Audacy’s David Glover welcomed American Foundation for Suicide Prevention expert and former Air Force member, Alex Silva in addition to Wounded Warrior Project Clinical Expert, Dr. Erin Fletcher and guest, Dan Miller to discuss the importance of mental health care for Military members and share that the bravest thing many of them can do is ask for help.

Talk Away the Dark: How to Have Open and Honest Conversations with Men. Men are less likely to talk about their mental health struggles than women, which is why it’s so important to break down stigma and open the door for these conversations. Community and friendships are huge protective factors against suicide. We seek to emphasize the critical role that asking someone directly about suicide plays in suicide prevention and demonstrate how to have supportive conversations with loved ones about mental health and suicide prevention.

About 48 million adults experience some degree of hearing loss. Researchers say half of people between 12-35 are at risk of hearing loss due in part to exposure to loud sounds, including music pumped through personal audio devices. Hearing loss is already a problem among older people, with the condition now experienced by one-third of Americans between 64 and 75.

Consistent exposure to loud sounds, and exposure to a single loud sound, can contribute to hearing loss, which if left untreated may increase the risk of health conditions such as dementia. Helping people maintain or improve their hearing health can help them enhance their overall well-being and reduce their risks of falls and health conditions associated with untreated hearing loss, such as social isolation and depression. That’s why UnitedHealthcare has collaborated with a national nonprofit, Wish of a Lifetime, the charitable affiliate of AARP, to launch a public awareness campaign to let people know how they can protect their hearing.

Dr. Monica Murray, an audiologist with UnitedHealthcare and a nationally recognized hearing health expert, discusses hearing loss and ways we can protect our hearing, especially by trying to prevent noise-induced hearing loss.
