#### **Across Kentucky - March 29, 2019**

A well-known farm broadcaster says he continues to hear quite a bit of optimism from farmers across the country in spite of some challenging years for agriculture. Max Armstrong, who co-hosts “This Week In Agribusiness” on RFD-TV, talks about spending time with farmers, the stories they share with him and the need to spread the word about agriculture.

#### **Across Kentucky - March 28, 2019**

Murray State University Hutson School of Agriculture Dean Dr. Tony Brannon is working to re-brand hemp across the state. Dr. Brannon says Industrial Hemp needs to be replaced by the name Agricultural Hemp because of the many potential uses of the crop that is being grown today.

#### **Across Kentucky - March 27, 2019**

We continue our conversation with Hart County hay producer Clayton Jarrell about his involvement as President of the National Hay Association. Jarrell also talks about the challenges of the hay industry and the pride he has in the product produced on his farm.

#### **Across Kentucky - March 26, 2019**

A Hart County farmer has found his place in the hay industry as he produces top quality product for the horse industry. Clayton Jarrell talks about how he got started in the hay business, the way he markets the hay from the farm and his family’s involvement in the farming operation.

#### **Across Kentucky - March 25, 2019**

Farmers from Kentucky and surrounding states sold beef cattle of various breeds for top dollar at the Kentucky Farm Bureau Beef Expo this year. Board Chairman John Chism talks about the number of head in the show and sale, how the cattle sold and the youth activities that took place this year.

#### **Across Kentucky - March 22, 2019**

The Kentucky Ag Tag Program raised more than \$600,000 in 2018 to help Kentucky 4-H and FFA members, and the Kentucky Proud Program thanks to farmers donating an extra \$10 when renewing licenses for the year. Kentucky Agriculture Commissioner Ryan Quarles talks about the importance of the program, how farmers can participate and what their participation will ultimately do.

#### **Across Kentucky - March 21, 2019**

Daviess County farmer Scott Zoglman was recognized for raising a soybean crop that produced 100 bushels per acre. We talk with Zoglman about his crop, when he planted it, what he planted and how his harvest turned out.

#### **Across Kentucky - March 20, 2019**

We continue our National Agriculture Day conversation with Indiana farmer Isabella Chism, who chaired the National Ag Day events and serves as vice-chair of the American Farm Bureau Women’s organization. She talks about the importance of sharing the story of agriculture and the need for all farmers to be willing to tell their story.

#### **Across Kentucky - March 19, 2019**

Indiana farmer Isabella Chism says the recent National Agriculture Day celebration was about sharing the story of farmers and agriculture with members of Congress and people around the country. Chism describes the celebration, who participated and the message they sent to Congress and the American consumer.

### **Across Kentucky - March 18, 2019**

Kentucky Farm Bureau is partnering with the Kentucky Department of Agriculture to name the new University of Kentucky Wildcat baseball stadium Kentucky Proud Park. Agriculture Commissioner Ryan Quarles discusses the partnership, the exposure the park will provide and how agriculture will benefit.

### **Across Kentucky - March 15, 2019**

The University of Kentucky is hosting a number of Kentucky Agriculture Training Schools this year at the Research and Education Center in Princeton. KATS Coordinator Lori Rogers talks about the schools, the topics being covered, the training participants receive and how to sign up.

### **Across Kentucky - March 14, 2019**

Kentucky Farm Bureau's Outstanding Youth, Marcus Wiseman and Lauren Rowlett, were among those attending the Congressional Tour. Wiseman and Rowlett talked about their experience in Washington, DC, what they have learned about the role of Farm Bureau and the message they hoped to leave behind with their members of Congress.

### **Across Kentucky - March 13, 2019**

Farm Bureau members also heard from five of the six members of the Kentucky Congressional Delegation during the annual Farm Bureau Congressional Tour. The Congressional Delegation addressed topics ranging from rural broadband to trade, labor issues and a number of other topics.

### **Across Kentucky - March 12, 2019**

More than 300 Kentucky Farm Bureau members met with Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell and Senator Rand Paul during the annual Congressional Tour. Senators McConnell and Paul talked about important agriculture issues including trade, industrial hemp, socialism, the impact of Farm Bureau and the possibility of association health plans.

### **Across Kentucky - March 11, 2019**

Members of the Kentucky Farm Bureau Women's organization gathered in Lexington recently for the annual Women's Leadership Conference. Farm Bureau Women's Advisory Committee Chairman Vickie Bryant talks about the conference, some of the highlights and the message shared by the keynote speaker.

### **Across Kentucky - March 8, 2019**

Retired University of Kentucky Extension Forage Specialist Dr. Gary Lacefield says it is more important than ever for agriculture to educate others about the work on the farm and the mission of agriculture. Lacefield talked about his work with forages, technology in the forage industry and the connection between agriculture and urban America.

