"You give them your license and registration and you don't go reaching in consoles, pockets or pulling out guns. When the officer sees a gun in the car he's naturally going to be cautious."

"Do what you're supposed to do, protesting doesn't mean rioting. Rioting is violating the law."

MATT HART FROM THE ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE TOLD THE COURT THAT HUBBARD WAS DRIVEN BY GREED.

"That's why no knock warrants should be so rare, if at all, used. Because they're very dangerous for our law enforcement community and they're dangerous for the folks on the other side of that door who may or may not be guilty of anything."

"If I cause him to lose his job, what would happen with me and that was very concerning to me." HUGLEY IS SPEAKING OF A TEXT MESSAGE FROM MYERS. IN IT MYERS WRITES, "IF ANYTHING HAPPENS TO HIS FRIEND'S JOB YOU WILL BECOME THE STORY AND NOT YOUR SISTER. UNDERSTAND?"

"And that's what the city manager calls a threat?"

MYERS DOES NOT CONSIDER HIS TEXT MESSAGE A THREAT.

"It's bizarre to me that it can be stretched into some idea that I'm making a threat against somebody. I was letting the man know that he needs to leave my friend alone. That's it."

HUGLEY SAYS HE HAS WATCHED MYERS BULLY SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS AND THE SUPERINTENDENT BEFORE.

"We have this behavior for a person who holds a high public office and they're making decisions regarding our teachers and our children and so that is concerning to me."

MYERS SAYS HE IS GOING TO CONTINUE TO KEEP WHAT'S BEST FOR THE SCHOOL SYSTEM AT THE TOP OF HIS PRIORITIES.

"The only threat the Hugley's have from me is political and if they want to stand in the way of me fixing the school system, that threat is going to continue because I'm going to fight to continue to fix this school system. That's what I promised people I would do."

TOMLINSON SAYS OFFICERS WHO FEEL THREATENED ARE TRAINED TO FOLLOW CERTAIN PROTOCOLS.

FIRST, THEY MUST TRY TO GET CONTROL OF THE SITUATION BY USING CLOSED FISTS, PEPPER SPRAY, A BATON OR A TASER BEFORE THEY REACH FOR THEIR WEAPON.

"Then the use of force as we know as deadly use of force which refers to a gun and that's the last."

HINES SAYS ALTHOUGH ALL OFFICERS AREN'T BAD, HE BELIEVES THE MEDIA PLAYS A ROLE IN HOW OFFICERS VIEW THE AFRICAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY.

"The more they hear it, the more they're going to believe it because if they're not actually in those neighborhoods and seeing what's going on for themselves. There are actually a lot of good cops out their that be in our neighborhoods to protect and serve and do their jobs."

TOMLINSON WANTS THE COMMUNITY AND OFFICERS TO COME TOGETHER SO THAT WE CAN UNITE THE FOUNTAIN CITY AND MAKE IT A BETTER PLACE FOR EVERYONE.

"If I don't feel good about myself I'm not gonna feel good about you, and if I don't feel good about myself I'm gonna treat myself wrong, I'm gonna allow other people to misuse me, to mistreat me, and I will do the same for others."

BILLINGS SAYS IT'S IMPORTANT TO MAKE SURE THE STORES IN THE SHOPPING CENTER SPECIALIZE IN DIFFERENT AEAS, SO THAT THEY AREN'T COMPETING WITH EACH OTHER.

"People are getting tired of having to walk across a 200-thousand square foot building to get milk in one corner and Tums in the other."

BILLINGS TELLS US WHICH STORES WILL BE IN THE FIRST COMPLETED BUILDING.

"SunTrust ATM, Blimpies Sub Shop, Cuts by US, Posh Nails and Spa, and we have Midland Beverage Package Store."

ONCE COMPLETED, BILLINGS SAYS THE SHOPPING CENTER WILL BRING IN 300 TO 400 NEW JOBS.

BILL MURPHY, THE EXECTUIVE VICE PRESIDENT OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AT THE COLUMBUS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE SAYS SHOPPING CENTERS LIKE THIS HAVE A POWERFUL IMPACT ON THE LOCAL ECONOMY.

"More people are going back to work, we see our unemployement rate drop. With more people working there's more demand for services and products and people are our shopping for goods and our local retailers are finally starting to see the light at the end of the tunnel."

