SCRUTINY IN TEXAS TO DETECT WHETHER EBOLA SPREAD PEDRO ROJAS / DALLAS, TEXAS

The man who has become the first Ebola patient to develop symptoms in the United States told officials at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital on Sept. 26 that he had just arrived from West Africa but was not admitted that day because that information was not passed along at the hospital, officials acknowledged Wednesday. The man, Thomas E. Duncan, was sent home under the mistaken belief that he had only a mild fever, a hospital administrator said; the information that he had traveled from Liberia, one of the nations at the heart of the Ebola epidemic, was overlooked. Some members of the Liberian community in the Dallas area said that given the spread of the disease in their home country, they were skeptical of the health information being released publicly, adding that public gatherings were being canceled out of fear of possible contagion.

WHY HASN'T THE U.S. CLOSED ITS AIRPORTS TO TRAVELERS FROM EBOLA-RAVAGED COUNTRIES?

Now that a man in the United States has been diagnosed with Ebola, some are asking why we haven't stopped allowing people traveling from West Africa into our airports. Thomas Eric Duncan, the patient currently being treated in the Dallas area, boarded a flight from Liberia on Sept. 19 and arrived in Texas on Sept. 20. United Airlines said Wednesday that it was told by the CDC that Duncan had used the airline to travel from Brussels to Dulles International Airport outside Washington, D.C., before flying from

Dulles to Dallas-Fort Worth. Authorities have said repeatedly that there is no danger of anyone getting sick from flying with Duncan because was not symptomatic at the time. With every connecting flight carrying passengers who have recently been in the Ebolaravaged countries of Sierra Leone, Guinea or Liberia, the chances of another exportation increase.

COMPANY RECALLS GROUND BEEF AFTER METAL COMPLAINTS VO: 0:23

Sam Kane Beef Processors of Corpus Christi, Texas, has recalled 90,987 pounds of ground beef products after consumers complained about finding pieces of metal inside the meat, the U.S. Department of Agriculture said Saturday. The USDA said four consumers complained, with one person reporting a chipped tooth. The pieces of metal were reported to be about 3mm, a USDA press release said. Alfred Bausch, general manager for the company, said all the products were shipped to Texas retail outlets. The USDA said the products bear the establishment number "337" inside the USDA mark of inspection. The press release said this is a Class II recall, meaning "there is a remote probability of adverse health consequences from the use of the product."

The historic tide of Latino voters that lifted President Barack Obama in 2012 and raised alarms among Texas Republicans may be ebbing with the approach of the 2014 elections, when the GOP is expected to make gains in Congress and maintain its dominance in Texas. Music has power-especially for individuals with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. And it can spark compelling outcomes even in the very late stages of the disease. When used appropriately, music can shift mood, manage stress-induced agitation, stimulate positive interactions, facilitate cognitive function, and coordinate motor movements. This happens because rhythmic and other well-rehearsed responses require little to no cognitive or mental processing. They are influenced by the motor center of the brain that responds directly to auditory rhythmic cues. A person's ability to engage in music, particularly rhythm playing and singing, remains intact late into the disease process because, again, these activities do not mandate cognitive functioning for success.

HEALTH OFFICIALS PROMISE EXTRA AIRPORT SCREENING FOR EBOLA VO: 0:20

Faced with growing concern over the spread of the Ebola virus, public health officials on Tuesday promised extra measures to screen airline passengers arriving into the United States. But they remained opposed to more draconian travel restrictions that they say would cause more problems than they would solve. Among the measures under consideration by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, temperatures of at-risk passengers would be checked, or they might be subject to detailed questioning upon their arrival in the United States. Dr. Thomas R. Frieden, the agency's director, provided no specific details, a reminder of how easily the disease

can travel and how difficult it is to detect.

Meanwhile, a poll found most Americans want flights banned from Ebola-ravaged areas. Around 200 Air Serv employees who work on domestic flights to LaGuardia began their strike on Wednesday evening. The group is seeking to unionize, and they said health and safety issues on the job - including exposure to blood, feces, and vomit without protective gear - are the main reasons. They are also concerned about possible exposure to the Ebola virus, which claimed its first victim in the United States on Wednesday.

The medical records of the Liberian man who died of the Ebola virus, released Friday by the man's family, raised new questions about the treatment he received when he first sought care at a hospital here. The man, Thomas Eric Duncan, 42, had a high fever - his temperature was 103 degrees - during his four-hour visit to the emergency room of Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital on Sept. 25, according to 1,400 pages of medical records that Mr. Duncan's family provided to The Associated Press. Mr. Duncan reported severe pain, rating it an eight on a scale of one to 10. His fever was marked with an exclamation point in the hospital's record-keeping system.

AS U.S. STEPS UP FIGHT, J.F.K. BEGINS SCREENING PASSENGERS FOR EBOLA

As Ebola continues to ravage West Africa and fears grow that the virus will spread around the globe, enhanced screenings began on Saturday at Kennedy Airport in New York. Kennedy was the first of five American airports to introduce Ebola screening protocols, and the new measures were the latest indication of the risk that the disease presented. Airports in Canada and Europe plan to take similar measures in coming days.

KMART BECOMES LATEST RETAILER TO SUFFER SECURITY BREACH LUCIA BURGA / MIAMI. FLORIDA

Kmart, owned by Sears Holdings, announced Friday that it's become the latest retailer to suffer a security breach to its payment data systems. In a release, the company said that its information technology team discovered the breach on Thursday and that it's since launched a full investigation. The breach, according to Kmart, started in early September. "Our Kmart store payment data systems were infected with a form of malware that was undetectable by current anti-virus systems," according to a statement by the retailer. The company says it was able to "quickly remove the malware," but that "certain debit and credit card numbers have been compromised."

TEXAS HEALTH CARE WORKER MAY BE FIRST PERSON TO CONTRACT EBOLA IN U.S.

Concerns about the Ebola virus were heightened Sunday when a health care worker in Texas had a positive preliminary test for the disease. The number of deaths attributed to the current Ebola outbreak has climbed to 4,033, the World Health Organization reported Friday. The tally brings the total number of confirmed, probable and suspected cases of Ebola to 8,399. The numbers were reported from Guinea, Liberia, Nigeria, Senegal, Sierra Leone, Spain and the United States.

U.S. CDC HEAD CRITICIZED FOR BLAMING 'PROTOCOL BREACH' AS NURSE GETS EBOLA

Dr. Thomas Frieden, director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, made the declaration on Sunday at a news conference and called for an investigation into how the unidentified nurse became infected while caring for Liberian national Thomas Eric Duncan, the first Ebola patient diagnosed in the United States. Duncan died last week at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital.

NEW CHECKS FOR PASSENGERS FLYING FROM WEST AFRICA BLANCA ROSA VILCHEZ / NUEVA YORK

New York's JFK International Airport is the first of five airports to add enhanced screening for Ebola. Over the weekend, passengers flying into the U.S. from West Africa faced the tougher protocol at JFK, and more thorough screenings will begin at other airports soon, but some members of Congress say it's not enough. Starting Thursday, Chicago's O'Hare Airport, Dulles International Airport outside of Washington D.C., Hartsfield-Jackson Airport in Atlanta and Newark International Airport in New Jersey will all have the new screening in place, reports CBS News transportation correspondent Jeff Pegues. U.S. authorities say those airports manage more than 94 percent of travelers from Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea, the West African countries hardest hit by Ebola. Despite the stepped-up measures, even the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention acknowledges the new system is not fool-proof.

