A. EDUCATION

Title: AMERICAN FALLS BOND

Broadcast Date: 7-5
Duration: 2:27

Description: Following failure of a property tax bond issue last spring, the American Falls school district is looking for solutions to building needs. The school board does plan to put another bond before voters, but must come up with answers before the 2016-17 school year. The board has decided to rent a two-room modular unit for this year. The board will also hire an additional third-grade teacher.

The Idaho Department of Water Resources said there has probably been an over-appropriation of resources and that there is probably a weather or climate change effect as well.

PUC officials said it would require people to dial all 10 digits of a phone number. In addition to phones, every device, including ATM machines and I-pads also have an assigned number. Current devices will keep a 208 prefix, but new ones will have a 986 prefix. The new numbers will take effect in late 2017, but 10 digit dialing will be required in August.