"There are a total of eight new buildings that will be at the Blackmon Village Center. They are expecting the to complete the first building by October first. MILES AROUND, AS WELL AS CITY CREWS.

CAN CLEAN UP AND LIGHT UP HOMES AGAIN.

AND THAT MAKES GARY GRIFFIN A LITTLE MORE SATISFIED.

"We were lucky. If it had been about 25-30 yards this way, we'd have gotten high force winds into our building and it would have done serious damage." 6pm PKG 1:30,11pm Vo/Sot:45

"The hotel, the parking, the grocery store, the restaurant, all of that brings viability. It obviously brings more sales tax dollars to downtown. It brings people who are spending their money to the downtown area, and that's what we want."

CITY COUNCIL APPROVED A TERM SHEET ON THE PROJECT BACK IN JANUARY.

AS NEGOTIATIONS WENT ON, THINGS STRAYED AWAY FROM THAT TERM SHEET.

SO, THE CITY CEASED NEGOTIATIONS.

CITY COUNCILOR DICK PHELAN SAYS HE WAS SURPRISED WHEN THE DEAL FELL THROUGH.

THE CITY CURRENTLY HAS 600 PARKING SPACES DOWNTOWN, BUT PHELAN SAYS MORE ARE NEEDED.

"We're getting more people downtown, and when they come to downtown to the commercial establishments, they want to have some place to park that's near where they are going to go. That's the real crux. If we can't develop the parking place, we're going to lose people who want to come and shop at our commercial establishments."

"For some folks here in the city, this project no longer going forward is a blessing in disguise." THAT'S THE SENTIMENT OF KEEP AUBURN LOVELY.

THEY REALIZE THE CITY IS GROWING, BUT THEY WANT IT TO BE DONE IN A WAY TO PRESERVE THE COLLEGE TOWN FEEL.

"You start changing the complexion of the little town, and you start making it like Downtown Atlanta where it's really tall, really congested, with the ensuing traffic jams, you might as well have gone to Georgia Tech."

"I went after the guy and was just like 'you lit the tree on fire!' I was just like, you did this, what is wrong with you? You did this? He was just like, no. He started to walk away from me. I was like, nope.'

TAYLOR SAYS THAT PERSON WAS JOCHEN (YO-HEN) WIEST (WEE-ST).

TODAY HE WAS CHARGED WITH PUBLIC INTOXICATION, DESECRATING A VENERABLE OBJECT AND FELONY CRIMINAL MISCHIEF.

AUBURN HORTICULTURIST GARY KEEVER SAYS THE TREE'S CONDITION HAS WORSENED.

HE EXPECTS THE LEAVES TO FALL OFF THE TREE IN SEVEN TO 10 DAYS.

WRIGHT'S MARKET IS **CURRENTLY TESTING A NEW** ONLINE SHOPPING SERVICE. "We will actually deliver groceries to your house. You order online. We can deliver to your home." "A lot of people we hear from don't even have the ability, physical ability, to get out and go to the store. So we see that as another way we can reach our customers."

JIMMY'S COMMITMENT TO HIS CUSTOMERS GOES WELL BEYOND JUST WHAT HE CAN OFFER THEM THROUGH HIS STORE. "Several years ago...just began to hear from a lot of our longtime, older customers about changes in their neighborhoods over in the south part

of Opelika."

JIMMY HAS BECOME ACTIVELY INVOLVED IN SEEKING IMPROVEMENTS FOR THOSE AREAS.

"We came up with a plan to revitalize two neighborhoods in our community... Carver and Jeter. That plan encompasses housing and a new road, a bike path and sidewalks."

I ASKED JIMMY WHAT WOULD HAPPEN IF WRIGHT'S MARKET WAS NO LONGER THERE.

CUTHBERT INTERIM POLICE CHIEF JENNIFER FAIRBANKS EXPLAINS THAT BRIDGING THE GAP BETWEEN BLACK LIVES AND BLUE LIVES STARTS WITH ENGAGING ALL LIVES.

'We're reaching out to our communities to let them know that we stand behind them and we want them to support us. That's the purpose of recognizing the black and the blue."

