As the Senate prepares to begin a free-wheeling debate over immigration next week, White House officials have begun floating a possible compromise idea - a pledge to maintain legal immigration at current levels, about 1.1 million people a year, for more than a decade. President Trump has proposed a series of measures, including restrictions on family unification, which he calls "chain migration," and an end to the visa lottery, that critics say ultimately could cut legal immigration to America by 40% or more. But a White House official said Saturday that the Trump administration is working with allies in the Senate on a proposal that would create a path to citizenship for an estimated 1.8 million people who were brought to the country illegally as children, and that would clear the backlog of nearly 4 million sponsored relatives who currently are waiting for green cards.

The combined effort, officials said, would effectively make up for the cuts in other immigration categories for about 13 years, the official said. After that, if Congress takes no additional action to add or expand visa categories, the total number of people allowed to resettle in the U.S. each year likely would decline by hundreds of thousands.

With the fate of hundreds of thousands of young, undocumented immigrants in the balance, the Senate on Monday began an open-ended debate on immigration - an exceedingly rare step that, in effect, will allow senators to attempt to build a bill from scratch on the Senate floor. The highly unusual debate, expected to unfold throughout the week, will test whether a series of legislative concepts and proposals championed by President Trump and a variety of Republicans and Democrats can garner 60 votes, the threshold for a measure to pass the Senate. No one has any idea how it will turn out. The debate kicked off Monday evening with a procedural vote on an unrelated House-passed measure that will serve as a shell for building an immigration bill. By a vote of 97 to 1, with only Senator Ted Cruz, Republican of Texas, dissenting, senators took the first step toward consideration of the underlying measure, as expected. The push on immigration comes against the backdrop of a ticking clock, and months of congressional inaction.

Opposition to teacher carrying guns

The recent mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High school in Parkland, Florida, has reignited a national debate about guns in America. In particular, as the conversation has focused on how to keep children safe in schools, the idea of arming some teachers has garnered attention. A 2017 Pew Research Center survey found that more than half of U.S. adults (55%) would oppose allowing teachers and officials to carry guns in K-12 schools, including 36% who said they would *strongly* oppose such a proposal. Still, a sizable minority (45%) said they favored allowing teachers to carry guns in schools. Parents with children younger than 18 in the household were no more or less likely than non-parents to express support for allowing teachers to carry guns in schools: 46% of parents and 44% of non-parents said they would favor it. Instead, opinions divided primarily along party lines and gun ownership status, with Republicans and those who own guns particularly likely to say they would support allowing teachers to carry guns in schools. About seven-in-ten Republicans and Republican-leaning independents (69%) said they would favor allowing teachers to carry guns in schools. In contrast, just about a quarter of Democrats and those Democratic leanners (26%) shared this view. Similarly, while a majority of gun owners (66%) said they would support this proposal, about a third of non-gun owners (35%) said the same.

Buyer beware. If you've snapped up a smart TV, with built-in Netflix, YouTube, Hulu and other Web connections, heads up on this warning-your smart TV could make you vulnerable to hackers and is probably monitoring more of your viewing than you realize. Consumer Reports just analyzed smart TVs from the five biggest US TV brands - Samsung, LG, Sony, TCL and Vizio - and found several problems. All can track what consumers watch and two of the brands failed a basic security test. How bad is the security? So poor, according to its report, that it was able to take over complete remote control of the TVs from Samsung and TCL's branded Roku TV, which included changing channels, upping the volume, installing new apps and playing objectionable content from YouTube. Consumer Reports hacked into the TCL/Roku TV by using a feature Roku created that allows for remote use of a remote control via other platforms, like on a smartphone. That feature can be disabled, says Roku. Additionally, to use the feature, you have to be on the same Wi-Fi system, and Roku suggests users have password-protected Wifi to prevent security breaches. Smart TVs represented over half of all TV sales in the first half of 2017, according to market researcher GFK, and at this point, most sets being marketed are "smart." Consumers opt for them because

The flu has not yet reached "epidemic" proportions, according to last week's CDC data, but it may happen soon. A flu epidemic occurs when the percentage of people who have died from the flu exceeds a threshold set by the CDC using data from prior years. Last week, the number of people who died from the flu this year was only 0.2 percent below that threshold. Doctor's visits for flu-like illness are rising. This year's numbers are almost identical to three years ago, in the 2014-2015 season -- both years surpassed what was seen last year, 2016-2017.

As if taxpayers don't have enough to worry about. Thousands of Americans have been conned out of more than \$1 million by crooks posing as IRS agents demanding tax payments, according to the U.S. Treasury. "This is the largest scam of its kind that we have ever seen," said J. Russell George, the Treasury inspector general for tax administration, who says the agency has received more than 20,000 complaints about the fraud. The sophisticated phone scam has hit victims in every state, tax officials say. Callers claiming to be from the IRS tell intended victims they owe taxes and must pay using a prepaid debit card or wire transfer. The scammers threaten those who refuse to pay with arrest, deportation or loss of a business or driver's license. To lend the scam credibility, the crooks often know the last four digits of the taxpayer's Social Security number, and the calls are made with spoofed caller identification software that makes it appear the call is originating from the IRS. In many cases, taxpayers will get follow-up calls that appear to be from their state motor vehicle agency (if a driver's license was threatened) or the police. The scammers also send follow-up emails that mimic the IRS insignia and even appear to be signed by real IRS officials. "The increasing number of people receiving these unsolicited calls from individuals who fraudulently claim to represent the IRS is alarming," George said. "Particularly during the tax filing season, we want to make sure that innocent taxpayers are alert to this scam so they are not harmed by these criminals. Do not become a victim." In reality, if you owe taxes, the IRS will contact you by U.S. mail -- not email. The agency never asks for payment via debit card or wire transfer. It never asks you to provide a credit card number over the phone. And it never requests personal or financial information by e-mail, text or social media.

Early voting numbers in Texas suggest surging Democratic enthusiasm.

The road to the House majority begins Tuesday in Texas, where Democrats must cull crowded candidate fields in the first primary election of 2018. Early voting numbers suggest high levels of enthusiasm on the left, particularly in historically Republican, suburban districts around Houston and the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex. But the party needs nominees who are well-suited to take on longtime GOP incumbents in these places in what will be the first test of House Democrats' strategy to negotiate crowded party primaries. State Sen. Sylvia Garcia, who would be the first Hispanic woman to represent Texas in Congress, appeared to be a lock on replacing Democratic Rep. Gene Green, who endorsed her, for his eastern Houston seat. But then Sen. Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.) weighed in. Two weeks before Election Day, the Senate minority leader endorsed health care executive Tahir Javed, a first-time candidate and longtime fundraiser who brought in \$1.2 million for his own bid, most of it from his own bank account. Javed's election would also be historic, as Texas hasn't sent an Asian-American to Congress. The Congressional Hispanic Caucus said it was "disappointed" by Schumer's intervention.
