BLOOMINGTON - Gov. Bruce Rauner has poured millions of dollars into state legislative races in hopes of eliminating the Democrats supermajority.

State Rep. Dan Brady, R-Bloomington, who has been campaigning in his role as assistant minority leader, told WJBC's Scott Laughlin the GOP needs to take just one seat held by Democrats to eliminate that supermajority in the House.

"We've got at least three if not four tier one (House) races we are focusing in on," Brady said.

The only Republican legislator in the Chicago area, House veteran Michael McAuliffe, is trying to hold on to his seat and the GOP has spent nearly \$2 million in advertising to try to save that seat.

Like many Illinois legislators, Brady is running unopposed. Only 48 of the 118 Illinois House seats will be contested on Nov. 8.

BLOOMINGTON - Some see them as a financial windfall, some who live near them consider them a nuisance.

The McLean County Board on Tuesday approved new guidelines for wind farms.

County Board member Catherine Metsker, R-Carlock, said she never envisioned living near industrial wind turbines when she moved to White Oak Township three decades ago. She said the new policy should put in more financial safeguards when these turbines go offline.

"The townships in our county will require significant financial resources to decommission these structures," Metsker said.

County Board member Jim Soeldner, R-Ellsworth, said his township got a big financial boost from wind energy.

"The assessed valuation in Dawson Township went from \$13 million to \$24 million because of the wind farm, so that's help the taxpayers in our township and overall in the county," Soeldner said.

The new guidelines require wind turbines be at least 1,500 feet from a home and be no taller than 550 feet and wildlife study must show minimal impact.

The county held two public hearings on the regulations which the McLean County Farm Bureau had requested. The county held the hearings after Metsker said that little notice was given to residents. Two wind energy companies are looking to apply for a permit for a new wind farm in northeastern McLean County.

"I don't care whether you are Democrat or Republican, I don't want any country messing with American's elections," Durbin said. "If there's any evidence of that let's get it out. If there's not, let's clear up any conspiracy rumors about it."

Stein is seeking recounts in Wisconsin, Pennsylvania and Michigan, even though she says there's no evidence of voter fraud.

McIntyre was not the only board member who will serve another term - Jim Soeldner was also reappointed to as vice chairman. McIntyre explained how the board's experience will be an important factor in ensuring that work is accomplished.

"I think we have a good range of experience on our board, and we need that because our board is the largest downstate county in terms of size," said McIntyre. "We also have almost 900 employees." McIntyre says implementing the county's mental health action plan is a top priority in the coming years.

The increase means the owner of a \$165,000 home will pay about \$13 more next year. Councilwoman Cheryl Gaines said they do not make these types of decisions flippantly. "We do do this based on facts and figures," said Gaines. "And we do know the facts and figures. We do look at the numbers."

The new revenue will be put towards funding police and fire pensions. Councilman Jeff Fritzen said the town chooses to fund its pensions through property taxes for a reason.

"We're protective of other revenue sources because that's how we operate," Fritzen said. Additionally on Monday, the council gave its approval to refinancing a \$23.5 million bond, which is likely to save about \$2.2 million.

"The last five years has seen an increase of over 130 percent increase in the value of food distributed from Midwest Food Bank," said Kieser. "The new location will allow us to accept more food and increase the number of agencies we serve."

The Normal location has nearly 100,000 square feet of warehouse space, more than triple the current 28,000 square foot warehouse. There are five additional semi trailer loading docks and increased parking space for agencies and volunteers.

BLOOMINGTON - State Representative Dan Brady says a bill that passed a House committee to help Exelon keep its nuclear power plants in Clinton and the Quad Cities open is not in its final form, but the company is optimistic enough to put its closing plans on hold.

"The companies have said if they can get something they would extend the period in which they said they would close those two plants," Brady told WJBC's Patti Penn. "They're holding and waiting for the Illinois General Assembly and hopefully there are positive results for everybody involved that we can come up with."

Exelon agreed to eliminate its request for demand-based rates to help refine the bill to something that will benefit the company as well as protect consumers from large rate increases.

Brady said the bill to help Exelon keep its nuclear power plants open had become bloated.

"It's something that blossomed into about a 400-page bill when we're trying to have a measure that deals solely with giving help to the companies that's needed," Brady said.

