**Act One -- "The Rangers":** The Rangers are not playoff bound, but they are building something big in Texas with an eye on the future. The failure to make the playoffs is certainly not due to lack of effort. Their powerful lineup leads MLB in runs scored, hits and slugging average. Texas believes it has the makings of a youthful and special lineup for a long time. The leader is five-time all-star Michael Young. Young is only the seventh MLB player in history with five consecutive 200 hit seasons. His consistent approach is an example of baseball excellence, especially because he leads by example.
