10-4 Early Voting In Muscogee -

IF MUSCOGEE COUNTY ELECTIONS AND REGISTRATION EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR NANCY BOREN AND HER STAFF CAN HELP IT, THERE WON'T BE LONG LINES COME NOVEMBER 8.

"That is what we hope to alleviate is that horrible rush where people have to stand in line to wait to vote. We don't want that to happen."

ONE THING THEY'RE DOING ABOUT IT, EARLY VOTING.

FOR THE LAST TWO WEEKENDS IN OCTOBER, VOTERS CAN CAST BALLOTS ON SATURDAYS AND SUNDAYS.

AND STARTING OCTOBER 17TH THE CITY SERVICES CENTER WILL OPEN THROUGH NOVEMBER FOURTH FOR EARLY VOTING.

"We just started the 7 am - 7 pm, as well as the Sunday voting, in General Primary in May. This will be our second time to have Sunday voting and the 7 am - 7 pm Monday through Friday. It's really convenient."

ABSENTEE BALLOTS STARTED GOING OUT SEPTEMBER 20.

SO FAR, 2500 HAVE BEEN MAILED.

"We need a written request, and we will mail you your ballot. And then you can vote your ballot in the convenience of your home. And you return it back here, as long as it's back here by 7pm on Election Day."

ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT DEADLINES IS FOR THOSE NOT YET REGISTERED TO VOTE.

"You can just Google "OLVR Georgia," you can go to "my voter page Georgia," and you can register vote, change your address, change your name, and you can do that by October 11."

## 10/12 City Employees Pay Raises -

THE CONTROVERSY BEGAN DURING AN EXECUTIVE SESSION ON AUGUST 9TH. CITY MANAGER ISAIAH HUGLEY APPOINTED A NEW PARKS AND RECREATION DIRECTOR.

COUNCIL COMPARED THE NEW STARTING SALARY OF 88-THOUSAND DOLLARS WITH THE EXISITING DIRECTORS PAY.

"There was a good bit of concern about the process and about the fallout of these increases to top management."

"This packet shows what was discussed at City Council's executive session on August 9th. City Manager Isaiah Hugley said he would look into the pay raises and Councilor Judy Thomas told him to proceed."

"The City Manager granted the raises, calculated the raises and was granted the raises, but did not come back before city council."

MAYOR TERESA TOMLINSON, SAYS THE CURE FOR THE PROBLEM IS TAKING THE MONEY BACK THAT WAS ALREADY RECEIVED.

THE 16 DEPARTMENT HEADS AND DIRECTORS HAVE UNTIL THE END OF THE YEAR TO PAY IT BACK.

"A solution to a long term problem and it wasn't handled with the process that we are used to in this community. Certainly wasn't illegal it just wasn't our best practices."

"The concern with the electoral system was that it needs to be kept in the hands of people who were smart enough to vote. That sounds horrible by today's standards because we want to have as many people voting as we can."

PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES ARE RACING TO EARN A MAJORITY OF THE COUNTRY'S ELECTORAL VOTES: 270 OUT OF 538.

ALABAMA HAS NINE ELECTORAL VOTES.

GEORGIA HAS 16.

"When you're voting, you're not just voting for Donald Trump or Hillary Clinton or Gary Johnson. You're voting for those 16 electors who then vote for those candidates."

We checked some other areas and there was water damage in the building. So then we kind of put a hold on everything to see what else was going on in the building."

THE ARTIFACTS HAVE BEEN MOVED INTO STORAGE.

LAKESHA STRINGER, A CURATOR, SAYS THEY'VE TAKEN EXTRA PRECAUTION MOVING THE ARTIFACTS.

"If anything was damaged I would be hurt but those are still material things and it's about the story."

VISITORS TO THE MUSEUM WERE SHOCKED TO LEARN THE NEWS BUT SUPPORTIVE OF THE CHANGES.

"If this is supposed to be a historical place that houses things that have happened in African American history in Columbus past. Where is it at?"

"There are two types of races and then there is a rabbit race and the turtle race. Before they got started they were running the rabbit race and now that they've ran into these problems things are moving slow."

"It allows them the convenience to be able to vote from home in the privacy of their own home or if they are out of town and aren't able to be back here for early voting or for election day."

During today's news conference Police Chief Mark Scott did announce there have been several attacks made, not only on the police, but also the family of the suspect and also the families of the officers who died.

"I want the community to know that these hateful people do not speak for me. They do not speak for the Americus Police Department and they do not speak for the people of Americus and Sumter County"

HOMES ENDING IN AN EVEN NUMBER CAN IRRIGATE ON TUESDAY, THURSDAY AND SATURDAY.

MATT DUNN OF THE WATER RESOURCE MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT SAYS THE CITY HAS ONLY HAD ONE INCH OF RAIN SINCE MID-AUGUST.

THE LONGEST DRY PERIOD ON RECORD.

"We are not in a dire situation. We do have water available for our customers, and we are ok in the situation we are in. Particularly if we get the winter rains that we typically get that fill our reservoir back up going into the spring and summer months of next year. It is important that our customers heed the drought warning, and comply with what we're asking them to do."

IF A HOME EXCEEDS USING 12-THOUSAND GALLONS OF WATER A MONTH, THE OWNER WILL BE CHARGED A FEE ON THEIR WATER BILL.

