He founded the company in 1972 and has been designing and manufacturing high end bags out of their Seattle factory since 1982. During this crisis, Tom says they are answering the call by actually halting most production and all shipping to focus all their energies on making cloth face masks. He says they have been working with local hospitals and other businesses to get them right. Tom says his company is making just barely enough money with these masks to keep the lights on and pay some employees.
