The Lake and Airport Committee approved the request and granted a Special Events Permit for the William Walter Catch-A-Fish Day Tournament for Saturday, May 9th from 8-10 a.m. They also waived the bidding process and accepted the quote of some \$23,000 from Stanley Roofing Company for recoating of the airport office and hangar roofs.

The Finance Committee approved the transfer of \$50,000 from the general fund to the water fund for the repayment of the Water Fund Loan. The board also approved the Fiscal Year 2015/2016 budgets for the audit, contingency, hotel/motel, IMRF, Social Security, Municipal Building, fire, police, street, sewer, garbage, Fire and Police Pension, insurance, ESDA and safety; and forwarded them to the City Treasurer for further refinement.

The ordinance committee directed the City Attorney to prepare a draft ordinance creating a Liquor Classification for a Micro Brewery and to also make the revisions to the proposed draft Liquor Ordinance as it was previously discussed.

The Taylorville Council approved the payment of bills totaling some \$450,000. The meeting was adjourned at 7:31 p.m.

The following board members requested to call the special meeting: Chairman of the Board – Paul Schmitz, Laura A. Wilkinson, Charles DeClerck, Donna Hibbetts, Aaron Allen and Timothy Carlson.

The main item on the agenda was the prevailing wage ordinance. The ordinance is an act of regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the county, city, or any public body or by anyone under contract on public works. Chairman of the Board, Paul Schmitz, tells Regional Radio News that it is established by the state of Illinois and it is a fair wage.

Vince Shaw, a business representative of the Operating Engineers Local Union No. 965 out of Springfield, addressed the County Board that every public body has to pass an ordinance during the month of June that meets the requirement of state statute.
