The following represent some of the key issues facing the broadcast area of KIDK during the current filing period. They are referenced on the accompanying programming summaries.

Unless otherwise noted, all programs aired as part of EYEWITNESS News at 5:30 pm & 10 pm

- A) **EDUCATION:** Issues relating to public school and university education in our community.
- B) **HEALTH / ENVIRONMENT:** Issues related to our environment and health of our community.
- C) **GOVERNMENT/POLITICS:** Issues facing local government including taxation and political moves in an election year.
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- E) **LAW ENFORCEMENT:** Tracking trends in neighborhood crime and the legal progress of criminal cases.

SECTION 2:

RESPONSIVE PROGRAMS

A. *EDUCATION*

Title: D25 LUNCH POLICY

Broadcast Date: 1-5

Duration: 2:32

Description: The Pocatello-Chubbuck school district announced it had offered a fired lunchroom worker a new job. She was fired after it was learned she gave a free lunch to a student. She refused to respond to the district's offer. School officials said the woman gave the country a misleading picture of the entire community and explained that school policy offers alternatives to children who can't afford a school lunch and explained that school policy offers alternatives to children who can't afford a school lunch.

Title: I.F. COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Broadcast Date: 1-11

Duration: 3:15

Description: Governor Butch Otter is committing five million dollars in state funding to back an effort to convert Eastern Idaho Technical College into an Idaho Falls Community College. While a "tech college" focuses on trade skills, a community college could expand that with a full bachelor's degree at an affordable price. Idaho Falls and Ammon officials also like the idea, believing it would be a benefit to the local economy.

Title: BONNEVILLE SCHOOL DISTRICT PICKS CONTRACTOR

Broadcast Date: 2-11

Duration: 2:40

Description: The Bonneville School Board selected a Utah contractor to manage construction of a new high school. However, the decision was criticized by local contractors, who argued the decision could take away local jobs. But, school officials said the contractor agreed to predominantly hire local firms to do the work.

Duration: 1:58

General Contractors of Idaho protested the board's selection of the company, saying it failed to secure proper licenses for Idaho. School board trustees said they would probably have to re-assign the contract to the second lowest bidder.

Title: COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Broadcast Date: 2/15

Duration: 2:00

Description: Idaho Falls and Ammon Mayors have named a committee to oversee the public discussion of proposals to create a community college in Idaho Falls. The group will look at potential geographic boundaries and taxpayer costs, as well as potential advantages of the move. The group will make a preliminary report in May and a final report in July.;

Title: TEACHERS IN STUDENTS' SHOES

Broadcast Date: 3-22

Duration: 2:00

Description: Teachers at Jackson Hole High School have initiated a program to follow a student to each of his activities throughout the day. Administrators say the program is giving them a better understanding of the challenges facing students in a typical day. Students said they were not intimidated and gave teachers an honest appraisal of their feelings. Teachers said it would help them help students to have a better high school experience.

B. HEALTH/ENVIRONMENT

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Broadcast Date: 1-15

Duration: 2:23

Description: Environmental scientists met with the Pocatello City Council to outline a “vision” study designed to reinvigorate the Portneuf River. Supporters said it would enhance tourism, fish and wildlife and encourage economic development. In addition to aesthetic improvements, the plan would also address flood control, chemical, and other environmental problems.

Title: ZIKA VIRUS

Broadcast Date: 1-18

Duration: 1:52

Description: The Centers for Disease Control are advising pregnant women to avoid travel to Central or South America. The mosquito borne Zika virus has been found in 24 countries. The biggest concern is the incidence of microphalia in newborn children. At the moment, there are no vaccines or treatments to prevent or treat Zika. So far, 20 cases have been reported in the United States.

Title: UCON ELEMENTARY LEAD

Broadcast Date: 2-12

Duration: 2:16

Description: Administrators disclosed that Ucon Elementary school students were exposed to lead from a school drinking fountain. Tests indicated the amount of lead exposure was double the amount of what is considered dangerous. The fountain was covered and bottled water was ordered in to serve to students and faculty after the President’s Day holiday. The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality admitted the high readings were first detected three years ago and that the department failed to follow up on its findings.

Title: LEAD TESTING FOLO

Broadcast Date: 2-15

Duration: 1:34

Description: Private retailers are selling kits that can be used to test for the presence of lead in private homes. The process is as simple as placing water in a beaker , placing in proper tablets, and using the proper testing strips. The kits also include copper and iron. Filters can be used to handle small amounts of unwanted chemicals.

Title: GRIZZLY BEARS

Broadcast Date: 3-3

Duration: 1:23

Description: The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is proposing to remove the Yellowstone grizzly bear from protection under the endangered species act. The agency said there were ample numbers to support the move. The de-listing would come after the states of Wyoming, Montana and Idaho develop and institute a joint management plan for the habitat area.

Title: AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES

Broadcast Date: 3-28

Duration: 2:41

Description: Franklin County is considering a proposal to close its reservoirs to recreational boats this summer. The state has cut funding for 24 check stations intended to screen boats for aquatic invasive species like quagga mussels. Irrigators say that if a contaminated boat made it into the water it could lead to nearly irreversible damage to irrigation equipment and the environment. A decision will be made within a few weeks. If closed, the decision would have a multi-million dollar economic impact.

C. GOVERNMENT/POLITICS

Title: SOCIAL LEGISLATIVE ISSUES

Broadcast Date: 1-4

Duration: 2:11

Description: A number of legislative issues are being identified prior to the 2016 session, but Pocatello democratic Senator Roy Lacey expects social issues will face a fate similar to that of 2015....failure. "Add the Words" and extension of Medicaid benefits are expected to fail before republican leadership. He said any connection with the federal government or the Obama administration is doomed to failure without consideration.