MANY PEOPLE ARE TURNING TO FAITH TO TRY

AND UNDERSTAND EACH SIDE'S STRUGGLE.

"Love goes to all sides. It doesn't matter if it's the police side or the other side. The role of the church is not to pick sides. The role of the church is to love each person.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE GERALD GREENE SAYS GOVERNOR NATHAN DEAL IS PROPOSING INCREASED MEASURES IN SUPPORT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT.

"We have always advocated doing something, not just locking people up, but doing something to help them."

MEANWHILE, THE CUTHBERT COMMUNITY IS COMING TOGETHER, REGARDLESS OF RACE, TO MAKE SURE VIOLENCE DOESN'T STAND IN THE WAY OF SAFETY.

"We ain't gonna make everybody happy. But we have a job to do, we have an oath. So we have to do that. But our community pretty much supports us well."

"When you go out there and hunt this stuff and let's say you pick up a bottle or you pick up an arrowhead..you're picking up somebody's life. Somebody's history, somebody's memories...you're holding that in your hands."

COLUMBUS POLICE OFFICER, MISTY PARISH, WAS PATROLING HER AREA WHEN SHE STUMBLED ACROSS THE 'HOMELESS HUNTERS" LOOKING AT ARTIFACTS.

"I rode by a few weeks ago and I saw some guys cleaning bottles and I was just curious to see what they were doing, so I stopped and spoke with them and I was actually really intrigued with what they had to say."

FELLOW HUNTER WILLIAM JONES WANTS TO KEEP THE WATER CLEAN TO MAKE IT SAFER FOR FAMILIES.

"We don't want anybody's foot getting cut and stuff like that and this is the history and we want more people to come and see about Columbus, Georgia."

"JUST NOW THEY COLLECTED TEN MARBLES WHICH COULD COST MORE THAN A HUNDRED DOLLARS AT AN ANTIQUE STORE."

JOEY HOPES TO BE HIRED BY THE CITY, TO REGULATE WHAT'S IN THE RIVER.

I would like to work with the city and maybe they can give me a job or something. I would like to make the river clean and beautiful like it's supposed to be.

THIS VIDEO SHOWS WHAT JACOB BARFIELD THOUGHT WERE HIS FINAL MOMENTS. HE CAUGHT THE TERRIFYING EXPERIENCE ON HIS GOPRO WHILE KAYAKING TWO WEEKS AGO.

"I came over hit a rock sideways, turned back over, so I was coming down backwards. I was feeling the rocks on my head, it broke the go-pro off my head."

BARFIELD GREW UP ON THE RAPIDS AND IS NOW A CERTIFIED GUIDE INSTRUCTOR FOR WHITEWATER EXPRESS.

BUT EVEN THE ELITE CAN BE CAUGHT OFF GUARD IN TRICKY WATERS. COLUMBUS FIRE CHIEF, RICKY SHORES, SAYS WEARING THE RIGHT GEAR COULD BE WHAT KEEPS YOU ALIVE - WHEN SECONDS MATTER.

"Make sure you have a proper flotation device and make sure that it's on at all times. Just use good common sense. Respect the water and understand that without those life saving pieces of equipment, that we're required to wear, we could wind up in peril."

BUT NOT JUST ANY LIFE VEST WILL DO -- YOU WANT TO MAKE SURE IT'S APPROVED AND IT FITS.

"There may be some things that you want to check for before picking out your next life jacket. make sure that you see a UL listed and coast guard approved stamp on it, as well as, it's the right chest range and weight size for your own body."

SANNA BALL IS A CERTIFIED WHITEWATER INSTRUCTOR.
SHE AND HER DAUGHTER ENJOY OUTDOOR WATER ACTIVITIES ALONG THE CHATTAHOOCHEE.

BALL SAYS INSTILLING GOOD SAFETY HABITS ALL STARTS BY SETTING AN EXAMPLE - AT AN EARLY AGE.

"If you're a parent and you're not wearing a life jacket, or if you're in your boat and you have it stashed to the side, or just don't feel like putting it on, your kids see that."

TAKING THE TIME TO PUT ON THE PROPER LIFE JACKET IS A GOOD HABIT THAT BARFIELD SAYS HE'S GRATEFUL HE ADOPTED EARLY ON.