NEW CASES AND THREATS OF EBOLA PEDRO ROJAS / DALLAS, TEXAS PKG 1:37

There are new details about that Texas nurse stricken with Ebola. 26-year-old Nina Pham received a potentially life- saving blood transfusion from Dr. Kent Brantly, the missionary doctor who recently survived Ebola, himself. Health experts say his blood is now packed with antibodies that might help fight the virus. Members of Pham's parish say she is in good spirits. Officials say she is now in stable condition, but how Pham got infected is still a mystery, and has some of her colleagues fearful. That fear is spreading around the country, with several people who appear sick and having some connection to Africa, finding themselves in isolation. As Pham was being treated in isolation Tuesday, the World Health Organization projected that West Africa could see up to 10,000 new Ebola cases a week within two months and confirmed the death rate in the current outbreak has risen to 70 percent. At least 33 people were rescued from the water by U.S. Coast Guard crews Wednesday morning after they threw themselves off a boat that was taking on water off Boca Raton in southern Palm Beach County. Coast Guard spokesman said the incident occurred about seven miles east of Boca Raton in waters of the Atlantic Ocean, The rescue came only two days after 13 Cuban rafters attempted to reach Miami in a makeshift boat that broke apart near the Turkey Point nuclear power plant. Eleven of the migrants were rescued or made it safely to land and two were still

Polio, a form of Enterovirus according to the CDPH, has been largely eradicated from the U.S. However, the fact that EV D68 is also a form of Enterovirus makes a possible connection to paralysis not surprising, Dr. Carole Glazer told reporters on a CDPH teleconference. The Department of Justice has stepped in to free a man from detention by immigration authorities, telling a federal judge that the DOJ needs the man's help with an investigation. Now the state of California has dismissed all but one charge against him and his deportation proceedings have been put on hold -- an almost complete reversal that was set in motion just last week by the DOJ's Civil Rights Division. When it comes to working for tips, one add-on isn't quite so welcome: widespread sexual harassment. Tipped restaurant workers are suffering from endemic sexual harassment in their workplaces, thanks to their minimum wage of \$2.13 per hour that has remained unchanged since 1991. That's according to a new study from Restaurant Opportunities Center (ROC) United, a group that advocates for the rights of restaurant workers. The federal minimum wage is \$7.25 an hour. Because tipped workers like waitresses depend on customers to make sure they earn enough to make ends meet, many feel they must put up with unwanted behavior, the study found. Given that tipped restaurant workers are predominantly women, representing two-thirds of country's wait staff, the issue raises the question of how the economic uncertainty of tips may lead to gender-based sexual harassment.

Faced with growing concern over the spread of the Ebola virus, public health officials on Tuesday promised extra measures to screen airline passengers arriving into the United States. But they remained opposed to more draconian travel restrictions that they say would cause more problems than they would solve. Among the measures under consideration by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, temperatures of at-risk passengers would be checked, or they might be subject to detailed questioning upon their arrival in the United States. Dr. Thomas R. Frieden, the agency's director, provided no specific details, a reminder of how easily the disease can travel and how difficult it is to detect.

NEW AIRPORT SCREENING PROCEDURES NATIONWIDE IN RESPONSE TO EBOLA

The Obama administration announced Wednesday that airline passengers arriving from the three West African countries experiencing an unprecedented Ebola outbreak will now be screened for potential exposure to the deadly disease when they arrive at five major U.S. airports. There are no nonstop flights to the U.S. from Liberia, Sierra Leone or Guinea, the three hardest-hit countries. Nearly 95 percent of the roughly 150 people traveling daily from or through those West African countries to the United States land first at one of the five airports selected for extra screening. The screening will include having their temperatures taken. Thousands of people pass through customs and immigration screening areas at the five airports daily and most won't be pulled aside for extra screening. Agents will be asking questions about the passengers' travel and potential contact with anyone who may have been infected with Ebola.

A federal judge struck down Texas' strict voter ID requirement on Thursday, likening the law to a poll tax deliberately meant to suppress minority voter turnout. The average price of a gallon of gasoline in the United States dropped 12 cents in the past three weeks to its lowest point in nearly a year, driven by the latest round of falling oil prices, according to the Lundberg survey released on Sunday. Prices have fallen for the past 16 weeks, survey publisher Trilby Lundberg said. Gas prices fall under \$3 a gallon in New Jersey on Oct. 6,

NO HEALTH INSURANCE FOR NON IMMIGRATION STATUS VO 25 SEC.

California's health insurance exchange is canceling Obamacare coverage for 10,474 people who failed to prove their citizenship or legal residency in the U.S. Covered California, the state-run insurance exchange, enrolled more than 1.2 million people during the rollout of the Affordable Care Act this year. For most consumers, the exchange said, it could verify citizenship or immigration status instantly with a federal data hub. But more than 148,000 enrollees were lacking proof of eligibility and needed to submit documentation. People living in the U.S. illegally aren't eligible for health law coverage. Covered California began sending notices to affected individuals last month. The exchange said 130,105 people submitted proof of legal status. Covered California said it's still reviewing information related to 7,629 people who sent in paperwork. That left the 10,474 people who will receive a "pre-termination notice" this week. Their health plan will send a final cancellation notice.

PILL TO DETECT CANCER

Detecting cancer could be as easy as popping a pill in the near future. Google's head of life sciences took to the stage at the Wall Street Journal Digital conference to reveal that the tech giant's secretive Google x lab has been working on a wearable device that couples with nanotechnology to detect disease within the body. The plan is to test whether tiny particles coated "magnetized" with antibodies can catch disease in its nascent stages. The tiny particles are essentially programmed to spread throughout the body via pill and then latch on to the abnormal cells. The wearable device then "calls" the nanoparticles back to ask them what's going on with the body and to find out if the person who swallowed the pill has cancer or other diseases.

LATINO VOTE VO: 25 SEC.

On Tuesday, a new Washington Post/ABC News poll showed that fully half of Hispanics do not believe that it makes a difference who wins the Senate in the 2014 midterm elections. And those who care, the poll showed, heavily favored Republicans - twice as many Hispanics, in fact, thought it would be a positive if Republicans took over the Senate (30 percent) as if Democrats took over the Senate (15 percent). That's because Hispanics think the economy stinks - 76 percent said they were negative about the economy. HOW THE CDC WILL MAKE SURE EBOLA DOESN'T SPREAD IN US MARIA EUGENIA PAYAN - MIAMI, FLORIDA

To stop the deadly virus from spreading in the U.S., health officials said they have already started tracing anyone involved with the first Ebola patient to be diagnosed here. Officials from the U.S. Centers of Disease Control confirmed Tuesday that the first Ebola patient has been diagnosed in the U.S., after arriving from Liberia. In a press conference in Dallas, officials were prepared and had already started tracing people who had come into contact with the unidentified Ebola patient now being treated in Dallas. I have no doubt that we will control this case of Ebola so that it does not spread widely in this country, said Freiden, who confirmed a CDC team was also en route to help track anyone connected to the infected patient. To track any potential exposures and stop the outbreak, Freiden said medical officials will first interview the patient and then family members. From there officials will outline and investigate all of the patient's movements after the symptoms appeared and he was contagious. They will build concentric circles, with one circle representing everyone the patient could have exposed and then a second including all the other people those initial contacts have interacted with. With that we put together a map essentially that identifies the time, the place, the level of the contact, said Frieden. Then we use a concentric circle approach to identify those contacts, who might have had the highest risk of exposure, those with intermediate risk.

CO: POSSIBLE LINK BETWEEN ENTEROVIRUS, PARALYSIS

Mysterious cases of paralysis in Colorado continue to baffle medical experts across the nation. All of the cases affect children. Experts from the centers for disease control are now here in Denver to help the investigation. Many questions remain at children's hospital about what may have caused paralysis in ten children admitted since august 8th. Six children showed enough improvement to be sent home, though some still have minor paralysis. Doctor Samuel Dominguez says one thing is certain. There is no solid link to Enterovirus 68. Four of the children had the Enterovirus. Others did not. Doctors are still waiting for test results on one patient. Another recovered from a very mild case and hadn't been tested. Doctors say the paralysis is being caused by inflammation of the spinal cord

ANTIBIOTICS LINKED TO CHILD OBESITY VO: 28

A baby's growth is measured during a check-up at Children's Hospital Boston. A new study finds that babies who take a lot of antibiotics by age 2 are slightly more likely to become obese Children who take a lot of antibiotics before age 2 are slightly more likely than others to become obese, according to a new study. The paper is the latest in a growing field of research examining the effects of modern life on the trillions of beneficial bacteria living in and on the human body. While the research doesn't definitively prove that the drugs make children gain weight, it's consistent with earlier studies in humans and animals linking antibiotics to obesity, says coauthor Charles Bailey, an assistant professor at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. Many scientists are now concerned that exposure to antibiotics -- from medication, food or even tap water -- has the potentiall to kill off some of the beneficial bacteria that may protect people from chronic diseases, Bailey says.

