6/1-6/2 – Montana State University Assistant to the Dean of Agriculture Susan Fraser talks about MSU's accepting nomination for outstanding Ag leaders. The winner will be presented with an award in the fall of 2014.

6/3 – As part of Havre's Living History Day, Omar Murray from Fort Walsh in Saskatchewan traveled to Fort Assiniboine to portray a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. He talks about the history that Canada and America share, particularly in northern Montana.

6/4 – Havre City Councilman Jay Pyette explains the Council's distribution of their Community Transportation Enhancement Program (CTEP) funds. \$77,000 will go towards the Havre Softball Association, while the remaining \$50,000 will go towards the Hill County Courthouse terra cotta restoration project.

6/5 – MSU-Northern Chancellor James Limbaugh held a press conference to announce his recommendations for MSUN's program prioritization process. All 74 academic programs were assessed, and put into 4 categories: Grow, Maintain, Integrate and Phase Out.

6/6 – Fish, Wildlife and Parks Director Jeff Hagener talks about the FWP Open House that gave Havre and Hi-Line residents a chance to informally discuss their concerns, particularly over the Milk River Ranch purchase and the possible relocation of bison to Fort Belknap.

6/7 – Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commissioner Dan Vermillion is the lone holdover from the FWP group that approved the controversial purchase of the Milk River Ranch. The FWP held their monthly meeting in Havre, and Vermillion spoke about the purchase and moving towards the future.

6/8-6/9 – The Blaine County Conservation District is putting on a Grazingland Workshop. District Conservationist for the Chinook Office Cliff Merriman previews the workshop, including guest speakers and topics that will be covered.

6/10 – Part 1 of a three-part series with Havre Police Detective Ryan Pearson. Pearson discusses Havre and Hill County's crime rates, including where the data comes from and how the information is classified.

6/11 – Part 2 of a three-part series with Havre Police Detective Ryan Pearson. Pearson discusses Havre and Hill County's crime rates, including Hill County's high ranking in both violent and property crimes (3rd and 2nd statewide, respectively).

6/12 – Part 3 of a three-part series with Havre Police Detective Ryan Pearson. Pearson discusses Havre and Hill County's crime rates, including the Havre Police Department and the number of calls and arrests they handle on a shift-by-shift basis.

She mentions the 37th annual Montana Range Days, being hosted in Havre for the first time ever. She also talks about what will be going on over the first two days, which mostly consists of registration and workshops.

5/3 – Two applicants are running for the open City Council seat left by the departed Rick Dow. Republican Debi Rhines, Office Manager at Schine Electric, gives us her qualifications, ideas and thoughts about filling the open seat.
