Five important ways to reduce risks for infant mortality were highlighted.

Ms. Pierre focused on Montgomery Housing Authority's redevelopment activities . . . what they have completed, what they are working on . . . and future plans. She told Tim applicants must meet a number of requirements – they have to be on the program's waiting list, meet income limits specified by HUD, pass a criminal background screening, and not owe Montgomery's Housing Authority, or any other housing authority. She and Tim talked about homeownership opportunities, and how they help first time buyers with monthly mortgage payments. The Housing Authority owns eight public housing properties in Montgomery, and serve over 1,400 families. They also talked about Section 8; their Housing Choice Voucher Program, and assistance to the elderly and disabled.

Guest: Carol Potok, Executive Director, Aid To Inmate Mothers

AIM is a non-profit organization that holds families together by providing visitation with children during the difficult years of incarceration. Ms. Potok came on today to discuss their annual fundraiser, and how it will benefit AIM. She told Tim about visits the children make to prisons to see their mothers, how it affects the children, and the joy it brings to their mothers. The children never see their Moms behind bars or with restraints on. It is a nice and pleasant setting where everyone can relax and enjoy each other. She talked about tapes that are made of mothers reading stories to their children, and why this is so important to the Mom and the child. She also had some success stories of children who are graduation from high school and who have visited their mothers regularly over the years. She told of other ways that AIM assists incarcerated moms, and what they do to help them once they are released from prison. This year's event, "Pour and Paint" will be held on October 23rd from 6-8 P.M. at the Unitarian Fellowship of Montgomery. Art instructors will be on hand to assist anyone who wants to create their own art piece (while drinking wine, of course). Tickets are \$25. Guest: Nathan Cook, Executive Director, Lighthouse Counseling Center Jonathan Yarboro, Board of Directors, Lighthouse Counseling Center

Today's guests promoted their latest fundraiser that will benefit the Lighthouse Counseling Center that is a non-profit organization. It is the "Last Man Standing" event that will be held on October 29. Tickets are \$100 each and can be purchased at the Counseling Center or from any member of the Lighthouse Counseling Center's Board. The doors will open at 5:30, dinner for two will be from 6-7 P.M., and the drawing will start at 7 P.M. Total cash winnings will be \$10,000. Mr. Cook and Mr. Yarboro discussed the Center's programs - Chemical Dependency Recovery Programs, Specialized Women's Outpatients Program, Dual Diagnosis Program, Based on Need for Emergency Treatment, and their Jail Program. They also discussed their services that include substance abuse education, HIV testing, basic living skills, referrals for health problems, etc. During Domestic Violence Awareness Month, Mr. Cook told the viewers about their Standing Together Against Rape (STAR) program that is free of charge to sexual assault victims and their families in nine of the state's counties.

Guests: Jannah Bailey, Child Protect

Jannah discussed child abuse, Domestic Violence Awareness Month, how domestic violence affects children, etc. She told how the organization helps their victims and the services that they provide. She said their job is to minimize the trauma that a sexually or physically abused child experience and to help rebuild their shattered lives. Instead of having to go to several different places to be interviewed over and over again by different people, the victims can tell their story one time at one place and then shared with appropriate parties. She said that this takes away some of the strain from the child and their family. They also provide counseling and other services at this same place, and there is never a cost for their services. Child Protect is a 501©3 non-profit agency that was started to help law enforcement and Human Resources investigate child sexual and physical abuse. It relies on individual donations, and assistance from the United Way and other organizations. All proceeds from the Station's Annual "Super Hero" 5-K benefitted Child Protect this year.

There is so much going on at MACOA. In 2018 they celebrated their 46th year of providing services for seniors. Because of strong community support and many donors and volunteers they will reach 4,000,000 meals served before the end of 2018. Because of these Meals on Wheels, many seniors can live independently in their homes. Hot meals are delivered each weekday by volunteers driving different routes. Last year, they provided 121,828 meals and served 902 clients. They also have seniors at the RSVP (retired and Senior Volunteer Program) that serve at 140 nonprofit or health related locations in 5 counties and contribute more than 140,000 volunteer hours to the community last year. The value of the service conducted in these counties totals over \$3.3 million. They also have individuals, groups and organizations that prepare Frozen Meals for their waiting list. They have several corporate partners that deliver meals to clients, and they serve veterans and their spouses. They make sure to share their love of seniors during the Christmas Holiday season. They told the viewers about their upcoming fundraiser, MACOA's International Tasting on November 11th that will benefit Meals on Wheels and more, and daily activities at the Archibald Center.