"If I wasn't wearing the life jacket, it would have taken me two or three more seconds to get up on top of the water, and that could have been the difference." **6pm PKG 1:30,11pm Vo/Sot:45**

7/25 Mental Health And Law Enforcement -FOR LUANNE HELMS, HER 17 YEAR OLD SON JAKE IS HER WORLD.

RECENTLY, THEY WERE OUT IN DOWNTOWN OPELIKA ON THEIR NORMAL WALK.

HELMS SAYS SOMETHING SET JAKE OFF, AND HE TOOK OFF RUNNING.

SHE WAS SCARED PEOPLE WOULD MISUNDERSTAND HIS BEHAVIOR.

"That's the Autism in him. That's not Jake, but I was afraid to call the police to get help because we just needed a ride to get back home. What if they would have come up and taken him as a threat when he wasn't a threat?"

HELMS STARTED LOOKING AT HOW JAKE MAY BE PERCEIVED BY THE COMMUNITY AND LAW ENFORCEMENT.

SHE WAS CONCERNED FOR HIS SAFETY.

THE INCIDENT IN MIAMI WHERE A POLICE OFFICER WAS AIMING FOR AN AUTISTIC MAN BECAUSE HE THOUGHT HE WAS THREAT, CONCERNED HELMS EVEN MORE.

THAT'S WHY SHE SAYS LAW ENFORCEMENT TRAINING ON MENTAL ILLNESS IS CRUCIAL.

FOR THE SECOND YEAR, SHE IS TRAINING LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS HOW TO HANDLE THOSE WITH DISORDERS LIKE AUTISM.

"It could make the difference between a life and death situation in reality. It could save a child or an adults life with them having the proper training."

"Lee County Sheriff Jay Jones says these incidents stem from a breakdown in communication, but he says his deputies are trained to make sure incidents do not happen."

IN ADDITION TO A BREAKDOWN IN COMMUNICATION THE SHERIFF SAYS INCIDENTS CAN HAPPEN DUE TO A LACK OF AWARENESS.

"When you have those two things come into play, then obviously it can result in issues that could be avoided simply having an understanding of circumstances and knowing the behavioral signs and knowing what to look for."

"When my husband leaves the house people see the uniform, but I see the man underneath the uniform because he's my husband."

RAY SMITH, THE PHENIX CITY POLICE CHIEF, SAYS OFFICERS PUT THEIR LIVES ON THE LINE EVERYDAY.

"Law enforcement officers have been shot at an 80 percent increase this year alone and of course when you take the Baton Rouge or the Dallas shootings that spikes it and it doesn't go unnoticed."

LOCKETTE IS FEELING UNEASY BECAUSE OF THE NATIONWIDE TENSION BETWEEN SOME PROTESTORS AND POLICE OFFICERS.

"Lately I've been concerned because of the things that are going on in the world today."

THE THIN BLUE LINE BILL WOULD ALLOW THE STATE TO PURSUE CHARGES AND THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO PURSUE CAPITAL CHARGES TO ANYONE THAT HARMS A POLICE OFFICER.

"Definitely shows support because the killing of a police officer is a special threat to the community because if people don't have any respect for a police officer then they certainly won't have any respect for the citizens."

MEANWHILE LOCKETTE DOESN'T THINK THE BILL WILL CHANGE CRIMINALS MINDS WHO WANT TO INTENTIONALLY HURT LAW ENFORCEMENT.

"Will it change anything probably not because when people are doing things they're not thinking about the consequences because they're just reacting."

DOCTOR KIM OWENS BELIEVES EVERYONE SHOULD CARE ABOUT STATEWIDE MEDICAID CUTS, BECAUSE EVERYONE COULD FEEL THE EFFECTS.

"If physicians are forced to downsize their practices, lay off staff, and and in some situations, close their practices, this will mean less access to care for every Alabamian."

"Greg Nichols, an administrator here at the East Alabama Medical Center in Opelika, says it could take months for patients to feel the effects of Medicaid cuts."

GOVERNOR ROBERT BENTLEY PROPOSED A STATE LOTTERY THAT WOULD BRING IN

225-MILLION DOLLARS TO REFILL THE MEDICAID BUDGET.

"It seems like an easy fix. But I think most states have proven that over a period of time, there's still issues with a lottery."

