Program Title: Bud Breault Retirement

Program description: Barnstable Municipal Airport Manager Roland “Bud” Breault is in the final few weeks on the job. After more than five decades of a career in public service, Breault will retire June 28. Breault, 75, previously served as a Coast Guard pilot for more than 30 years. He also served as Truro Town Administrator for eight years and helped to construct the Hyannis Youth and Community Center as a project manager for Barnstable’s Department of Public Works. He has spent the last 9 and a half years managing the airport. “I think the main success [during my time at the airport] is the project they really brought me in to do, in the beginning, was to get the terminal built,” Breault said.

Program Title: JFK Museum Preview

Program Description: A special exhibit commemorating the life and legacy of Robert F. Kennedy opens Monday at the John F. Kennedy Hyannis Museum. “RFK: Ripple of Hope,” which was assembled in collaboration with the RFK Human Rights Foundation, begins with Robert’s early years, including his time on Cape Cod. But the focal point covers his time serving as U.S. Attorney General and a U.S. Senator, culminating with his presidential campaign. “The theme ‘Ripple of Hope’ comes from his most famous and powerful speech delivered in Cape Town, South Africa,” said Rebecca Pierce-Merrick, the curator of the JFK Hyannis Museum. Pierce-Merrick and Executive Director John Allen join the program.

Program Title: PawPalooza Preview

Program Description: New England’s largest dog festival returns to Cape Cod this month for the third year in a row. The annual Paw Palooza will be held at Dennis-Yarmouth Regional High School on Saturday and Sunday. The event is put on as a collaboration between Agway of Cape Cod, the MSPCA, and the Animal Rescue League. Last year’s event drew more than 10,000

attendees and hundreds of their four-legged companions. Since its inception in 2016, the festival has raised more than \$50,000 for the Animal Rescue League and the MSPCA.

Program Title: Against the Tide

Program Description: A fundraising event for the Massachusetts Breast Cancer Coalition comes to Brewster later this summer. The 18th annual statewide Against the Tide Swim, Kayak, Walk, Run and/or Aquathon event will be held at Nickerson State Park on August 19.

Proceeds benefit the coalition, which works to understand the causes of breast cancer and find ways to prevent the disease. “We are very fortunate to have such tremendous support from citizens of Massachusetts demanding greater protection of their children’s future health in our effort to stop breast cancer before it starts,” said Cheryl Osimo, the Executive Director of the MBCC. “MBCC often is overshadowed by larger, national breast cancer organizations and messages of early detection, treatment, and finding a cure. We depend on our generous media and supporters to continue our unique goal of breast cancer prevention.”

Program Title: Pops by the Sea Preview

Program Description: An actor who has appeared in more than 100 films and TV shows will get to make a lifelong dream come true right here on Cape Cod. Dermot Mulroney has been announced as this year’s guest conductor at the 33rd Annual Citizens Bank Pops by the Sea. Julie Wake, Executive Director of the Arts foundation of Cape Cod, which organizes the concert, said that this is kind of a homecoming for Mulroney. “Dermot has close ties to the Cape. His parents live in Orleans and he’s been around for many years. We’ve seen him at the theater and different musical venues,” she said. Mulroney says that as a lifelong classical musician, this is a real pinnacle moment. Mulroney and Wake have hinted that he may pull double duty, which will make him the first guest conductor to do so.

Program Title: Family Links

Program Description: Cape Cod Child Development announced the creation of a new parent company name: ‘Family Links’, which will represent the broader partnerships and vision that have evolved during CCCDP’s 47 year history. “Our organization went through a strategic planning process where one of the things that we identified was that the name Cape Cod Child Development did not fit the full scope of services that we offered,” said Family Links CEO Anne Colwell, who joins the program. “We also, during that process, identified that we wanted to create more strategic partnerships, and really grow that family advocacy process through

acquisitions.” Although the changes have been implemented, all will maintain their existing separate corporate entities and finances.