Topic: Salvation Army

Guests: Lt. Tonya Farrington, Corps Officer, Salvation Army

New to Montgomery, Alabama Lt. Farrington discussed her new role as a Corps Officer with the Salvation Army. They operate an 80bed emergency shelter, feed three hot meals each day with lunch and dinner open to the public. They offer rental/mortgage, electric bill assistance, and assistance with groceries for those who have fallen on hard times. They are currently in the middle of their Angel Tree program which assists under privilege families with Christmas presents for their children, and seniors with groceries. She also discussed the Red Kettle program that raises funds to finance the annual budget to operate their social services. She talked about the Army's Family Store that operates out of their warehouse. A major warehouse sale is held on the 2nd and 4th Saturday of each month. They are currently in the process of planning the expansion of the ministries that they offer to the community. They hope to expand the Emergency Shelter to also offer transitional housing. They also will develop some emergency response teams to help serve the community and First Responders during disasters, as well as the disasters that strike our neighbors abroad.

Topic: Alabama Kids Count Data Book/Child Well-Being

Guest: Rhonda Mann, Executive Director, VOICES For Alabama Children

Ms. Mann discussed a report released today that explores how the well-being of Alabama Children has evolved over the last 25 years. The report also identifies various inequities that still exist across the state. The Data Book includes an analysis of 70 key indicators across four issue areas: health, Safety, Education and Economic Security. In addition to statewide evaluations each indicator was broken down by county. Shelby County ranks #1 in the state for overall child well-being, followed by Limestone, St. Clair, Autauga and Lee Counties. Wilcox County ranks 67th in the State. Statewide more children are enrolled in state-funded, high quality and voluntary Pre-K than ever before (32%); the percent of vulnerable families has fallen by nearly 1/3 over the past 10 years, and births to teens 15-17 has decreased by more than 50% during the same period. The book also identified a number of areas of concern for Alabama's children that include child population falling by 2.6%; 26.5% of children live in poverty; Alabama has one of the highest infant mortality rates in the nation; 4th graders not meeting minimum standards for proficiency in reading and math; child care centers continue to decline; and high school seniors graduating ill prepared for life after graduation; too many children live in poverty without access to quality healthcare. These areas have to be addressed

Topic: Medicare Open Enrollment

Guests: Sandra Adams-Whatley, Central Alabama Aging Consortium

Ms. Whatley discussed the Medicare Open Enrollment period that is from October 15, 2018 to December 7, 2018 with changes that are effective starting January 1, 2019. She told the viewers what changes they can make to various aspects of their coverage during the annual enrollment period (AEP). She also gave basic criteria for enrollment in a Medicare Advantage plan (must be enrolled in Medicare Part A and B; live in the plan's service area; cannot have end-stage renal disease (some exceptions apply if person was already enrolled in a plan before the change was made). She also told the viewers of Medicare changes to be aware of – new Medicare ID cards without social security numbers; and an increase in Medicare Part B coverage in 2019. It's important to review plan provider information for increasing co-pays, changes to drug formularies or treatment coverage, etc. She asked viewers to call their local SHIP counselors for free insurance counseling

Topic: National Hospice Month

Guests: Angela Boyd, Hospice of Montgomery

Ms. Boyd told the viewers who Hospice of Montgomery is, (3rd oldest in the nation; oldest in Alabama), when it was founded, how many counties it serves. She also shared their mission, how they are funded, and how services are paid. Usually there is no cost to patients and families for Hospice care because most private insurance programs as well as Medicare and Medicaid provide Hospice benefits. Claims are submitted by Hospice of Montgomery which means no paper work for those being cared for. Any person in the River Region diagnosed with a terminal condition qualifies for Hospice, and this include diseases of the heart, liver, kidneys, lungs, cancer, Alzheimer's, AIDS, stroke, Lou Gehrig's disease, and a variety of other conditions. Hospice can being once the physician has made the referral. Hospice's Annual Patient Satisfaction survey shows a 95% excellent rating for patient care received under Hospice, which is 26% higher than the national average of 75%. Ms. Boyd said Hospice of Montgomery patients get more attention, better care and this, a better chance at a higher quality of life. Also, many of their team members almost become part of the patient's family, just as the patient becomes a part of theirs. A number of their patients go on to live a long time after being diagnosed with terminal illnesses.

