Up to 15 percent of calls to 9-1-1 involve people having a mental health breakdown, yet many call centers, especially in rural areas, have no one with any training on what to do or who to dispatch in those cases. Typically, they send police, who may also have no training on how to handle mental health crises and may inflame the situation. Dr. Vaughan and Ms. Velazquez discuss why this happens and how communities can respond better.