1ST EBOLA DIAGNOSIS IN THE U.S.: IS IT TIME TO START PANICKING? DR.. JUAN RIVERA - MIAMI, FLORIDA INTERVIEW: 3:00

For the first time, a patient in an American hospital has been diagnosed with Ebola. The unidentified man, who is being treated at a Dallas hospital, didn't show symptoms until after four or five days of arriving in the United States from Liberia. Citing privacy concerns, official are being tight-lipped about how he contracted the virus or how he's being treated. Shortly after the news broke Tuesday evening, more than 50,000 tweets about Ebola flew through Twitter in a one-hour period, many of them panicked responses. Should we be concerned? The short answer: no. Now let's get to the long answer. Could the patient's fellow passengers be infected? The patient being treated in a Dallas hospital flew from one of the Ebola hot zones -- Liberia -- to Texas. But his fellow passengers aren't thought to be at risk because you can only contract Ebola through direct contact with the bodily fluids of someone who's actively sick with with it. It's not like a cold or the flu, which can be spread before symptoms show up. And it doesn't spread through the air. "It's very unlikely that (Ebola victims) would be able to spread the disease to fellow passengers," said Stephen Monroe of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. What's to stop other Ebola patients getting on a flight and coming here? The CDC has issued warnings to avoid nonessential travel to Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea, the countries grappling most with the outbreak. And it's also working with airport officials in those nations, and in Nigeria, so that every person getting on a plane is screened for fever. "And if they have a fever, they are pulled out of the line, assessed for Ebola and don't fly unless Ebola is ruled out," said CDC Director Dr. Thomas Frieden.

U.S. GOVERNMENT TO HELP PAY MIGRANT KIDS' LEGAL BILLS VO: 30

HEALTH OFFICIALS WATCHING FOR ANY MORE EBOLA CASES PEDRO ROJAS LIVE - DALLAS, TEXAS

A Dallas emergency room sent a man with Ebola home last week, even though he told a nurse that he had been in disease-ravaged West Africa, and officials at the hospital are considering if they would have acted differently had the entire medical staff been aware. The decision by Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital to release the patient, who had recently arrived from Liberia, could have put others at risk of exposure to Ebola before the man went back to the ER a couple of days later when his condition worsened. A nine-member team of federal health officials was tracking anyone who had close contact with the man after he fell ill on Sept. 24. The group of 12 to 18 people included three members of the ambulance crew that took him to the hospital, as well as a handful of schoolchildren. They will be checked every day for 21 days, the disease's incubation period. "That's how we're going to break the chain of transmission, and that's where our focus has to be," Dr. Tom Frieden, director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, told The Associated Press Wednesday. The CDC reminded health care providers to ask patients with symptoms if they've traveled recently. The American College of Emergency Physicians planned to alert its members as well. The patient explained to a nurse last Thursday that he was visiting the U.S. from Africa, but that information was not widely shared, said Dr. Mark Lester, who works for the hospital's parent company.

OBAMA APPROVES PLAN TO LET CHILDREN IN CENTRAL AMERICA APPLY FOR REFUGEE STATUS

President Obama has approved a plan to allow several thousand young children from Central American countries to apply for refugee status in the United States, providing a legal path for some of them to join family members already living in America, White House officials said Tuesday. The program is aimed at helping to discourage many children from making a long, dangerous trek across Mexico in an attempt to cross into the United States and join their parents. The idea was first presented to Mr. Obama at the height of the summer's border crisis, when tens of thousands of young children from El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras were pouring across the border from Mexico and presenting themselves to American border patrol agents as refugees fleeing from rape and gang violence. The spike in migrations raised concerns that the

journey across Mexico was often more dangerous than the rough conditions the children were fleeing in their home countries, while the images of border control Officials have said that the number of children crossing the border has decreased over the last two months, but White House officials said the new program should help to stem that flow even further by providing children a way to determine if they qualify as refugees without leaving their country. In June, more than 10,000 children crossed the border into the United States, according to figures from the Department of Homeland Security, but in August, that number had dropped to slightly more than 3,000 children.

DALLAS HOUSEHOLD WEARY OF EBOLA QUARANTINE MARIA EUGENIA PAYAN - MIAMI, FLORIDA

A woman who has been confined to her Dallas apartment under armed guard after a man infected with Ebola stayed at her home, said she never imagined this could happen to her so far from disease-ravaged West Africa. Louise Troh said Thursday that she is tired of being locked up and wants federal health authorities to decontaminate her home. Authorities say the circle of people in the U.S. possibly exposed to Ebola widened after the man, who arrived from Liberia last month, was discharged from a hospital without being tested for the deadly virus. The confinement order, which also bans visitors, was imposed after the family failed to comply with a request to stay home, according to Dallas County Judge Clay Jenkins. Texas State Health Commissioner David Lakey said the order would ensure Troh, her 13-year-old son and two nephews can be closely monitored for signs of the disease. The first Ebola diagnosis in the nation has raised concerns about whether the disease that has killed 3,300 people in West Africa could spread in the U.S. Federal health officials say they are confident they can keep it in check. Troh said she had imagined she would be safe from the grasp of the virus thousands of miles from her native Liberia, the worst-hit country.

BARACK OBAMA: ACTION ON IMMIGRATION NOT IF, BUT WHEN VO/SOT: 49

With frustration mounting, President Barack Obama sought Thursday to quell doubts he'll use his presidential powers to act on immigration, telling Hispanics and immigration activists it's "not a question of if but when." At the Congressional Hispanic Caucus Institute's annual gala, Obama warned activists that his eventual actions will spark intense political opposition that could threaten the durability of what he does. In a partisan pitch a month before Election Day, he urged Hispanics across the U.S. to use their votes to improve prospects in the future for a legislative fix. "The moment I act -and it will be taking place between the November election and the end of the year -opponents of reform will roll out the same old scare tactics," Obama said. "When opponents are out there saying who knows what, I'm going to need you to have my back." Once hailed as a champion for Hispanic rights, Obama's relationship with the Hispanic community has become strained since he decided last month to abandon his earlier pledge to act quickly after summer's end to help some immigrants who are in the U.S. illegally. Instead, he said he'd wait until after the Nov. 4 elections, exasperating immigration activists who accused the president of putting politics ahead of their families and said they had waited far too long already.