THERE'S ALSO THE 75-MILLION DOLLARS ALABAMA POCKETED FROM THE B-P OIL SPILL PAYOUT.

BUT MEDICAID MUST COMPETE FOR FUNDING WITH DAMAGED INFRASTRUCTURE FROM THAT SPILL, AS WELL AS THE STATE'S CORRECTIONAL SYSTEM.

HOWEVER, WITHOUT A SOLUTION...

"There are obvious, undesirable decisions that must be made. And who will suffer the most? Our patients."

NICHOLS EXPECTS LONGER WAIT TIMES AMONG OTHER PROBLEMS, AS PATIENTS LEAVE PRIVATE PRACTICES IN FAVOR OF HOSPITALS.

"Anyone that comes in our emergency room, we're going to take care of. Whether they pay or not, that's not going to change."

"And if it does not run or run too fast, too slow or completely stops we call a stagnation that's when the disease starts and that's when most of the pain and all the other symptoms start to come out."

AND APPLYING PRESSURE TO THOSE PLACES RESTORES THE ENERGY FLOW AND STOPS THE PAIN. FOR THESE SMALLER CUPS, A DEVICE IS CLAMPED ONTO THE TIP TO PRODUCE THE VACUUM EFFECT. BUT FOR THESE LARGER CUPS, HERE'S HOW THE PROCESS WORKS. FIRE IS USED TO HEAT THE CUP. THE CUP IS PLACED ON THE SKIN. AS THE AIR INSIDE THE CUP COOLS, IT CREATES A VACUUM. HE CHOOSES THE SAME PRESSURE POINTS AS IF HE WERE USING ACUPUNCTURE. FOR SUSAN CULPEPPER, THE COMBINED THERAPIES KEEP HER ON THE TENNIS COURT.

"Migraines are a very common condition especially among women. Studies have shown that one out of three women will get a migraine headache sometime during their life."

KHAN SAYS THERE ARE A FEW THINGS THAT CAUSE MIGRAINES.

"Sunlight is a big trigger, hormonal changes in women and girls and certain foods with MSG are well known triggers."

BAILEY SAYS BEING IN THE SUNLIGHT CAN MAKE HER HEADACHES MORE SEVERE.

"Sometimes I just want to work in the dark and be in a completely dark room because of the light sensitivity that it causes you to have."

BAILEY HAS A SET ROUTINE EVERY NIGHT.

SHE TAKES MEDICATION AND GETS BOTOX EVERY THREE MONTHS.

KHAN SAYS IF YOU CONTINUALLY GET MIGRAINES BE CAREFUL WHAT MEDICINES YOU TAKE.

"Sometimes these medications do what we call medication rebound headaches which is when your body starts getting used to these medications and when a certain level of these medications are not present in your system you get an adverse headache."

BAILEY'S HAS BEEN A PATIENT OF DOCTOR KHAN'S FOR A FEW YEARS NOW AND SHE'S STARTING TO SEE RESULTS.

WALLETHUB RANKED GEORGIA 46TH IN INFANT MORTALITY RATE, 47TH IN LOW BIRTH WEIGHT, AND 43RD IN THE RATE OF PRE-TERM BIRTHS. PEDIATRICIAN TOREY HARDEN WITH WEST GEORGIA PHYSICIANS SAYS ACCESS TO PRE-NATAL AND POST-NATAL HEALTH CARE WEIGHS HEAVILY IN THOSE NUMBERS.

"Then also access to neo-natal nurseries and ICU's even after the babies are born will all contribute to infant mortality as well as low birth weight infants and basically healthy pregnancies."

DR. HARDEN SAYS THERE ARE THINGS A WOMAN CAN DO TO HAVE A HEALTHY BABY. SUCH AS PRE-NATAL VITAMINS AND A HEALTHY DIET. THERE ARE THINGS SHE SHOULD AVOID AS WELL.

"Also avoiding things like smoking, alcohol, you know as well as other substances."

"I also dabbled briefly with the idea of going into the professional ministry. And I thought that's where I need to be. But it turns out, it wasn't. And probably good for the Baptist Church that didn't happen. (laugh)"

RON MAJORED IN ENGLISH AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA AND BECAME A PUBLIC SCHOOL TEACHER.