Title: SAUSA

Broadcast Date: 2-8

Duration: 1:30

Description: The US Attorney's Office for Idaho announced it was appointing a special assistant federal prosecutor to serve eastern Idaho. James Dalton will work to reduce the number repeat offenders who serve minimum time at the local level before they're back on the street. He will target the most serious offenders who pose the greatest risk....including drug trafficking and prostitution.

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Broadcast Date: 3-4

Duration: 1:00

Description: In an exclusive interview, Senator Marco Rubio talked about his immigration policy and how it would affect Idaho. He said the key to the program was a secure border and a guest worker program. Rubio also addressed management of the Idaho National Laboratory. He said he would prefer to privatize the research currently being conducted there.

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Duration: 2:15

Description: Thousands of supporters of Bernie Sanders presidential bid turned out at Skyline High School for a political rally. Sanders focused on issues he believed would also concern a "conservative" audience, including Idaho's health-care gap, "Wall Street Greed", and free college for all high school graduates. Sanders said polls indicate he could beat republican front-runner Donald Trump in a head-to-head contest.

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Broadcast Date: 3-22

Duration: 4:00

Description: Democrats turned out in large numbers for the presidential caucus in Idaho Falls and Pocatello. Both Sanders and Clinton had a sizable number of supporters, who surprised organizers across the state. Supporters of each candidate began the night together, then listened to pleas from representatives of each candidate to join their caucus. Ultimately, Sanders ended the night with a large majority of votes in each county. Selection of delegates for the state convention continued into the night.

D. ECONOMY

Title: REXBURG WALMART OPENING

Broadcast Date: 1-7

Duration: 2:05

Description: After two years in the works, the Walmart Superstore in Rexburg is being stocked this week in preparation for its opening. One big issue facing the city is what will happen with the building Walmart....and other "box" stores have left behind. In addition to the soon-to-be vacant Walmart building,, a former Staples building is up for lease, the old Cal Ranch store is vacant, and the former K-Mart building is half-empty. The city's economic development director said the empty buildings reflect more hiring, but still leave some unsightly empty buildings.

Title: MORTGAGE RATES

Broadcast Date: 2-3

Duration: 2:00

Description: The local real-estate market is turning into a seller's market. 30-year mortgage rates have fallen to 3.79 percent. Realtors say buyers can still get a good deal, as sellers get higher values. At the present time, there are more buyers than listings, so sellers can entertain two or three offers.

Title: HOME VALUES

Broadcast Date: 3-1

Duration: 1:42

Description: According to the Snake River Multiple Listing Service, the number of single family homes for sale in Bonneville County is down 33 percent from the previous year. As a result, realtors say the market is good for both buyers and sellers. They said low interest rates have also stimulated new home construction.

Title: WOMEN AND WORK

Broadcast Date: 3-9

Duration: 2:37

Description: Over 200 girls from regional schools participated in the 16th annual Women and Work Conference at ISU. The conference focused on providing girls with information about possible careers involving STEM fields, or science, technology, engineering and math. Although typically male-dominated, many of the careers are now opening to women.

E. LAW ENFORCEMENT

Title: PLANE CRASH

Broadcast Date: 1-4

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Description: The Bonneville County Sheriff's Office was dispatched to the scene of a private airplane crash near Alpine and Palisades Reservoir. Two persons were killed, including the pilot and a teenage passenger. Both were part time residents of Alpine from South Carolina. The impact of the crash was the probable cause of death. The cause of the crash was under investigation.

Title: IDAHO FALLS FIRE STATION

Broadcast Date: 1-8

Duration: 2:01

Description: Idaho Falls has broken ground for a new downtown fire station. Located on "E" Street between Park and Shoup, the building will take about a year to build. The existing facility has cracking floors and walls and won't support modern fire-fighting equipment. The new building will accommodate a ladder-truck capable of protecting multi-story buildings in the downtown area.

Title: BANNOCK COUNTY JAIL

Broadcast Date: 1-19

Duration: 1:30

Description: The Bannock County Sheriff said that unless the county jail is expanded soon, it could face federal lawsuits. He hopes to see an \$18 to \$20 million bond issue go to voters in May. If successful, it would increase basic property tax rates by about \$20 per year. County commissioners created an advisory committee to review design and costs and to help answer questions for the public.

Title: BOMB THREAT REACTION

Broadcast Date: 2-11

Duration: 1:39

Description: The Bannock County Sheriff's office arrested a man for false reporting of an explosive device in a private or public place. The arrest came after a previous incident in which the courthouse was evacuated after a bomb threat. The County Commission met with department heads to overview emergency policies. Because officials have to make decisions on the credibility of threats, they will err on the side of caution. And, all threats will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

Title: SEXTING

Broadcast Date: 2-15

Duration: 2:29

Description: Most parents are aware their children are sending texts every day, but may not be aware of the content. But with new apps on the market, it is very easy for kids to get into activities that are inappropriate. Although half of the states have laws that contain consequences for teen sexting, Idaho and Wyoming are not among them. As a result, it is up to parents to make sure their devices are safe.

Title: MISSING BOY'S PARENTS SPEAK OUT

Broadcast Date: 3-11

Duration: 4:18

Description: The parents of missing toddler DeOrr Kunz said their family has fired a private investigator hired to learn more about his disappearance at a Leadore campground last summer. In their first interview, the couple denied the investigator's claim that they knew where the boy's body was. Now, the parents said they are getting death threats from strangers who blame them for their son's disappearance. They request the public keep their eyes open for any sign of the boy.