### **Across Kentucky - March 7, 2019**

American Farm Bureau President Zippy Duvall says 2018 was a big year for agriculture policy, with some major priorities on the table for 2019. Duvall, who was recently in Kentucky, says Trade and Farm Labor are two of the major issues that still need to be addressed.

Although the FFA organization allowed women into the organization in 1969, it would take 30 years for FFA members to elect their first female president in Kentucky. We visit with Kentucky's first female FFA President Jessamine County native Susan Wright, talk about the impact of FFA in her life and how she was able to give back to members of the organization.

### **Across Kentucky - March 5, 2019**

Kentucky Farm Bureau President Mark Haney says it is important for county Farm Bureau Presidents to know the priorities of farming and agriculture in the state. Haney talked with county presidents and vice-presidents about priorities and their role as leaders during the 2019 KFB Presidents and Vice Presidents Conference that took place in Louisville in February.

### **Across Kentucky - March 4, 2019**

Kentucky Agriculture Commissioner Ryan Quarles says it is critical for the Kentucky General Assembly to pass a meat labeling bill that will protect Kentucky Agriculture from lab grown meat products that are being developed. Quarles says the fake meat bill, that is being debated in the Kentucky General Assembly, will protect the beef cattle, pork and poultry industry, and will ensure Kentucky consumers know what they are eating.

### **Across Kentucky – March 1, 2019**

The American Soybean Association and Valent USA are looking for applicants for the 2019 Agriculture Voices of America Program that will take place this summer in Washington, DC. Jeff Smith with Valent USA talks about the history of the program, what participants will learn and how to apply.

### **Across Kentucky – February 28, 2019**

Kentucky Farm Bureau will partner with the Kentucky Department of Agriculture to host the annual Beef Expo this weekend at the Kentucky Exposition Center in Louisville. Expo Board President John Chism talks about the shows and sales, youth events and the trade show that will take place Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

### **Across Kentucky – February 27, 2019**

Kentucky Corn Growers President Mark Roberts says corn farmers faced some tough challenges in 2018, but are hoping a new Canada Mexico Trade deal will bring some better prices in 2019. Roberts also talks about a special car that is bringing attention to the benefits of E-85 ethanol in Kentucky.

### **Across Kentucky – February 26, 2019**

FFA chapters from the across the state partnered with one National Farm Machinery Show exhibitor to hand out popcorn and take donations for chapter activities this year. Madison Central FFA President Lydia Carey talks about their chapter, how they plan to use the donations and what students are learning in the FFA and Vocational Agriculture program at the school.

### **Across Kentucky – February 25, 2019**

Kentucky Farm Bureau members are in Washington, DC this week for the annual Congressional Tour. First Vice-President Eddie Melton says members will be meeting with the Kentucky Congressional delegation and will likely discuss trade, rural broadband and a number of other topics.

### **Across Kentucky - February 22, 2019**

Kentucky FFA Advisor Matt Chaliff says FFA is touching many lives in the state, but has also left a lasting mark on many leaders. Chaliff discusses FFA Week activities, the role former members play in their communities and across the state, and the impact of FFA Advisers.

### **Across Kentucky - February 21, 2019**

Menifee County FFA members will collect food for the community animal shelter and host an impromptu speaking contest, among other activities during the National FFA Week. Program Director Sarah Vaughn talks about the grant program, what farmers can sell and how they can apply to participate this year.

### **Across Kentucky – February 13, 2019**

The Kentucky Soybean Board is using checkoff dollars to help promote the use of soybeans, conduct research and look for new ways to utilize soybeans. Kentucky Soybean Board Chairman Ryan Bivins talks about how the money is used, what return farmers can see and how the work in Kentucky integrates with the United Soybean Board.

### **Across Kentucky – February 12, 2019**

The National Farm Machinery Show has become a tradition for many people who have been attending for a number of years. Kentucky Exposition Center Communications Director Ian Cox says this year's show will feature product introductions, renewing of acquaintances, competitive tractor pulls and a different way to celebrate Valentine's day.

### **Across Kentucky – February 11, 2019**

The National Farm Machinery Show kicks off Wednesday at the Kentucky Exposition Center in Louisville. Kentucky Venues President and CEO David Beck previews the National Farm Machinery Show, talks about what people can see and the important connection the show makes between rural and urban people.

### **Across Kentucky - February 8, 2019**

After meeting the 2019-2020 Kentucky Farm Bureau Lead Class Thursday, class facilitator Jackson Tolle talks about the initial meeting of the class in January and their participation in the Kentucky Farm Bureau Congressional Tour in February. Tolle also talks about what the class will do in year two, including the class out-of-state trip that will be planned during the next year and a half.

### **Across Kentucky - February 7, 2019**

The 2019-20 Kentucky Farm Bureau Lead Class includes a wide variety of Kentucky Agriculture leaders from all parts of the state. Class facilitator Jackson Tolle talks about who is in the class and describes their backgrounds.

