1/10/2021 DANIEL REGENEY, OCEAN COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH COORDINATOR, discussed the County's COVID-19 vaccination rollout, logistics, expanded hours, future sites, the process for registering and getting vaccinated, and challenges with supply.

1/17/2021 DR. REBECCA GREENBAUM, PROFESSOR WITH RUTGERS UNIVERSITY'S SCHOOL OF MANAGEMENT AND BUSINESS RELATIONS AND EXPERT ON UNETHICAL LEADERSHIP, discussed bottom-line mentality in politics and the corporate world, why so-called bully bosses get ahead or rise in management positions, difference in perception based on gender in the leadership role and what traits or qualities make good leaders and managers.

1/24/2021 DR. STEVEN TOBIAS, PSYCHOLOGIST AND DIRECTOR OF THE CENTER FOR CHILD & FAMILY DEVELOPMENT IN MORRISTOWN, discussed the impact the COVID-19 pandemic is having on younger children, teens and young adults dealing with online learning, limited sports and social interaction, signs of depression and anxiety, and ways to stay emotionally connected.

1/31/21 LORI GOGANZER, CEO OF THE YMCA OF GREATER MONMOUTH COUNTY, discussed the Y's partnership with the Visiting Nurses Association of Central Jersey Community Health Centers to provide Covid-19 vaccinations to eligible residents, Covid-19 testing being made available at the Red Bank Y, and programs the Y is offering to help families during the pandemic.

2/7/21 PAUL HUSLE, CEO AND PRESIDENT OF JUST BELIEVE INCORPORATED, discussed homelessness in Ocean County, the only county in New Jersey without a full-time shelter, the efforts and progress of his non-profit organization to help those in need, as well as the establishment of temporary shelters during Code Blue nights when temperatures drop during the winter months.

2/14/21 TERRANCE TURNBACH, TOMS RIVER COUNCILMAN, discussed his efforts to draw attention to the issue of homeless in Ocean County by sleeping outside of town hall when temperatures were in the teens, efforts to get the County Board of Commissioners to act, and how the public can get involved.

2/21/21 KERWIN WEBB, PASTOR AT SECOND BAPTIST CHURCH IN ASBURY PARK AND PRESIDENT OF THE GREATER RED BANK AREA

NAACP, In observance of Black History Month, Paster Webb discussed the importance of Dr. Martin Luther King's principles of seeking social justice and equality through non-violence and how those teachings can apply today, what it was like growing up in Alabama after the 1965 marches in Selma, who his role models are, and some of the initiatives and programs of the NAACP.

2/28/21 EDMUND DEVEAUX, PRESIDENT OF THE NEW JERSEY CANNA-BUSINESS ASSOCIATION, discussed New Jersey's decision to officially legalize adult recreational marijuana, including how the state can benefit from a cannabis marketplace and issues involving lack of police control over minors caught with pot and alcohol.

3/7/21 LYNDA FOTE, PRESIDENT OF OCEAN COUNTY CHAPTER OF NOW, THE NATIONAL ORGANIZATION FOR WOMEN, discussed current bills on the national level, including a measure protecting voters rights, as well as initiatives the group is working on the state and local levels for 2021, and the impact of having America's first female Vice President.

3/14/21 LAUREN CONCAR, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE GARDEN STATE FILM FESTIVAL, discussed this year's upcoming hybrid event, of live and virtual programs, diversity of films, some of the local talent being featured, and how they film festival has had to adjust to the COVID-19 pandemic.

3/21/21 JULIE MOWER, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE PHOENIX CENTER IN NUTLEY, discussed how the not-for profit school helps children with educational, behavioral, and therapeutic needs of students ages 5-21 with autism, multiple disabilities, and intellectual disabilities transition to a productive life outside of the classroom, what questions parents should ask when they are deciding on a school for their child, and how the COVID-19 pandemic has forced schools that provide special services to re-adjust and become more creative.

3/28/21 PAUL HOOKER, FOUNDER OF RALLYCAP SPORTS IN MIDDLETOWN, discussed the inspiration for his non-profit group of more than 30 years which gives children and young adults with disabilities a chance to play organized sports, how they were able to turn it into a national organization, and ways the program has had to adapt during the COVID-19 pandemic.
