The board said three factors guide the effort including courses of study, financial resources and community support groups. The state awarded \$10 million in scholarships this year.

He claims school boards should be setting a standard for children to honor and respect the constitution...and boards should use it to demand adequate funding from the legislature.

Description: After a series of high profile protests, the Bureau of Land Management is looking at a new approach to its decision making. State Senator and sheep producer Jeff Siddoway said new government regulations are one of the key reasons land users are frustrated. BLM hopes the new process will help address those concerns.