Topic: Book, "Closed Ranks" Guests: Foster Dickson, Author

In 1975, Bernard Whitehurst, an unarmed black man was mistaken for a robbery suspect, and was shot and killed by Montgomery police. This led to a year-long controversy that resulted in the resignation or firing of police officers, the police chief, and the city's popular 'New South' Mayor. On the day of the shooting, police claimed Whitehurst had fired at the pursuing officer and produced a gun that they said was found near his body. Investigations by a private attorney, the local district attorney, and the Montgomery Advertiser uncovered facts pointing to wrongdoing by the police. Still, no one was ever convicted in Whitehurst's death, and his family's civil lawsuit against the city of Montgomery failed. Tim and Mr. Dickson talked about the case, and the book that brings together interviews, police reports, news stories, and other records. With police shootings that happen nowadays and are covered nationally, this book shows how essential it is to find and face truth in such tragic situations. At the time that it happened, there wasn't much coverage, if any, outside of Montgomery. Tim was a resident of Birmingham at the time and hadn't heard of the shooting and the cover-up. Mr. Dickson, is a History instructor at one of the city's High Schools.

It's time once again Montgomery Zoo's Christmas Lights Festival, and "Night At The Museum". The Zoo will once again be transformed into a Winter Wonderland sparkling with thousands of lights and festive decorations. There will be live entertainment nightly, and the children can visit Santa. Admission is \$17 per person 3 years old and older and included one train ride. If you visit the Zoo in the afternoon and stick around for the Christmas Lights Festival that evening, early bird admission is \$30 per person 3 years old and older, and includes entry into the Zoo for the afternoon and Christmas Lights Festival (same day) and a train ride. Night At the Museum will be held on December 2 from 6-10 P.M. Kids can be dropped off at the Mann Wildlife Learning Museum at the Montgomery Zoo for an evening of fun and adventure. It will be packed with games, night tours of the museum, movies, snacks, animal presentations, and a lot of fun. Topic: AIDS, HIV, World's AIDS Month

Guests: Dr. Carlos Reyes, Medical AIDS Outreach

December 1 was World AIDS Day. Dr. Reyes discussed the status of AIDS in the River Region, and said there has always been high numbers in new cases here, and has been increasing in numbers since 2014. So far in 2018, there've been more than 255 new cases in the state, and more than 55 or 56 are in the River Region. That is three times more than any other big city reporting. He said the South is way ahead of other parts of the country with new cases. Compared to the Northeast, East, Midwest, West Coast, every region had 6,000 - 7,000 new cases, and that number is steady or going down. In the Southeast there were 19,000, 20,000, 21,000 new cases and going up. They saw 400 less cases than in 2016, but it is still a high plateau. MAO has opened a prevention clinic, and screenings in the region have increased. At the Prevention Clinic they discuss the many ways to prevent HIV; stop having sex, don't share needles, use condoms, education, and take medication (Prep). Condoms prevent 96-98% of cases, and they are The Prep prevents 90% of cases, and costs \$1,900-2,000 per month. Insurance covers the Prep, and MAO social workers will help patients that don't have insurance apply to companies that will help them. Their goal is to prevent HIV. MAO has offices in 28 Counties in Alabama, including Montgomery, Dothan, and Atmore.

Topic: Sheriff Department Outreach, Holiday Safety

Guest: Derrick Cunningham, Sheriff, Montgomery County

Tim and Sheriff Cunningham discussed the recent death of a 14-year-old girl who ran outside and was hit by a car after shots were fired at a party. Tim wanted to know what the Sheriff thought about the girl being at a party at 11 P.M. The Sheriff recommends parents being parents, being aware of where their kid is going. With cell phones there is no excuse for parents not to know where their children are - put a track on their phones. He talked about how they are always working to get kids to wear seat belts. They have many programs where they go out and talk to kids about safe driving, texting, etc. For the past 15-16 years they have being holding two fishing events per year for children. It shows them they can go outside, that there is another way to have fun. They don't have to own an X-Box or PSP, they can go to a park and go fishing. Also, they go down to Ramer for Deputy Dave's Day every year. Teaching youth about the great outdoors is a great way for the them to see law enforcement in a different way. He said they are on special watch during this time of year to make sure people out shopping, and their homes are protected during the holidays.