GM RECALLS 117,000 VEHICLES FOR CHASSIS PROBLEM VO: 26

General Motors announced two more recalls, pushing its total for the year to 71, affecting almost 30 million vehicles in North America. The biggest of Friday's recalls covers just over 430,000 Cadillac SRX and Saab 9-4X SUVs, mainly in North America. The company says some rear suspension nuts may not have been tightened properly. That could cause the toe link adjuster to separate from the suspension, possibly causing a crash. The recall affects SRXs from the 2011 through 2015 model years and Saabs from the 2011 and 2012 model years. GM says the problem has caused three crashes and two injuries. Dealers will inspect the SUVs and install a new assembly if needed. Unsold SRXs are being checked to make sure the nuts are tightened properly. The other recall covers nearly 94,000 Chevrolet Spark mini-cars from 2013 through 2015 in the U.S. and Canada. Rust can cause a secondary hood latch to stick, and the hood can open unexpectedly, blocking the driver's vision and causing a crash. GM says it knows of no crashes or injuries from

President Barack Obama says the government is considering ordering more careful screening of airline passengers arriving from Ebola-plagued West Africa. The president hasn't outlined the details, but he says the U.S. will be "working on protocols to do additional passenger screening both at the source and here in the United States." A North Carolina drugmaker is Providing its experimental antiviral drug to the Liberian man being treated for Ebola in Dallas. Officials at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital say Thomas Eric Duncan is in critical condition and being treated with the oral medicine developed by Chimerix Inc. US HEALTH PROVIDERS EXPAND THEIR EBOLA PRECAUTIONS PEDRO ULTRERAS - DALLAS, TEXAS

Public hospitals in New York City are concerned enough about Ebola that they've secretly been sending actors with mock symptoms into emergency rooms to test how good the triage staff is at identifying and isolating possible cases. A small hospital in the Ohio countryside has hung up signs, imploring patients to let nurses know immediately if they have traveled recently to West Africa. And across the U.S., one of the nation's largest ambulance companies has put together step-by-step instructions on how to wrap the interior of a rig with plastic sheeting while transporting a patient. Ebola has yet to infect a single person on U.S. soil -- the one confirmed case here involves a man who contracted the virus overseas. But health care providers are worried enough that they are taking a wide variety of precautions. It isn't yet clear whether those preparations are overkill, or not nearly enough. But medical officials and health experts say that, at the very least, the scare is giving them a chance to reinforce and test infection control procedures. "The attention has been, in a sad way, very helpful," said Dr. Richard Wenzel, an epidemiologist at Virginia Commonwealth University and a former president of the International Society for Infectious Diseases.

SUPREME COURT-GAY MARRIAGE

The Supreme Court unexpectedly cleared the way Monday for a dramatic expansion of gay marriage in the United States and may have signaled that it's only a matter of time before same-sex couples can marry in all 50 states. Rejecting appeals from five states seeking to preserve their bans, the Supreme Court effectively made such marriages legal in 30 states, up from 19 and the District of Columbia, taking in every region of the country. Challenges are pending in the other 20 states. Almost immediately, exuberant couples began receiving marriage licenses previously denied to them. "This is the dream day," said Sharon Baldwin, a plaintiff in a challenge to Oklahoma's ban, as she and her partner got their license in the Tulsa County Clerk's Office. Directly affected by Monday's orders were Wisconsin, Indiana, Oklahoma, Utah and Virginia. Officials in those states had appealed lower court rulings in an effort to preserve their bans. Couples in six other states -- Colorado, Kansas, North Carolina, South Carolina, West Virginia and Wyoming -- should be able to get married in short order since those states would be bound by the same appellate rulings that have been on hold. While county clerks in a number of states quickly began issuing licenses to gay and lesbian couples, in some other states affected by the court's action officials did not sound ready to give up the fight. However, their legal options are limited.

SUPREME COURT CLEARS THE WAY FOR GAY MARRIAGE EXPANSION TONY LIMA - EXECUTIVE PRODUCER, SAVE DADE INTERVIEW 4:00

Gay and lesbian couples are getting legally married in the South for the first time, crossing a threshold into a conservative region that long stood united against same-sex marriage. The U.S. Supreme Court's decision Monday to turn away appeals from a handful of states including Virginia means marriage bans are unconstitutional throughout the 4th U.S. Circuit. And that means similar bans in West Virginia and North and South Carolina should fall as soon as judges in each state follow through on the appellate court's orders. Carol Schall and Mary Townley of Chesterfield County challenged Virginia's ban, wanting their California marriage to be recognized in the state where they are raising a 16-year-old daughter. Their victory shows that a region once considered inhospitable to gays has changed, Shall said. "It says the South is a wonderful, welcoming and open place," she said. But as with other civil rights battles, plenty of southern conservatives seem determined to fight to the bitter end.

EBOLA CRISIS LEAVES DALLAS A CITY ON EDGE

Leaders are urging calm, but Dallas is a city on edge as it approaches the first Ebola incubation deadline this week. Several residents of the neighborhood where the first U.S.-diagnosed case of Ebola was found told city officials they'd been sent home from work. Some community volunteers shunned a nearby after-school program, and the hospital at the epicenter of fear acknowledged for the first time that some patients were staying away. Health officials tried to present a unified front of both preparedness and reassurance. Ten of the 48 people being monitored are confirmed to have had close contact with Thomas Eric Duncan, who is hospitalized in critical but stable condition. Federal health officials say people with the virus can begin showing symptoms of Ebola eight to 10 days after exposure.

AMERICANS LIVING LONGER AS MOST DEATH RATES FALL VO: 27

Americans are living longer than ever before. A new government report says not only has U.S. life expectancy inched up, but death rates have fallen. or example, the life

expectancy for a child born in 2012 is 78 years and 9 1/2 months. That's about six weeks longer than life expectancy in 2010 and 2011, and it's a record. For men 65 years old, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says they have about 18 years of life left, and women have about 20 1/2 years.

FIRST CASE OF ENTEROVIRUS-D68 CONFIRMED IN FLORIDA VO: 2

A 10-year-old Tampa area girl is recovering from the Enterovirus, it's the first confirmed case of the disease in the state of Florida, according to the Florida Department of Health. The girl is recovering in Polk County. Enteroviruses are transmitted through close contact with an infected person, or by touching objects or surfaces contaminated with the virus and then touching the mouth, nose or eyes. "The most effective way to prevent enteroviruses is to practice good hygiene regularly by washing hands often," said Deputy Secretary for Health and Deputy State Health Officer for Children's Medical Services, Dr. Celeste Philip. "Those having cold-like or flu-like symptoms should stay home from child care centers, school or work and, if possible, remain apart from other family members." Enterovirus D68 can cause mild to severe respiratory illness and can attack the nervous system in severe cases. There's no vaccine or specific treatment, and symptoms include fever, runny nose, sneezing, cough, and body and muscle aches. Some children have more serious illness with breathing difficulty and wheezing, especially children with a history of asthma. More than 500 cases have been reported in 43 states. Four people with the virus have died, although it's unclear what role the germ played.

EBOLA SUSPECT & CALIFORNIA POSSIBLE CASE

A sheriff's deputy who went into the apartment where deceased Dallas Ebola patient Thomas Eric Duncan stayed was taken to hospital on Wednesday after feeling ill. The deputy was taken to an urgent care clinic in Frisco, a northern suburb of Dallas, and was exhibiting enough symptoms of Ebola to trigger a preliminary screening, Frisco Fire Chief Mark Piland said. He did not specify the symptoms and said test results were expected back within about 48 hours. "This patient had reported that they initially had been in the apartment, in the initial Ebola patient's in Dallas, and had some contact with family members," Piland said. An Inglewood hospital announced Wednesday that a "possible Ebola patient" had been admitted to its emergency room after traveling from Liberia to LAX, but the county's public health chief said the patient was not suspected of having the potentially deadly virus. The individual was brought to Centinela Hospital Medical Center by ambulance from Los Angeles International Airport on Tuesday night, the hospital stated. "The patient does not have any symptoms of Ebola, however, due to travel history, appropriate precautions were implemented," the hospital's statement read. The unidentified person, who was referred to in the statement's headline as a "possible Ebola patient," has been fully isolated in the emergency room and all appropriate testing will be conducted, the hospital said.

EBOLA FEVER SCREENING AT 5 US AIRPORTS MARIA EUGENIA PAYAN - MIAMI, FLRORIDA

Five major U.S. airports will soon begin an extra level of screening to try to catch any travelers from Ebola-ravaged countries who may be carrying the disease. About 150 travelers a day will have their temperatures checked using no-touch thermometers, and Health officials expect false alarms from fevers due to malaria. The extra screening

probably wouldn't have found Thomas Eric Duncan when he arrived from Liberia last month without symptoms. Duncan, the first person to be diagnosed with Ebola in the U.S., died Wednesday in Dallas. The new airport screening will begin Saturday at New York's JFK International Airport and then expand to Washington Dulles and the international airports in Atlanta, Chicago and Newark, New Jersey. The disease has killed at least 3,800 people in West Africa.