Program Title: Quahog Challenge

Program Description: Quahog lover’s – break out your utensils as the Housing Assistance Corporation is looking to find who makes the best stuffed quahog, during this year’s ‘Cape Cod Quahog Challenge’. “This event came about thinking about a fun way to bring people together during the summer on the waterfront in Hyannis,” says Laura Reckford, Director of Community Relations for HAC. “We are just having fun trying out one of the most signature dishes of the region.” Over the past three years, Arnold’s Lobster & Clam Bar in Eastham has won the coveted top prize which is based upon popular vote. The restaurant will not be returning to defend its title as owner Nathan Nickerson and head chef Susan Buckley promised if they won three years in a row, they would step aside to give others a chance. “We have about 9 or 10 restaurants who turn out and the people who come to this event actually get to vote on which is the best one. Along with the price of admission, you get beer from Narragansett Beer, and you get ice-cream from Polar Cave. There is live music as well,” said Reckford, who joins the program.

Program Title: Barnstable County Fair Preview

Program Description: The Barnstable County Fair returns to the Cape Cod Fairgrounds later this month. The 174th edition of the fair brings music, rides, attractions and fair food from Monday the 23rd through Sunday the 29th of July. Several musical acts will take the stage including Jordan Davis, Jenny Tolman, and The Romantics, along with the fan favorite World’s Largest Demolition Derby on Wednesday Night. Fair Manager Wendy Brown said new grounds attractions have been added this year. “One of them is called Waterbark and it’s a combination of dogs and humans with diving tricks in a large pool of water,” Brown said. “We are also bring in the Clydesdales this year.” The Barnstable County Agricultural Society held the first fair in 1844 at the County Courthouse in Barnstable Village. Brown joins the program to preview the fair.

Program Title: Cape Cod Writer’s Conference

Program Description: The Cape Cod Writers Center Conference, one of the oldest broad-based writers’ conferences in the nation, presents a series of state-of-the-art courses and workshops at its 54th summer Conference. The event takes place at the Resort and Conference Center in Hyannis on Thursday and runs until Sunday. The conference features a faculty of 20 distinguished authors, poets, journalists and prize-winning writers and often attracts a 200 member audience. “It’s open to people who are beginner writers, as well as people who have experience or have been published, and it’s meant to help them improve their literary skills and prepare for publication,” said Cape Cod Writers Center Executive Director Nancy Rubin Stuart.

Program Description: Casey Sherman, award-winning New York Times Best Selling author and Hyannis native joins us to talk about his latest book – all about the Tom Brady deflate-gate scandal! Sherman spent time interviewing Brady and other teammates about the scandal that rocked the legendary quarterback and the team that results in a four-game suspension for Brady.

Program Title: Housing Crisis on Cape Cod

Program Description: A nonprofit that provides affordable housing and homelessness prevention services in the region has teamed with a philanthropic services provider to form the Housing Legacy Fund. The Housing Assistance Corporation and Cape Cod Foundation collaborative fund will help to ensure the security of safe and affordable housing on the Cape and Islands. HAC will direct donations to the fund by donor request and the money will be invested by the Cape Cod Foundation to generate income to support the housing agency’s mission. “It’s really investing in resources to address unknown housing needs in the future,” said Ann Van Vleck, the chief development officer for HAC. “We want to be able to continue to help our clients and to help so many people that we serve, but being able to have the ability to do that for future generations is really what this is about.”

Program Title: National Night Out

Program Description: In an effort to make neighborhoods safer and more caring places to live, police departments across Cape Cod will host National Night Out events this month. National Night Out is an annual community-building campaign that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie. Dennis Police Officer Ryan Carr said the recent shootings of police officers on Cape Cod show that building strong relationships between police and residents is essential. “It’s really important that we get out and connect with our community, the kids, establish relationships and all work together,” Carr said.

Program Title: Cape Symphony and Cotuit Center for the Arts

Program Description: The Cape Symphony will partner with the Cotuit Center for the Arts for the first time for its season finale. “Freedom, Expression & Hope” will include the play “Every Good Boy Deserves Favor” and “Symphony No. 5” by Dimitri Shostakovich, one of the most famous Russian symphonies of the 20th century. “Every Good Boy Deserves Favor” is a one-act play that takes place in and around the orchestra. It is a satirical commentary on government repression with themes of freedom, personal expression and hope, along with humor. The performance will include six local actors and the more than 70 musicians of the Cape Symphony. Officials from both groups join the program.

