First Quarter 2024

SCHOOLS

- --Faced with declining enrollments like many districts, the Olympia School District proposed cutting a 3 ½ million dollar budget cap by closing two elementary schools. Parents were outraged, and led a successful effort in court to delay for at least a year any school closures. Parents and people opposed to closing schools said cuts could be made in other areas, including cuts to administration staff.
- --While contemplating elementary school closures, the district abandoned plans to build a new high school.

CRIME

- --The number of juveniles committing crimes increased since the new year began. Kids as young as 12 and 13 involved in car thefts, armed hold-ups, and so called "crash and grabs", where a vehicle is used to smash into a business to steal merchandise.
- --The State legislature approved changes to Washington States pursuit laws, which for 2 years limited when police could pursue criminal suspects. Police were prohibited from pursuing vehicles even if the vehicle was reported to be stolen. This triggered a huge increase in car thefts. Washington citizens overwhelmingly signed an initiative to lawmakers making changes to the pursuit laws.

DRUGS

--Fentanyl overdoses continue to claim lives. Several high-profile busts by law enforcement agencies in the area have been made. Thousands of pounds of fentanyl pills and powder have been seized but the supply continues to flow.

HOUSING

--Lawmakers failed to pass legislation designed to stem the tide of huge rent increases across the state, but local leaders hearing from the public to impose some form of rent

control. The Olympia City Council approved several measures to help renters including limits on move in fees, pet deposits, and other fees. Rents in the Capitol city up an average of 40% over the past 3 years.

--Several new facilities opened in the South Sound to house the homeless. Several former motels were purchased as transitional housing. Many encampments used by the homeless along area freeways were dismantled because of safety concerns, and large boulders put in place to prevent further occupation of the areas.

TRAFFIC

--In 2023, traffic fatalities hit their highest level in nearly 30 years in Washington State, and the trend continues in 2024. Several multi-fatality crashes have occurred. Police blame impaired and distracted driving for the crashes along with high speeds.