AT&T TO PAY MILLIONS FOR UNAUTHORIZED CHARGES VO: 29

It's for unauthorized charges for things like trivia, horoscopes and love tips that showed up on customers' monthly bills. A-t-and-t is accused of keeping a percentage of the fees-- as well as obscuring the charges on bills, and preventing customers from securing full refunds.

SENIORS IN 49 STATES CAN'T AFFORD RETIREMENT VO: 34

Seniors in almost every state in the country don't have the income to retire comfortably. 20-13 census bureau data shows households 65 and older are living on just over 37-thousand dollars a year, in 49 states. That's well short of the pre-retirement income that's recommended for retirees -- closer to 45-thousand dollars per year. Nevada and washington d-c are the only districts where seniors have incomes above the savings benchmark. Analysts say retirement savings should allow a senior to live on 70 percent of the average income of working adults, age 45 to 65.

ENTEROVIRUS AND EBOLA FEARS DR. JUAN RIVERA INTERVIEW 4:00

Two young Tennessee children - one in East Tennessee and one in West Tennessee had enterovirus D-68, the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention confirmed Wednesday. Both children were hospitalized with the respiratory illness, which has been sweeping the nation, but are now home and "doing well," said Tennessee Department of Health officials. The two are the first lab-confirmed cases of enterovirus D in the state, which until Wednesday was one of only four states in the continental U.S. to have no confirmed cases. A 10-year-old Tampa area girl is recovering from the Enterovirus, it's the first confirmed case of the disease in the state of Florida, according to the Florida Department of Health. The girl is recovering in Polk County. Enteroviruses are transmitted through close contact with an infected person, or by touching objects or surfaces contaminated with the virus and then touching the mouth, nose or eyes. "The most effective way to prevent enteroviruses is to practice good hygiene regularly by washing hands often," said Deputy Secretary for Health and Deputy State Health Officer for Children's Medical Services, Dr. Celeste Philip. "Those having cold-like or flu-like symptoms should stay home from child care centers, school or work and, if possible, remain apart from other family members." From the White House to capitals around the world, Ebola concerns are front and center this morning.

GAY WEDDINGS IN NEVADA VO 34 SEC. Synopsis:

Gay couples have started to get married in Las Vegas, a city filled with chapels that for

them had been off-limits until Thursday evening. Thomas Topovski cried as the Clark County clerk announced to cheers that gay marriage licenses would be issued, bringing same-sex unions to the marriage capital of the world amid a flurry of court decisions this week that tore down legal barriers nationwide. About 10 same-sex couples were waiting as the announcement came shortly after 5 p.m. For gay couples in Nevada, the licenses ended long-felt frustration that increased by the day as they watched legal wrangling go in favor of others elsewhere, while they could do nothing but wait. A Supreme Court decision Monday that denied appeals from five states seeking to retain their bans on same-sex unions effectively made gay marriage legal in about 30 states. Opponents have continued to push back against gay marriage, saying such unions are unconstitutional. Days of weddings, court decisions and confusion have followed the high court ruling. West Virginia officials began issuing gay marriage licenses Thursday, prompting further frustration in Nevada.

VOTER ID LAWS IN TEXAS AND WISCONSIN VO: 30 SEC.

Synopsis:

The Supreme Court on Thursday evening stopped officials in Wisconsin from requiring voters there to provide photo identification before casting their ballots in the coming election. Three of the court's more conservative members dissented, saying they would have allowed officials to require identification. Around the same time, a federal trial court in Texas struck down that state's ID law, saying it put a disproportionate burden on minority voters. The Wisconsin requirement, one of the strictest in the nation, is part of a state law enacted in 2011 but mostly blocked by various courts in the interim. A federal trial judge had blocked it, saying it would "deter or prevent a substantial number of the 300,000-plus registered voters who lack ID from voting" and would disproportionately affect black and Hispanic voters. The law was provisionally reinstated last month by a unanimous three-judge panel of the federal appeals court in Chicago hours after it heard arguments. The full court was deadlocked, five to five, on a request for a new hearing.

TOO HIGH CELL PHONE BILLS

Synopsis:

If your cell phone bill feels too high, it might be because almost a quarter of it could be taxes and fees. A new report from the tax foundation shows taxes and fees take up an average of 17 percent of your bill. But because taxes are on federal, state and local level, it goes up to between 22 to 24 percent of your bill, in some states. And in Chicago, it really skyrockets -- as much as 35 percent of your bill could be taxes, fees and charges. According to tax foundation...people living in cities tend to get the worst of it.

OBAMA ON IMMIGRATION

VO: 30 SEC.

Synopsis:

President Obama said Thursday that Republicans would be committing political suicide if they continued to hold up an immigration overhaul effort in Congress, leading the next generation of young people to reject the party for years to come. If they look at the GOP's immigration policies, a whole generation of Americans will determine "that party does not seem to care about me and my life," Obama said at a meeting in Santa Monica with young entrepreneurs. Although the immigration legislation that stalled in the House is all but dead for the year, Obama said he still had hope for its passage. House Republicans will see the political peril ahead, he predicted. Obama made the remarks at an event that sought to reach out to so-called millennials, the generation of Americans born roughly between 1980 and 2000. The stop was part of Obama's

campaign season effort to promote his economic agenda to the Democratic base, particularly young people, women, African Americans and Latinos.

DAIRY QUEEN CREDIT CARDS INFORMATION BREACH VO: 29 SEC.

Synopsis:

Dairy Queen announced a data breach that affects some of its customers' sensitive credit card information. The breach happened at certain Dairy Queen/Orange Julius locations across the country, including a dozen stores in Colorado. Customers' names, payment card numbers and expiration dates were compromised. Dairy Queen spokesman said that there is no evidence that other customer personal information, such as Social Security numbers, PINs or email addresses, were compromised as a result of this malware infection. The company also says the problem has been contained.

EBOLA FEARS INCREASE PEDRO ROJAS - DALLAS, TEXAS

A breach of infection control resulting in a Dallas health worker getting Ebola raises fresh questions about whether hospitals truly can safely take care of people with the deadly virus, as health officials insist is possible. Even in the United States, with the best conditions and protective gear available, mistakes can happen that expose more people to Ebola, the new case reveals. On Sunday, the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention confirmed infection in the health worker, who was said to have worn full personal protection equipment while caring for Thomas Eric Duncan, a Liberian man who died Wednesday of Ebola at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital. She doesn't know how she became infected, and officials are investigating to try to find out. Of the six Ebola patients treated in the U.S. before the health worker's case, Duncan was the only one not treated at one of the specialized units in several hospitals around the country set up to deal with high-risk germs. The CDC's director, Dr. Thomas Frieden, has said that any U.S. hospital with isolation capabilities can care for an Ebola patient. But his stance seemed to soften on Sunday, when asked at a news conference whether officials now would consider moving Ebola patients to specialized units.

EBOLA DEATHS TOP 4000, 2ND U-S INFECTION LIKELY MARIA EUGENIA PAYAN, MIAMI, FLORIDA

The c-d-c is working to confirm an ebola diagnosis in dallas. A nurse who treated a liberian man tested positive in a preliminary test for ebola. If the test is accurate, andrew spencer reports it would mark the first ever transmission of the deadly virus in the united states. More than four-thousand people have died in the ebola outbreak, and the world health organization says at least one in every twenty has been a health care worker. The ebola virus is now believed to have spread -- for the first time in the united states -- to a nurse at texas health presbyterian hospital. She had helped treat thomas eric duncan, the liberian man who died at the dallas hospital, last week. The case is similar to one at a hospital in spain, where a nurse's assistant became the first person to contract ebola outside africa.