Program Title: Military Backpacks

Program Description: Students across the Cape will be returning to school next month, many without the supplies that they need to get them through the year. The Cape Cod Military Support Foundation is reminding the community that it is not too late to make a contribution to their Operation Backpack to Support Massachusetts Military Families. “The reality is that back to school time can be a burden on many families – especially those who have to provide school supplies and clothing for more than one child in their household,” explained Cape Cod Military Support Foundation President and CEO Don Cox. The local non-profit has led the annual campaign with a goal of providing backpacks filled with school supplies and distributing them to the children of active duty members of the military, National Guard and Coast Guard.

Program Title – Alzheimer’s Walk

Program Description - A new Massachusetts law seeks to make improvements in the diagnosis and treatment of Alzheimer’s and dementia. The measure was approved by the Democratic-controlled Legislature and signed last week by Republican Governor Charlie Baker, who noted the impact Alzheimer’s has on people, whether they have the disease or are caring for someone with it. “Raising awareness about Alzheimer’s and dementia is key to supporting the Massachusetts families who are impacted by this horrible disease,” said Baker. Pamela Schwabe from the Alzheimer’s Association of Cape Cod joins the program to talk about the new law and their upcoming walk to raise money for the disease.

Program Title – Housing Institute

Program Description - Officials with the Housing Assistance Corporation are inviting local municipal leaders to take part in their 2018 ‘Cape Housing Institute’ this October. Now in its second year, the Cape Housing Institute is a collaborative effort between HAC and Community Development Partnership to provide municipal officials throughout the Cape with the support, tools, and resources to boost affordable housing development in their individual communities. “This was really the brain child of Jake Coburn of Community Development Partnership. He was thinking to himself that it would be valuable to our volunteer boards and committees, throughout the Cape, to have a training to learn the ins-and-outs of affordable housing, so that they are better able to negotiate with developers, that they know all the details about affordable housing, and why it’s important,” said Laura Reckford, HAC’s Director of Community Relations, who joins the program.

Program Title: Antiques Roadshow on Cape Cod

Program Description - Kenneth Gloss, proprietor of the internationally known Brattle Book Shop in Boston’s Downtown Crossing section, will give a free, and open talk discussing the value of old, and rare books on Cape this month. “I’m looking forward to coming down to Wellfleet. The event should be a lot of fun,” said Gloss. During the gathering, Gloss, who is a frequent guest appraiser on PBS’ Antiques Roadshow, will talk in part about the history of his historic bookshop, which goes back to circa 1825.

“The talk lasts for 45 mins to an hour. I talk about what is an ‘old book’, first editions. I bring some show and tell, I have a program from the 1912 World Series where the Red Sox’s won. I have an original brochure from the Titanic, I have a page from a book from the 1400’s over 500 years old and more,” he said.

Program Title: Seaside LeMans

Program Description: Local businesses and area residents are turning out for the 2018 Seaside Le Mans in Mashpee next month. The fast-paced annual event features Formula One European style racing karts provided by X1 Boston. The four hour endurance race runs on a quarter mile track that winds around corners and under a footbridge at Mashpee Commons. “Before the sun rises that day we have hordes of volunteers waiting to build a track out of hay bales and shrink wrap,” Event Director Kelsey Ellis said. “It’s a quarter mile track and it’s through the streets and part of a parking lot of Mashpee Commons.” “It’s like a real Formula One Track with a pedestrian overpass, there’s an infield with activities, you can see the race from outside the infield, and there’s something to do for the whole family.” The Seaside Le Mans was created to bring local businesses and area residents together to raise money to support Cape Cod communities.

Program Title: Airport Drill

Program Description: Dozens of emergency response agencies across Cape Cod will be participating in a full-scale disaster drill next month. The mock disaster event will simulate plane crashes at two separate locations – The Barnstable Municipal Airport and in Lewis Bay – at 5 p.m. The airport is required by the Federal Aviation Administration to conduct the in-depth exercise involving safety protocols every three years. Airport Manager Katie Servis said events at the airport will test its emergency response plan and responders. “The purpose of the drill is to go over those responsibilities to identify any actions we need to take to respond to an accident at the airport,” Servis said. “It also helps us take a look at what we did right, what we did wrong, what we need to work on and polish up on, and to identify and critique ourselves so that we know how to do it better in case the accident really does occur at the airport in the future.” Although actual aircraft will not be used in the drill, fire departments will be setting training fires and using other simulations to test the airport’s emergency response plan.