I've been here. How many of them are professional actors? Out of 6,000 I would guess fewer than 50. Maybe 100. I don't know. I know some personally who are and very successful. Good.

"What is remarkable about America, is that not withstanding our differences, we are still one." "It's a lot of hard work to become a citizen, a lot harder than being born I think."

FOR BUCKLEY-BREEDEN, HER FAMILY HELPED TO EASE THAT DIFFICULT WORKLOAD.

"Fill out paperwork or anything dealing with my citizenship or green card...anything to do with immigration process, they were there."

HER NAME WAS KERIS BEMBRY. KERIS MEANS LOVE, CHARITY. TO HER FAMILY, HER FRIENDS, HER TEACHERS, SHE WAS SO MUCH MORE. SHE WAS WISE BEYOND HER FOUR YEARS WHEN IT CAME TO HER SPIRITUALITY.

"Everyone that she come across she would somehow manage to bring a smile to their face or tell them something about spiritual growth or her spirituality and that was her."

IN OCTOBER OF 2013, THIS UPBEAT, FUN-LOVING 4 YEAR OLD STARTED HAVING HEADACHES. SHE EERILY DESCRIBED THE FEELING TO HER MOTHER.

"And she said mom, I feel like bones are churning in the back of my head. And that description was so alarming to me."

KERIS WAS DIAGNOSED WITH EVERYTHING FROM BRONCHITIS, TO ANXIETY TO A VIRUS, AND ULTIMATELY A BRAIN TUMOR.

"Based on the position and where it was, it was called DIPG, Diffuse Intrinsic Pontine Glioma, a pretty long name."

SIMPLY STATED, IT WAS A DEATH SENTENCE.

""It was a, it was cancerous, a cancerous tumor, and it was inoperable." WORDS THAT DID NOT SCARE KERIS.

"I can remember one conversation where she told us that she wasn't scared to die you know she was just like mom, dad, I'm not scared to die you know I'm going to Heaven."

BUT THEY WERE GOING TO FIGHT. KERIS WAS GIVEN 6 MONTHS TO LIVE AT THE AGE OF 4. HER PARENTS TRAVELED WITH HER TO ATLANTA, HOUSTON AND CINCINNATI, FOR TREATMENT TRIALS THAT GAVE KERIS KINDERGARTEN GRADUATION AND HER SIXTH BIRTHDAY. THE TREATMENTS AND TRAVEL DEPLETED THEIR RESOURCES, BUT THEY SAY IT WAS WORTH IT. DEIDRE AND TREY BEMBRY CREATED KERIS KARES, A FOUNDATION THAT RAISES FUNDS FOR FAMILIES OF CHILDREN WITH DIPG, GIVING OTHER PARENTS THE OPPORTUNITY TO FIGHT.

"Because their bills keep coming, their jobs are only flexible to an extent, and when you have a child that's dealing with pediatric cancer, everything in your life completely comes to a standstill." SERGEANT LANCE DEATON WITH THE COLUMBUS POLICE DEPARTMENT DISAPPROVES OF CITY COUNCIL'S

VOTE TO IMPLEMENT NEW HEALTHCARE INCREASES FOR THE NEXT FISCAL YEAR. "We're shortchanging our citizens, our taxpayers, and our public employees by just saying this is all we can do."

THE INITIAL VOTE FAILED TO PASS, BUT AFTER LEARNING OF POTENTIALLY HARMFUL CONSEQUENCES TO THE CITY'S BOTTOM LINE, COUNCIL APPROVED THE INCREASE.

"Health coverage rates have increased and they've given us little bumps to compensate for them."

THE CHANGES HAVE LEFT SOME EMPLOYEES IN LOWER INCOME BRACKETS...WORRIED ABOUT COVERING HEALTHCARE COSTS.

"They're not seeing the COLA making up for that full increase. So it was good to hear consideration of adjusting those pay grades to help offset costs for those groups."

"It takes a lot of time to process what's impacting this expense and how can we manage it." SERGEANT DEATON SAYS THE RISING COSTS

WILL HURT THE POLICE DEPARTMENT'S ABILITY TO OFFER OVERTIME PAY, AS WELL AS OFFICER RETENTION.