RETIREMENT SAVINGS: WOMEN OUTSAVE MEN

Women are generally better at putting money away for retirement... But they still have

less in their 401-k than men. Hat's according to research by vanguard, an investment management company. According to the survey, women are 10-percent more likely to enroll in their workplace savings plan than men --and save a bigger chunk of their paychecks. But the women surveyed had an average savings account balance of 78-thousand dollars, far below the male average balance of 121-thousand dollars. Blame it on the wage gap. Overall, men in the survey earned an average of 40-percent more than women. Another factor: Women, on average, work 12 years less than men do over the course of their careers - because they are more likely to take time off for family.

DOCTOR GIVES BLOOD FOR EBOLA-INFECTED DALLAS NURSE PEDRO ROJAS - DALLAS, TEXAS

A Dallas nurse who caught Ebola while treating a Liberian patient who died of the disease has received a plasma transfusion donated by a doctor who beat the virus. Ebola has killed more than 4,000 people in an outbreak the World Health Organization calls "the most severe, acute health emergency seen in modern times." Federal health officials say they are ramping up training for medical workers who deal with the infected. Medical records indicate nurse Nina Pham was among about 70 hospital workers who cared for Thomas Eric Duncan.

Pham is the first person infected with Ebola in the U.S. Family members and a mission group say Kent Brantly, a doctor who survived Ebola, has donated blood for a transfusion that could save the 26-year-old nurse. Duncan died on Wednesday.

LIQUID NICOTINE EXPOSURES UP SHARPLY AMONG KIDS

Poison control workers say that as the e-cigarette industry has boomed, the number of children exposed to the liquid nicotine that gives hand-held vaporizing gadgets their kick also has spiked. More than 2,700 people have called poison control this year to report an exposure to liquid nicotine, over half of those cases in children younger than 6, according to national statistics. The number shows a sharp rise from only a few hundred total cases just three years ago. The battery-powered electronic vaporizers often resemble traditional cigarettes and work by heating liquid nicotine into an inhalable mist. The drug comes in brightly colored refill packages and an array of candy flavors that can make it attractive to young children, heightening the exposure risk and highlighting the need for users to keep it away from youngsters. "With kids, the exposure we're seeing is usually parents or family members leave out refill bottles that they try and open," said Ashley Webb, director of the Kentucky Regional Poison Control Center.

OFFICIAL: 2ND WORKER IN ISOLATION WITH 90 MINUTES

A second health care worker at a Dallas hospital who provided care for the first Ebola patient diagnosed in the U.S. has tested positive for the disease, the Texas Department of State Health Services said Wednesday. The worker at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital was monitoring herself for symptoms of Ebola, Dallas County

Judge Clay Jenkins said. The unidentified woman reported a fever Tuesday. She was in isolation within 90 minutes, Jenkins said. Health officials said the worker was among those who took care of Thomas Eric Duncan, who was diagnosed with Ebola after coming to the U.S. from Liberia. Duncan died Oct. 8. The department said a preliminary Ebola test was conducted late Tuesday at a state public health laboratory in Austin, Texas, and came back positive during the night. Confirmatory testing was being conducted at the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta. Officials said the health care worker was interviewed to quickly identify any contacts or potential exposures. It said others who had interactions with the worker or possible exposure to the virus will be monitored.

43% OF AMERICANS DISAPPROVE BARACK OBAMA'S EBOLA RESPONSE VO: 37

A new poll shows americans are concerned about ebola, and many of them are not satisfied with the president's response. According to a washington post-a-b-c news poll, 43-percent of those asked disaprove of mister obama's ebola response. Just 41-percent approve, and 16 percent had no opinion. Only about a third of those polled say the u-s is doing all it reasonably can to try to prevent more cases of ebola. And most respondents, 91-percent, want stricter screening of those entering the u-s from african countries plagued by the ebola outbreak. The post reports that a little more than a thousand people were surveyed with a 3.5 percent margin of error.

US PANEL TO HEAR APPEAL ON NY STOP AND FRISK CASE VO: 28

The city's police unions are arguing they should be able to continue to appeal a federal judge's ruling that the New York Police Department's stop and frisk policy violated civil rights. Lawyers for the unions were scheduled to appear before a panel of judges Wednesday at the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. A judge has already ruled the unions did not signal soon enough a wish to be included in the lawsuit. The stop and frisk case was heard last year in federal court. U.S. District Court Judge Shira Scheindlin ruled after a 10-week civil trial that the NYPD's stop, question and frisk policy sometimes discriminated against minorities. She ordered sweeping reforms to the policy, and installed a monitor to oversee the changes. The Bloomberg administration appealed the decision, but the de Blasio administration dropped the appeal when the new mayor came into office this year. The police unions are trying to take over the appeal.

NATIONAL SURVEY OF NURSES SHOWS HEIGHTENED EBOLA CONCERNS GIANNINA SANTOS - NURSE

Three out of four nurses say their hospital hasn't provided sufficient education for them on Ebola, according to a survey by the largest professional association of registered nurses in the United States. National Nurses United has been conducting an online survey of health care workers across the U.S. as the Ebola outbreak has widened globally. After_a Texas nurse who cared for the first patient diagnosed with the Ebola in the U.S. tested positive for the virus Sunday, the group released its latest survey findings.

Out of more than 1,900 nurses in 46 states and Washington D.C. who responded, 76 percent said their hospital still hadn't communicated to them an official policy on admitting potential patients with Ebola. And a whopping 85 percent said their hospital hadn't provided educational training sessions on Ebola in which nurses could interact and ask questions.

DALLAS NURSES CITE SLOPPY CONDITIONS IN EBOLA CARE PEDRO ROJAS - DALLAS TEXAS

Liberian Ebola patient was left in an open area of a Dallas emergency room for hours, and the nurses treating him worked for days without proper protective gear and faced constantly changing protocols, according to a statement released late Tuesday by the largest U.S. nurses' union. Nurses were forced to use medical tape to secure openings in their flimsy garments, worried that their necks and heads were exposed as they cared for a patient with explosive diarrhea and projectile vomiting, said Deborah Burger of National Nurses United. Burger convened a conference call with reporters to relay what she said were concerns of nurses at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital, where Thomas Eric Duncan -- the first person to be diagnosed with Ebola in the U.S. -- died last week. RoseAnn DeMoro, executive director of Nurses United, said the statement came from "several" and "a few" nurses, but she refused repeated inquiries to state how many. She said the organization had vetted the claims, and that the nurses cited were in a position to know what had occurred at the hospital. She refused to elaborate. Among the nurses' allegations was that the Ebola patient's lab samples were allowed to travel through the hospital's pneumatic tubes, opening the possibility of contaminating the specimen delivery system. The nurses also alleged that hazardous waste was allowed to pile up to the ceiling.

MAKING HALLOWEEN SAFER FOR KIDS WITH ALLERGIES

Have you bought your halloween pumpkins yet? Maybe you should forgo the traditional orange for a shade of teal. One group is hoping a greenish-blue pumpkin could help protect kids who have food allergies. Think about it, so many kids have allergies to dairy, nuts and soy. Unfortunately, many halloween treats contain these very ingredients. That's why the food and allergy research and education organization wants to take the potentially deadly "tricks" out of trick or treating. Their teal pumpkin project encourages people to put a painted pumpkin outside their door if they are offering non-food treats for kids with allergies. The group suggests small toys, stickers and crayons as an option. The idea is getting a huge online response. The group's first facebook post reached 2.7 million people in 72 hours.

US STEPS UP DOMESTIC RESPONSE TO EBOLA CRISIS PEDRO ROJAS - DALLAS TEXAS

The federal government is ramping up its response to the Ebola crisis after a second Dallas nurse became ill and it was disclosed that she had been cleared to fly a day before her diagnosis. While Ebola patients are not considered contagious until they have symptoms and only two persons have been known to contract the disease in the U.S., the revelations Wednesday raised new alarms about whether hospitals and the public health system are equipped to handle the deadly disease. Federal health officials were being called to testify before a congressional committee Thursday to explain where things went wrong. President Barack Obama directed his administration to respond in a "much more aggressive way" to oversee the Dallas cases and ensure the lessons learned there are transmitted to hospitals and clinics across the country. For the second day in a row he canceled out-of-town trips to stay in Washington and monitor the Ebola response.