Program Title: Tick Disease Update

Program Description: Officials in Barnstable County are preparing for a new tick species which could eventually end up on Cape Cod. The Asian longhorned tick, which has been known to be a pest for livestock but can also spread diseases to humans, has been found in eight U.S. states including New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. It was discovered last year in New Jersey on a sheep farm. “Once it got reported to be in Westchester County, New York, I said, ‘okay this thing is on our door step and it is just a matter of time,’” said Larry Dapsis, the Barnstable County Entomologist and local tick expert. There is a concern about how quickly the species can spread. “The females do not need a male. They do not need a mate in order to lay eggs,” Dapsis said. “They are already fertile and they just start laying eggs as soon as they become an adult tick and the populations can grow very, very fast.” The tick may have been in the U.S. since 2010 and has been misidentified as a rabbit tick, according to Dapsis.

Program Title: Summer Tourism Recap

Program Description: The Cape Cod Chamber of Commerce is calling the 2018 summer season a success so far for tourism-related business. Labor Day Weekend signals the transition into the so-called shoulder season, but still a time of strong revenue for many in the industry. Based on initial numbers, it appears tourism-related business was up over 4% from last year as of the end of July. The figures are tied to a survey that is done of hotels that participate in the Smith Travel Research data collection. There are about 10,000 bedrooms that are eligible for that on Cape Cod through hotels, motels and bed and breakfasts. The figures do not count short-term rentals. “It’s been a very strong summer season and I see no way for that to change into the next best season which is September, October and November,” said Wendy Northcross, the Cape Cod Chamber of Commerce CEO. The water is at its warmest and the weather regularly remains consistent with warm temperatures. For many, the shoulder seasons are a critical part of their entire yearly budgets.

Program Title: Canal Day

Program Description: The Cape Cod Canal Region Chamber of Commerce is planning an event to celebrate the recently completed renovation of Buzzards Bay Park. “Cape Cod Canal Day” is set for Saturday at the park on Main Street in Buzzards Bay and aims to create economic activity in the village during the shoulder season. The park renovation was completed earlier this

year and town and local officials have expressed optimism that the new space along the Cape Cod Canal could play a role in the revitalization of the village, which has seen a decrease in economic activity in recent decades with the construction of the Main Street bypass and Route 25. “We hope to have a few thousand people there. Think about a few thousand people coming in to Buzzards Bay, they will go to different businesses, whether they stop for a particular business or even if they stop for gas, it still creates economic development no matter what they ProgCommerce.

Program Title: Gosnold Gala

Program Description: Gosnold of Cape Cod is marking its 46th year in existence and they’re celebrating with a gala in Boston to honor Gov. Charlie Baker for his work in the opioid drug crisis. Baker began working on the issue as soon as he took office and has been lauded for his approach and commitment to the issue. Founded on Cape Cod in 1972, Gosnold is an award winning nationally accredited non-profit leader in the prevention, treatment and recovery of mental health and substance use disorders. Gosnold officials join the program.

Program Title: K9 Relief Fund

Program Description: The Cape & Islands Police K-9 Relief Fund is inviting the public to another Motorcycle Run this weekend. Proceeds collected during the event will go directly to veterinary bills of retired K-9 Police Officers from Cape Cod. Motorcycle Run organizer Joe Ambrosini says that when the dogs retire from the force the police departments no longer have financial responsibility for them. “When the dogs retire they don’t pay for their dogs anymore, it’s up to the handler. The dogs live another five or six years. What we do as an organization is pay the vet bills. It’s a budgetary thing I’m sure. Everybody needs money for equipment, so the handler takes the dog and the burden is on him. So, we take care of them,” Ambrosini explained. The proceeds from the event, as well as the rest of the Cape & Islands Police K-9 Relief Fund, goes directly to easing the burden of veterinary costs incurred in maintaining a retired K-9 officer.

Program Description: An art conference for artists of all levels and media will be held this month in Hyannis. The Cape Cod Art Association is hosting “Mastering Your Mark 2016” at the Hyannis Resort & Conference Center on October 14.
