There are not many outlets for programs in the local African-American community. This weekly program provides that outlet.

This two-hour gospel music program provides local information about residents in the community. Prayers, readings and music are broadcast as part of the program. Community events and issues are announced weekly.

Listeners also learn about local issues for the Alliance community and church in the sermons each week.

Also joining us is Matthew Dallek, a former Wilson Center Public Policy Scholar and Associate Academic Director and Professor of History and Politics at the University of California's Washington Center. He's working on a book that will place the concept of "homeland security" into historical and political perspective. The working title is, "State of Siege: Franklin Roosevelt, Eleanor Roosevelt, and the Battle to Defend America during the Second World War."