EBOLA CONTACTS MAY BE ADDED TO "NO FLY" LIST MARIA EUGENIA PAYAN - MIAMI, FLORIDA PKG: 2:39

When you think the t-s-a's no-fly list, you might think suspected terrorists. Soon, potential carriers of the ebola virus might be on that list as well. The c-d-c is considering new measures after another airline passenger tested positive for ebola. Flying out of dallas on a specially-equipped jet, the woman who tested positive for ebola, this week,landed in atlanta wearing a protective suit -- covered head to toe as she was loaded onto an ambulance to be taken to the c-d-c. It was a very different experience from her flight earlier this week. Amber vinson took a commercial flight from ohio to texas on monday, a day before being tested for ebola -- a test which came back positive.

NEW US EBOLA CASE A NURSE WHO TREATED MAN IN TEXAS PEDRO ROJAS - DALLAS TEXAS

A dated yearbook picture of a smiling young woman has become the latest face of Ebola in the U.S. The high school picture of Amber Vinson spread across the country after the 29-year-old nurse was confirmed with the virus Wednesday. But little was publicly revealed about her, beyond the image of her with a wide grin, tipped head and shiny pink blouse. Vinson lived in Akron, Ohio, and went to Kent State University, where she received degrees in 2006 and 2008, the university said. She was licensed as a registered nurse in Ohio on February 2, 2009, and remains licensed there, records show, though she has since moved to Dallas. She became an R.N. in Texas on August 22, 2012. Vinson lived in an unpretentious rental in The Village, a sprawling series of apartment buildings popular with young professionals and other Dallas newcomers. It's been the home to countless other workers at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital, which is just 2 miles away, including other people on the team that cared for Thomas Eric Duncan, the Ebola patient who died Oct. 8.

EXISTING PROTOCOLS MIGHT NOT BE ENOUGH FOR EBOLA DRA. AILEEN MARTY -

INTERVIEW: 4:00

As Thomas Eric Duncan's health deteriorated, nurses Amber Joy Vinson and Nina Pham were at the Ebola patient's side. They wore protective gear including face shields, hazardous materials suits and protective footwear as they inserted catheters, drew blood and dealt with his body fluids. Still, the two somehow contracted Ebola from the dying man. As health officials try to figure out how that happened, the nurses' cases have brought new scrutiny to national Ebola protocols that had never before been put to the test at a general hospital. Authorities are examining whether those guidelines need to be rewritten. "Our infectious disease department was contacted to ask, what is our protocol," Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital nurse Briana Aguirre said on NBC's "Today" show. "And their answer was, we don't know. We're going to have to call you back." Aguirre, who did not deal directly with Duncan but helped take care of Pham, said the protective gear they were provided left the neck exposed.

SENIORS LOSE AVG \$30K SCAMS

Scammers targeting seniors. According to a recent survey -- elderly victims say they've had an average of 30- grand -- stolen. And some seniors say they've lost more than one-hundred thousand dollars. But it's not just strangers who are stealing from seniors. More seniors say they were swindled by someone they knew -- like a caretaker or family member. The crime isn't new. Past studies estimate seniors lose nearly three billion dollars to financial abuse every year. It's impossible to tell how many are victimized -- because many victims stay silent.

VIOLENT MEDIA CAUSES CHILDHOOD AGGRESSION? VO: 30

A new study is taking a look at a controversial topic -- how parents and doctors view the effects of violent media on children. So what do the results reveal? The study, authored by brad bushman, a professor of communication and psychology at ohio sate university, found a consensus among some researchers, parents, and pediatricians -- they believe violent media can increase aggression in children. 90-percent of pediatricians surveyed, as well as at least 66-percent of both researchers and parents strongly agree violent games can increase aggressive behavior among kids. But violent literature? According to the study, not so much. Less than half of the people surveyed believe violent comics and books have the same harmful effects.

EBOLA FEAR, MONITORING EASES FOR SOME IN DALLAS MARIA EUGENIA PAYAN - MIAMI, FLORIDA

Ebola fears began to ease for some Monday as a monitoring period passed for those who had close contact with a victim of the disease and after a cruise ship scare ended with the boat returning to port and a lab worker on board testing negative for the virus. Federal officials meanwhile ramped up readiness to deal with future cases. A top government official said revised guidance instructs health workers treating Ebola patients to wear protective gear "with no skin showing." The Pentagon said it is forming a team to support civilian medical staff in the U.S.In Dallas, Louise Troh and several friends and family members will finally be free Monday to leave a stranger's home where they have been confined under armed guard for 21 days -- the maximum incubation period for Ebola. They had close contact with Thomas Eric Duncan, a Liberian man who died of the disease at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital on Oct. 8. "I want to breathe, I want to really grieve, I want privacy with my family," Troh told The Associated Press. The incubation period also has passed for about a dozen health workers who encountered Duncan when he went to the Dallas hospital for the first time, on Sept. 25.

CLINICS RECOMMEND HOSPITALS FOR EBOLA TESTING VO: 28

When a Dallas County sheriff's deputy who had entered the apartment of the first patient to die from Ebola in the U.S. started feeling ill himself, he didn't rush to the nearest hospital. He chose an urgent care clinic. So did a man who recently traveled to West Africa and was complaining of flu-like symptoms, prompting the suburban Boston urgent care practice where he went to briefly shut down last week.

The deadly virus' arrival in the U.S. has put the spotlight on weak spots in American hospitals, but those facilities are not the only ones who have suddenly found themselves on the front lines against Ebola. Urgent-care clinics for many people have become de-facto emergency rooms. They are not, however, equipped like hospitals to treat serious illnesses, such as Ebola, nor do they have isolation units. Clinics are urging potential patients to get checked for the highly contagious virus at a hospital. Given the problems at the Texas hospital, where Thomas Eric Duncan died and two nurses have been diagnosed with the virus, an Ebola case could have posed even greater problems at a clinic or smaller hospital, experts say.

SURVEY DATA BREACH

A new survey suggests almost half of shoppers surveyed, will avoid retailers affected by last year's data breaches when it comes time for this year's holiday shopping. The report, just released by creditcards-dot-com indicates that 45-percent of americans surveyed said they would "definitely not" or "probably not" shop at some of the retailers recently affected by major data breaches during the upcoming holiday season. This includes stores like target, home depot, and neiman marcus among others, where hackers illegally accessed customer credit and debit card information earlier this year. That figure includes 29-percent of those surveyed who said they likely wouldn't shop at those retailers even if they used to be frequent shoppers at the store.

EBOLA CDC GEAR GUIDELINES

Federal health officials on Monday issued new guidelines to promote head-to-toe protection for health workers treating Ebola patients. Officials have been scrambling to come up with new advice for protective gear since two Dallas nurses became infected while caring for the first person diagnosed with the virus in the United States. The new guidelines set a firmer standard, calling for full-body garb and hoods that protect worker's necks; setting rigorous rules for removal of equipment and disinfection of gloved hands; and calling for a "site manager" to supervise the putting on and taking off of equipment. They also say health workers who may be involved in an Ebola patient's care should repeatedly practice and demonstrate proficiency in donning and removing gear -- before ever being allowed near a patient. And they ask hospitals to establish designated areas for putting on and taking off equipment, whether it's a room adjacent to an Ebola patient's room or a hallway area cordoned off with a plastic sheet.