"The goal is, and we've talked about it is to appropriately fund the plan and set these contributions where they need to be, we will not continue to incur these types of increases year after year."

EVEN WITH THE VOTE PASSED, COUNCIL STILL HAS PLENTY OF QUESTIONS ABOUT EXPECTED BUDGET SHORTFALLS WHEN IT COMES TO HEALTHCARE.

HIS BRAIN AND SPINAL CORD ARE AFFECTED THE MOST.

THE HEATHERLY'S SAY THE DIAGNOSIS CHANGED THEIR LIVES IN MORE WAYS THAN ONE.

"It's made us stronger together. It makes us look at things differently. It makes you realize what's important. It makes you realize that some of the day-to-day things that happen are minimal in comparison.

ALTHOUGH PORTER HAS NEVER SPOKEN A WORD, EVERYTHING HE DOES IS A GIFT TO THE FAMILY AND THE WORLD.

BUT THE FAMILY DOES NOT KNOW HOW MUCH LONGER PORTER WILL BE ABLE TO GIVE THAT GIFT.

"For the past six months or more, we've been kind of going on a day-to-day basis for his health. You can wake up one morning and he's having a lot of trouble breathing or something. It's kind of a roller coaster up and down. It is a day-to-day, and we really don't look too far out into the future. We just take one day at a time and make the most out of each day."

DOCTOR FLORENCE WAKOKO-STUDSTILL, A SOCIOLOGY PROFESSOR AT

COLUMBUS STATE, BELIEVES THE AFRICAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY IS LETTING OUT
FRUSTRATION THAT'S BUILT UP FOR HUNDREDS OF YEARS.

"The history of people trying and working so hard just to make ends meet, but at the same time the history of oppression and how particularly with African Americans and other minorities."

STUDSTILL BELIEVES THE PROTESTS ARE PART OF A CYCLE OF EVENTS. PROTESTING HAS BEEN USED FOR MANY YEARS, AS A WAY FOR THE AFRICAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY TO EXPRESS THEMSELVES.

"The question is are the black men who are rioting, rioting because they belong to this particular group or they're just rioting without a reason? That's not true."

SUDSTILL KNOWS IT'S EASY TO GET WRAPPED UP IN THE HEAT OF THE MOMENT, AND BELIEVES PROTESTORS SHOULD FIGHT THIS BATTLE IN THE COURTS AND NOT ON THE STREETS.

"Use reasoning and say let's change the laws of the land and let's hold people accountable according to the law and follow through. This country is very good at that." **6pm PKG 1:30,11pm Vo/Sot:45**

9/28 HW: Women And Stress -

RESEARCHERS FED 58 WOMEN 2 DIFFERENT MEALS.

"One was a meal that was high in saturated fat, another was high oleic sunflower oil, that's a healthier oil, obviously, than saturated fat."

AFTER WOMEN ATE THE MEAL WITH SATURATED FAT, BLOOD TESTS SHOWED THEIR INFLAMMATION LEVELS WERE HIGHER. AFTER THE HEALTHIER MEAL, THEY WERE LOWER. THEN RESEARCHERS ADDED STRESS INTO THE EQUATION.

"To our surprise, if women had a stressor the day before their meal the type of fat didn't matter." IN THIS STUDY HEALTHIER TYPES OF FAT HAD NO BENEFIT FOR WOMEN WHO WERE STRESSED. THEIR INFLAMMATION MARKERS REMAINED ELEVATED.

"If we can't resolve the stress and the stress physical response, then that's what takes a toll on our health and can lead to increased risk for chronic diseases that are associated with chronic stress."

ONE WAY TO REDUCE STRESS. EXERCISE. CARLOS MOFFETT IS A CERTIFIED PERSONAL TRAINER IN COLUMBUS.

"Working out is definitely going to reduce stress simply becasue you've got to get your endorphines. You've got to find some way to release your endorphines. So I definitely would tell people anytime you're going through any type of depression or not getting enough sleep at night, you definitely want to make sure you get some type of workout, amybe do some cardio, in the morning, start your day off with the cardio and do some type of weight training."

OTHER WAYS TO REDUCE STRESS INCLUDE

TAKE A TIME OUT TO CLEAR YOUR HEAD BY PRACTICING YOGA OR LISTENING TO MUSIC.
