The following represent some of the key issues facing the broadcast area of KIDK during the current filing period. They are referenced on the accompanying programming summaries.

Unless otherwise noted, all programs aired as part of EYEWITNESS News at 5:30 pm & 10 pm

- A) **EDUCATION:** Issues relating to public school and university education in our community.
- B) **HEALTH / ENVIRONMENT:** Issues related to our environment and health of our community.
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- E) **LAW ENFORCEMENT:** Tracking trends in neighborhood crime and the legal progress of criminal cases.

SECTION 2:

RESPONSIVE PROGRAMS

A. *EDUCATION*

Title: AMERICAN FALLS BOND

Broadcast Date: 7-5

Duration: 2:27

Description: Following failure of a property tax bond issue last spring, the American Falls school district is looking for solutions to building needs. The school board does plan to put another bond before voters, but must come up with answers before the 2016-17 school year. The board has decided to rent a two-room modular unit for this year. The board will also hire an additional third-grade teacher.

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Description: A committee studying the prospects for an Idaho Falls based Community College has completed its review. The project would require \$800,000 be raised through a new taxing district. According to the committee, the district would raise property taxes about \$13 a year for a \$170,000 average home. But, the committee said the new college would not only generate new business, but also lower the cost of a college education.

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Description: United Way of Southeast Idaho launched a new Cradle to Career Campaign with a large donation from Monsanto. The program is aimed at supporting an initiative to improve pre-kindergarten childhood education. The goal is to prepare kids to be at grade level before going into kindergarten and first grade. Officials said better prepared students not only do better in early grades, but throughout the rest of their education.

Title: SCHOOL SECURITY

Broadcast Date: 9-15

Duration: 2:43

Description: Idaho First Lady Lori Otter traveled to Shelley to formally launch the new "See, Tell, Now" campaign in eastern Idaho. It is specifically aimed at improving school security. That will include adding surveillance cameras and generally improving common practices to monitor who has access to the school building. The new program will also encourage vigilance among school students.

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Broadcast Date: 9-19

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Description: BYU Idaho is posting another record enrollment. About 18,000 students are enrolled for the fall semester. And, administrators are forecasting growth to continue by about 6 percent per year for the next several years. The Rexburg business community believes the growth is nothing but positive. But, the Mayor of Rexburg said it also presents challenges, especially in the area of student housing. The University is looking to the private sector to meet that need, but is prepared to step in with institutional housing if necessary.

B. HEALTH/ENVIRONMENT

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Broadcast Date: 7-6

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Description: People living near Arco are finding wells they've had for decades are beginning to go dry. Residents say their wells had to go deeper after new subdivisions were developed. They said the Lost River doesn't even come close to making it into town to recharge the aquifer there. The Idaho Department of Water Resources said there has probably been an over-appropriation of resources and that there is probably a weather or climate change effect as well.

Title: ENERGY SUMMIT

Broadcast Date: 8-10

Duration: 1:10

Description: Governor Butch Otter was a keynote speaker of the annual Energy Summit. Otter focused on the need for alternative energy...especially nuclear energy for future energy resources. The Governor also pressed for economic growth that reduces the amount of carbon in the air. For example, he said thinning overgrown forest by allowing more grazing could dramatically reduce the amount of land that burns every year.

Title: HENRY'S CREEK FIRE

Broadcast Date: 8-22 to 8-26

Duration: (varied)

Description: Newscasts each night featured team coverage of range and forest fires that struck eastern Idaho at the beginning of the week. The Henry's Creek fire grew to well over 50 thousand acres, primarily burning sage and grass land. The Tie Canyon fire began mid-week and threatened the town of Victor. Coverage included nightly reports on a variety of subjects ranging from the basic path of the fire to impacts on livestock, health, etc.

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Broadcast Date: 9-16

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Description: Fish and Game biologists have been studying the environmental impact of the Henry's Creek fire on wildlife habitat. Some believe deer populations in particular could die off by the thousands. One of the biggest areas of concern is the Tex Creek Wildlife Management Area. Moose and elk may be less impacted. The lack of cover, however, could force wildlife closer to town in search of vegetation this winter.

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Broadcast Date: 9-21

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Description: "Your Health Idaho" announced that people participating in the state's Obama Care system will have additional health insurance plans to choose from next year. There will be 225 certified plans, 15 more than a year ago. Idaho has 95,000 people enrolled and a fee almost half of that paid by people in other states. That has saved Idaho participants about \$13 million. Monthly costs will go up, although most of it will be offset by tax credits. All of the plans will be available for preview starting Oct. 1.

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Broadcast Date: 7-12

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Description: Idaho Falls developers are planning nearly 100 new townhomes this summer. Planners said it reflects a national trend toward non-traditional single family homes. The Planning and Zoning commission is currently reviewing two development plans to make sure they meet minimum city requirements.

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Broadcast Date: 7-13

Duration: 2:08

Description: The Portneuf Wellness Complex is costing Bannock County more to maintain than originally forecast. When the county took over management of the complex, it was also given about \$2 million to cover maintenance costs. There is now about \$400,000 left in that budget. The county hopes to make additional revenue from ticket sales, but is considering other options. Those options include either property taxes and event ticket prices or user fees.

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Broadcast Date: 9-26

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Description: As the first presidential debate nears, Bonneville County election officials report more than 43 thousand Idahoans are registered to vote. People can register by filling out a card and presenting their driver license. Voters must be US Citizens and must have permanent residence by October 9 and be 18 by election day. Absentee and early voter ballots are also available.

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Broadcast Date: 9-27

Duration: 2:00

Description: The Idaho Public Utilities Commission met with area people to outline how implementation of a new area code will impact them. PUC officials said it would require people to dial all 10 digits of a phone number. In addition to phones, every device, including ATM machines and I-pads also have an assigned number. Current devices will keep a 208 prefix, but new ones will have a 986 prefix. The new numbers will take effect in late 2017, but 10 digit dialing will be required in August.

D. ECONOMY

Title: POWER OUTAGE

Broadcast Date: 7-19

Duration: 2:15

Description: *More than 120,000 people were without power for several hours after problems were reported at the Goshen substation near Shelley. The outage had a particularly hard impact on restaurants and some other businesses in an area stretching from eastern Idaho into West Yellowstone and Jackson.*

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Description: Yellowstone Bear World has announced an expansion proposal that would bring an additional \$25 million into the Madison County economy. The tourist attraction would like to build a hotel and indoor water park. But, owners said they can't do that until the Idaho Transportation Department approves a new direct access from US Highway 20. ITD said it's priority was to remove at-grade intersections that threaten public safety.

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Description: After nearly a year delay, a large scaled solar complex in Power County is now under construction. The original company filed for bankruptcy and was taken over by Capital Dynamics. It will entail 390 acres of solar panels and a substation occupying 10 acres. It will be a 40 megawatt production project and should be complete by January...one month behind its original construction schedule.

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Broadcast Date: 7-19

Duration: 2:01

Description: The Cliff Creek fire in western Wyoming served as a warning to people living in interface areas that they need to be prepared for evacuation at a moment's notice. Officials advise we prepare two ways to escape a home and a neighborhood, in case one of those escape routes gets blocked. Make sure young children know what emergency officials look like so they don't try to hide. People should also make plans for pets and wildlife.

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