EXPLODING AIRBAG RECALL

An urgent new plea from the nation's top auto safety officials - tonight, urging nearly five million families to take their cars to be repaired *right now* - because of a kind of ticking time bomb: Defective air bags that can explode without warning - sending dangerous material - shards of metal - flying through the air. GOVERMENT SEEKS SUPPLIES FOR IMMIGRATION DOCUMENTS

The Homeland Security Department appears to be readying itself for an increase in the number of immigrants living illegally in the country to seek work permits once President Barack Obama announces his executive action plans to change immigration rules. A draft contract proposal the government published earlier this month shows that U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services wants to buy card stock to make as many as 34 million Permanent Resident Cards, or Green Cards, and work permits in the next five years. Administration officials won't say what Obama will do on immigration. But it's widely believed he will announce plans later this year to temporarily protect millions of immigrants living in the country illegally from deportation and give them new work permits.

EBOLA NURSE FREE OF VIRUS

Doctors no longer detect Ebola in a Texas nurse who flew to Ohio and back before she was diagnosed with the virus, her family said Wednesday. Officials at Emory University Hospital and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention couldn't detect Ebola in Amber Vinson as of Tuesday evening, her family said in a statement released through a media consultant. Doctors usually do two tests a day apart before saying they can't detect the virus. It's unclear how many tests Vinson has had. Vinson's mother, Debra Berry, spoke to her Wednesday, and Vinson has been approved for transfer from isolation, the statement said. "We all know that further treatment will be necessary as Amber continues to regain strength, but these latest developments have truly answered prayers and bring our family one step closer to reuniting with her at home," Berry said. Vinson, 29, remains in treatment at Emory, near Atlanta. Emory wouldn't release any information about the patient, hospital spokeswoman Holly Korschun said.

OBAMACARE HISPANICS

HealthCare.gov's new EZ application for coverage can't be used by legal immigrants or naturalized U.S. citizens. That's prompting concern that many Hispanics and Asians will go right back into long enrollment queues this year. The Obama administration wants more Latinos to sign up under the health care law for 2015. Hispanics are the nation's largest minority group, and they're younger and more likely to be uninsured. An administration official says there have been significant improvements in the application process for immigrants, but advocates are unimpressed. Alvaro Huerta a lawyer with the National Immigration Law Center in Los Angeles, says the whole idea was that HealthCare.gov was going to be seamless and easy, but that doesn't seem to be the case for immigrants.

READY OR NOT, OPEN ENROLLMENT TIME

It is probably something you don't pay much attention to but this year you probably want to. There could be changes in open enrollment in your company's health care plan for 2015 that you may need to check out. Usually the only time we pay attention to open enrollment is because of a big life change, like getting married or having a kid, for example, but this year we all need to pay close attention. The reason? It has to do with changes related to the affordable care act or "obamacare", meaning health plans must now meet a new standard. According to the 2014 aflac work forces report -- there are a couple of things you better check before letting your open enrollment deadline pass by: 56 percent of companies surveyed raised co-payments and premiums last year and more companies are expected to do that by the end of 2014. A mercer study says companies are going to do more to encourage steps to improve your own health, like wellness campaigns or company-sponsored health screenings.

STUDY: BEER FERTILITY

Would-be daddies should hit the bottle immediately. Beer-guzzling guys can increase their chances of becoming a father if they drink a few beers each day, a new study shows. But while the booze helped men get their gals pregnant, downing a few cups of coffee each day cut the guys' chances of making a baby, according to the study done by Massachusetts General Hospital. The study examined more than 100 men at the hospital whose partners were undergoing in vitro fertilization between 2007 and 2013, according to London's Telegraph. Dudes who downed at least a pint and a half each day were more than twice as likely to have children through IVF than those who stayed stone-cold sober. Java drinkers, however, showed the opposite effect. Men who drank more than two cups of joe each morning had their chances of becoming fathers cut drastically to just 1 in 5.

40% OF WEB USERS HAVE BEEN HARASSED

New research gives a detailed look at abusive behavior on the web. 73-percent of adult internet users have witnessed someone be harassed online--and 40-percent have personally experienced it. That's according to a new survey by the pew research center. The group used responses from more than 28-hundred web users. The survey found young adults, ages 18-to-29, are more likely than any other group to experience online harassment. And the harshest forms of abuse--physical threats, stalking and sexual harassment--are often reserved for women. The pew report suggests social media is where a lot of online harassment takes place.

U-S NATIONAL PARK FEE HIKES PROPOSED

If you're planning on visiting the grand canyon or yellowstone national park, next year, you better pack some extra cash. Some national parks are planning on hiking their entrance fees. For the first time in eight years the national park service will be allowed to raise entrance and amenity fees. Proposals have to be submitted by next march; the fee increases could go into effect by next summer. Yosemite national park released its proposal on tuesday. A weekly pass could increase from 20 to 30 dollars. Camping fees could go up 20-percent. Less than a third of the national park service's 401 sites charge an entrance fee.

Doctor who became New York City's first Ebola patient was praised for getting treatment immediately upon showing symptoms, and health officials stressed that the nation's most populous city need not fear his wide-ranging travel in the days before his illness began. Mayor Bill de Blasio and Gov. Andrew Cuomo urged residents not to be alarmed by the doctor's diagnosis Thursday, even as they described him riding the subway, taking a cab and bowling since returning to New York from Guinea a week ago. De Blasio said all city officials followed "clear and strong" protocols in their handling and treatment of him. "We want to state at the outset that New Yorkers have no reason to be alarmed," de Blasio said. "New Yorkers who have not been exposed are not at all at risk." The doctor, Craig Spencer, a member of Doctors Without Borders, reported Thursday morning coming down with a 100.3-degree fever and

diarrhea. He was being treated in an isolation ward at Manhattan's Bellevue Hospital, a designated Ebola center. In appearance on CNN on Friday morning, the governor said Spencer "presented himself" to the hospital when he had a 100-point-3 fever ... not 103 ... as has been reported." New York City's health department on Friday confirmed that the doctor's temperature was 100.3. Cuomo said Friday that the doctor "obviously felt he wasn't symptomatic" when he went out "in a limited way." "When you're a doctor you know you're not contagious until you're symptomatic," Cuomo said on NBC's Today show. "As soon as he had a fever he presented himself to a hospital." The governor, in an appearance on CNN's New Day, said there was no reason to fear riding the subway, and he would do so Friday.

One commuter said he first learned of New York's first Ebola case on the subway on his way to work Friday morning. It's "a scary thing" because there are "a lot of germs in New York," said Chris Thompson who was riding the L train, one of the lines Spencer rode after returning home from West Africa.

GOVERNORS BACK HOME QUARANTINE FOR EBOLA WORKERS VO: 33

The governors of New York and New Jersey are at odds with scientists over Ebola as they back 21-day quarantines for medical workers returning from West Africa, while the nation's top infectious-disease expert warns that such restrictions are unnecessary and could discourage volunteers from aiding disease-ravaged countries. The two governors late Sunday night emphasized separately that their policies permit home confinement for medical workers who have had contact with Ebola patients if the workers show no symptoms. They will receive twice-daily monitoring from health officials. The emphasis on home confinement was at odds with the widely criticized treatment of a nurse returning from Sierrra Leone who was forcibly quarantined is a New Jersey hospital isolation unit even though she said had no symptoms and tested negative for Ebola.

New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo said such quarantines in medical facilities would only be used in some cases, such as if the health care workers were from states other than New York or New Jersey. For workers under home confinement, family members will be allowed to stay, and friends may visit with the approval of health officials.

GAS-PRICES DROPS 18 CENTS

A national survey of gas prices reports that the average cost of U.S. regular grade gas dropped 18 cents per gallon in the last two weeks. Industry analyst Trilby Lundberg said Sunday that the average for regular grade gas is \$3.08 per gallon, while midgrade averages \$3.31 and premium \$3.47. Retail diesel averages \$3.67. Lundberg said the price has dropped 65 cents since its peak in May and is 29 cents below what it was last year. She said the drop has been driven by a decrease in the price of crude oil. She forecasts minimal further cuts if prices remain stable. In the Lower 48 states, San Francisco had the highest average price at \$3.45 per gallon, while Memphis, Tennessee, had the lowest average at \$2.73.