Brady said the current bill that passed out of committee was pared down enough to focus on what it might take to keep the plants open.

NORMAL - The Normal Town Council on Monday unanimously approved about \$1.8 million in tax rebates for Portillo's.

The rebates will come in the form of food and beverage and sales taxes in a 5 to 7 year period to help make the 8 million dollar redevelopment at 202 Landmark Drive possible. City Manager Mark Peterson explained this is not the first time Normal has offered incentives for a business on Veterans Parkway. "Most of the development that's occurred in the past 15 to 20 years has have had some public benefit in terms of some form of tax incentive," he said.

Councilman R.C. McBride said he went back and forth on the issue.

"What this comes down to for me is would this deal happen without the incentive? And the answer from everything I understand is probably no," said McBride. "And there are some other questions that need to be asked. Would it happen elsewhere if we don't do it? Maybe."

Councilman Scott Preston agreed with the rest of the council in saying he thinks this is a good deal. "It's something that in the long run will bring in revenue to the Town of Normal from people outside of this community," said Preston. "I don't think there's any doubt, especially being the first, that we will have a regional appeal with that Portillo's."

Portillo's estimates their annual sales will be more than \$8 million a year. Their goal is to open by August 2017.

"At the end of the day, we're talking about billions of state dollars. Our taxpayer moneys that are going to Springfield today are routed to school districts," he said.

"As I didn't support terminating you tonight, Nov. 1 is the day," said Trask. "If you guys can't work it out with this group here it's a done deal; and we move on, and we move out and we move forward."

Board member Jim Hayek said he's seen progress as well.

"There's hope. There certainly has not been a sustentative meeting of and of the contract provisions so far, but there's hope that there will be," Hayek said.

If the agreement is not kept, Unit 5 will end the contract with First Student at the end of the school year. The district has already begun drawing up a request for proposals in the event they do seek a new transportation provider.

"We've told them we need to be ensured of a percentage of drivers that are substitute drivers," said Daniel. "And that means they're constantly in the recruiting phase."

The deal also includes First Student paying Unit 5 \$30,000 for violating the terms of the original contract. The contract currently goes through June 2018.

Deer Creek-Mackinaw school district voters are being asked to approve a \$6 million project that would include the first improvements to the football field in decades and installation of the school's first trackand at no net tax increase.

Dee-Mack superintendent Scott Dearman said voters are being asked to approve a 30-cent increase in the education fund rate to \$3.15, but the bond rate for the project would drop by the same amount to 77 cents.

Dearman said the football field has not been updated in decades and has inadequate restrooms, concession areas, press box and lighting, plus the light poles are too close to the field. The superintendent also said the school would finally have a track.

"We have state champion track athletes, but we don't have a track," Dearman said. "They run in our school hallways or they run out in the streets, or they go up to a cemetery that's nearby mainly out of necessity for safety reasons as a place they can go and run and not worry too much about traffic." Dearman says the field and track would be constructed at an angle at the current location to accommodate the new facility's size, and have a more durable surface.

"When we do that, we also eat up our practice field which we use for band, physical education, football and other activities," Dearman said. "That necessitates the need to put in synthetic turf, something that can be used on a daily basis and not show the wear that a natural grass field would."

The field would be a synthetic surface since the new stadium footprint would eliminate a practice area. Dearman says if weather cooperates, the work would be completed by next August.

SPRINGFIELD - Illinois won't be lacking in agriculture education if the Illinois Agriculture in the Classroom (AITC) program succeeds in its goals of nurturing agricultural knowledge.

Kevin Daugherty, education director for the AITC, said the program's purpose is to educate students about the origins of their food and raise awareness on how agriculture affects the world by providing support and training for teachers to integrate agriculture into their math, science, social studies and language curricula.

Daugherty emphasized that AITC is not about teaching agriculture.

"One of our main goals is that we don't teach agriculture; we want to show students what agriculture does for the world around them," Daugherty said.

The program has given hundreds of thousands of dollars to further this cause.

"We have a program in every county in the state," Daugherty said. "In all 102 counties, there is a local contact. Several of our counties receive grants from us, and this year, we awarded over \$600,000 in grants to 80 county coalitions."

The other counties that did not receive grants were provided with support materials, including teacher lesson plans and AITC's award-winning Ag Mag, a four-page weekly-reader type publication about various agricultural products.