THE BONE FRAGMENTS WERE FOUND DURING EXCAVATION OF THE SITE. "We reached out to the Muscogee Creek nation before we started this project to let them know that we would do it. We are reaching out to them today to let them know that we did find a human burial."

"News 3 is hearing that hundreds of years ago the Muscogee Creek tribe would bury their relatives in huts and were also hearing that it's not uncommon to find clusters of bones on the property today. Today we asked the Columbus Museum to weigh in on whether or not the remains that were found was found on a burial ground."

"Without being there on the ground and being one of the archeologists doing the excavation it's hard to say for sure. I would say that just finding a few isolated remains does not indicate the presence of what we might consider a burial ground."

"We need rain bad. Everything is dieing out."

THE LEVEL 2 RESPONSE HAS AFFECTED 52 GEORGIA COUNTIES.
PATRICK BOWIE, THE LAGRANGE DIRECTOR OF UTILITIES SAYS THERE ARE A FEW RULES AND REGULATIONS THAT YOU'LL NEED TO KNOW.

"In terms of outdoor watering of your lawn or your landscape, if you have an even numbered address then you are allowed to water on Wednesday and Saturday between 4 P-M and 10 A-M and if you have an odd address on Thursday and Sunday you have between 4 P-M and 10 A-M."

"Even this fountain behind me in the heart of downtown Lagrange has been temporarily shut off. To remind people to conserve their water."

"Most people would understand that that's why it's not running and a lot of people are praying for rain."

AND IF YOU HAVE A HOME GARDEN ..

"You are allowed to handwater plants so if you have a hose and you need to go out and hand water a plant you can do that."

THE DIRECTOR OF UTILITIES SAYS THE LAGRANGE COMMUNITY DOESN'T HAVE TO WORRY ABOUT RUNNING OUT OF WATER.

"We pull out of West Point Lake, that's where our water source is located and we don't have any concerns about running out of water or anything like that. This is just preventative to let people know that what we do in LaGrange affects people down stream."

CONSERVING WATER, TO BE PREPARED FOR THE UNEXPECTED.

10-YEAR-OLD AMANDA GRABEL'S ASTHMA HAD GOTTEN SO SEVERE THAT IT WAS LIFE-THREATENING.

DESPERATE FOR A SOLUTION, HER PARENTS TOOK HER TO SEVERAL DOCTORS WHO KEPT WRITING MORE AND MORE PRESCRIPTIONS.

"It was very frustrating and they just kept throwing more medicine and none of it, and none of it helped.

"She was afraid to go to sleep at night because she was afraid she was going to die."

AFTER SEEKING A SPECIALIST, THE GRABELS LEARNED AMANDA HAD THE RIGHT MEDICINE, BUT WAS TAKING IT INCORRECTLY.

"We see children who just don't know how to use it at all, and so they take breaths in a totally different way that doesn't help get it into the lungs, which is where the medicine needs to go."

IN FACT, DR. LANSER SAYS MOST CHILDREN HE SEES USE INHALERS INCORRECTLY. HE SAYS THE BIGGEST MISTAKE IS NOT USING A SPACER. WITHOUT IT ABOUT 80 PERCENT OF THE MEDICINE SETTLES IN THE MOUTH AND NEVER GETS INTO THE LUNGS.

DR. LANSER ALSO SAYS MANY CHILDREN DON'T REALIZE THAT EXHALING IS JUST AS IMPORTANT AS INHALING.

"Take some normal breaths and then a big deep breath to fully exhale so that you then have empty lungs to take a nice big, deep breath to get all the medicine deep into the lungs."

OTHER COMMON MISTAKES INVOLVE HOW THE INHALER IS POSITIONED.

DR. LANSER SAYS KIDS SHOULD STAND UP STRAIGHT WHEN USING INHALERS WITH THEIR HEAD IN A NEUTRAL POSITION -NOT TIPPED BACK.

AIM THE INHALER AT THE BACK OF THE THROAT AND CLOSE THE LIPS TIGHTLY AROUND THE MOUTHPIECE TO KEEP MEDICATION FROM ESCAPING.

AFTER LEARNING THE PROPER TECHNIQUE, AND PRACTICING IT, AMANDA PERFECTED HER INHALER USE, AND IS BACK TO BEING HERSELF

"I don't have to worry about everything, and I'm just...I feel like I don't have asthma anymore. I do, but it feels like I don't." **6pm Vo/Sot:45,11pm PKG 1:30**

So the need is actually very great, especially for our elderly families."

"In addition of raising awareness of poor housing conditions, Alabama Rural Ministry also says there's another type of housing crisis-- and that's the lack of affordable housing in the state."

ALABAMA FACES A SHORTAGE OF 90- THOUSAND AFFORDABLE HOMES-- MEANING RIGHT NOW A LARGE NUMBER OF PEOPLE PAY 50- PERCENT OR MORE OF THEIR INCOME FOR RENTALS OR LEASES--- WHILE OTHER SUFFER WITH SUBSTANDARD CONDITIONS.

"But oropharyngeal cancer, cancers at the base of the tongue, tonsils, I know people now who have that. It also causes anal cancer and penile cancer, and vaginal cancer."

THE HUMAN PAPPILOMAVRUS ALSO CAUSES GENITAL WARTS. BUT SOME PARENTS CAN BE SOMEWHAT SQUEAMISH WHEN IT COMES TO THE THOUGHT OF THEIR CHILDREN AND SEX.