#### **Across Kentucky - February 6, 2019**

Kentucky Congressman James Comer recently received the New Member of Congress Award from American Farm Bureau President Zippy Duvall. Congressman Comer talks about the award, his involvement with Farm Bureau and his work in Congress and as a member of the House Agriculture Committee.

#### **Across Kentucky - February 5, 2019**

Kentucky farmers can nominate school districts to receive a grant through the America's Farmers Grow Rural Education Program. Coordinator Erin Glarner describes the program, how farmers can nominate a school district, how grant funds have been used previously in Kentucky and other details.

#### **Across Kentucky - February 4, 2019**

A central Kentucky farmer says 2018 wound up on a positive note, but had it's challenges. Ryan Bivins from Hodgenville talks about his farming operation, some of the challenges in 2018, why he enjoys farming and his involvement in the agriculture industry.

#### **Across Kentucky - February 1, 2019**

The Kentucky Department of Agriculture issued a record number of industrial hemp permits that allows a record acreage to be grown. Kentucky Ag Commissioner Ryan Quarles talks about the number of permits, the acreage, the number of potential new industrial manufacturers and writing new regulations following the 2018 Farm Bill signing.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 31, 2019**

Kentucky is home to 2019 American Soybean Association President Davie Stevens of Wingo. President Stevens talks about serving as the leader of the American Soybean Association, the role of the organization and some of his goals for his term as President.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 30, 2019**

Most all Kentucky farmers will be within close proximity of a Dicamba training session this Spring. University of Kentucky Weed Specialist Dr. Travis Leglighter talks about the upcoming sessions, what will be covered and importance of proper training and application.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 29, 2019**

Farmers who use Dicamba herbicides this year are facing some changes in application requirements being imposed by the Environmental Protection Agency. University of Kentucky Weed Specialist Dr. Travis Leglighter details the changes will be in place this year.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 28, 2019**

The deadline to apply for the second round of Market Facilitation Program payments through the Farm Service Agency Office has been extended due to the government shutdown. Kentucky FSA Director Brian Lacefield talks about the length of the sign-up period, the reporting deadline and other programs affected by the shutdown that began in late December.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 25, 2019**

The extremely wet year in Kentucky has left crops in the fields in parts of central and eastern Kentucky. University of Kentucky Grain and Forage Center of Excellence Director Dr. Chad Lee analyzes the 2018 crop, discusses some of the impacts of the wet year and how world demand has affected Kentucky farmers.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 24, 2019**

Kentucky experienced near record rainfall in 2018, with more than 80 inches recorded at one location in the southeastern part of the state. State Climatologist Dr. Stuart Foster talks about precipitation totals for 2018, the dry parts of the state, the wettest areas of Bluegrass and the overall precipitation trends.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 23, 2019**

We continue the conversation with Union County farmer Jason Greenwell, who placed 3<sup>rd</sup> in the National Corn yield contest. Greenwell talks about marketing the 2018 crops, his options for selling his crops, the importance of the family farm and his son's roles on the farm.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 22, 2019**

Union County farmer Jason Greenwell, who owns and operates Greenway Farms with his brothers, placed 3<sup>rd</sup> in the National Corn yield contest in 2018. Greenwell talks about his corn crop, what variety he used and discusses other details about the 2018 crop year.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 21, 2019**

Murray State University Hutson School of Agriculture and the Kentucky Soybean Association will partner to host the 15<sup>th</sup> Annual Soybean Promotion Day Tuesday, January 22nd. Rae Wagoner with the Kentucky Soybean Association talks about the events planned, the guest speakers and the topics that will be covered.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 18, 2019**

Kentucky Agriculture Commissioner Ryan Quarles says updates to the Grain Indemnity Fund and regulations concerning the labeling of lab-grown meats are two issues he is hoping the Kentucky General Assembly will address this year. Quarles also discussed the county fair grant program that was funded by the 2018 Kentucky General Assembly and how that is helping counties across the state.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 17, 2019**

The average cost of 40 basic food items decreased for the second quarter in a row in 2018, although food prices increased slightly for the year. Kentucky Farm Communications Director Todd Bright discusses the final Market Basket Survey for 2018, what increased, what decreased and how much of the price of food makes it back to the farm.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 16, 2019**

The Kentucky Commodity Conference will celebrate its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary this week in Bowling Green with a variety of topics on the program for Thursday, January 17. Kentucky Corn and Small Grain Growers Executive Director Laura Knoth talks about the speakers, the topics they will cover, the awards ceremony and a special 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 15, 2019**

Cattle producers from across the state will gather in Owensboro January 17 and 18 for the annual Kentucky Cattlemen's Convention. Executive Director Dave Maples previews the convention, the guest speakers, the topics that will be covered and the hall of fame induction ceremony.

#### **Across Kentucky - January 14, 2019**
