The plan would let students take traditional vocational classes, but also start internships, partnerships, and relationships to learn skills in business, IT, ag, and healthcare.

NORMAL - Memories of a transportation debacle in August were fresh in the minds of Unit Five school board members Wednesday night, as they approved spending up to 3.5 million dollars to buy a fleet of school buses and transit vans. Complicated routes, late and overcrowded buses plagued the district the first several weeks of the school year, calling into question the performance of administrators and the busing contractor, First Student.

"Part of our changes in what we've done this year in regards to transportation is because of funding," superintendent Mark Daniel told news partner WMBD-TV. "If we don't get those payments, we will certainly be in greater deficit."

Board members John Trask and Gail Ann Briggs called on administrators to perfect a communication plan with First Student and with the public. Business manager Marty Hickman said he expects delivery of the 54 buses and half-dozen transit vans to arrive 12-to-14 weeks. Hickman added the purchase eliminates the need to rent buses from First Student.

Four Unit Five elementary schools will have new principals when the next school year begins. The board tabbed Moe Backe as principal at Glenn. Former Glenn principal Julia Schoonover moves to Fox Creek, as Dennis Lafson assumes other administrative

duties. Sarah Edwards becomes principal at Grove elementary, replacing Tina Fogal, who takes over at Pepper Ridge.

Bloomington Police have arrested a man and a woman from Indiana suspected of a crime spree netting them thousands of dollars in cash and merchandise purchased with stolen credit cards.

37-year old Brent Heitz of Indianapolis and 37-year old Desiree Gill, also known as Desiree Jordan, of Elmwood, Indiana face multiple burglary and theft by deception charges and use of forged credit and debit cards.

Police responded to a call of suspicious activity at Eastland Mall, and officers said they found the pair a short time later loading a van with merchandise bought with a stolen credit card. That card and a purse had reportedly been stolen from a car at a local park.

Police said a follow-up investigation linked the two to the theft of a second purse at another local park on May 5th, which resulted in the loss of more than 11-thousand dollars in cash and merchandise from area stores using stolen bank and credit cards.

Police said the woman was able to withdraw large amounts of money from victims' accounts using stolen bank cards.

The arrests happened last Thursday, but details were just released. The investigation continues, and anyone with information is asked to call Bloomington Police or McLean County Crimestoppers.

In a statement, Brady praised Radogno as an "incredibly hardworking, principled, and bipartisan leader who truly believes in working across the aisle."

Three Chipotle Mexican Grills in Bloomington-Normal were among the chain's restaurants hit by a cybersecurity attack which sought customers' information stored on their credit cards.

A company blog post revealed the malware, or malicious software, searched for data including card numbers, expiration dates, and internal verification codes.

The affected restaurants include a Chipotle in Bloomington at 3-0-5 North Veterans Parkway, 7-0-1 South Main Street and 16-0-1 East College Avenue, both in Normal.

The breaches happened between March 24th and April 18th, but the company said not all Chipotle's were involved.

Chipotle said it is supporting law enforcement's investigation, improving its security, and working with payment card networks to increase monitoring by the banks that issue the credit cards.
