

Family Promise is a program that networks with 14 area churches to house homeless families. The families rotate through the churches for a week at a time, and typically, the host churches house the guests for one week each quarter. Family Promise is more than a shelter – they offer shelter, meals, transportation, job search assistance, stability planning and support through extensive case management. Ms. Teague said they are unique as they can offer shelter to people and their pets. Through a partnership with PetSmart, they opened a pet room in 2014 to shelter the four-legged family members that would otherwise be displaced when families come to them. Recently they've been partnering with the Wellness Coalition through the *REACH* Initiative to offer a more holistic approach in their case management. This allows them to help families without healthcare access or little to no insurance. She said that building a network with companies and other agencies allows them to offer more support to their families that are transitioning from homelessness to stability.

Topic: The Wellness Coalition

Guest: Molly Stone, Director, Wellness Coalition

Eileen Knott, Community Liaison

The Wellness Coalition works to help people get the healthcare they need through community-wide collaboration, services, and education. The Coalition targets its programs to uninsured or underinsured adults. The signature program is its Wellness Case Management. Four Wellness Navigators work with clients to help them connect with a primary care provider, assist with health insurance enrollment, help clients apply for free or low-cost medications, and provide individualized chronic disease self-management education. They also offer sessions of the chronic Disease Self-Management Program at a wide range of sites around the River region. *REACH* – Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health is a part of the Wellness Coalition's *REACH* initiative, which is funded by a cooperative agreement from the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention. Family Promise of Montgomery just recently joined the network. Since their CHW training, Family Promise's intake process now includes questions related to healthcare access needs. Ms. Stone said that existing healthcare resources don't always make their way to the people who need them. With Community Health workers closing that gap, they have now found a way to expand their reach throughout the River Region. Visit thewellnesscoalition.org for more information.
