Today's first guest was Heather Geronemus, from MADD. She came to discuss the MADD dash walk run being held on April 28th at 7:30am-11am. The walk takes place at Huizenga Plaza in Fort Lauderdale. This event is sponsored by La Croix and Ultimate Software. MADD was founded by Candice Lightner, whose daughter Cari was killed by a drunk driver. She was 13 years old at the

driving and she found that to be unacceptable and has been building awareness since 1980. MADD services the entire country and anyone can be affected by DUI.

Today's second guest was Lori Castle, chair of the 2018 Celebration Gala for the American Cancer Society Broward Chapter. She has been the chair for the last two years. She is co-chairing with her daughter. She lost her mom to cancer to Metastatic Colon Cancer in 2015 after a 12 year battle. This year's theme is Let's Fiesta and it is being held at the Fort Lauderdale Marriott Harbor Beach Resort and Spa on May 5th from 6:30-11:30pm. They have already raised \$270,000 of their \$350,000 goal.

Today's first guest was Jim Braun, the general manager of IFLY Indoor Skydiving in Davie, FL. This is the 28th location that has opened in the US. They have a charity called IFLY All Abilities. They have an event coming up on April 12th at IFLY Fort Lauderdale. This event is custom designed for physical and cognitive challenges to create an environment of support and inclusion by making the dream of flight a reality for those in the special needs community. This is a monthly event that occurs every second Thursday. The guests can experience the sensation of skydiving in a safe, comfortable environment.

Today's second guest was Professor Anthony Abbate, the Director of the FAU School of Architecture and he came to speak about how the construction industry is adapting to climate change and sea level rise, especially in coastal communities which have long been impacted.

Segment 6: Trauma and Burn Surgery Specialty

Today's first guest is Dr. Raul Cruz, an anesthesiologist at Ketamine Health Centers in Miami. He has been licensed for over 10 years. He is very involved in the full spectrum of his specialty. He came on the show to primarily discuss the trauma and burn surgery specialty.

He has developed expert knowledge in the use and delivery of IV ketamine to treat burn victims. He has also had a lot of luck in treating patients with depression, anxiety, PTSD and neuropathic pain with Ketamine.

Today's second guest was Francisco Cruz, who joined in on the discussion above. He is the head Psychiatrist at the Ketamine Health Center. He is double board certified in general psych and addiction medicine. They discussed the opioid crisis and stated that opioids are the leading cause of death in Americans younger than 50. They also mentioned Ketamine infusion therapy is a way to eradicate the opioid crisis.

Today's student was Mark. He is 22 years old and is in the Culinary program. He was recently made sous chef of the week. He is here from Drug Court and is doing well. He is participating in Family Therapy and was recently allowed to go home on pass. He has been here for 7 weeks.

He hopes to continue his mission and passion to strengthen and enhance public education for Broward students through programs such as financial literacy. Dustin has more than 10 years of experience in this field and spoke about upcoming events to promote his mission.

Robert is the director of tennis city of Coral Gables, He is also the USPTA 2016 Facility Manager of the Year, the USPTA 2014 Touring Professional of the year and the tournament director of Copa Badia International. Segment 11: Workplace Violence

Today's first guest was Keith E. Noble, PHD. He teaches people how to deal with workplace violence, specifically active shooter training. He works to promote best practices in corporate risk mitigation and prevention as it relates to work place violence and active shooter incidents. He also reviews case studies on mass shootings in concerts, schools and workplaces. In lieu, of recent terrible events, his focus has been creating a world-class corporate security culture.

Today's second guest was Dr. Julia Harper, PHD. MS OTRL. Renowned expert, who specializes in brain development and neural plasticity at her center TheraPeeds in Davie, Florida. She says disorders can be detected in infancy, from as early as 6 weeks old. She offers a free screening program called How to keep your child Away from Me for any infant from 6 weeks old to 12 months old that provides parents with answers about their child's development. She also says parents need to be brave to hear the truth about whether their baby's development. They need to know the signs of a problem in development. Anything before or after the normal development stages are early signs to look out for.

Today's student corner was Max. He is 22 and this is his second time in our program. He relapsed on cocaine and came back voluntarily. He is working to get into JobCorp and has a very positive attitude. He is very appreciate for John and Sam giving him a second chance.

Segment 11: Immunizations

Today's guests were both from Walgreen's. We had LaKeisha Axem, who is a Health Care Supervisor and Alie Darbouze, who is also a Health Care Supervisor but in Southwest Florida. They gave us an overview of immunizations. They said immunizations are considered one of the greatest public health achievements in history. There have been significant reductions in the rates of infectious diseases in the United States since the year 1900. Many public health achievements have contributed to this success, including

improved sanitation and the advent of antibiotics. The use of vaccines to prevent diseases has been a key contributor to reducing rates of deaths caused by infectious diseases as well. Immunization programs in the United States during the past century have nearly eliminated many of the vaccine-preventable diseases that were once common. In fact, routine vaccinations have prevented so much disease and averted so many deaths that many people may not even be aware of the devastation that can be caused by vaccine-preventable diseases. Despite the current successes, it is only through ongoing immunization efforts that these diseases will remain under control. The host thanked both guests for the helpful information.