He said Bob Dillon's song "Hard Rain Is Going to Fall" fits the title of his book that captures the spirit of the 60s. These were hard times of tragedy, violence, and division but also a time of great hope. People felt they could make our great country an even greater country. Young people demonstrated for Civil Rights, young women raised the issue of gender equality, and we had a handsome young President names John Kennedy making us believe we could it to the moon, or start a Peach Corp. the 60s included so much history in the 10 year period, and was an amazing time to come of age. We saw so many things, social movements, the space race, environmental consciousness that arose during that time. Musical history was made at that time also, and is a common thread in the book. Elvis, a white man loved black music; Sam Cook, a black man loved country music. Music became a way of crossing some of the divides in the book. Viet Nam is another thread in the book. A lot of tragedy centers around Viet Nam which was such a source of division in the country. Political activism and violence are other threads. There were assignations, bombings, 1,000 armed white people that didn't want James Meredith to integrate a college in Mississippi: 4 little girls killed in a bombing in Birmingham, Kennedy, Malcom X and King assassinated; riots every summer in Urban areas. These were turbulent times, disturbing times, violent times. Alabama was Ground Zero for events happening in the 60s.

Kym turned a grim topic into positive message writing about her sister's suicide. She never felt guilt but there were and still are a lot of questions of why. Could she have made a difference if she had moved to where her sister lived? They are left with so many unanswered questions. Her sister left a journal and she thought about the impact that taking her life would make. She thought about her husband, her family, her daughter. The only comfort they found is that her sister wouldn't have killed herself if mental illness hadn't taken over her mind. Kym has lived in Montgomery for 11 years, and found that people don't want to talk about suicide. You don't put it out on social media, and the family agreed that they wouldn't talk about it. However, after they put it out, Kym couldn't stop talking about mental illness and suicide publically. Mental illness was a lot of work for her sister, counseling helped when she went, but she didn't always want to go. Her book can be found on Amazon and at Barnes and Nobles.

Mayor Strange, who is Mayor of the largest city in our broadcast area is our final guest of the year. He will retire on November 12, 2019 at 10 A.M. He and Tim started off talking about garbage/trach (recycling) and will end with political trash talking. In 15 days the City will relaunch a full recycling program. A good company will be in charge of the program, and it will get things done. What can't be recycled will be compressed and used as fuel in the cement industry. Very little separation of garbage will need to be done, and residents won't have to do any of it. The company paid the city \$1 million; they paid \$10 million for the new equipment, and have hired 60 people. Tim and the Mayor also talked about Education. Mayor Strange said it's a challenge but is making progress. He regrets not taking on education sooner. He said we will hear something on Charter Schools in the next few days, and anticipated some opening up in 2019. The new school board members are all female, and he expects good decisions from this board. The previous board didn't get along, and didn't get things done. He hopes to have everything in place before he leaves office, and said voters should ask City Council candidates and Mayoral candidates what they are going to do about Education. When talking about Crime, he and Tim talked about the Pajama Party for teens where a 14 year old ran out of the building and was struck by a car and killed when shots were fired. The Mayor really wishes he could shut down this building but there are a lot of loopholes, and they did have a legitimate license. However, 4 people have been charged in the incident. Montgomery's homicide rate is down 22%; car thefts and burglaries are still happening, but overall crime is down 3%. Burglaries of businesses are ongoing particularly during this season, but Montgomery Police are dealing with this. Development - discussed businesses moving out to EastChase, and the Country Club development. The Boulevard continues to be vibrant, and Mayor Strange said this is why he works with local and National developers to promote Montgomery. They are meeting with people From Canada and Miami to develop the old Governor's House Hotel, and it is now a closed deal. Politics – he will meet with 4 or 5 people, and anyone else that is thinking about running for Mayor or Montgomery. He wants the person to want the job, not a position, and the candidates to know what the job is all about, and what they are in for. He talked about the first City Council female member in years, and the all-female school board members.
